WLS National Barn Dance Show at Fair

A pioneer in radio entertainment is the WLS National Barn Dance, which is observing its seventeenth anniversary this year, and in celebration of the event a gala tour of this popular radio show has been arranged. With a galaxy of new stars of comedy, song and dance, the National Barn Dance is coming to Mentone for one big performance at the Mentone Fair on Friday evening, August 22.

There are many interesting features of the new Barn Dance Show, but the main and original idea remains—rustic comedy and music in the setting of a hayloft. "NAVY INTELLIGENCE"

Is it necessary to be a high school graduate in order to enlist in the Navy?

No. Navy enlistees need not be high school graduates. All applicants will be given an examination containing approximately 100 questions. A grade of 50 per cent or better on this examination is sufficiently high to pass the Navy educational standards. However, a high school education will be valuable to the seaman during his Navy enlistment.

If I enlist in the Navy will I be sent to a Navy Trade School?

All new recruits are sent to one of four Naval Training Stations and after a training period they may take examinations for entrance into Navy Trade Schools. Those recruits who pass their examinations with sufficiently high grades are sent to Navy Trade Schools before assignment to the fleet. While attending these schools they will receive regular Navy pay and free schooling valued at \$1500.

What is the greatest possible pay I can expect to earn during my first term of enlistment?

It is possible to earn as much as

\$126 a month by the end of your first term of enlistment, and remember that your clothing, lodging, medical and dental care are all supplied free.

After I have served my term of enlistment, what benefits do I get for re-enlistment?

Depending on your rate and length of service, you can get a cash bonus up to \$300 plus 30 days leave with pay.

What does the term "ash can" mean in the Navy?

An "ash can" is a slang term applied to the depth charge used to combat submarines. The average "ash can" is a container filled with approximately 300 pounds of T.N.T. and can be dropped overboard from a ship and so controlled as to explode at depths ranging from 36 to 300 feet. These are generally carried by the fast ships in the fleet, as a boat dropping a charge regulated to explode at 70 feet depth must move away from the explosion area at a speed of 25 knots or more. These "ash cans" are either rolled off the stern or shot from "y-guns" which hurl one right and one left simultaneously.

HALF-PRICED TICKET

SALE UNUSUALLY LARGE

Each year the Indiana State Fair Board offers several thousand half-priced 25-cent admission tickets to the great Hoosier Exposition which have proved to be unusually popular with Indiana State Fair goers. The original amount of tickets offered was 50,000, and that amount has been increased 25,000 each year until this year the total amount offered for sale July 14 was 250,000.

All tickets are sold on a cash basis by the State Fair Board, but so popular are these tickets with the public that drug stores, banks, business concerns, county agents and others purchase the tickets and resell them without profit as a courtesy to their customers and members. Today less than 20,000 tickets remain unsold at the Fair Board offices on the State Fair Grounds, Indianapolis, and the supply is diminishing fast.

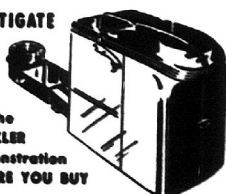

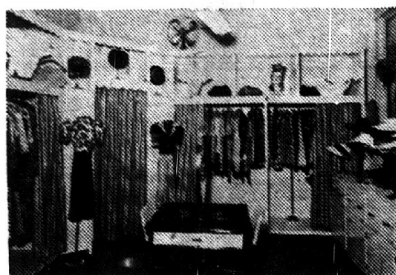

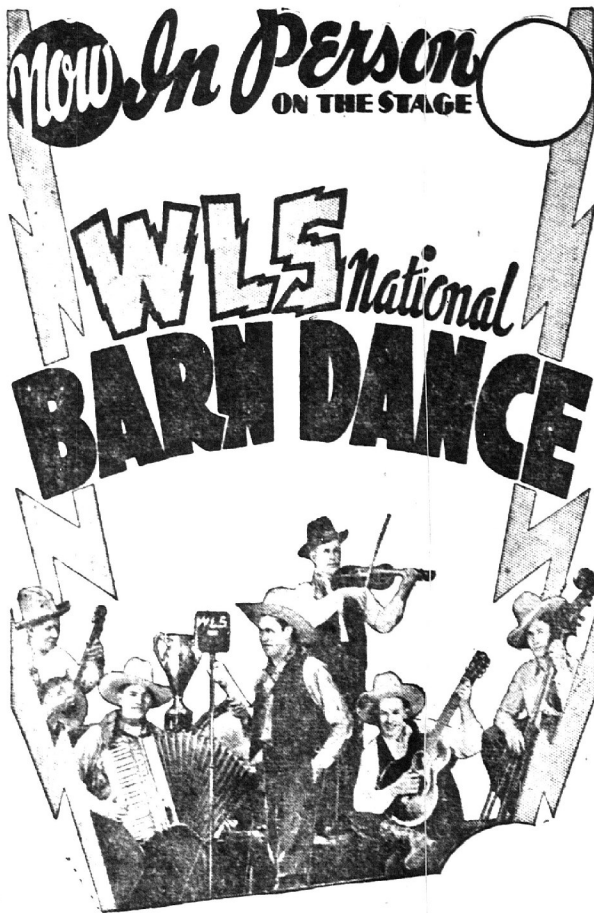

**MAKING SURVEY OF
 RAILROAD CROSSINGS**

A survey of all railroad crossings in the city of Mentone, and including those in other Kosciusko county towns such as Warsaw, Burket, Claypool, Etna Green, Leesburg, Milford, Pierceton, Sidney, Silver Lake and Syracuse, was started August 11 by representatives of the State Highway Commission and the U. All grade crossings, whether on state highways or not, will be included in the study which is a part of the statewide program to obtain data for future safety programs. The survey party for local crossings is composed of Wm. H. Bilby, C. A. Stier and Richard Blackett.

It is estimated that it will require 14 days to obtain the necessary data which will be transmitted to the Bureau of Highway Planning in Indianapolis for tabulation along with similar information on crossings in other Indiana cities and towns.

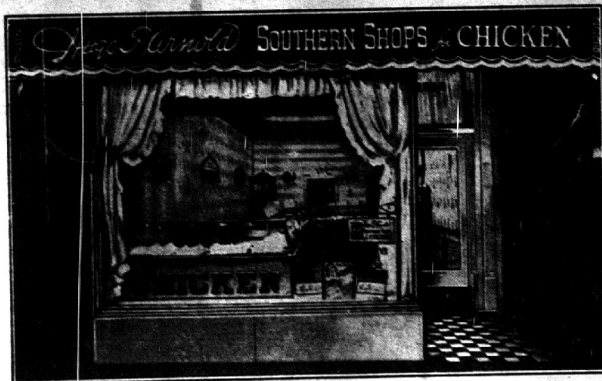
