

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Purdue University poultrymen dvise cleaning and disinfecting he laying house thoroughly beore the new pullets are housed. Paint or spray the perches with anthtacene oil to eliminate red mites. Repair broken wire of the osting racks with one-inch by four-inch welded wire. Cover the windows and other openings with three-fourths inch square hardware cloth to keep out the sparrows.

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Passing Know How

The average driver has to pass slow-moving cars and trucks several times during the course of a day's driving. But even seasoned drivers may not know all they should about careful pass-

The Motor Club points out that careful passing is a tough jobnot so simple as many motorists seem to think.

First, it's important to know when not to pass. You should not pass on hills or curves, at railroad crossings, or at road intersections. And you shouldn't pass if the car ahead is moving along at the legal speed limit.

When you are going to pass, it is essential that you know how to judge the distance and the speed you'll need to get safely around the car ahead. For instance, to pass an auto doing 45 miles per hour, you should do 60 mph. Also, you'll need about one quarter of a mile to make the passing maneuver.

Passing on a two-lane involves different approaches than passing on expressways. Here are some tips from the Motor Club for safe passing on two-lane highways.

1. Never follow the car you are going to pass too closely. This will block your view of the highway and will not give you enough stopping room if the car ahead brakes suddenly. Follow the car ahead by one car length for every 10 miles of speed.

2 Look ahead for cars coming from the opposite direction or anything on the road that might make the driver you're overtaking swerve into the passing lane. Check your rear-view mirror to make sure a car isn't passing you.

3. If a car is following you, switch on your turn signals to show you are going to change Blow your horn or at lanes. night flick your lights to let the driver ahead know you're passing him. Give your signals a chance to be observed before you start passing.

4. Turn smoothly into the other lane, accelerating rapidly to a speed 10 to 15 miles faster than that of the car you're passing. 5 Don't move back into the right lane until you're well be-

yound the car you've overtaken. Move back smoothly and guard against a tendency to slow down after passing.


In three lane expressway traffic, passing differs in that the passing driver does not return to the outside lane used by slowmoving vehicles. If you are driving at medium-high speeds, stay in the middle lane. Move to the inner lane if you are driving at the top legal speed. Don't switch from lane to lane.

Whether on an expressway or a two-lane highway, safe passing requires patience, courtesy, and careful observation of these safe ty tips.

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Eggs Back On More Breakfast Tables

Ohicago—The Poultry and Egg National Board has revealed the strategy behind a new public relations and promotion campaign designed to "restore the egg to its proper place as reigning queen of the breakfast table."

According to Dr. A. William Jasper, Director of the Division of Egg Production, PENB has selected six key targets for a concerted program which is already under way. He lists these targets as the urban housewife, teenagers, overweights, older persons, diners-out, and school age children

The opening shot of the campaign was fired from PENB's. Home Economics Division when Kathryn B. Niles, Director of the Division, delivered a strong denunciation of what she called "light-breakfastitis" and spelled out its hazards to personal health and nutrition. A two-page news release covering her statement was released to newspapers, syndicates, magazines, and radio and television stations throughout the country.

Mrs. Niles said that "One half of the American population today is suffering from "light-breakfastitis", a condition resulting in mid-morning tiredness, nervousness and inefficiency... it is time we faced squarely how much the nation is losing in overall productivity, and how much the individual is losing in personal health due to pernicious morning eating habits."

As a remedy Mrs. Niles recommended a return to the "oldfashioned, common-sense" type of breakfast—which includes eggs—to give the staying-power to keep up energy and alertness throughout an entire morning of work, school or play.

Jasper said that the PENB will next release a series of articles on teen-age eating habits, stressing, the advantages to appearance and energy of a well balanced breakfast. He said that the Division of Egg Promotion will make periodic press reports of activities in "this vital eggs-for-breakfast field."

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Rd. 15 South

The dairy department at Purdue University says that many first calf heifers enter the dairy hard during September through November. For best results, these newcomers to the herd should be accustomed to the treatment given the dairy herd at milking time and be fed the same as a dry cow.

Leafhoppers cause yellowing of second and third cuttings of alfalfa. To prevent damage, Purdue University entomologists advise spraying alfalfa when it has about two or three inches of growth with one quart of methoxychlor in 10 gallons of water per acre.



Seed Wheat

Indiana Lafavette, Ind. farmers concerned about the other state, however, is the germination of their seed wheat due to delayed harvest or sprouts in the field are urged by Purdue University agronomists to look around home for seed before considering out of State sources.

Northern Indiana has the bumper wheat crop of all time with less damage by heavy rains and high moisture than most sections of the state.

In some southern counties, Knox was combined before the Local investigation may reveal supplies of dry wheat, some of which is doubtless under loan storage. Commercial or home drying has been widely practiced this year.

Moisture content of seed in closely. K. E. Beeson, Purdue above 13 percent, hot or wet spots will lead to a mouldy condition that reduces germination. Wheat that was combined at under 14 percent or dried quickly and properly stored is a logical source of seed for consideration."

Wheat combined after the heavy rain may be very satisfactory, Beeson says. Swollen grains may still germinate satisfactorily although those from which the sprouts have emerged are usually dead. However, 10 percent sprouted grains cannot mean more than 10 percent reduction in the germination of the lot, and such seed may still germinate 75 percent or better and be satisfactory for planting

Farmers are especially warned about going out of the state to obtain seed wheat. 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





For farmers who request it, the county committee will figure two sets of maximum annual rates. One will apply if only part of the clabble acreage on a farm is placed in the reserve. Another rate, 10 percent higher, will be available if all eligible land on a farm is put in the Reserve for it least five years.

After maximum rates have been determined, a farmer will have two weeks in which to decide on participation, designate land for the Reserve and apply a r a contract.

The signup phase of the program closes October 10, and all requests for establishing farm rates must be received by that date.





Agronomy Field Day, Sept. 11th

Lafayette, Ind.—Corn and soybeans, two of Indiana's major agricultural crops, will be emphasized at Purdue University's annual Agronomy Field Day, Thursday, September 11.

The program will be held at the university's Agronomy farm, seven miles northwest of Lafayette on U. S. 52.

Tours will highlight the morning session. The first of these will begin at 9 a.m. Visitors will view field plots of soybean varieties, soybean diseases, corn fertility, planting variations in soybeans, harvesting losses of soybeans, corn varieties, corn diseases, dwarf corn, weed control in corn and soybeans, grain and forage sorchims.

A general riding tour of the 470 acres Agronomy farm will start at 10:45 a.m. The farm is used as a laboratory for teaching fundamentals of crop and soil science. Controlled experiments which demonstrate basic principles of crop production, soil fertility, soil management, plant breeding, soil physics and other studies associated with soil and crop science are conducted on the farm.

For persons interested particularly in corn and soybean handling and storage a special demonstration will be held before noon. G. H. Foster agricultural engineer with the U. S. Department of Agriculture stationed at

Purdue, and G. W. Isaacs, Purdue agricultural engineer, will discuss the problem.

Dr. Martin G. Weiss, associate director of the crops research division, Agricultural Research service, U. S. D. A., will tell about "The Importance of Continuing Basic Research in Times of plenty" after a noon luncheon at the farm.

In case of rain shelter in the buildings on the farm will be available and a special program will be held.

Russell K. Stivers, Purdue extension agronomist, is chairman for the event, which is expected to attract approximately 1.000 farmers, fertilizer and seed dealers and other interested persons.





Swine Tour September 17th

The second annual state swine management tour, a project of the Indiana Commercial Pork Producers' Association and Purdue University's animal science department, will be held Sept. 17 in Rush and Decatur counties.

The first stop will be at the 467-acre general crop and live-stock farm of Lowell O. Norris and his son, Russell. A highly specialized hog producing unit, the farm is approximately four miles southwest of Rushville just off U. S. 52.

Lunch and a brief program will be held at noon at the Rush county fair grounds. The afternoon stop will be made at the 538-acre farm of Floyd Diewert

Decatur county. Under a multiple farrowing system, the farm produced about 1,500 pigs annually. It is nine miles north of Greensburg.

Power Lawn Mower Data

Lafayette, Ind.—Because of late summer rains, many Hoosiers will be using their power lawn mowers later than usual this year. And operating a power lawn mower can be fun, if you don't get hurt.

A rash of power lawn mower accidents points up the need to remind homeowners that carelessness is a big factor in these mishaps, says F. R. Willsey, Purdue University extension safety specialist.

The safety specialist lists these suggestions:

Study carefully the instruction manual that came with the mow-

Before you start mowing, inspect the lawn, clearing off stones, wire and other debris.

Don't operate the mower inside a building since exhaust gases from mowers contain carbon monoxide, an oderless, colorless, lethal gas.

Don't refill when the eng hot or still running.

Safety shoes will provide foot protection.

When starting the mower, your feet are in a safe position. Keep in step with the mower for good control.

Bystanders or pets should not be in the immediate area of mowing because rotary mowers can throw debris.

Mow sidesways on hills and banks. This will prevent loss of control, slipping into mower or the mower's sliding into the operator.

Disconnect the spark plus wire or the electric plug when you want to work on the underside of the mower. Keep hands, feet, and clothing away from the moving parts.

Never attempt to remove an object from the mower until the rotor has been stopped complete-


Know how to disengage the clutch or stop the engine quickly.

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



"Wet" Corn For Hogs

Ensiling of high moisture corn is an efficient method of handling and storing shelled corn for the swine. This fall may again bring to Indiana farmers the problem of what to do with high moisture corn.

W. M. Beeson, head of animal nutrition work at Purdue University, and J. H. Conrad, swine nutritionist, report that on the basis of three experiements there was no improvement in the nutritional value of the corn that was ensiled.

Eight percent or more of high moisture shelled corn (on the moisture equivalent basis) was required per 100 pounds of gain when compared to low moisture corn, the scientists found.

Less protein supplement was consumed when high moisture

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corn was compared to low moisture corn containing 11:5 percent moisture. Only small differences in the protein supplement consumption were found when the high moisture corn was compared to the low moisture corn containing more than 14 percent moist-

Details of the experiments, conducted at Purdue's livestock experimental farm, are contained in Mimeo A. S. 244 available without charge to Indiana residents at counity extension offices publication office at Purdue University, Lafayette.

Total Patient Rehabilitation Is Kenny Foundation Objective

Minneapolis, Minn.—Teaching patients to develop to maximum use whatever muscular movement they have left, following injury or illness, is the aim of the total rehabilitation program of the Sister Elizabeth Kenny foundation, according to

Sister Blizabeth Kenny foundation, according to R. Bruce Reinecker, president.

Techniques originated by the late Sister Elizabeth Kenny for treatment of polio and perpetuated and developed further by the foundation bearing her name have been found effective in the care of many crippling and handicapping diseases, Reinecker pointed out.

"Important as this treatment is " he said "to

necker pointed out.

"Important as this treatment is," he said, "It still is only one phase of the Kenny rehabilitation program for victims of neuromuscular disabilities and diseases, including polio.

Reinecker

"Along with treating patients to develop any remaining physical movements, our medical and other staffs seek to help them solve other problems stemming from their disabilities. Wage earners, for example, often are taught new occupations. Homemakers are instructed in household short-cuts. Children of school age attend classes while hospitalized, or are taught by a bedside teacher.

"An adaptive equipment engineer designs and creates mechanical aids for individual patients. A recreational director supervises children at play and assists adults in developing hobbies. A social worker is available to help patients and their families work out financial problems. Emotional problems are dealt with by a psychologist or phychiatrist."

The Kenny foundation's program of direct patient aid, medical research, grants to universities and individual doctors as well as support of the activities of the American Rehabilitation foundation, its subsidiary, is made possible through contributions of the public, Reinecker concluded.
