A stop that should prove to be most interesting will be a duck landing demonstration at the "Goose Pond." Mr. Anderson will demonstrate how wild ducks are caught, examined for age sex, then banded for migration studies, and released.







Also, each advertisement helps to establish the name of a store in the minds of consumers who nay not be interested in buying immediately.

Retailers learn that newspaper readers often clip advertisements and refer to them weeks or months after the date of publication.

A department store which runs a special sale on toys in September finds that many mothers wait until December to order the toys advertised.

A California grocery chain re

cently experimented with advertising in media other than newspapers. The drop in all sales was so drastic, a store official reported that he "didn't have the guts to continue."

The store position in the mar ket could not be regained im-mediately. Only the accumulative effect of repeated newspaper advertising restored sales to former levels.

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





Rules For Christmas Mail For Armed Forces Overseas

10, for surface parcels, and before Dec. 10, for air parcels, has been designated for the mailing Christmas parcels for members of our Armed Forces servoutside the continental d States. The following astructions have therefore been ssued with the view of assuring delivery of the gift parcels on and in good condition. ne term "Armed Force

The term Overseas" includes the personrel of our Armed Forces, mem bers of their families and auth-U.S. Civilians employed everseas who receive their mail brough an A.P.O. or N.P.O.

TIME OF MAILING: The importance of mailing Christmas jurcels during the designated period cannot be emphasized rongly - the better. The public reasonably assured that rcels mailed through the resurface mails ovember 10 will reach their stinations before Christmas wever, no assurance can en that surface parcels mailed er November 10, or Air Parmailed after November 10. Air Parcels mailed after Dember 10, will be delivered in ne for Christmas.

SIZE AND WEIGHT: The ximum size and weight limits surface parcel post and air cel post vary according to CO's and NPO's to which the "cels are sent. Customs declarons are required for parcels iressed to some APO's and O's, and some articles are hibited to certain APO's and 'O's. Therefore it is suggested mailers, before packing parpost for mailing, make y at the post office as to

overseas transmission must necessarily be of strong construction on acount of the great distance these parcels must be transported and the handling and storage must undergo. It is ab solutely necessary that all articles for overseas delivery packed in boxes of meal, wood, solid fiberboard, or strong double faced corrugated fiberboard. Boxes should contain sufficient cushioning material so that the contests will be tightly packed to prevent any rattling or loosen-ing of the articles within the parcels. It is also desireable that all fiberboard boxes be securely wrapped in heavy paper and se-curely tied with strong cord.

ADDRESSING: Addresse must be legible and prepared in typewriting or ink. It is preferable that the outside address be hand-printed on the wrappers of the baxes rather than on labels pasted to the wrappers, since experience has shown that the labels frequently fall off when subject to moisture. It is highly desirable that a slip of paper containing the name and address of the sender and addressee, together wit ha list of the contents be enclosed in each parcel as to provide identification and proper disposition of the mail in the event the address on the outside becomes defaced.

CHRISTMAS CARDS: Patrons sending greeting cards to Armed Forces personnel overseas should such cards prepaid at the first class rate prior to No vember 10 and at the air mail rate prior to December 10, if they are to have a reasonable expectation of delivery prior to Christmas.

REGISTRY AND INSURANCE Mailers are encouraged to re-gister valuable letters and insure valuable parcels. It is recommended that patrons use postal money orders to transmit gifts of money to members of the armed forces serving outside the continental United







A GRICULTURE is the only ma A GRICULTURE is the only major industry to show a death rate increase in the past 20 years. Mining, quarrying, construction, transportation — all have shown significant reductions in the occupational death rate. And industries other than agriculture have progressed rapidly toward establishing programs for safety, encouraged by both management and labor.

Since farming is a comparatively

Since farming is a comparatively individual activity, there has not been any organized advance in safety recognition and supervision. The seasonal harvesting of hay grain and corn, filling silos, repairing buildings and equipment, and the presence of children on vacation from school causes a sharp rise in rural accidents. A third of all agricultural accidents recognized the proceed white requires work.

A third of all agricultural accidents occur during routine work on the farm such as chores, milking, cleaning the barn, caring for animals, manure spreading, tilling the fields and repairing of fences. And the modern mechanization of farms has only added to the azards. Tractors, harvesters, binders and reapers are taking the place of the horse and adding to the serious, mutilating and sometimes fatal accidents.

The most common piece of

The most common piece of equipment on the farm, the tractor, is the cause of most accidents. Frequently driven by young boys, the tractor may topple over a stephillside when forced into maneuvers for which it was not intended. The mechanization of tarms is

saving much labor. But it also in-tensifies the need for controlled





The ding the booklet makes one kink we should all have many anxion moments. In the booklet Gue Fall repeatedly calls for the difact of Goldwafer saying man and over that Goldwafer's feetim would erase all the mine the communist party has

made in the United States.

These are pretty bold statements coming from such a dishonest and disloyal citizen as Gus Hall.

Gus Hall says in this booklet, "Here, there is the merging of ideological currents, of reactionary centers with some mass base. The hopes of electoral victory is based on racism, jingoism and anti-communism." He further attacks the Republican platform plank which says, "There can be no peace, there can be no security until this goal is won", referring to the aim for total vic ory and world peace.

Lest we think too lightly of Mr. Hall and his statements, let's remember what the communist goal in the United States is. According to The Communist Party A Manual on Organization: "A the leader and organizer of the proletariat, the Communist Party of the U.S.A. leads the working class in the fight for the revolutionary overthrow of capitalism for the establishment of the dictatorship of the proletariat, for the complete abolition of classes for the establishment of socialism, the first stage of the class-Communist Society."

The handbook goes on to say,"....for revolution it is essential, first, that a majority of he workers should fully understand the necessity of revolution and be ready to sacrifice their lives for it; secondly, that the ruling classes be in a state of government crisis which draws even the most backward masses into poli ics....weakens the government and makes it possible for the revolutionaries to overthrow it rapidly."

The handbook goes into lengthy description then of the infiltration needed to be done in labor unions and farmers groups to keep them striking for higher pay and shorter hours and the need to encourage Negro unrest.

This is not a plea for votes for Barry Goldwater. By now most voters have made up their minds about their candidate This is, however a lone, small voice asking everyone to think.
Think before you vote. Think before you sign a petition. Think before you let us get rubberstamped into socialism. Think how many of the communist aims have been realized in the past year. Think if you want to be a communist. Decide now and towards getting what want. I hope very few of our readers would prefer socialism and communism to capitalism. If you want Capitalism, say so. Vote. Write to the leaders of our country. They're just the same as our local, county and state official-they don't know we feel unless they hear a little rumble out of us instead of a shrug and silence.

And, in the meantime, how would you explain to a six year old what is a communist and what is communism?
