

MIRACLE OF FATIMA AT AKRON THEATRE

"The Miracle of Fatima," Warner Bros.' stirring true story drama of the famous miracle that occurred 35 years ago in the little town of Fatima, Portugal, opens at the Akron Theatre on Easter Sunday and Monday. It is filmed in color by WarnerColor.

The story of the miracle goes back to May 13, 1917, when three shepherd children reported they had seen a vision in a field near the village.

The children declared the vision had promised to appear to them five more times on the same date in succeeding months. In these later meetings, the children reported, the vision had prophesied that World War I, then raging, would end shortly. Also there would be a World War II. The apparition also predicted that two of the three children, Jacinta and Francisco, would die and that the third, Lucia dos Santos, their cousin, would live.

Some of the prophecies came true. Jacinto and Francisco died a few years later with influenza. Lucia lived

and is now a nun in an Italian convent. World War I ended the year following the visions, and World War II occurred.

Perhaps the most amazing of the Fatima miracles was the climactic vision seen by the children which is now known as the "revolving sun" phenomenon and which occurred on Oct. 13, 1917. Thousands of spectators who were present on this day testified they, in addition to the children, saw the sun descend rapidly toward the earth and then as suddenly stop and return.

Persecuted by the socialistic government, the children and their families withstood threats of jailing and torture rather than give up their faith in the Lady of Fatima. The story, long one of the world's most dramatic expressions of faith, has Gilbert Roland and Susan Whitney in Key posts.

Since the children reported the vision at Fatima, that little village just northeast of Lisbon has become one of the world's greatest shrines, and has been visited by millions of the faithful from all parts of the world.

WHEAT VARIETY DEMONSTRATION IN GOOD SHAPE

All wheat varieties in the variety and fertilizer demonstration seeded on the Hoy and Forrest Meredith farm northeast of Mentone last fall have come through the mild winter in fine shape.

Varieties seeded include: Butler, Thorne, Seneca, Vigo, Fairfield, Saline and two unnamed experimentals. Seneca and Saline are new wheats developed at the Ohio and Illinois experiment stations.

Along with the variety seedings are

drill width strip comparisons of fertilizer, fall applied ammonia nitrogen for comparison with the same amount top dressed this spring, and a spring dressing without fall fertilizer are included.

Variety and fertilizer strips are to be combined separately and yields determined. A meeting at or near combining time will be announced to give Kosciusko county farmers a chance to see these wheats together in the field and to get their performance record as well as the results of the different fertilizer treatments.

Mentone school will be on the air this Saturday at 11:30 over radio sta-



**INSOLUBLE FERTILIZERS
BEING SOLD IN STATE**

Several insoluble fertilizers and fertilizer materials are being sold in the state, according to Dr. F. W. Quackenbush, state chemist.

Such materials as sewage sludge, soft phosphate with colloidal clay and green sand marl, an insoluble potash carrier sold individually or mixed, contain very little available plant food. Yet prices for these materials and mixtures are relatively high in comparison to the foreseeable benefits.

Fertilizer buyers should attempt to get available plant food. They should place their confidence in the statements concerning available plant food found on the fertilizer tag. Verbal representations and testimonials will not produce a bumper crop, but properly balanced available plant food as shown

on the state chemist fertilizer tag will help do so.

Farmers should make the fertilizer tag their guide. If the fertilizer is not tagged or if there are any circumstances that throw doubt on the quality of the fertilizer, these facts should be reported to the state chemist.

During 1952, more than 2,000,000 boys and girls participated in 4-H club work. This number was the greatest enrollment in history. Indiana's share was 73,688 members. State 4-H leaders announce that National 4-H Week will be held this year from March 7-15. During this week, many counties will conduct drives for both members and volunteer leaders, according to Harold B. Taylor, state leader of 4-H clubs at Purdue University.







Safe Trash Burner



Here's how one farmer made a safe, but very effective incinerator for trash and rubbish: He used an ordinary 50-gallon steel drum, and cut the top from one end. Four small holes were punched along the rim at the bottom of the other end to serve as a rainwater drain. A half dozen larger, 1½-inch holes were punched six to eight inches above the bottom for a draft. It'll burn rubbish fast, but he keeps a sheet of metal for the top to shut off the flames—in case the fire burns too fiercely.

Secret of control of spittlebugs, a major pest of clovers and alfalfa, is early application of sprays or dusts. One or two spittle masses per plant, on or between expanding leaves, is enough manifestation to justify prompt action this month, say Purdue University entomologists.

Like its Master Jesus Christ, it has not hesitated to associate with the publican and sinner of this day.

It is not a doctrinal church, and its concept of the Bible is not fetishistic. Its positive message is the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

An interesting bit of information the pastor recently learned is that the form of government for the state of Indiana was patterned after that of the Methodist church, it being the best organization within the bounds of the territory when Indiana became a state.

The members and friends of the Methodist church of Mentone, are urged to attend this conference session this coming Sunday afternoon.



Funeral services will be held at the Harrison Center EUB church at two o'clock Friday afternoon, with Rev. David Gosser, pastor of the Methodist church, and Rev. John Schroeder, pastor of the Etna Green EUB church, officiating. Burial will be at Harrison Center. Friends will be received at the Johns funeral home until the hour of the services.

Likely the county commissioners will announce the appointment of Mr. Tucker's successor as trustee within the next few days.





LATE NITROGEN APPLICATION GOOD FOR WHEAT

How late in the season can nitrogen fertilizer be applied as a top dressing for wheat? This is a question many Indiana farmers are asking Purdue University agronomists this spring.

Some farmers are faced with a delay in the delivery of nitrogen fertilizers. Others are fearful that fields

may be too wet for them to get on the land until late April with spreading equipment. Some farmers have the opinion that nitrogen fertilizer should not be top dressed much later than April 1.

The Purdue agronomy department has carried on experiments for eleven years trying to determine how late in the spring nitrogen may be applied to wheat with good results. In these tests,

conducted on the old Soils and Crops Farm at Lafayette, applications were made March 20, April 5, April 20, May 20. The increase in yield from the March, April and May 5 applications were similar, but the late May application gave only about one-third of the increase of the earlier applications.


Field demonstrations conducted throughout the state during the past six years have shown an average increase of a little more than six bushels per acre from top dressing of 25 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre, the amount contained in 80 pounds of 32 per cent ammonium nitrate.

From these results farmers should feel encouraged to apply nitrogen fertilizer on wheat any time in April or even as late as May 5, in the latitude of Lafayette or further north in the state.

South of Lafayette where the season

is normally earlier and the wheat larger, the latest date of application probably would be a week or two earlier, than at Lafayette. However, Purdue specialists say, there is no point for any farmer in the state waiting any longer now to apply nitrogen for top dressing if soil conditions permit its use.

Dormant oil sprays will protect trees and woody ornamentals against most scale insects, declare Purdue University entomologists. Spray should be applied before buds open and when the temperature is above 40 degrees.

Akron Rates Reduced



ADVISE HITTING SWEET CLOVER WEEVIL EARLY

Don't wait until you see the whites of their eyes before you attack sweet clover weevil," says M. Curtis Wilson, Purdue University entomologists.

He warns farmers that the insect is already chewing on new sweet clover shoots from last year's crop and will invade 1953 seedlings as soon as they appear.

A lethal barrage for the pests, reports Wilson, is a mixture of DDT and fertilizer as a top-dressing when the sweet clover seedlings first appear. This practice works two ways—DDT protects the plants from the weevils and the fertilizer speeds up plant growth.

The bigger the plants, the less likely they will be killed by weevils. Since treatment calls for only about two


pounds of DDT per acre, it must be thoroughly mixed with the fertilizer so that it can be spread evenly over the field. The job is probably best done with the mixing equipment at a fertilizer plant.

Sweet clover weevil can also be controlled by DDT sprays or dust, at a rate of one and one-half to two pounds of actual DDT per acre.

A low pressure weed sprayer can be used to apply one gallon of 25 per cent DDT emulsion in 20 gallons of water per acre when sweet clover is in the two-leaf stage.

Airplane dusting may be advantageous when the nurse crop of wheat or oats is too high for ground equipment.





and partly from the presence of white grub, a favorite morsel for swine. Where summer pasture is the main need, agronomists are advocating seeding Korean lespedeza as a first choice among legumes. It should be seeded as early as soil conditions permit.

Under the recently revised Canada thistle law, tighter statewide controls are set up for one of Indiana's primary noxious weeds. Oliver C. Lee, Purdue University extension botanist, says the new law, coupled with the current education program, will provide encouragement for farmers and landowners to check the spread of Canada thistle and bring about its eradication. The law requires that the weed be controlled in the bud state or earlier.

OUTDOOR LAB AIDS
NATURE STUDY SCHOOL

Back in pioneer days, children grew up with thorough knowledge of woods and wildlife. Nowadays, outdoor experiences are infrequent and interest in conservation may be neglected.

E. J. Lott, Purdue University extension forester, suggests that a school forest may be the key to giving children a real appreciation of the things of nature, as well as to teach the basic

importance of natural resources.

Land for school forests may be acquired by purchase or gift. In some states, lumber companies have donated land or made it available at low prices. In other states, land is obtained by paying delinquent taxes.

School forests have worthwhile features in addition to use as biology laboratories. They can produce wood for the school shop, posts, Christmas trees and greens for sale.

The study of the forest as it develops into a community of trees and wildlife can be highly fascinating for children. Experiences in other states indicate that as the forest grows, civic interest increases, and the whole community becomes stronger.

They also advise setting aside some land near the dwelling to use exclusively as poultry pasture. AN OPEN LETTER

Pursuant to a movement sponsored jointly by the Mentone Lion's club, Businessmen's Association and others interested in an adjustment in Telephone rates in this and adjoining communities, a letter has been mailed to all subscribers of the Mentone Telephone exchange, outlining so far as practical, information relative to the proceedings which were involved in the recent rate increases and the efforts to have a reconsideration and adjustment of the rates.

As a result of several petitions to the Public Service Commission, which had not had too careful consideration from that body, until after an effort was made to have legislative investigation of the proceedings of the commission, relative to the petitions, and also a suit being filed enjoining the commission on a decision to permit the Telephone Company to increase its rates, in spite of the fact that service by the company to its patrons had not been put on a basis comparable to the rates,

and such as the patrons have a right to expect, a reduction in rates to the basis of December, 1951 was granted to the patrons of Akron Ind., exchange, only, although several other exchanges, including Mentone, Silver Lake and others had been included in and made the subjects of the petition. The hearing in injunction above referred to, has been venued to Kosciusko Circuit Court, to be heard at a time set following the recent finding of the Public Service Commission, at date which is yet to be set.

This hearing in injunction is still pending, and is one of the main factors in pressing the cause as outlined in our petitions for rate adjustment and must be prosecuted to the end that proper consideration of these petitions be given by the commission.

As stated in the letter mentioned above, these hearings have involved quite a matter of financial obligation and outlay and will, necessarily, involve further outlay to carry the proceedings to a reasonable conclusion; an obligation and responsibility which,

in all fairness, should be, as equitably as possible, spread over and presented to the entire personnel of the several exchanges involved, inasmuch as there is no organization or association of patrons with salaried legal council to represent them.

We have been assured by the sponsors of the movement in Akron, Ind., that although they have been granted the adjustment for which they petitioned, they are not accepting this as a bid to withdraw from the picture, but that the favorable consideration they have received is but one step in an all out effort on behalf of all the exchanges involved and interested.

The financial support of all affected and interested is urged by the committee in the manner outlined in the letter above mentioned.

In case you have not received a

copy of the letter, either by oversight, or because your phone was not listed in the local directory, kindly mention it to your neighbor who will undoubtedly have one, and be glad to let you read it.

The committee is highly gratified at the immediate and hearty response received from contributions by checks and in many instances a little note of hearty endorsement and boosting in behalf of the efforts of the committee, for which an appreciation is hereby expressed.
