Two Minute Sermon .By Thomas Hastwell

THE BEAUTY OF SERVICE: There is an elm tree by my study window, that, as long as it lives will continue to be a lesson to me. When I moved into my present home, a number of years ago, the tree was a young, straggling sapling. It had apparently one time suffered an injury that had resulted in its acquiring an unsymetrical and unlovely shape. In addition to this it had not been set out in a location where it would best shield my study window from the afternoon sun. I remember, at the time, saying that it was unfortunate that it had not been set in the right place to be really useful, and, since it was so misshapen and ugly some day I would cut it down and plant another better proportioned tree.

I never got around to cutting down the tree, and as years went by it grew larger and larger, but never overcame its unloyeliness. It seemed to have understood my feeling toward it and seemed always to make a conscious effort to grow in such a way that its misshapen branches came to shield completely from the heat of the day, my study window. It seemed in this effort to become more useful and of service, it had become more misshapen than ever. Perhaps it is sentiment, foolish sentiment, but I never go near the tree but that I do not fancy its leaves saying to me, as they rustle in the passing breeze, or hang motionless in the quivering heat, "See, I am shielding your window from the sun. I have made myself useful, even though I am not beautiful. I have even made myself less beautiful and more mishapen in my effort to serve and be useful." I have thought of this tree and its lesson to me a good many times when I have been tempted to be harshly critical. It has been, to me, a silent mentor. It has taught me a priceless lesson, a lesson that will live as long as the memory of its unsefish service will endure.

Eggs For Energy And Economy

Representatives of 100,000 poultry producers met in Chicago during the past week to survey the egg situation on more than five million farms and to plan for marketing the anticipated 1938 production. They found that in addition to the unexpected prolific activity of the American hen last autumn, she is already starting springtime laying at a fast rate. Fresh eggs certainly will be available for every family table this year.

The problem discussed by the egg men was how to get more of these fine fresh eggs fron farm to consumer during the spring months, thereby decreasing the number going into surplus storage stocks.

With four definite objectives in view, the Federation requested the National Association of Food Distributors Council and the National Asso ciation of Chain Drug Stores to launch a spring drive on fresh eggs to stabilize the market: increase consumption; absorb a large proportion of spring egg production thereby reducing the surplus; develop new uses and put more eggs on more tables for more meals.

After examining market conditions, the food chain association Executive Committee and other groups above mentioned responded favorably and set four separate weeks for spring sale drives of fresh eggs in thousands of retail food stores throughout the country. The dates fixed are March 14th, April 4th, April 25th, and May 16th

Mr. Hobart Creighton of Warsaw, is president of the Federation.

"Many poultry raisers on both farms and in towns in this vicinity said Hobart Creighton, "are vitally concerned in this effort to market our eggs in an organized manner. The lesser number of hens reported on farms has been more than offset during the past few months, by increased production per hen. Nature prescribes that hens in all areas lay heavily during the spring. The greater the consumption at this time of year, the less the amount going into storage to unsettle the market later.

"We are glad to see the chain and independent organized food stores come to the aid of producers who have suffered from depressed prices and high feed costs. The chains helped increase consumption of eggs 16 per cent by last autumn's campaign, lineup: producers and distributors helps both, K. When they came to the house in which Christ was teaching they found it crowded to the door. They could not get inside with their crippled friend. The story states that they carried the crippled man to the top of the house, removed a section of the roof, and lowered him at the feet of Christ, who healed him.

I have no doubt that when the crippled man felt the flush and thrill of life through his crippled limbs that his heart and soul were filled with rejoicing. He was made whole. Once more he could walk among his fellows, a new man. Surely he had a right to rejoice and praize the master. But what of the four men who brought their helpless friend to Christ? Surely their joy over being the instruments that made possible

this miracle of healing was no less than the joy of the man who received the healing. I like to think of this as one of the

important lessons in this passage - a practical lesson that we can take into life today. Whenever we help some one else, we too, are rewarded and blessed.
