#### METHODIST CHURCH NEWS

Bishop Raines had toured Korea at the invitation of the Chaplaincy Commission, holding retreats and interviews for Chaplains and service men. His tour took him to the front, including a forward dressing station, Triangle Hill, and places where shells were dropping within a few hundred yards. His visit with boys in the hospitals and military men in Formosa was revealing, to say the least.

The text for his lecture came from the reading of the New Testament in the Revised Standard Version, II Timothy 1:8, "but take your share of suffering for the gospel in the power of God." The audience was well aware that Bishop Raines was speaking from a conviction that prompted urgency and demanded a response. He asked for money to re-roof a hospital at Seoul, and pants for the bare buttocks of a Korean child whom he saw dancing up and down in the winter cold to keep warm.

The sincerity of his message did not permit him to become sentimental, for the situations which he portrayed were too drastic and real for imitated drama. The response to the offering was generous, with more of the swish of folding money than the clicking of coins in an offering plate.

This past Sunday evening was the first in a series of Bible Lessons pre-

sented by the Pastor. The first two chapters of the Gospel of Matthew were presented. No particular translation is necessary for the course, but references to the Revised Standard Version will be made from time to time. Chapters three and four of Matthew will be studied this coming Sunday evening. The hour is seven-thirty and the service begins with the singing of gospel songs.

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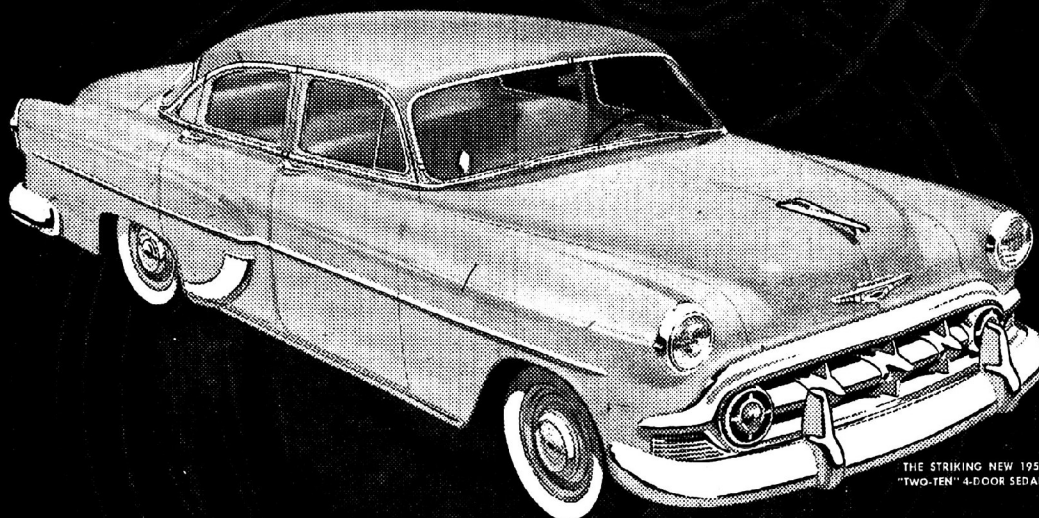

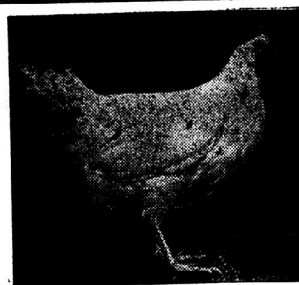

**HEALTH FACTS FROM YOUR STATE BOARD OF HEALTH**

Indiana continued in 1952 with its good communicable disease record with no cases of smallpox reported for the fourth year and the incidence of diphtheria 355 cases below the five-year average and 49 cases fewer than the 88 reported in 1951.

This is shown by the morbidity report of the Indiana State Board of Health which is issued weekly in co-operation with local health agencies. Dr. Albert L. Marshall, director of the Division of Communicable Disease Control, emphasized the fact that the reporting of the communicable diseases by the city and county health officers only indicates the trend of the disease as not every case is reported to the health officers.

Whooping cough showed a drop in incidence, being 612 cases below the number reported last year, but an increase was shown in the number of cases of chickenpox, measles, Poliomyelitis and mumps reported.

In line with the normal cycle as expected every four years, measles showed the largest jump with 3,801 more cases reported last year as compared to the preceding year of 4,548 cases. A total of 1,397 more cases of mumps was recorded and this was 1,880 over the average. Chickenpox was only 221 cases more than the five-year medium but totaled 1,205 more than occurred in 1951.

Poliomyelitis followed the national trend. Dr. Marshall pointed out that although there was an increase in the number of cases reported, this should not be regarded as epidemic as the cases were widespread throughout the state and not concentrated in local areas.

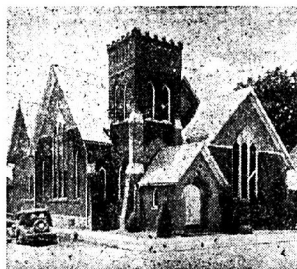

## PROTEST RATE HIKE

General Telephone Company subscribers met with the Sidney Lions Club December 29, to discuss means of securing relief from what they described as "unacceptable telephone equipment, operation and service and newly imposed unusually high rates."

Sidney subscribers pointed out they filed a petition to the Public Service Commission for improved service which was held in what they described as "an unsatisfactory fashion." Feeling was registered that since the present Commission "has occupied their making decisions profitable and in favor of the General Telephone Company, and to the expense and detriment of their subscribers, there was no use to expect relief from the present Commission." Plans are now being drafted to secure reasonable and adequate service and telephone rates proportioned to the service rendered.

The Akron subscribers now have a lawsuit filed against the Public Service Commission which is set for trial February 4, in the Kosciusko County Circuit Court.

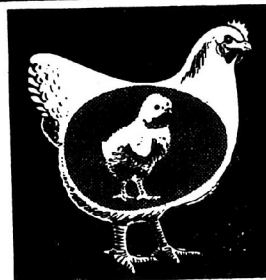

## TIMELY TOPICS

By Mary Anne White

Last week during Winter Agriculture Conference, I attended the workshop session on Friday concerning the Bishop method of "Simple Clothing Construction." As many of you ladies are familiar with her method of sewing I won't go into detail other than she does all her basting and sewing on the machine, no hand work at all. One of the important procedures she gives credit to for being able to do this is—"stay stitching and pressing." All seams must be pressed good as we sew in any method of construction.

What I would like to tell you today

is how to prepare your material for sewing—Yards and yards of cotton goods is inviting merchandise during our January sales, but goods that is not sanforized should be shrunk before it is made into garments.

Just a word of caution to you housewives that some of these cotton goods may not have been pressed on the straight grain of the fabric at the mill. This is evident when the selvages are put together, the torn ends are not even. This must be straightened at the time it is shrunk.

If the fabric is not shrunk before it is used or not shrunk properly—one is wasting her time making it up. To shrink the fabric, the ends should be torn or cut with the grain. It should be

folded neatly lengthwise with the right sides together, and the ends basted together. If the fabric tends to slip or slide, the selvages should also be basted together.

After it has been folded in large, loose folds, it should be soaked in the bathtub or a large pan with enough lukewarm water to float the material. It should be soaked several hours or overnight. The water in the tub or pan should then be drained off and the fabric pressed between the hands without wringing. Keeping it folded lengthwise, it should be hung on a rod or a rustproof line. The selvege and ends should be smoothed and straightened, keeping the edges and the selvege together. As the fabric continues to dry, its position on the line should be changed to prevent a mark on the fabric from the line.

Some cotton fabrics may be left to dry and will not need pressing. Others are better if pressed after drying or while slightly damp by following the length-wise threads on the wrong side of the fabric while it is still folded double. The center crease should not be pressed in. If it has been pressed the fabric should be opened out and dampened slightly and pressed to remove the crease.

If the selvege and ends have been

matched, the fabric should now be on the grain.

Remember—the cheapest materials are the ones that definitely need this process before the garment looks and hangs. Try it next time—won't you??

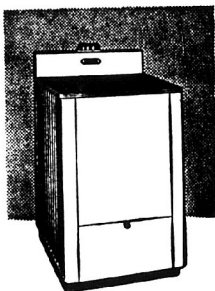

#### 105,000 AUTO ACCIDENTS IN INDIANA LAST YEAR

Indiana's high accident highways this year will be dotted with roadside safety messages to alert drivers against traffic smashups.

The educational billboard campaign begun last year, has been increased 50 per cent in the number of posters to help decrease the state's mounting death and property losses. In 1952, State Police provisional figures show there were 105,000 reportable Indiana accidents, which cost 1,273 lives and in excess of \$120,000,000.

State Police statisticians aided in locating the billboards near areas having the highest accident records. The monthly messages call attention to these common causes of highway accidents in Indiana: driving on the wrong side of the road, drinking driving, excessive speed, failure to observe road signs, and driving too close to the car ahead.

The billboards will be seen by motorists who travel virtually every federal road and many state roads. U. S. 31, highest fatality thoroughfare in the

state, will be bordered by 13 safety posters. U. S. 41 will have nine billboards on the safety subjects, with U. S. 421, 52, 50, 30, 24 and 20 having at least five. State roads 67 and 37 lead the list of Hoosier roads to be marked by posters.

Members of the Outdoor Advertising Association of Indiana are making the billboard space available. Meridian Mutual Insurance Company, Indianapolis, is sponsoring the project in the interest of highway safety.

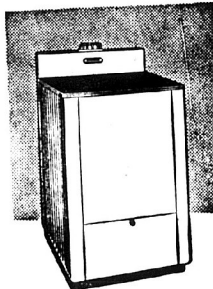

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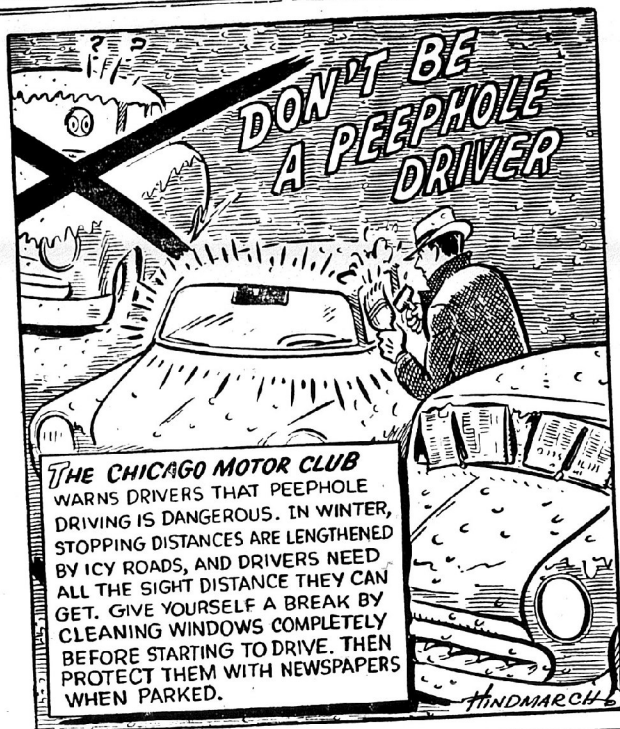

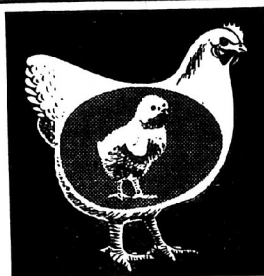

# **BARN BURNS DOWN ON LEWIS FARM; LOSS NEAR \$9,000**

A fire of undetermined origin destroyed a barn and its contents Thursday night on the farm of Robert Lewis about seven miles northeast of Rochester on the Tiosa road.

Damage to the frame barn which was a total loss, was estimated at 6,500 and to its contents of hay, grain and implements at \$2,500 by Fire Chief Bud Johnson.

The barn, recently remodeled, was believed to have been in solid condition.

It and its contents were only covered partially by insurance.

By the time seven firemen and two trucks arrived at the scene, the mushrooming blaze was beyond control. The alarm was received at 5:15 p. m. Firemen stood by until midnight to protect other buildings.

Several hogs in the barn when the fire was discovered were driven from the structure before the rapidly-burning fire reached the lower level of the bank type barn.

Lewis attempted to pull a wagon loaded with one and a half tons of ground feed from the barn but by the time he had backed his tractor to the wagon he had to pull away because of the intense heat.

Other farm implements destroyed, along with the wagon loaded with feed were a corn planter, tandem disk, spring-toothed harrow and a corn cultivator.

Also destroyed were 100 bales of oats, 1,400 bales of hay and 60 bales of straw.

The fire lighted the sky to such an extent that it attracted spectators from 10 miles distance.

Three theologians will also speak. Rev. Barton Payne, Bob Jones University, Greenville, S. C., will speak about "RSV errors in the Old Testament." Dr. Herman A. In announcing the impending rally, Rev. Dowden said, "This rally is the effort of a large number of fundamental, Bible-believing ministers of this area to fully acquaint the American public with the complete story on the Revised Standard Version."

We are not interested in any Bible-burnings but simply want to present in a dignified way, the full story of the change in basic Christian doctrine which is found in the RSV."

The rallies announced for this area by the Mentone Baptist church are a part of a movement led by the American Council of Christian Churches to hold at least 3000 such rallies on or near Friday, January 30, to present the Fundamentalist answer to the Revised Standard Version Bible in every part of America.

# DINITRO HELPS FIGHT WEEDS IN SOYBEANS

The annual summer battle between Hoosier farmers and weeds will soon get underway. The farmers, who will be using every weed killing weapon available, may get some help from the 1953 Purdue University chemical weed control recommendations.

According to O. C. Lee, Purdue Specialist, one of the most interesting results of recent weed control tests has been the use of a material known as Dinitro. This material, when applied at the rate of eight pounds per acre, did an excellent job of killing weeds and did not affect the soybean yield.

Dinitro should be applied as a pre-emergence spray preferably within two to three days of the time that the beans come through the ground. Unfortunately the material is expensive and its use should be confined to extremely weedy bean fields. However, the cost can be reduced by applying the material only directly over the row. If the material is applied in this manner the sprayer will have to be specially adapted for row spraying.

Purdue again recommends using 2,

4-D for weedy corn fields. It can be applied anytime after the corn is two to three inches high until it is too tall to get through. Lee advises watching the weeds instead of the corn as a guide to applying 2, 4-D. Spraying should be done after the weeds have emerged and applications should never exceed one pint of 2, 4-D per acre.

TCA, presently the best chemical agent for use in killing grasses, should be used very carefully. It is non-selective and kills all plants which it contacts.

A new chemical for weed control, CMU, is now on the market, but Lee does not recommend its use on agricultural land at the present time. Purdue is planning to test this chemical further during the coming summer.

## NEW HYBRID POPCORN

A new yellow popcorn hybrid that matures early enough to grow well in northern Indiana has been released at Purdue University. Two Purdue corn geneticists, Dr. O. E. Nelson, Jr., and Dr. A. M. Brunson, have done the breeding work on the new hybrid, in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

In addition to its earliness, the new popcorn, Purdue 202, has excellent popping quality. It is the first large-kernelled, yellow hybrid available in the early maturity group. It silks earlier and has a lower moisture content at harvest than any of the Purdue hybrids that have been released previously.

Seed of this hybrid will be available only in limited quantities for 1953 planting. Adequate supplies should

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be on hand for the 1954 season.

During the past decade, the Purdue popcorn breeding project has been the source of most of the yellow hybrid popcorns in the Corn Belt. Their high quality has had much to do with the vast increase in use of popcorn in homes and commercially in this decade.

Tests have shown the new corn to be superior in quality to Purdue 32, famous line that has been considered a champion in the popcorn world. In the past yellow hybrids have been adapted to southern portions of the Midwest, though grown elsewhere because of high quality and yield.

The new popcorn will make large and

fluffy popped kernels that have a good taste. Expansion has averaged 34%, which means that 1 quart of unpopped corn will yield 34% quarts of popped corn.

Purdue 202 has a good standing ability as the older hybrids. Its plants are uniformly short and sturdy with broad dark-green leaves.

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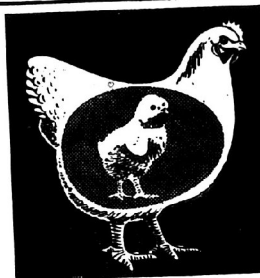

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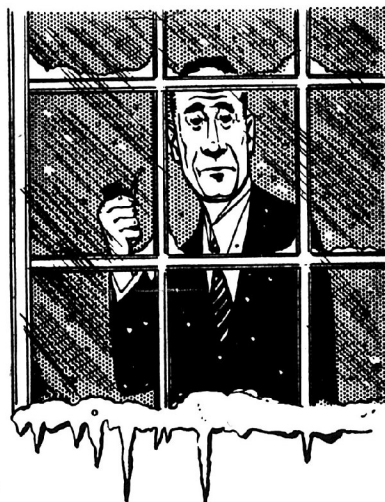

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# HEDGEHOG CACTUS

Almost anyone can imagine from the name what a Hedgehog Cactus would look like. The botanists do not agree as to which plant the common name

properly belongs. One standard book says that the name should be applied to a member of the genus to which the common prickly pear belongs. Most

seem to think that the name should be applied to *Echinocereus engelmannii*, but one book gives the name Calico Cactus to that plant and another calls it Saint's Cactus. It is not appropriate that we here get into this argument.

Hedgehog Cactus is a loosely branched plant to about 1 foot high with the cylindrical upward growing branches to 3 inches in thickness, with 11 to 14 blunt ribs and heavily armed with spines that are to over one-half inch long. There are some 60 species in the genus and of these at least a half may be found grown as ornamental. In some of the plants, the stems sprawl while in others they are erect, not a few appearing more or less a viciously spined cucumber. In some species the stems may be grouped to form a formidable plant.

The plant is relatively common in the deserts of California and ranges

from Utah and Colorado through California, Arizona, Sonora and Lower California. It is essentially a plant of the Lower Sonoran Zone and favors gravelly or stony hillsides and washes.

The flowers of the Hedgehog Cactus are approximately 3 inches across with a funnel-shaped base and widely spread petals. They are reddish purple and brilliant. They are about as long as they are wide. The fruits are about on 'inch long covered with spines and a woolly felt. They produce globular black seeds. The fruits are uncommon and some authors have claimed that some members of the group produce no fruits. In most members of the genus, the fruits are thin-skinned and spiny though the spines are easily removed when the fruits reach maturity. Unlike some cacti the flowers of the Hedgehog Cactus open in the daytime and close at night.

The name Calico Cactus which has been applied to this plant refers in all probability to the many colored spines. These are often curved or twisted and may be yellowish or brown.

So anxious are some persons who collect cacti as hobbies that many of the more attractive plants have been completely eliminated from their native regions. To protect against such deprecations some states have laws and the National Wildlife Federation in its general policy is dedicated to the support of laws designed to protect harmless living things that are

in danger of being completely destroyed.

The Hedgehog Cactus has no economic importance except to those who strive to get it established in their gardens as an ornamental.

Phosphate and lime can boost clover seed yields considerably, two Purdue University agronomists report. Tests at the Jennings county Experimental Field near North Vernon show that lime alone produced an extra 42 pounds of re-cleaned clover seed per acre, and addition of 48 pounds of phosphate per acre upped the yield another 25 pounds. George H. Enfield and R. R. Mulvey explain that on plots where lime was omitted, the clover stand was so sparse that harvesting seed wasn't practical. Applications of manure, potash or crop residues failed to give any yield increase over lime and phosphate.

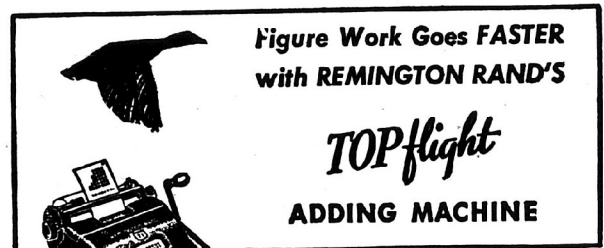

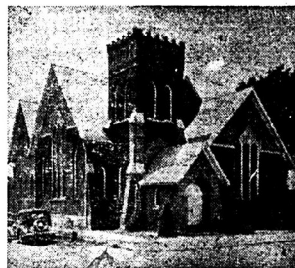

The Talma Rod and Gun Club held their January meeting on Tuesday evening at the Talma High School Gym (old) with a large number of members present. The meeting was in charge

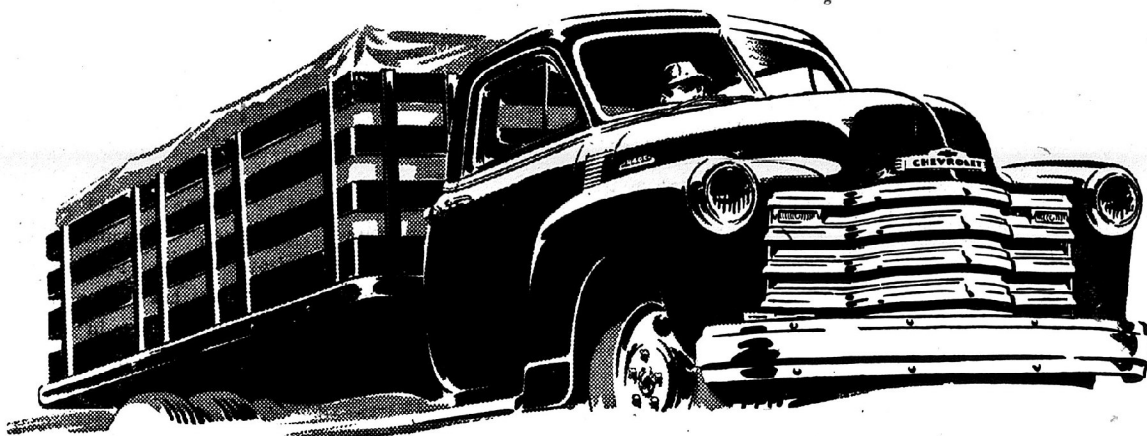

# OVERWEIGHT MENACES HEALTH OF AMERICANS

Overweight is the number 1 health problem in the United State today, according to medical research people. It affects about one-fourth of the adults in the United States and about 60 per cent of this group are women.

Statistics show that overweight people die earlier than those who are not overweight. This is because they are so much more susceptible to the degenerative diseases of later life, such as heart trouble, high blood pressure, hardening of the arteries, gall bladder trouble, diabetes, rheumatism and arthritis.

Miss Lois Oberhelman, extension nutrition specialist at Purdue University, points out that these are a greater problem today than a generation ago because medical research people have

eliminated the causes of death in younger years and more people are living to an older age.

Studies show that overweight and the degenerative diseases are problems in western Europe and America but not of the Asiatics and Africans. This is contributed to overeating and strenuous living in America. Miss Oberhelman explains that high calorie and high fat diets are the chief culprits in the American health problem today.

Many people would have better health if they formed good food habits by eating the health protecting foods such as fruits, vegetables, meats, eggs, milk products and whole grain cereals, she adds. They should reduce the consumption of fried foods and rich desserts which contribute little towards good health.
