## Plans Announced for Mentone Egg Show

April 16, 17 and 18 will be the date of the 1941 Mentone Egg Show, a widely attended annual event sponsored by the egg and poultry producers of the Mentone community and participated in by egg shipping associations of nearby towns, it was recently announced by Max Nellans, general chairman.

The highlight of the three-day program will be the crowning of the Egg Queen on the last night. The queen is selected from one of five candidates, one each from North Manchester, Claypool, Warsaw, Burket and Mentone, and will be chosen by disinterested judges at the Wednesday night program.

The show will again offer two afternoon sessions, Wed., April 16, and Thurs., April 17, and the three night sessions, April 16, 17 and 18, with the banquet serving 400 to be held before the final program. The premium eggs, exhibited by poultrymen, will be judged Thursday and prizes awarded Friday evening.

It is planned to have several of the poultry industry's outstanding authorities, a world famous woman dietician, the Governor of Indiana, Henry Schricker, who will crown the Egg Queen, and Lieut. Gov. Dawson, on the program.

The mobile WLS unit will also be in Mentone Thursday noon when dinner-bell time, directed by Art Page, will be broadcast from the community building. The candidates for queen and several local egg show officers will take part in the program.

The H. J. Heinz Company of the 57 varieties fame, turns out 126 different food products and to do so employs 17,000 men in 26 factories.

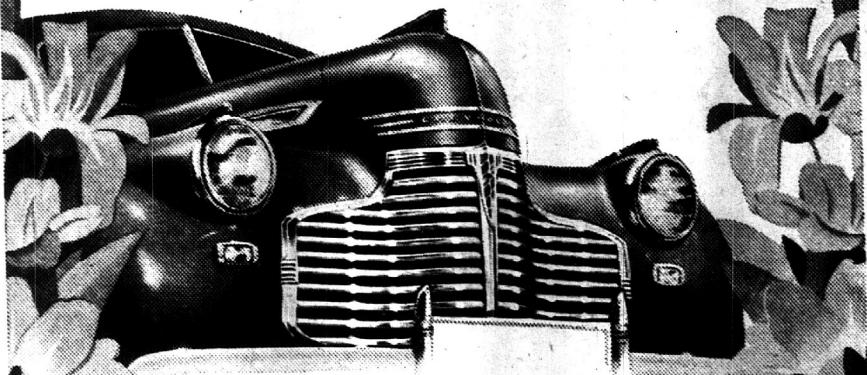

## Will Use Magic to Pack Church Pews

### Handsome Performer Goes To Work for Christianity.

CHICAGO.—John Booth, a handsome youth who has lived off magic the last six years, transfers his tricks and fancy talk from night club floors to the church pulpit to "pack the pews" for Christianity.

He has promised to "rekindle enthusiasm for the church if I have to pull jackrabbits from the organ stops.

"I made a lot of money amusing crowds at theaters and night clubs from Canada to South America," he said, "and I'll pack the pews for Christianity, too."

Booth, 28, is a theology student at the University of Chicago. He said he decided to become a minister when he realized that "something constructive" should be done with his powers of entertainment.

For six years after his graduation in 1934 from McMaster university, Hamilton, Ont., he pounded the footboards as a career conjurer, winning reviewers' plaudits from scores of metropolitan newspapers. A national trade journal rates him "one of the nine foremost magicians of the day," and, additionally, he has written three books of instruction in the art.

Tall, dark and mustached, Booth said he learned early that presentation—"gift of gab" he calls it—was "90 per cent" of any trick.

"If I could make presentation pay with mere tomfoolery I figured I could make it do big things for truth," he said.

Booth long had nurtured an ambition for the ministry because it was as a child in Sunday School at Cleveland that he learned his first "magic" from Carl Germain, a prominent showman and a teacher in the church school.

"Of course I cannot hope to make the money I made on the stage," Booth said. "But I will have become useful to myself and to mankind."

He said he expects to bring magic and logic together in the pulpit "in a modern, sane setting." In ancient ritual, magic and religion were united in ceremony, he said, to impress the congregations.

## Whistle of Train Lures Baby, Mother to Death

GASTONIA, N. C.—A funeral bell and not the locomotive bell that he liked so well tolled for 16-month-old Lawrence Chavis and his mother.

Lawrence, so the neighbors said, liked to watch the train roar by his home; he'd cock his head when the bell rang and imitate the whistle.

He apparently decided that such a friendly thing as a train wouldn't hurt a little fellow. So while his mother was busy with the housework, he slipped away and headed for the tracks.

His mother saw him there, saw the train bearing down upon him. Screaming, she ran to his side, threw her arms about him and there they died together.

During the summer, Franke, the "sleepingest man in town," had his alarm clock connected with a pail of water placed above his bed, but cold weather made this scheme unbearable. Franke's cat, which may be allergic to alarms, starts pulling his hair now whenever the clock's bell rings, and Franke says he must rise in self-defense.

## One Shot in the Rabbit Worth Two in Appendix

RENSSELAER, N. Y.—The gunshot he used so often to fell wild rabbits finally "felled" Charles W. Weston himself.

Stricken with severe abdominal pain, Weston was taken to a hospital where an appendix operation was performed.

X-rays disclosed bits of buckshot lodged in his appendix, leaden souvenirs of rabbits he had slain and consumed.

### Spicy Coating for Doughnuts

To give a spicy sugar coating to freshly fried doughnuts, mix half a cup of granulated sugar, one teaspoon of cinnamon, one-half teaspoon of powdered cloves and one-fourth cup of chopped nut meats. Place in a paper sack and add six doughnuts at a time. Shake the bag until doughnuts are coated. These are delicious served with hot or cold drinks.

Jack Dillman received a rating of A-plus, very superior, in the state music contest at Laporte, recently.

## Seasonal Poultry Suggestions Given

Moving the brooder house now may be much easier than waiting until the spring rush season. Coccidia and worm eggs may live over winter in the soil. To avoid many of these troubles this year move the brooder house to clean ground—an area that has had no poultry or poultry manure on it for at least one complete year, says Scott Hinners, Purdue University extension poultryman.

Before moving the brooder house it is well to clean the house thoroughly by scraping, sweeping, scrubbing with one ounce of lye to each gallon of boiling water, and spraying with a three to five per cent solution of a good disinfectant. If this procedure is carried on before the house is moved the disease germs and parasite eggs will not be carried along with the brooder house to the new range, states the specialist.

Perhaps now would be as good a time as any to construct temporary fences which may have been needed so badly to keep the growing flock separated from the laying flock. It is important to keep the flock separated since the older stock may carry disease and parasitic infections that can easily be picked up by the young chicks.

Most successful poultry raisers prefer to start good quality chicks, states Hinners. They feel these chicks will have an opportunity to develop into nice healthy vigorous cockerels and pullets. Livability, growth, and egg production, rather than price should be considered in making chick selection. It is advisable to use only good chicks—chicks from desirable breeding stock properly tested for pullorum disease with reactors removed. Placing the order early may prevent disappointments.

### Baking Crust First

One way to keep the lower crust of a pie from soaking up the fruit juice is to bake the crust before the fruit is put into it, and thicken the fruit slightly before it is put into the pie.

## TEXT OF TALK OVER WOWO GIVEN BY MRS. VIRGIL DORAN

The following is the script of a talk given by Mrs. Virgil Doran, of Burket, president of county home economics club, over radio station WOWO, Fort Wayne, Friday, April 4, in regard to the Mentone Egg Show:

"Kosciusko county has 26 home economics clubs and about 700 women enrolled.

"We feel very honored that an organization like the Mentone Egg Show has asked us to sponsor a two-hour program, Thursday afternoon, April 17, in cooperation with Miss Catherine Niles, member of the National Egg and Poultry Board, who will have charge of the demonstrations. Our program will feature eggs through demonstrations and exhibits. Attractive awards will be given for:

1. The club coming the greatest number of miles, collectively.
2. The club using eggs in the most different ways.
3. The most attractive exhibit (group of five dishes).
4. Most attractive dish or article prepared from eggs.
5. Posters urging the use of more eggs.
6. Four demonstrations.

"Each of our 26 clubs will be represented and we are expecting a large attendance. There will be everything from omelets, angel food cakes, divinity fudge, icings, salads, Easter eggs, school lunches, etc. I get a letter from the women every day describing their exhibits and I am so enthused that I can hardly wait. Come and see for yourself what 600 homemakers can do with eggs.

"For the evening, the County Home Economics Chorus has planned a varied and entertaining program. Not only will the chorus render several selections a capella, but they will present a barnyard frolic, the acting being done entirely by chickens, believe it or not. The "All American Quartet," a short skit concerning an expectant father, will precede the cock-fight which we expect to be the climax of the evening. We have two game cocks in training now and if they continue to improve there is sure to be a knockout.

"The chorus will close their evening program with a novelty interpretation of that old favorite, "Lil'

Liza Jane." Incidentally, the director of the chorus is last year's Egg Queen Delta Deane Doran."

According to Harold Nelson, publicity chairman, it is expected that 360 dozens of premium eggs will entered for judging at the Mentone Egg Show. Prize money totals \$215.

## Fertilizer Economies Save Farmers More Than \$200,000,000 A Year



### Survey Shows \$3.60 For Each Dollar Spent For Fertilizer.

Washington, D. C.—Lower prices for fertilizers due to industry economies have saved farmers \$200,000,000 a year, according to government analysis made by A. L. Mehring of the U. S. Department of Agriculture who shows that the sharp downward trend of fertilizer prices since 1880 was interrupted only during the period of the last war; when, due to our country's dependence at that time on foreign supplies, prices rose sharply. After that they again resumed their downward trend. At the same time the industry made the nation self-sufficient and no longer largely dependent upon foreign sources of supply.

"Prices dropped sharply during the depression and have never recovered to the extent that other commodities have. As a result of this fact, fer-

tilizer prices today give the farmer real parity for his dollar," says Charles J. Brand, Executive Secretary and Treasurer of The National Fertilizer Association. "Prices received by farmers for their products today would have to go up 21 per cent to reach parity with what farmers pay for all commodities which they buy. But, so far as fertilizer is concerned the picture is different. The present price of fertilizer is so low that it gives the farmer, instead of a 21 per cent handicap, a 5 per cent advantage on every dollar he spends for fertilizer."

Returns from a recent survey of 32,000 farmers show that an investment in low-priced fertilizers yields high returns. An average of \$3.60 returned for each \$1.00 which they spent for fertilizer.

## HUNDREDS TURNED AWAY AT FINAL NIGHT'S PROGRAM

Over 1500 persons attended the final program and banquet of the Mentone Egg Show last Friday night and hundreds were turned away as all seats and every bit of standing room in the community building were filled to capacity.

On the program were: Frankie Meredith's orchestra, Ramblin' Red Foley and Little Eva, WLS radio headliners, the Stevens Troubadours, Dr. Holmes Martin, head of Purdue Poultry Dept., and Professor Harry J. Reed, dean of the Purdue agricultural dept., who crowned Queen Ileen Sarber, of Burket, in place of Gov. Schricker, who was unable to attend.

Introduced were many special guests and prominent men connected with the poultry industry in and around Mentone.

Also present was Maurice Early, columnist for the Indianapolis Star. A few excerpts from his column, "My Day in Indiana," a front page feature of that paper, are as follows:

HERE in Mentone are the Henry Fords of the egg production business. They have put poultry raising on a high assembly line basis. This brought prosperity to this small town, which otherwise would have been nothing more than another Hoosier cross roads village.

UNLIKE industry, these big egg men do not want to batter down competition. Instead they welcome it. Scores of farmers have gone into the poultry business in a 20 mile radius around Mentone.

BOTH Chester Manwaring and Hobart Creighton, heads of the biggest poultry farms in the nation, point with enthusiasm to prosperous small farms. They are being operated in some instances by young men from Chicago—and successfully. These city boys with no farm experience are instructed in the science. They succeed for one reason, because they were not raised on, and have no preconceived notions on how egg production should be managed. They accept scientific processes, many of them developed at Purdue university, and by the school of experience here.

AS A RESULT, as many as 2,000,000 eggs are shipped to New York weekly during the period of highest prices. The demand in the big metropolis for the white-shelled Leghorn eggs appears to be without limit.

BUT THERE were many years of hard work behind the success that developed the eastern market. Strains of chickens had to be developed which would produce large, perfect eggs. Extreme care had to be taken

in caring for the eggs and grading them.

IT IS ESTIMATED there are 200 individual farmers in the Mentone area who have gone into poultry raising as their chief means of livelihood and not as a sideline. Income from eggs alone in this area is \$2,000,000 a year.

BUT THIS is regarded by the experts here as only the beginning. They expect a much greater expansion of the industry. That is the reason that the annual egg show is held at Mentone. The show, now in progress is like the ones held in previous years. The main idea is to spur the people in the area on to developing better eggs and to get more people in the business.

MENTONE got the drop on other communities 31 years ago when A. C. Manwaring, who had ups and downs financially, decided at the age of 55 to go into the highly hazardous poultry business. Many had done it before throughout the nation. The record is about 90 per cent failure. But he stuck it out and called his son, Chester, now head of the firm, from the class room. He was a teacher. Together they determined to make the business a success.

WITH THE HELP of Purdue, they did. From this beginning sprang the big business. Today in the Manwaring plant is an incubator which will hatch 65,000 eggs at once.

HOBART CREIGHTON, state representative, also was kicked upstairs into the business, operated jointly with his brother. Hobart was a student under Chester Manwaring, and also became a teacher. But the law was changed and demanded a four-year college course for a teacher, so he went back to farming—ilopped as a swine raiser and then borrowed some money and went into the poultry business.

TODAY he points to what is believed to be the biggest single poultry ranch in the country—certainly the biggest outside of California and New England. On it are 37,500 pullets maturing. Early in the fall they will be placed in mammoth houses and start their work of egg production. A hen here loses its neck if it can't produce 250 or more eggs a year.

ELEVEN YEARS ago co-operative shipping of eggs by carlot to New York was developed and in a single year increased the income of producers \$61,000. About the same time the farmers invested \$5,000 in their own mill to mix feed scientifically. Last year it did a business of \$500,000 with a net profit of \$33,000. As a result, this community was prosperous during the depression. Manwaring gets the credit for the suc-

cessful shipping method and Creighton was the mainspring of the co-operative mill.

J. HOLMES MARTON, head of the Purdue poultry division, explains Mentone's success. The recipe is well-bred and productive stock, reliable and economical source of feed and materials, and successful marketing.

OTHER COMMUNITIES can do the same thing, he says.

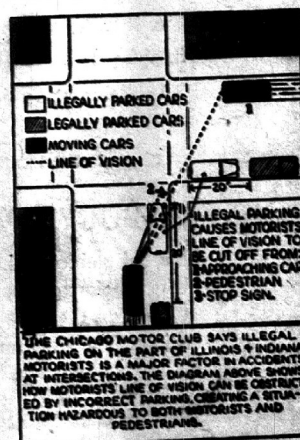

### SAVINGS BONDS WILL GO ON SALE IN MENTONE MAY 1

The United States Defense Savings bonds and postal savings stamps are to be placed on sale here at the local postoffice on Thursday, May 1, as a part of the national effort to make America impregnable.

Postmaster L. A. Rickel has been informed that a supply will be available for local persons, and that the new bonds are similar to the familiar "baby bonds" of which so many have been sold.

A defense bond may be purchased for \$18.75 on May 1. In ten years this bond will be worth \$25.00. Other denominations are also available.

This is equal to an annual interest return of 2.9 per cent, compounded semi-annually.

For the smaller investor who wants to buy a bond on an easy payment plan, the postoffice will have a new series of Postal Savings Stamps, at 10c, 25c, 50c \$1.00, and \$5.00. Each purchaser will be given a pocket album in which to paste his stamps until he has enough to buy a \$25 bond or one of the higher denominations.

K. A. Riner, vice-president of the Farmers State Bank, announces that the bank is cooperating in the defense program and that the above described Defense Stamps and Defense bonds, in addition to the larger denominations of bonds, comprising series "F" and series "G", will be available at the bank. All bonds and stamps will go on sale May 1, 1941.

## Finds Rival's Love Notes, Then Kills Fickle Sweetheart

### British Soldier, Sutor for Seven Years, Charged With Murder.

LONDON.—After finding letters from a corporal on his sweetheart's dressing table, an army private, it was claimed by the prosecution, shot her dead.

"You have not been true to me," he is alleged to have told the girl. "I do not intend you to have another man to fool like you have me."

The soldier, Driver Edward George Beesley, 29 years old, of Oxford, England, British army private, was charged at Oxford with the murder of Miss Irene Sherry, 26 years old, whose real name was Irene Winifred Edwards, of Craven Arms, Shropshire, a domestic servant at Oxford, by shooting her with his service rifle.

Prosecutor E. G. Robey said Miss Sherry had been friendly with Beesley for a number of years, and it was obvious that he wanted to marry her.

In July of this year she became acquainted with Corporal James Fuller of Totnes road, Reading, and apparently they made up their minds to become engaged.

#### Rejected Admirer Calls.

On September 16 Beesley went to Oxford because he was anxious about Miss Sherry, not having heard from her for some time. He went to the girl's lodgings and waited in her room until she returned at 10:30 p. m. Shortly afterwards the fatal shot was heard.

Beesley, while waiting, had seen some letters which were written by Corporal Fuller. They were obviously love letters and they showed that Fuller and the girl were hoping to marry.

After reading the letters, alleged Robey, Beesley discharged his rifle, with the result that the girl was shot through the heart at close range while sitting in an armchair.

Counsel alleged that in a statement Beesley said:

"I waited until Miss Sherry came in. She seemed surprised to see me. I asked her why she had not written to me for nearly a month, and told her I knew the reason why."

"I asked her who Corporal James Fuller was, and she said she did not know. I produced some letters which I had found on her dressing table and she tried to grab them from me, but I pulled them back and put them in my pocket."

#### Treats It as a Joke.

"I said to her: 'You have not been true to me while I was in the army. It is about time you made up your mind after going with me for seven years. I do not intend you to have another man to fool like you have me.'"

"She then said she would please herself what she did, and laughed and treated it as a joke."

"I picked up my gun and pointed it at her as she sat in the chair. The next thing I heard was a shot. I thought I had missed her, and left the room and the house by the front door."

"I walked up Richmond road to the corner of Walton street and just wandered about. In the end I gave myself up at the Central police station."

Prosecutor Robey said that when at the station Beesley asked if the girl was dead. When told she was, he said he did not care what happened; he did not mean to kill her.

Beesley was committed for trial at Oxford Assizes.

### Forest Ranger at Last Finds an Honest Hunter

GLOBE, ARIZ.—It took Forest Ranger Carl Scholefield 32 years to find an honest hunter. Scholefield's candidate is 17-year-old Richard Harrell of Phoenix, who accidentally killed a doe in Crook National forest. He promptly reported what he had done to the ranger.

The ranger said Harrell was the first hunter in his 32 years of service who surrendered voluntarily after killing a doe.

Justice of the Peace Erastus Grice dismissed the case, saying, "This young man has given an exhibition of sportsmanship very rare among hunters. His license has been restored to him with the admonition to look more closely for horns the next time he goes hunting."

### Identifies 3 Kidnapers, Then Collapses and Dies

LEXINGTON, KY.—George Maxey, 68 years old, was called by the police to identify three men suspected of abducting, robbing and beating him.

He identified them and prepared to swear to warrants.

Then he collapsed. A few minutes later he died—of a heart attack, said Coroner Hervey Kerr.

The suspects were released. There were no witnesses left.

### New Method Is Devised To Combat Dog Thieves

SCRANTON, PA.—Frederick W. Earley, Lackawanna county dog recorder, is tattooing dogs' ears with identification numbers.

Earley said the practice would facilitate police and owners in identifying lost or stolen dogs.

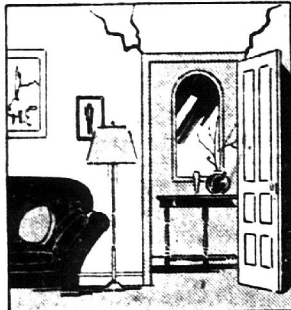

## SKIMPING IN WRONG PLACES OFTEN COSTLY IN LONG RUN

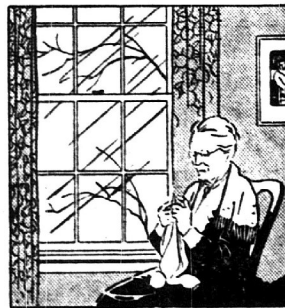
### CUTTING COSTS ON FUNDAMENTALS MEANS ENDLESS TROUBLE AND EXPENSE IN YEARS TO COME



**CRACKED WALLS**—Often caused by uneven settling of footings and foundation. Skimping on footings in either size or concrete mix is poor economy.



**CREAKY FLOORS**—Very often the result of skimping on size of floor joists. Another example of the wrong place to cut costs.
