## Mentone Aviation Board leases airport, plans improvement

Since June of this year, the Mentone Chamber of Commerce has been working on project of "airport improvement."

Investigation has shown that in almost all cases, growth of a community and a local airport go hand in hand. In many cases industries have rejected industrial sites only because of the distances to the nearest landing facilities.

The board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce has met with representatives of the State Aeronautics Board, and

the representatives have advised that it would be to everyone's benefit if the air strip were a public strip owned by a municipality.

To accomplish this, Mr. Allen Herendeen, present owner of the land, leased a parcel of land located in the southeast quarter of section 10, township 31 north, range 4E in Kosciusko county to the Board of Aviation Commissioners of the town of Mentone on September 6, 1967 for \$1.00.

The board of aviation commissioners of the town of Men-

tone in turn leased the operation of the said airstrip back to Mr. Herendeen who is to pay all expenses incurred in the operation of said airport.

The airport shall be operated in compliance with all rules and regulations of the Civil Aeronautics Authority and the Indiana Aeronautics Commission.

The Mentone Chamber of Commerce, using from various projects and with funds presently pledged by many civic minded individuals, plans to improve the strip so it can be an

"all weather" landing strip. The Chamber of Commerce has sent representatives to other airstrips, has met with the State Aeronautics Board, and has asked for advice from the Kosciusko County Commissioners. The Chamber of Commerce feels this is a project that has

many benefits to a community at no cost to the town. This contrasts with nearby areas that have become saddled with costly projects.

Members of the Mentone, Aviation Board are Darrell King, Don Smythe, Lloyd Bowerman, and Dr. Wymond Wilson.

## School Board sets tax rate, hears protest

Members of the Tippecanoe Valley school board met Thursday night and established a tax rate of \$3.96. No remonstrators were present. The established rate includes a \$3.14 general fund and 82 cents in the cumulative building fund, and is the next to lowest rate of any surrounding school corporations. Bremen, which has no cumulative building fund, is the only corporation that is lower. Its rate is \$3.87. Taylor-Howard is at the top of the scale with a proposed rate of \$9.37 and is followed by Whitko with a proposed rate of \$7.34. All units are subject to reduction by the State Board of Accounts.

Superintendent Robert Forbes reported during the financial report that the additions to the Mentone and Akron schools had cost \$68,306.93 less than had been anticipated and

the money had been returned to the cumulative building fund.

Rev. Daniel Bengston of the Akron Methodist Church, representing the Henry Township Ministerial Association, appeared before the board and requested that the board honor Thursday night's church activities and Passion Week by not scheduling any school functions. The board agreed to suggest to the principals that this request be honored whenever possible.

A contract for Robert Miller, now a student at Manchester College, was approved. Marilyn Yohe will fill his position until he completes his studies.

Eleanor Hoover, who is moving from this area, resigned her position as secretary at the Palma School and Kay Kindig was hired to fill the vacancy.

Title III expenditures for instructional apparatus were approved by the board in the amount of \$6,000.

Invitations to the board were heard from Robt. Forbes, who will have the board as his guests at the Purdue-Notre Dame game, and from Roy Meredith, who will have the board as his guests for the Akron Lions Club ladies night in December.

Bus policies were reviewed with no changes being made except in the rate of pay for extra-curricular activities. It was felt that \$1.50 per hour plus five cents per mile would be more fair to the bus driver for these activities.

The board reviewed school board policy and during this review Mrs. Loren Sheetz lodged a protest against the policy that calls for the immediate withdrawal from school of any girl known to be pregnant and the boy involved. She stated she felt it unfair to deny these children the right to complete their education. Asked by board member Mickey Eaton if she thought this action would condone premarital sex, she replied







Chances are, if you are past 65 your hospital bill will be marked "Paid" promptly. It will, that is, if you show your official Medicare identification card when you are admitted. If you fail to show your card there may be a delay before the hospital gets its money and your bill is paid.

If you have lost your Medicare identification card get in touch with your social security office. They will see that you get a duplicated card.

Remember, your hospital bill can be marked paid promptly only if you furnish the correct information at the time you enter the hospital. You can do this by keeping your Medicare identification card with you at all times.





**Indiana - land of surprises**

Indiana is full of surprises as ten 4-H Junior Leaders found as they traveled to the southern part of the state. Probably the first and most exciting surprise was the hills and winding roads in that part of the state. Little did we realize how flat our land is here in Kosciusko County. Seeing the hills and the poor agricultural land which is very common in Jefferson and Switzerland Counties made us all realize that we are living in one of the Nation's best agricultural areas.

The Kosciusko County Junior Leaders were divided with the host Junior Leaders. They lived on the farms for two days where the type of agriculture is strikingly different than ours. Tobacco is a main crop in that area. To grow tobacco the farmers have to cultivate the fields by hand. Each tobacco plant has to be cared for individually and surprising to us, there is not a weed growing in a field of tobacco. A large patch of tobacco for a farmer is three acres. The labor involved in producing three acres of tobacco is tremendous.

The scenic Ohio River was always spoken of with pride by the local people. To them the Ohio River used to be the only opening to the outside world. They talk about the T.V.A. and the great Marklin Dam which has controlled the floods. They point with pride to several loaded coal barges being guided by one tug down the Ohio. These barges will eventually end up at New Orleans.

The trip was worth-while and educational. The ten 4-H Junior Leaders that went on the trip appreciated the Volkswagon Bus which Chapman Motors sponsored as transportation.



Included in the list of rules is a rule that says boys' pants with loops should have a belt and should not be too tight.

Girls with skirts that are too short will be taken to the home economics room where the home ec teacher will measure the distance from the hem of the skirt to the floor while the girl is in a kneeling position.

Cars will be permitted for students living outside the town of Mentone or students participating in extra-curricular events. As soon as the event taking place is finished, driving privileges also stop.

Students will be dismissed by the teacher, not by the bell, and all students in the hall during class time must have passes.

Students are expected to go outside following the lunch period if weather permits. During bad weather dancing will be permitted on the stage during the lunch period.

All school activities must be

supervised by a faculty member unless otherwise specified. Sock hops will be permitted only on Friday nights following home basketball games.

Other regulations outlined include further driving and parking rules and the stipulation that any student who has been absent must bring an excuse from his parents telling the reason for his absence.







## School Bus Safety

### Reminders Listed

Lafayette, Ind. School buses will hit the road soon as millions of youngsters travel back to school.

Whether or not their travel is safe travel depends on you and me.

We can make those miles safe ones by understanding and obeying traffic regulations concerning school buses, says Dick Willsey, Purdue University safety specialist.

Reviewing traffic regulations before school starts this fall, he reminds that you must stop when you meet or overtake a school bus which has stopped on the highway to let children on or off. You must remain

stopped until the children are safely off the highway and the stop sign arm extending from the left-front side of the bus has been folded back.

Passing or overtaking a school bus on some multiple lane highways is slightly different. If the lanes are separated by a dividing strip of 20 feet or more in width and if the bus is on the opposite side of the divider, you need not stop. Willsey urges you to proceed with caution, however.

If you are behind the bus on a divided highway, you must stop when the bus stops. Remember, too, that school buses must make full stops at railroad crossings. Be ready for these stops—don't tailgate.



## Boat Explodes; Local Residents Injured



## School Board makes policy change

Members of the Tippecanoe Valley School board met Monday night and in routine business granted permission to the Mentone Scramblers, a square dance group, to conduct a holiday dance in the Mentone gym providing certain conditions were met. Board president Eldon Cumberland opposed the policy, saying that it felt it was a loose policy and would lead to further looseness in school morals. He felt the old policy was just as good as the newly adopted one.

The rest of the policy manual was considered and the board adjourned.

In his talk, Forbes described the new additions and said that the Mentone kindergarten room had shown the greatest improvement, having moved from a makeshift room behind the stage to a bright new room of its own.

He stated that the corporation has 91 teachers and administrative personnel and that 40% of these teachers have a master's degree and 70% have completed one year or more of graduate work. He described them as being dedicated, loyal and fully qualified and stated further that all were fully licensed and were teaching in their own areas.


He said he was proud that the corporation now had an audio visual program, a remedial reading and speech and hearing therapy programs. He said there are no split sections and no classes at Mentone with more

than 32 pupils.





# Farmers State Bank celebrates 75th anniversary

The Farmers State Bank of Mentone is observing its 75th Anniversary this month. September 21st, 22nd, and 23rd have been designated as Anniversary Days.

Early organizers of the bank were Artemus C. Manwaring, President; Milton Hire, Vice President; Elmer M. Eddinger, Cashier and Loren D. Manwaring, Assistant Cashier. The bank was known as the Farmers Bank at that time. These officers were followed by Loren D. Manwaring, Pres.; Allen Bybee, Vice President; E.M. Eddinger, Cashier; Frank P. Manwaring, Asst. Cashier, who served until November 20, 1910. At this time the elected officers were E.M. Eddinger, President; L. D. Manwaring, Vice President; Frank P. Manwaring, Cashier and A.I. Nelson, Asst. Cashier.

Mergers and acquisitions in the banking business are not

modern day innovations, as records at the bank show that in June of 1894 the Farmers Bank acquired all of the assets of the Citizens Bank of Mentone. The Citizens Bank consisted of Thomas O. Taber, president, and John H. Taber, Cashier. The consideration of said purchase was sixteen hundred dollars.

The Farmers Bank was organized as a private bank and in 1905 the capital was increased to \$30,000.00 from \$20,000.00 and was further increased from \$30,000.00 to \$50,000.00 in November 1910.

It was about this time that the bank was moved to its present site, having occupied a small room back of the present drug store site. After World War II the building was refurbished inside and out and more recently (1962) the banking quarters were enlarged to double the previous floor space and completely remodeled, both exterior and interior.

Another merger was effected on July 24, 1911 when the Farmers Bank purchased the First National Bank of Mentone. It was stated in the agreement that the First National Bank of Mentone was intending to liquidate.

Signers for the First National Bank, on the purchase agreement, were names such as Turner, Myers, Ford, Forst, Cartell, Bowman, Underhill, Smith, Haimbaugh, Doran, McCullough, Guy, and Straub.

Little is on record about another one-time financial institution of Mentone, but records dated in the early 1900's show that there was a Mentone Building, Loan and Savings Assn.

On December 8, 1920, the Department of Banking of the State of Indiana granted a state

charter and the Farmers Bank became known as the Farmers State Bank.

The first official financial statement of the bank as a state chartered bank shows that as of March 21, 1921 the bank had loans of \$599,518.55, deposits of \$606,155.94 and total capital of \$85,314.31.

Others connected with the bank during the 1920's and early 30's were Dr. M.G. Yocum, Charles H. Tucker, William Nye,


directors; and Kenneth A. Riner, Elmore Fenstermaker, staff personnel; Chester L. Manwaring, a director, served until 1954. Floyd L. Tucker was elected to directorship in the mid 30's and continues currently to serve in that capacity. Others who have served as president of the bank are Frank P. Manwaring, A.I. Nelson, K.A. Riner and Charles L. Manwaring. At the present time Forrest D. Miner is President and Floyd L. Tucker is

Chairman of the Board. Other personnel are Charles L. Manwaring, Vice President; Thomas M. Fugate, Cashier; Larry Pyle and Iris Anderson are Assistant Cashiers. The present board of directors are Tucker, Miner, Manwaring, Dr. O.L. McFadden and Donald D. Poulson.


As of June 30, 1967 bank assets totaled \$7,971,691.48, deposits \$7,265,040.88 with capital accounts and loan reserves totaling \$666,203.68.




Frank Manwaring, father of Charles Manwaring who has also served as president of the Farmers State Bank, was one of the bank's earlier presidents.

## County Shares Tax Distribution

Commissioner of Revenue, Wm. L. Fortune, announced this week that the fall 1967 distribution of intangibles tax was less than the fall 1966 distribution. Of each \$1.00 distributed by the state, 75 cents goes for school support and the remaining 25 cents goes to the county's general fund.

Kosciusko's fall distribution was \$136,570.95 as compared to 1966's \$144,193.86.

Fulton county's fall distribution was \$47,828.44 as compared to last year's \$47,828.44.

Statewide totals were \$11,092,995.08 for this year compared to \$11,696,164.68 for last year.

## Ditty Bags Are Needed

The American Red Cross is again urging local residents to make and fill ditty bags to be given to each able-bodied U.S. serviceman in Vietnam at Christmas time. All filled bags should be turned into the Red Cross by October 10 as final shipment will be made October 15.

Specifications for the bags are: red or green strong denim or other smooth textured solid color cotton fabric; finished measurements, 11" wide and 13-3/4" deep or 12 1/2" wide and 13-3/4" deep. The bags should be constructed by folding material in half and french seaming the sides to within 3" of the open end. The remaining seam edges should be finished with a narrow hem. Turn down 1-3/4" around opening of bag, turn under 1/2" and stitch. Stitch again 1/2" from top of hem for heading. Insert tapes in opposite directions through openings in 1 1/4" hem, making double drawing-string. Knot ends together.

Contents: All items should be new and should contain no liquids, glass containers, combustibles, food, or any item that would melt or deteriorate in heat. Also no medicaments, including foot powder, should be included. Suggested items are: ballpoint pens, paperback books, plastic soap cases without soap, small packages of writing paper, self-sealing envelopes, small address books, plastic toothbrush holder, terry cloth washcloths in dark colors, anil clipper, plastic cigarette case, comb, pocket

games, mailing size voice tapes, small tins of vacuum packed nuts or candies, windproof type cigarette lighters, small plastic snapshot holders, small kitchen size and sandwich type plastic bags (not more than 3), "Wipe and Shine" packet shoe polish.

A card with the following message should be included with each ditty bag: Holiday greetings from American Red Cross of (Your Country) and (Name of your organization.)


