An Epic Of 'The Soil' In New Sound Movie

A new feature-length sound motion picture entitled "The Soil" will be presented in a full hour and a half of entertainment at the Mentone Community Building on Monday night, April 24, at 7:30 o'clock by the Northern Indiana Cooperative Association. This motion-picture, just completed by The American Agricultural Chemical Company, was produced on farms in different parts of the country and has as its 'hero', the soil itself, as the name of the picture signifies.

As Lowell Thomas, the narrator, expresses it in the picture, "Farming is America's biggest business—in capital invested, in number of people employed, in the value of yearly output. Today, agriculture is on the march, as expanding knowledge and increased efficiency are helping the farmer get the most out of his basic asset, the soil."

SOUND SOIL MANAGEMENT

The picture then goes on to visualize in a graphic and interesting way, the six basic steps in profitable soil management, including drainage and erosion control, maintaining proper sweetness or acidity of the soil, adding organic matter thorough preparation and cultivation, consistent crop rotation, and proper feeding of the crops with the right kind and amount of plant food.

Among the close-ups of typical farms in different parts of the country is one which has been under continuous cultivation ever since 1705, tree-quarters of a century before the American Revolution, and today produces crops that are better than ever, as a result of sound soil management, including the use of adequate amounts of fertilizer.

A striking sequence is a trip through the Florida pebble phosphate rock mines of The American Agricultural Chemical Company. The picture shows how the element phosphorus, imprisoned by nature in the phosphate rock millions of years ago, is extracted with the aid of heat of volcanic intensity, and you actually see what pure elemental phosphorus looks like, as it burns furiously the instant it strikes the air. Also shown is the method by which the phosphate rock is converted into superphosphate, the form in which phosphorus as a plant food is made readily available for the growing crop.

The process of making Agrico Fertilizers is then presented, and there is a behind-the-scenes tour through the chemical laboratories which control quality by constant analysis, from raw materials through the manufacturing process and right up to the shipping platform.

Thomas Tells Of Field Service

"But to me one of the most interesting things of all," continues Mr. Thomas, "is the work which the A. A. C. Co. does among farmers right out in the field," as the picture shows how A. A. C. agronomists and field service men travel from farm to farm, checking soils and crops, test-

In a striking conclusion, a typical American farmer tells of the results of good soil management—of what it means to a farmer and his family "to keep the good earth good."

As to the reason for the picture, a representative of the American Agricultural Chemical Company said: "Yes, we make fertilizer, make it the best we know how, spare no pains to put into every bag of Agrico the very utmost in crop producing power. 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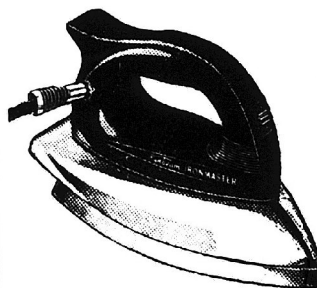

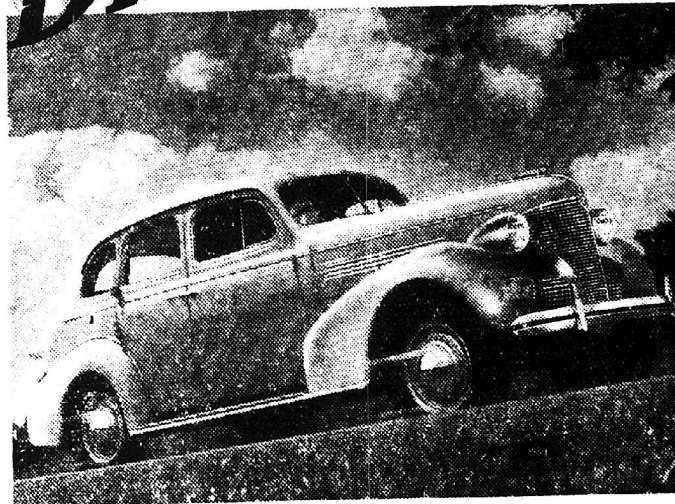

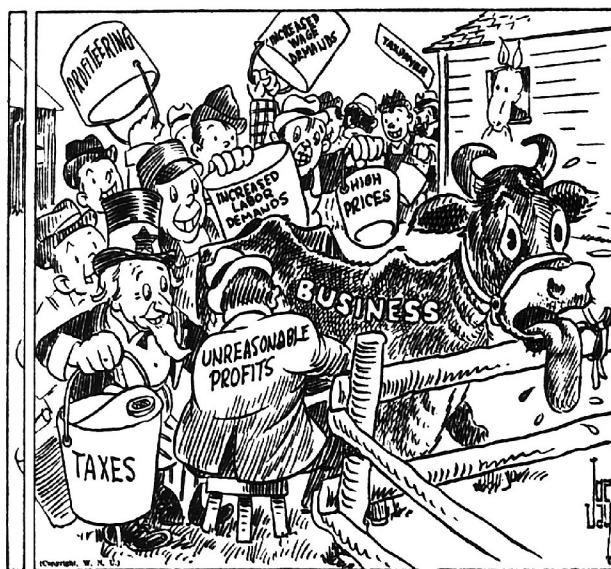

Two Minute Sermon

Thomas Hastwell

LORD WHAT WILL THOU HAVE ME TO DO: I am a frank admirer of the Apostle Paul. He had so many of the qualities that are to be desired in men that his life and work would furnish the theme for many, many sermons.

Today I want to talk about Paul's courage of his convictions—a thing everyone admires in men today, and a thing so much needed. Paul was reared a Pharisee. He was taught the traditions of the Pharisees and was sincere in his persecution of the followers of Christ, but when he was brought to see things in a new light there in the Damascus road, he turned to Christ, though the decision cost him the friends and associates of years. Was any man ever called upon to make a more self-sacrificing decision or display more true courage of convictions?

I think of it often today when I see men halt, and waver, and vacillate between two opinions as they weigh the consequences. What the world needs today is more men with the same high courage of their convictions that Paul had. Men who will stand in their place and say, as did Paul that day in the Damascus road; "Lord what wilt thou have me to do?"

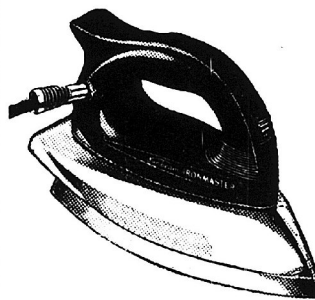

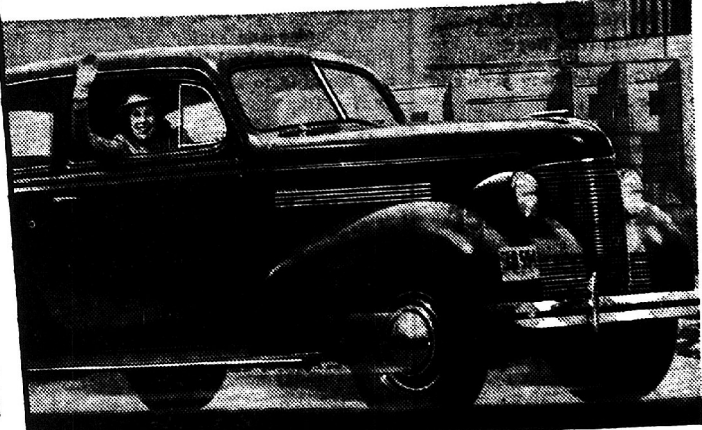
