





Winterize More Than Radiator

Motorists not only should take their winter clothing out of moth balls but their winter driving habits, too, according to Matthew C. Sielski, director of the Chicago Motor Club's Safety and Traffic Engineering department.

Winter, with its slippery roads and visibility problems, is a critical time of year for drivers, Sielski said.

Most skidding accidents occur in the pre-winter and early winter months because motorists are caught by surprise. It is easy for drivers to forget how slippery roads can get, Sielski said.

Tests have proved that the braking distance on glare ice is twice as long at 30 degrees as at a zero temperature. The greatest skidding dangers exist when it is just cold enough for water to freeze.

"A winter changeover doesn't mean just adding anti-freeze to your radiator," Sielski said. "The changeover also should take place in the attitude of the driver himself '

Wet roads require motorists to drive cautiously and at a reduced speed. Slushy roads, usually accompanied by fog and early darkness, present many visibility problems, he said. Falling sleet or snow and splashes of slush from passing cars require motorists to have properly working windshield wipers.

In this kind of weather, headlights, not parking lights, should be turned on to warn both pedestrians and oncoming traffic. Windshield washers installed on the car can aid visibility, Sielski said.

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Mentone Boy one of Students Aiding in Fuel Research Rocket to Moon is Aim Of Purdue Research

The following story appeared in the Nov. 3 issue of The Indianapolis Times, and the picture that was used in the story showed Dr. M. J. Zucrow, Dr. Bruce A. Reese, associate professor of Mechanical Engineering, and Don (Junior) Emmons, Mentone. who is working on his Master's degree. Junior is one of the students who has been experimenting with rocket fuels and their development. -Ed I

Because of rocket research at Purdue, man someday may fly to the moon.

How would you like to take a stroll through a rocket lab? There is one at Purdue University, Part of it's secret-part of it isn't. It's one of three in our nation.

One small boy visiting was allowed to step into the concrete cell where they actually run a rocket motor.

"That's a rocket?" he gasped. "Oh, no." He knew better.

The comic books don't show the insides of a rocket. They don't explain chamber pressure or heat transfer or two-phase flow hydrodynamics.

At Purdue, they do.

"Sure we can go to the moon -and will-we know how to now," Dr. M. J. Zucrow said calmly

"We'll go farther-we'll go to Jupiter and Mars-and beyond and there is no end, for when we get there, we'll look for another planet. But to blast off, we need two things: People and money."

Purdue, under guidance of one of the top 10 rocket experts of the world-Dr. Zucrow-is putting up the people-at least some of them

"Football coaches get paid. Science teachers don't. This isn't funny," said Dr. Zucrow.

"If no one feeds us the right minds from high school, we'll grind to a scientific halt."

As Dr. Zucrow walked from concrete cell to concrete cell where rocket motors were mounted with Rube Goldberg-like test devices, he blasted away:

"We face armament danger. Only if our retaliatory powers are so great no one dares to touch us, will we be safe.

"To be best, we must prepare. Anybody's a good cook when the grocery store's full of supplies. Our country won't be a leader unless we stock our shelves with trained scientific teams and basic research knowledge," he said.

Stopping a moment, he introduced one of his "boys." There are about 25 taking their masters and doctorates under Dr. Zucrow.

Ten years ago, there were none The rocket expert came to Purdue to find a cornfield awaiting him. There were no people, there was no money.

With money mainly from the Navy, a bunch of greenhorns and some buildings built by Purdue. Dr. Zucrow began.

Now 102 men have picked up their graduate degrees and gone out to head up research projects all over the nation.

"We are, I believe, one of three university rocket labs in the country. Ours is the only one where the students do the work. go boom. It did.

It takes five-siz years to get a doctorate here, but our boys have some breadth as well as dept when they get out," the rocketeer said proudly.

"These are the boys who may help put us on the moon," he said, pointing out the students.

"They don't just go to scho here, they get their hands dirty in the rocket business," he added.

What they have accomplished since that first day 10 years ago when Dr. Zucrow stared at an empty field?


It used to be that maximum chamber pressures were 300 lbs. per square inch in a rocket. They thought that's all a rocket could take.

How high they are now is classified-but they're thought to pe twice as high-thanks to the research of Dr. Zuchrow's crews.

Rocket propellants build up tremendous heat inside the motorup to 7000 defrees F. and more Zucrow's boys are tackling various propellants, heat transfers and ways of cooling rockets.

Their blackboards and notebooks look like foreign code. In the low-slung buildings of the rocket lab they peer through bulletproof glass inside cells with walls a foot and a half thick to the danger valves and wires and cylinders that make up rocket motors.

"In the old days we had a few mishaps," recalled the professor. One day the students were prepared for a visiting general. Zucrow had briefed them. He wanted to walk in with the dignitary, push a button, and see a rocket

Sorghum In Dairy Ration

Indiana dairymen are asking whether sorghum can be used in place of corn for dairy cattle, says G. A. Williams, Purdue University extension dairyman.

The answer, he replies, is a qualified yes. Grain sorghums, grown rather

extensively this year in Indiana, are apt to heat in the bin unless

nble corn grain in composition and feeding value

The sorghums, like corn, con-tain 70 percent nitrogen-free ex-tract which is largely starch. Most grain sorghums contain more protein than corn, but are lower in fat. Too, they generally are lower in vitamin A than corn.

Williams points out that the hard-coated sorghum seeds, when apparently dry, contain considerable moisture. As a result they

the grain is well cured before i harvested.

Sorghum may replace 50 to 70 rcent of the corn in a dairy ration, Williams (asserts. Crushing is preferable to grinding. When ear corn is worth \$1.30

a bushel, 100 pounds of grain sorghum is worth \$2.33, according to the U.S. D. A.'s Agricultural Research Service.

Short Course **Scholarships**

For the fifth year, Indiana bankers are offering \$100 scholarships to Purdue University's annual winter short course in agriculture, January 6-February 28, 1958

Fifty-five farm youths received scholarships from their local banks to this year's short course.

The Indiana Bankers Association sponsors and encourages scholarships to assist worthy and well recommended older farmers and young people to attend the eight-week winter course. They are for young men and women. 18 years or older, who plan to continue in farming or farm management in their home community.

Young persons interested should get in touch with their local banker to obtain application forms, or write to the executive secretary, Indiana Bank-Association, Union Title ers Building, Indianapolis.

Some 5,000 persons have completed the eight-week course in the school of agriculture at Purdue since its inception 70 years 200 Three programs of study are available-general agriculture, animal husbandry and dairy production. The total cost for Indiana students, including room, board, books and incidental expenses, will range from \$225-\$275.

Requirements for entrance are that the applicant be at least 13 years of age and have a good common school education. No entrance examination is required.

Applications for admission can be obtained by writing V. C. Freeman, associate dean, school of agriculture, Purdue University, Lafayette.

Farm-stored grain should be checked periodically for evidence of insect infestation, remind Purdue University entomologists. The top foot should be examined for presence of insects. A broomstick or long rod with thermometer attached should be pushed into the grain at several places. If one reading is several degrees warmer than the others, insect activity is likely.





New schemes for selling real estate by mail are growing, according to the editors of Changing Times, the Kiplinger Magazine, with the result that many thousands of people who think they are buying a nice retirement spot wind up with a treeless and raw piece of land, often far from highways or towns.

Ordinarily, anyone buying real estate near home knows what he is getting. Buying property hundreds of miles away and sight unseen through advertisements and fancy brochures can be dangerous without thorough investigation.

Do you know who the promoter is and what his performance record is? Does the price mentioned cover a large enough lot for building purposes or will you be required to buy more than one lot to comply with zoning requirements? How far is the property from highways, towns, schools, churches, etc.? What is the value of land in that area? Are there sanitary sewers, or must septic tanks be put in? Is the land dry or must it be drained? What about land taxes cobs whenever they are availand local zoning restrictions? What are the full details on financing your lot?

The answers to these questions

should tell you something about the development. Many times you pay almost as much for a lot in the development as you would for an entire acre in the area. Maintaining Net Farm Income

Lafayette, Ind. - How were some some 300 central Indiana farmers able, during a period of sharply falling agricultural prices and mounting farm expenses (1950-56), to maintain an average annual net income of about \$10.000?

N. S. Hadley, Purdue Univer-62 sity agricultural economist, ana-43 lysed the records of these farmers and found that they enlarged the size and volume of their operation, specialized in enterprises most favorable to them and greatly increased their efficiencies.

Land was added (tillable acres were increased from 206 to 234 acres per farm) and a higher percent (up from 34/to 41) was



4,000 to 7,000 bushels These farmers specialized in hog production and cattle feeding. The number of hogs raised jumped 80 percent and the number of cattle fed 250 percent. A 10 percent decline in the number of dairy cows kept was more than offset in production per cow (up 50 percent).

Production per man increased 40 percent in only six years. To do this, farmers increased capital investment by more than 50 percent. The total capital investment per farm rose from \$62,000 to \$95,000.

"These good farmers had to do all these things just to keep their income constant," Hadley pointed out.

What happened to farmers not able to meet the competition?


Their incomes from farming are falling.

They are moving into nonfarm occupations at a rapid rate. Nearly half of them have nonfarm incomes greater than their farm incomes. Their total income per capita is about 15 percent higher and their purchasing power is about the same as it was in 1947.

"We are in a period of great agricultural change," Hadley observed. "The next 15 to 25 years are likely to be among the most interesting and challenging of all time. Competition will be fierce, stakes will be high, and those who will win will win big."



Dr. Wymond Wilson, a mem-ber of the Mentone club, was on his solo cross-country flight and as he attempted to land at Lima, a cross-wind coming over a wood-ed area interferred with his control while about to land. The plane hit the soft runway and as it bounced into the air the pilot immediately applied full throttle (the proper procedure whenever a plane takes any perceptible bounce.) The crosswind changed the direction of the plane sufficiently to head it for a fence along the runway. As the plane went over the fence, a post just touched the lower side of one wing. This tipped the plane into a muddy area where one side of the landing gear was bent. Doc wasn't injured in the least and damage to the plane was not extensive.

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
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
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EC. 25. 1957 BELL TO BUILD NEW ADDITION

Purdue University's Dairy Day will be resumed in 1958, according to Prof. H. W. Gregory, head of the University's dairy department.

Gregory said the morning session would be devoted to research demonstrations and exhibits.

Dr. C. F. (Shorty) Huffman, nationally known ruminant nutrition research scientist, will speak in the afternoon. Huffman, a member of the Michigan State University staff, is immediate past president of the American Dairy Science Association.

Boom In Skilled Jobs Due In 60's And 70's

A massive demand for workers in nearly every type of occupation and industry will come with the U. S. economic boom in the 60's and 70's, predict the editors of Changing Times. In a copyrighted article in the December issue of the magazine, the editors state that 10,000,000 jobs will be added to the work force by 1965, another 10,000,000 to 15,-000,000 by 1975. The well-educated and the highly skilled will have greater opportunities than ever before.

Semiprofessional and semiskilled workers will be in heavy demand too. And openings will abound at all levels for women, for parttimers and for older employes. In manufacturing, employment

will be up 28% in 1965, 56% in 1975. The fastest growth will be in the manufacture of transport equipment, machinery, metal products, paper products and chem-icals. The heaviest employment needs will be for semiskilled machine operators, including women,

and for salespeople, managers and technicians.

New industries developing during the 60's and 70's will mean new jobs. One large company expects that 80% of its output ten years from now will be items not developed today.

In the atomic energy field, jobs will multiply with a strong demand for chemists, nuclear physicists, mathematicians, biochemists and nuclear and other kinds of engineers. Many semiprofessional technicians will be needed for inspection and decontamination teams

Electronics manufacturing will require thousands of new engineers,, draftsmen, office workers as well as skilled and semiskilled plant workers.

Plastic-products manufacturing a relatively new industry, will hire faster than most other industries. Most openings will be for inexperienced workers who will be trained on the job.

There will be a big rise in construction where most jobs will be filled by craftsmen and other skilled workers.

Jobs in the wholesale and retail trades will swell 45% by 1975 with work at that time for more than 19,000,000 people in sales clerical and managerial positions. Demand will grow in local and state governments for all kinds of teachers, nurses, engineers, office help, policemen, postmen, and killed workers.

In the finance, insurance and real estate fields, jobs will increase by 80% in 1975. Nearly half the employees in this field are women.

Growth in the professional occupations has been three times as fast as for the rest of the work force, and swift expansion will continue. Biggest needs will be for teachers, engineers, natural and physical scientists, technicians and medical people.

In the clerical and sales occupations, the demand for operators of automatic data processing equipment will leap. The heavy turnover in stenographers, typists and secretaries will continue, assuring jobs for new-comers. The high turnover in sales occupations will provide a wide variety of openings.

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The service occupations will continue to have heavy turnover, but most industries in this field will have lots of room for parttimers, women and older workers. There will be a big need for

all kinds of skilled workers, particularly for industrial machinery

repairmen, electronics technicians business machine repairmen and building trades workers.

Although there will be mor machines to do the work of people today, the over-all growth of the economy will pull up the slack. Machines will actually help double the output per worker in the next 25 years. Growth in the manufacturing industries will offset job reductions caused by automation. And demand will spurt for skilled hands to develop, produce, operate and repair the new machines in industry and the home.




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
