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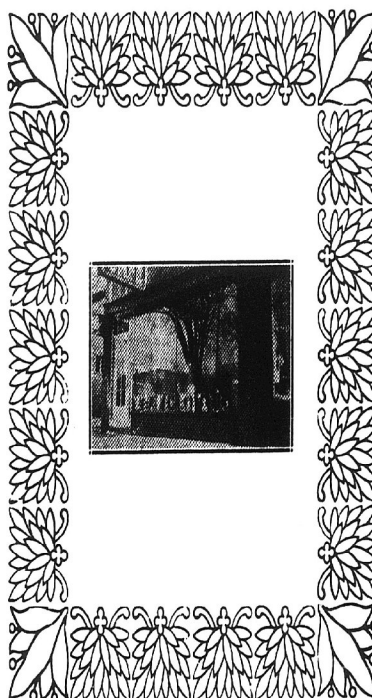

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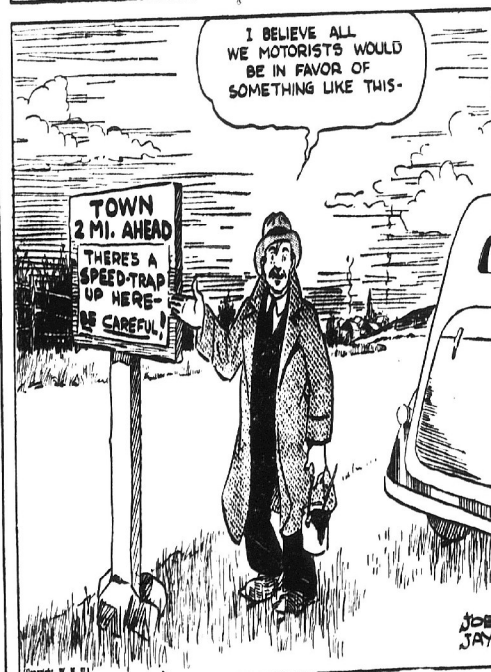

The greatest poverty that can come to a man is the poverty of mind. Poverty that closes the mind to new ideas and keeps it little and narrow and contracted; poverty that causes a man to be content with petty, little humdrum things; poverty that prohibits a man ever having a big, generous thought. When the taxpayer is denied the right to know where his money goes, to whom it is paid, for what it is paid, and in what amount, he might as well be under the rule of Russia.

If I was in authority in this country I would deport the last one of them. If they really want these things let them go where they can have them one hundred per cent."

Neal Dow, Temperance Worker

Neal Dow was born in Portland,
Maine, in 1804, of Quaker parent-
age. In 1851, through his efforts
while mayor of Portland, he secured
the passage of the Maine law which,
under severe penalties, prohibited
the sale of intoxicating liquors. In
1884 this provision was incorporated
in the state constitution. He was
twice mayor of Portland, and, dur-
ing the Civil war, was brigadier
general of volunteers. He traveled
widely, speaking on temperance
problems and organizing temper-
ance societies. In 1880 he was the
candidate of the National Prohibi-
tion party for President of the Uni-
ted States. He died in 1897.

Isolated Eskimos Found Free of Tooth Trouble

Rockport, Ind.—Most primitive
Eskimos have little tooth trouble
if isolated from traders and white
men's food, according to Dr. Taylor
Pyle, bureau of Indian affairs su-
pervising dentist for Alaska, who
visited here recently.

He said that dental cavities were
rare among tribes isolated in Ala-
ska while the Indian who has been in
contact with the white men since the
coming of the Russians is constant-
ly developing a toothache.

As wards of the government, Es-
kimos and Indians receive free den-
tal attention, Dr. Pyle said. There
are about thirty-five practicing den-
tists in Alaska and Eskimo and In-
dian work is distributed among fif-
teen in widely separated districts.
In addition, Dr. Pyle personally at-
tends the more isolated communi-
ties, reaching them by plane, boat
and dog team.

During four seasons in the Far
North, Dr. Pyle has made a study
of Eskimo teeth, diet and living con-
ditions in the isolated regions.

Dr. Pyle said that when twins are
born the Eskimo believes that there
will not be enough brains for both,
so only one is permitted to live.

More Men Are Teaching in Schools, Survey Shows

Madison, Wis.—Men more and
more are turning to school teaching
in Wisconsin, a survey by the state
education association reveals.

An increased number of men in
the teaching profession during the
last seven years applies in rural,
village grade, city and high schools.

In 1930, there were 3,000 male
teachers in the state's elementary
and high schools. The number had
grown to 4,500 in 1936. During the
same period the number of women
teachers in the same schools de-
creased 600.

Rural schools, strongholds of
women teachers some years ago,
had more than 1,000 male teachers
in 1936 compared to 631 in 1930.

Tired Omaha Bus Rider Wins Right to Sit Down

Omaha.—One Omahan, at least,
believes in standing up for his rights
to sit down.

Arrested on a charge of drunken-
ness while sitting on a curb, the
defendant told Judge George
Holmes, "I got tired waiting for a
bus. I helped build that sidewalk
years ago, and I guess I can sit on it
if I want to."

Judge Holmes agreed.

THE GREATER MARVEL: We are
prone to wonder, as we study
early ministry of Christ and ef-

that day to give up an empty formal-
ism and to accept the wonderful new
teachings that possessed the secret of
human hope, and inspiration, and

to think, the indifference of that day
is not nearly so remarkable as is the
indifference of thousands of men and
women today, who, though living in
a world which has seen countless
times the power and truth of Christ's
teachings demonstrated, still hesitate
to accept them and make them the

malism as completely as were the

Farmers Important To Automobile Industry

A new and comprehensive moving picture of the ramifications of the automobile industry has been produced by Chevrolet that is called "Materials". As the name suggests, it pictures sources of materials used in the manufacture of the automobile and shows how they are mined and smelted, grown on farms and gathered, taken from the forests and ranches and transformed into usable products for the factories of suppliers of the industry.

The picture was two and one half years in the making. More than 50,000 feet of film was shot and this was edited to 2,200 feet that can be viewed in 23 minutes. Five camera crews worked at seasonal times in different parts of the country, overcoming all manner of obstacles presented by weather, transportation, distance and research.

It was found that approximately sixty-odd basic materials are used in the manufacture of the modern car. All of the important ones except rubber and cork were found to be produced in the United States in commercial quantities and every state produces at least six different materials.

The picture brings out especially how interrelate with the farmers is the automobile industry. Corn, cotton, sheep, angora goats, sugar cane, hogs, cattle and such products of the farm are used in enormous quantities by the car manufacturers.

Chevrolet alone uses the produce of 100,000,000 bees supplying wax, 1,000,000 sheep, 100,000 angora goats, 10,000 cattle, 20,000 hogs, 500,000 bushels of corn, 2,500,000 pounds linseed oil, 400,000 pounds castor oil, 2,500,000 gallons of molasses, 70,000,000 pounds of cotton, 2,000,000 pounds of turpentine and 800,000 gallons of tung oil.
