Named Cancer Society President

Dr. Marvin N. Golper, radiologist, Kokomo, was recently elected president of the Indiana Division of the American Cancer Society.

Dr. John W. Kink, Associate Director, Preventive Medicine Institute, Strang Clinic in New York City reported to the annual meeting of the Indiana Division that 3,750 lives could be saved in Indiana by applying modern techniques of diagnosis and treatment to all types of cancer. This, he said, is more than three times the number of lives lost annually on Hoosier highways.

Tom Fugate, Chamber of Commerce president, acted as spokesman for the group. He pointed out that the present runway is inadequate for year-round use by airplanes and noted that the Chamber of Commerce had donated \$2,000 for improving the runway and that an additional \$2,000 had been donated by service clubs and other organizations. Other donations, he said, are expected to bring the fund to nearly \$8,000 by next week.

He said the Chamber of Commerce hopes to attract additional industries into the area if the runway is blacktopped, pointing out that funds spent would be returned to the county in additional valuation for tax purposes.

As a result of the meeting, the commissioners agreed to follow the prescribed course of action for aiding a municipality in doing a project of this type.

Other Chamber of Commerce members attending the meeting were Leo C. Valentine, Allen

Herendeen, David Cooper, Robert Hibschman, and Macy Nelson. They were represented by their attorney, D. James Snodgrass.

Killed In Tractor Accident

Ray C. Hathaway, 73, Claypool was killed Monday afternoon when his tractor hit some soft dirt and overturned on him while placing corn silage in a ground pit on his son Perry's farm. Dr. Joe Bill Mishler, county coroner, said that death was due to a crushed chest and suffocation.

Mr. Hathaway was born near Claypool on January 26, 1894 to Heber and Sophronia (Kimes) Hathaway. In 1936 he married Leta Stickler, who survives.

Surviving with the widow are two sons, Perry of Claypool and Ronald, at home; one daughter, Mrs. Dale (Joyce) Toetz of Stillwater, Okla.; six grandchildren and one brother, Doyle Hathaway of Danville, Pa. One brother preceded him in death.

Funeral services were conducted today in the Tucker Funeral Home with Rev. Wayne Johnson officiating. Burial was in the Graceland cemetery.

Two Jailed After Wreck Near Here

Sherman Spaulding, 24, R. 2, Silver Lake, and Ellis Crum, 36, Mentone, were jailed Saturday night following a one-car crash south of Mentone.

Spaulding was charged with public intoxication and leaving the scene of an accident after his car left SR 19 and struck a fence. Crum, a passenger in the car, was treated at Murphy Medical Center for abrasions and scratches and was later jailed on charges of public intoxication and disorderly conduct.

County and local police estimated damages to the car at \$225.

Christmas Mailing Deadlines Are Listed By The Post Office

The suggested mailing deadlines for Christmas mail were announced today by Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien.

"It's not too early to begin planning for the holiday season," Mr. O'Brien said. "In fact, the Post Office Department's plans to handle the rush of mail have already been completed. Now it is up to the public.

"If people mail early, the expected record-breaking volume of well over 9 billion pieces of mail to be delivered during the holiday season will arrive at its destination on time and without a serious hitch."

The Postmaster General noted that special attention will again be placed on the delivery of mail to servicemen in Vietnam and the surrounding area.

The deadlines for mail to all members of the Armed Forces abroad are:

Gifts weighing more than five pounds sent by surface postage rates . . . November 11
Gifts five pounds or less, plus letters and greeting cards sent

at surface rates (these go by air on a space available basis) . . . December 1
Air mail gifts and greetings . . . December 11
Deadline for domestic military and civilian mail are:

Domestic Surface Mail
Gifts to distant states . . . December 4
Greeting cards to distant states . . . December 10
Gifts and greeting cards to near-by areas . . . December 13
Domestic Air Mail
Gifts and greeting cards . . . December 19
Deadline for overseas civilian mail are:

Overseas Surface Mail
Far East . . . October 15
Other Areas . . . November 1
Overseas Air Mail
Remote areas off main air routes . . . December 1
Areas on heavily traveled air routes . . . December 10

headed editor I ever saw. Say cheese, and I'll take your picture while you type up something original. Then you can tell me why you operate like that."

One thing I did know was that if I happened to be several hundred miles from home and was having car trouble I'd want help. My hippie friend was from New Hampshire, and that's a long way when it's raining and the car isn't running properly. I left the camera in the drawer and went out and asked him if I could get some help for him. That startled him almost as much as if I'd asked him to pose, but he politely declined the offer, explaining his car was having a tendency to use oil. (I believed him as I watched him open a gallon can.)

Withdrawing to the office and trying to work without gawking at Mr. Hippie, I wondered at his lack of flowery speech and flowery ornament. Watching him and his wife (?) leave I noted her attire was a little further out than his and her hair much longer; otherwise they didn't look much different than the rest of us.

But now comes the big question. What would you have done? If I ever see another hippie, do you want me to talk to him and get his picture or do you want me to leave him alone and hope the fad doesn't catch on locally. I'll be eager to hear opinions.

Dr. and Mrs. W.S. (Bill) Farris accompanied the group. Dr. Farris, Professor of Agricultural Economics at Purdue University, was Delegation Leader and Host.

The People-to-People Travel Program is a private, not a federal function and each participating delegate paid his own

way.

They met people from all phases of the farming occupation, compared methods and had frank off-the-record exchange of views and thinking. They also had special briefing meetings with members of the staff of the American Embassy in Brussels, Moscow, and West Berlin.

The delegation visited farms in each country, including collective and state farms in Czechoslovakia and the Soviet Union. Picture taking was permitted with only certain restrictions behind the iron curtain.

Other highlights of the tour was a typical Swiss Fondue Dinner Party on the shore of Lake Lucerne, a visit to Red Square, the Kremlin, and the G.U.M. Department Store in Moscow, an evening at the circus in Krasnodar, USSR, a visit of East Berlin, passing through the Berlin Wall at Checkpoint Charlie, and a bull fight in Madrid.

During the three weeks the delegation flew over 16,000 miles and traveled hundreds of miles by bus and train.

Eaton resigns school board

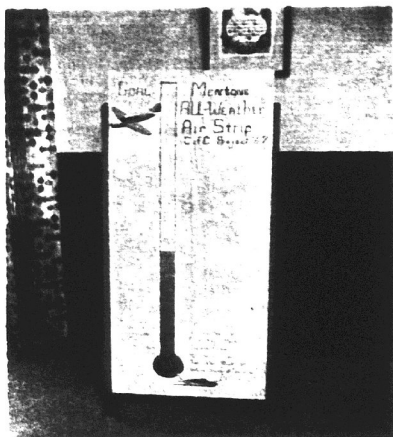

Christmas Mail For Armed Forces Overseas

Parcels weighing more than five pounds sent by surface postage rates November 11.

Parcels five pounds or less, plus letters and greeting cards sent at surface rates (these go by air on a space available basis) December 1.

Air Mail parcels and Air Mail greeting cards December 11.

TIME OF MAILING: The importance of mailing Christmas parcels before the designated deadline cannot be emphasized too strongly—the earlier the better. If mailed by the deadlines indicated the public can be reasonably assured that parcels will reach their destinations before Christmas.

SIZE AND WEIGHT: The maximum size and weight limits for surface parcel post and air parcel post vary according to Military Post Office to which the parcels are sent. Custom declaration Forms are required for parcels addressed to some Military Post Offices, and some articles are prohibited to certain Military Post Offices. Therefore it is suggested that mailers, before packing parcel post for mailing, make inquiry at the post office as to weight and size limits, customs declaration Forms needed and the list of prohibited articles, that are applicable to certain Military Post Offices. Matches of all kinds and lighter fluid are prohibited to all Military Post Offices.

PACKING: Boxes for overseas transmission must necessarily be of strong construction on ac-

count of the great distance these parcels must be transported and the handling and storage they must undergo. It is absolutely necessary that all articles for overseas delivery be packed in boxes of metal, wood, solid fiberboard, or strong double faced corrugated fiberboard. Boxes should contain sufficient cushioning material so that the contents will be tightly packed to prevent any rattling or loosening of the articles within the parcels. It is also desirable that all fiberboard boxes be securely wrapped in heavy paper. Each box should be well tied with strong cord.

ADDRESSING: Addresses must be legible and prepared in typewriting or ink. It is preferable that the outside address be hand-printed on the wrappers of the boxes rather than on labels pasted to the wrappers, since experience has shown that the labels frequently fall off when subjected to moisture. It is highly desirable that a slip of paper containing the name and address of the sender and addressee, together with a list of the contents, be enclosed in each parcel so as to provide identification and proper disposition of the mail in the event the address on the outside becomes defaced.

REGISTRY AND INSURANCE: Mailers are encouraged to register valuable letters and insure valuable parcels. It is recommended that patrons use postal money orders to transmit

Anthony Nigo DAR hears about founder Service addresses

Members of the Anthony Nigo Chapter, D.A.R. enjoyed as a portion of their October meeting a trip to the grave site in Plymouth, Indiana, where Anthony Nigo, the Indian for whom their chapter received its name, was buried. They also visited the spot, now marked with a bronze marker, where the Twin Lake Chapel stood, this being the chapel where he was converted to Christianity in 1828. According to records this was the first church in Marshall County. He was the last Indian to live in this county. While in the Plymouth area the group also went to view the statue of Chief Menominee of the Potawatomi tribe, whose people were forcibly removed from this area in 1838.

The group then went to the Holiday Inn for dinner. The tables were beautifully and appropriately decorated with Indian dolls and other items by the hostesses, Mrs. Ray Linn, and the co-hostess, Mrs. Max Smith. Each lady had a small birch canoe filled with candy corn as her place card.

Mrs. Frank Smith read an article on the Indian Chief Menominee. The regent, Mrs. Thomas Fugate, then conducted the opening ritual, followed by singing the Star Spangled Banner in unison.

Three guests, Mrs. Roy Cox, Mrs. Michelle Claus, and Mrs. Harry Bates, were welcomed by the regent.

Mrs. Max Smith introduced the speaker of the evening, Mrs. Bates, who spoke on the life of Anthony Nigo. Due to the fact that Mrs. Bates' grandparents and Anthony Nigo had lived as close neighbors, she could relate many interesting experiences. His father was of the Potawatomi tribe and his mother was a Miami Indian. Because of a tribal custom that the papoose belonged to the mother's tribe, he was allowed to remain when the Potawatomi tribe was removed from Indiana. He was told that he must procure land and become a peaceable citizen if he remained, which he did. The speaker displayed some dominoes which he had made for her grandparents from white bone and wood stained black with dye made from roots and berries. They were very skillfully made. On each Fourth of July celebration he was asked to carry the flag at the head of the procession. Anthony Nigo passed on in 1878, being seventy-three years of age.

Mrs. Cox then rendered three

piano numbers, "By the Waters of Minnetonka", "Indian Love Call" and "Red Wing".

The chapter treasurer, Mrs. Charles Tucker, gave a very interesting report on the Antique Flea Market and Rummage Sale recently held by the chapter. It proved to be very successful and most interesting, as well as educational, bringing to light many facets of our American Heritage. Much credit is due to the committee in charge of this project who worked faithfully and long to bring it to fruition.

Mrs. Linn, Mrs. Tucker, Mrs. Frank Smith, and Mrs. Fugate gave comprehensive reports on the recent State Conference. Mrs. Frederick Griswold, Jr. of Montclair, N. J., National Chairman of National Defense, spoke at the formal opening banquet.

Mrs. Griswold has made numerous trips over the world and is very familiar with all segments of our national life. She questioned those assembled as follows: Has life been too pleasant and comfortable for Mr. Average American Citizen in this era of seeming prosperity and affluence? Has he gloried in glowing promises of the Great Society which is to give generously all things to all people, regardless of individual effort or any attempt at honest labor? Mrs. Griswold acknowledged, "It appears that many have come the full cycle from rugged independence and self-reliance to dependence upon government." She described the numerous ways Soviet Russia and communism have more and more encroached upon Western powers since the closing days of World War II. Failure of many in high places to admit that the Cold War is a series of battles for survival for our nation could

mean the end of our way of life if not understood and dealt with forthrightly. It is clear that for two generations the West has been falling back and shrinking before the all-prevailing and aggressive force, communism.

Mrs. Griswold continued, "Of the world's 20 civilizations, 19 have been destroyed from within...moral disintegration must be stopped if it is not to become our destroyer of freedom. Many good people fail to heed this increasingly potent danger...The true spirit of America must be awakened and aroused to action as it was in the early days of our Republic as we now chart our course into the uncertain and difficult future."

The chapter was reminded to bring Christmas gifts for boys or girls in the mountain schools to the November meeting.

Mrs. Frank Smith then announced that her piece, Michelle Claus, of Bourbon, would play the new D.A.R. song just published entitled "Look with Pride on our Flag".

The meeting was closed with a prayer written by an Indian and read by the chaplain.

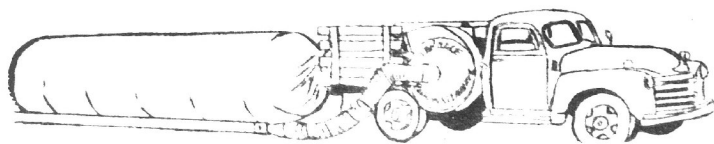

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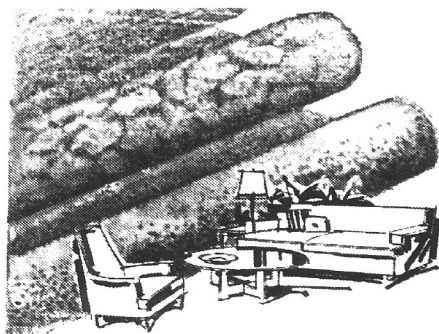

Ear Is Sewed On After Accident

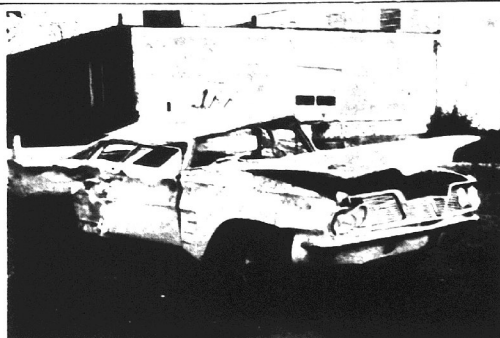

Cy Gates was treated and released with injuries to the hand and back.

Damage to the vehicles was listed at \$300 at the Bailey car and \$1,000 to the Engle car.

Extension Service Plans Re-Organization

An area organization of the Indiana Cooperative Extension Service Field Staff, designed to provide more specialized educational opportunities for Hoosiers, was announced this week by Howard G. Diesslin, Cooperative Extension Service Director at Purdue University.

Diesslin said the reorganization is an expansion of the area structure created in January, 1967, in southeastern Indiana. At that time, two areas of six counties each were established on a pilot basis. Three more areas are being planned by early next year and it is expected that the entire state will be reorganized by early in 1969.

Explaining general purposes of and reasons for the state-wide plan, Diesslin said, "In a state

and nation rapidly growing more specialized, continuing education becomes more urgent for every citizen. County Extension Agents, likewise, must specialize to make their educational programs more useful and appropriate to rapidly changing situations in their communities."

He stressed that the reorganization would be of existing county staff only, with the number of positions in each county remaining the same. However, most agents would work across county lines. An administrator, responsible for supervising personnel, program and budget, will be named for each area. Present county Extension offices will remain and most professional staff will operate from them.

The tentative lineup of the remaining areas to be established by early 1969 includes Area XI, which is composed of St. Joseph, Elkhart, LaGrange, Marshall, Kosciusko, and Fulton Counties.

With specialized agents located in each area, more specialized continuing education programs can be planned in each county.

Trend Toward Fewer High Schools Continues

Lafayette, Ind. The trend to fewer--and better--high schools for Hoosier teen-agers is certain to continue, says J. B. Kohlmeier, Purdue University agricultural economist and former executive director of the Indiana State School Reorganization Commission.

When the school doors opened this September, 32 high schools in operation during the 1966-67 academic year had been discontinued. These were situated in 16 scattered counties throughout Indiana. However, 25 of these schools moved into 10 new buildings, resulting in a net reduction of 22 schools.

Indiana had 842 public high schools in operation. By 1965 the total had fallen to 508. When the 1966-67 school year began, there were 27 fewer high schools than in the previous September.

Highest attrition rate, Kohlmeier explains, occurred among high schools with fewer than 100 students. In 1962 the State Department of Public Instruction reported 114 high schools with enrollments of fewer than 100. This fall, that number had dropped to 23. By the autumn of 1968 this will be down to 15, Kohlmeier predicts.

Students from these discontinued schools are now enrolled in high schools that offer at least 50 per cent more subjects, he adds. This is particularly true in the areas of English, mathematics, foreign language, science, social studies and business.

Rising costs of education are reflected in higher tax rates, Kohlmeier points out. But, he adds, teachers are better trained than previously and they command higher salaries. Too, building costs, equipment and maintenance have been hit by inflation.

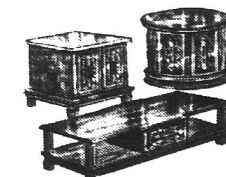
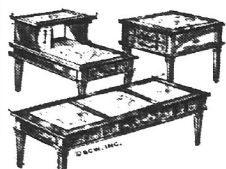
