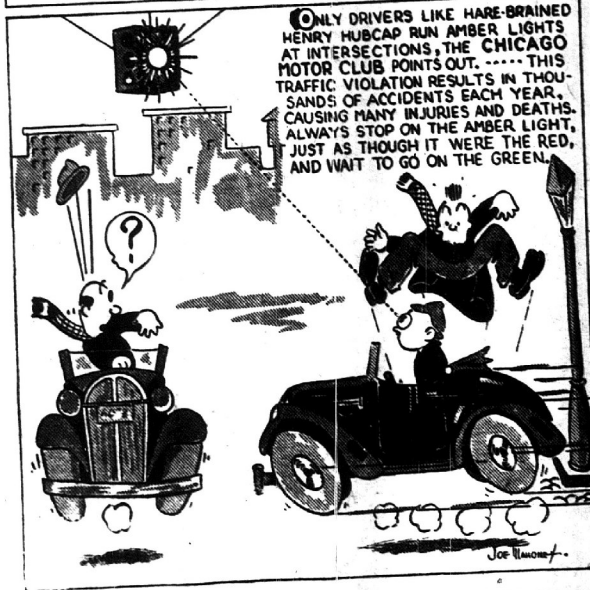
QUIER

Harve Orcutt, well known and highly esteemed farmer of Kosciusko county, died at the home of his son, Wesley Orcutt, four miles south of Atwood, at 10:30 Thursday morning. Death followed a week's illness and was due to senility. He was 83 years of age.

The deceased, a lifelong resident of this county, was born near Clunette, on June 8, 1857, the son of Philip and Elizabeth Parks Orcutt, pioneer residents of the Clunette community. He was a carpenter by trade.

Surviving are four sons, Orville, South Bend; Theodore, Laporte; Lester, Mt. Pleasant, Mich., and Wesley, at whose home he died; two daughters, Mrs. Charles Stopp, of Piercetown; Mrs. Blanche Bowers, Etna Green; one brother, Will, Pitt's Meadow, B. C.; four half-brothers, Robert Orcutt Beatty, Lakeland, Fla.; Tom and Amos, of Crawfordsville, and Charles, of Martinsville; two half-sisters, Mrs. John Castner, Etna Green, Mrs. Gertrude Rankins, Plymouth; 15 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. His wife, two sons and a daughter preceded him in death.

Timely Poultry Topics Are Discussed

Even when fed a balanced ration and housed properly some well bred pullets will stop laying for a week or more during the winter. This is referred to as "winter pause" and is an inherited character.

Stock bred for non-pause egg laying should continue in production throughout the winter months unless the management is poor. Farmers can increase their winter production by obtaining chicks from strains bred for high winter rate of lay and non-pause. Selection for these traits is chiefly a problem for the specialized breeder who must be encouraged in his work by higher prices for improved quality.

One problem poultry raisers face each spring is that of getting a source of well bred chicks. It costs money to produce good chicks. Livability, growth and egg production rather than price should be the measure. One should use only good chicks—chicks from desirable breeding flocks properly tested for pullorum disease with the reactors removed.

Right now many producers are beginning to be confronted with the problem of producing good hatching eggs to meet hatchery requirements. To obtain the best results, a well balanced laying ration should be fed. It is usually advisable to provide plenty of green feed, fresh water, some milk if available, oyster shells, and direct sunshine. If the birds are confined add about five per cent of alfalfa leaf meal and one per cent of standard 85 to 100 unit fish liver oil to the mash.

TONS OF SAND, CINDERS USED ON ICY HIGHWAYS

Many tons of sand and cinders have been used by state highway maintenance workers during the recent icy weather to increase the safety of highways which were coated with ice or packed snow, James D. Adams, chairman of the State Highway Commission stated recently. These abrasives are mixed with chemicals which help melt ice and aid in resorting normal movement of traffic.

Special equipment, mounted on state highway trucks, is used to spread the treated sand and cinders on slippery pavements and at curves and grades to reduce the likelihood of skidding. Thus far, most of the emergency maintenance activities on the state highway system have been treating slick roads rather than the removal of snow. Several times in recent weeks the maintenance crews have worked night and day to spread sand and cinders on roads coated by freezing rain and packed snow.

Snow plows and other equipment used in keeping the roads open for traffic and in the best possible condition for driving, is checked regularly as a part of the program of meeting any emergency which may occur. The work on the roads is supplemented by special newspaper bulletins and radio announcements, keeping the motorists informed of driving conditions.

**150-Year-Old Fire
Is Still Burning**

**Cared for by Aged Man Atop
Tryon Mountain.**

SALUDA, N. C.—A 150-year-old fire burns brightly atop Tryon mountain, and inside the cabin that houses it a radio plays softly. An 80-year-old man sits there alone and occasionally accompanies the radio music with his old fiddle.

A paved highway passes near by, leading to large cities, and across the mountains an aluminum works pounds out weapons of war.

But William Morris cares little for those things "outside." He'd rather take his time-worn poker and stir up the fire and perhaps take down an aged pan and cook a slab of meat, all the time "wondering if me and the fire will go out together."

He'll tell you a story about that blaze if you'll "set awhile, just pull up that cheer and just make yourself to home."

A century and a half ago John and Sarah Morris left Pennsylvania, their meager possessions piled high on a buckboard, and traveled afar to establish a home. Their trail led them into the Blue Ridge mountains, then infested by Indians who had been pushed back from the seaboard. They chopped down trees and, on the spot where the logs fell, built a cabin. They dug deep and found stones for a chimney. Then they moved in.

John Morris took out his hunting knife and struck a spark from a flint arrowhead. The spark fell upon dry wood, and a blaze sprang up. The Morris's knelt in prayer and thanked God for caring so well for them.

That was the birth of the ancestral fire that one can now see burning so brightly on the hearth of William Morris. It never has been out, has moved only once—into the nearby cabin where the old bachelor now lives alone.

Keeping the fire going once had a utilitarian virtue. Finally it became so famous in the wilderness as a never-fading flame that the family prided themselves upon it. Utility thus faded into sentiment and finally, with the old man, almost into reverence.

William is the last of the family. "So me and the fire will go out together," he says.

**Robber Suspect Escapes
Court Posing as Drunk**

HAMILTON, ONT.—John R. Ross, 38, of Montreal, voluntarily answered to another man's name in police court here, and paid a \$10 fine for being drunk, an offense of which he was not guilty.

But Ross was not animated by altruistic motives. He was held here on suspicion of participating in a diamond robbery in Montreal, and the ruse to which he resorted won him at least temporary liberty.

Ross was awaiting arraignment in police court when a docket of drunk cases was being dealt with. When the name of Charles Walters of Sarnia was called, Ross, answering to the name, stepped forward, entered a plea of guilty, paid a \$10 fine and was allowed to leave the court. By the time his own name was called, he was far from the scene.

Walters was found later asleep in a cell.

**Skunk Fights Rattlesnake
And Emerges the Victor**

STAUNTON, VA.—It was a battle to the death, and a skunk emerged as the victor over a rattlesnake.

Game Warden C. L. Miller tells the story. Mr. and Mrs. Lee Wilkins of Washington were camping on Mount Elliott when they heard the ominous rattle of the snake above night noises. A flashlight disclosed a small spotted skunk battling the snake. The skunk fled when the light was flashed, but recovered his nerve and returned for the kill.

The spotted skunk, Miller explained, is of the weasel family and much smaller than the ordinary pole cat. It is about the size of a squirrel and seldom is seen out of the mountain areas.

**Brothers Apart 55 Years
Require an Introduction**

SEATTLE, WASH.—After a separation of 55 years, two aged brothers have been reunited here.

John Richard Moody, 85 years old, of Charleston, S. C., met his brother, William Cassius Moody, 79, here—and they had to be introduced by a third person because they did not recognize each other.

"Time certainly plays tricks," John Moody said. "I certainly was stumped when I saw my brother. We were young bucks when we separated back in 1885."

INCREASING CONSUMPTION OF EGGS IN HOOSIERDOM

"The egg consumption in Canada during 1940 was about 368 per person," reports Ed Menefee of the Purdue University Agricultural Experiment Station. In the United States during 1940, only 225 eggs were eaten per person, just about the number the Canadians were eating ten years ago.

Menefee gives proof of what can be done by intelligent effort to increase demand for eggs at the breakfast table by referring to twelve years ago when the Canadian government started a campaign to better the egg market for their farmers and at the same time give their consumers a standard product.

Compulsory grading of eggs was instituted and federal graders and inspectors were placed in different districts of several provinces. The chief result of this program has been that Canadians are eating one-half again as many eggs as they did ten years ago. This increase has come about first by the improvement in the quality of eggs. With strict grading and candling of eggs, it was quite unusual for bad eggs to reach the market, and the consumers soon began to lose their fear of bad eggs.

There is nothing more sure than the fact that an occasional bad egg turns the consumer against all eggs, says Menefee. One bad egg may cause the housewife to eliminate eggs from the shopping list for many months—or until she forgets and forgives. Bad eggs rob the poultryman of his markets and the only way to eliminate the bad eggs is to candle and grade according to size, color and interior quality. When the Canadian housewife buys graded eggs with the Canadian government inspector's certificate of quality on the package, she does not pay the same price for eggs of low quality as for good eggs.

Indiana is getting a start on a program that should result in an increased consumption of eggs, the specialist explains. Several firms are certifying eggs under Federal seals, and more eggs are being federally inspected each year. The Indiana Fresh Egg Law which was enacted at the last General Assembly is leading the way to giving consumers eggs of known quality.

**MOTOR CLUB LISTS TIPS FOR
DRIVING ON ICY HIGHWAYS**

Pointing out that it takes four times as far to stop an automobile on icy pavement as on dry road surface, the Chicago Motor club recently urged motorists to anticipate spots in the road ahead which might prove skid-traps.

Likely spots for icy stretches include shaded areas on the road, the north side of banked curves which are the last to thaw and bridge spans which often remain slippery after other sections of roadway have thawed and dried.

Should the car go into a skid, club engineers say the best way to right the car is to observe the following four rules:

1. Steer in the direction in which the rear of the car is skidding, being careful to avoid over-steering.
2. Never jam on the brakes.
3. Keep the clutch engaged.
4. Always release the accelerator gradually. Sudden release may make the skid worse.
