**FORTY PEOPLE MAY LOSE
THEIR LIVES THIS WEEK**

Forty people may lose their lives on Illinois and Indiana highways during the Fourth of July week end, says the Chicago Motor club, basing its forecasts upon the records of previous three-day holiday records.

"The tragedy of the figures," says Charles M. Hayes, motor club president, "is the fact that in both states the preponderant number of deaths, injuries and accidents occurred on Monday following the week end. It indicates that fatigue and failure to allow enough time to make the return trip are probably the two most important factors."

The motor club suggests four "don'ts" aimed at the worst features and greatest accident hazards:

1. Don't overdo it either speed or distance, or by taking too many persons in the car.
2. Don't pass on hills or curves, slip over the center line, or dodge in and out of traffic.
3. Don't drink if you drive, and vice versa.
4. Don't expect the other fellow to obey any of these rules!

BORROWED EDITORIAL —

The following article, printed in a neighboring paper at Akron, contains so much of value that it is being reprinted in full:

The late Senator Lafayette Young of Iowa, left the following message to be read to his grandchildren as they reached their twenty-first birthdays. It embodies a philosophy well worth considering:

IF I WERE TWENTY-ONE

Every grown man thinks that if he had another chance and his age were twenty-one he would set the world afire in the way of achievement. He thinks he would omit every mistake which he feels he has made and make everything count. It is perfectly right for every man to feel this way but it is perfectly right for him to know that if he were starting over again he would duplicate his former mistakes and make more colossal errors. A man who has succeeded reasonably well might succeed better. Those who have failed would undoubtedly fail again.

If I were twenty-one I would devote more time to sport and when I worked I would work harder than I have ever been able to work.

I would not search the world over for a location

I would not aspire to sudden wealth nor would I make my standards all on a financial basis.

At the age of twenty-one a man never expects to die. He attends funerals as a looker on without deep concern. He feels sorry for the person in the coffin but the thought never enters his head that sometime or other people will be standing around his grave. If I were twenty-one I would start with the firm belief, that it is to be an eternal life after death. I would carry this belief with me in all my ambitions and undertakings.

I would understand that though a great American has said that opportunity knocks but once that opportunity is knocking all the time in all lives where there is any brain power co-operating in any way with physical strength.

If I were twenty-one I would form friendships of the right kind intending that I would be useful to my friends and that I would expect them to be useful to me. Thus I would

have a co-operative organization for our mutual welfare.

I should not ask my friends to endorse my note and seldom would I ask any one of them to loan me money. Fortunes that endure are the fortunes which start with one's own strength and will to achieve.

I would try to make my fortune grow and I would enjoy a considerable part of it as I went along.

I would realize that speculations seldom make permanent fortunes.

I have often read of young men and young women inheriting fortunes from their kindred. I never have heard of such fortunes doing permanent service to those who came into possession of them. I would not sit down to live off of a fortune.

I would not be ambitious to build a home half as big as a township.

I would not do this if I had the money. I would not put this in my plan. A well-known society has frequently been singing during the last few years about aspiring to a cottage by the road to be a friend of man. Poets would not say this was good poetry but I believe the doctrines are good.

I would learn as early as I could that whatever came to me must come in joy and sorrow as a part of my life.

I would learn that joys cannot be compelled to appear and sorrows cannot be forever avoided.

I would try to have the common sense to enjoy my joys and the fortitude to endure my sorrows.

I would not be moving every month of the year.

I would not be in a hurry to leave

the place where I was born. It is the thought of the young American that he must break away and go into new fields. Many have adopted this plan. I would not object to staying at home.

I would not object to my habitation having a name.

I would think it were a delight to remember the old trees and grass.

I would fight the good fight.

I would aspire to having a wife and children, thus I would have a home.

If I were able to do so I would want to travel to see the interesting parts of the world.

I would never repudiate a debt.

I would never lie to anybody.

I'd know something about the sky.

I would know all that science could tell about the beginning of every-



METHODS TO MAINTAIN EGG QUALITY SUGGESTED

(Purdue News Service)

"Hot dry days during the summer are hard on egg quality," says E. H. Matzen, extension marketing specialist of Purdue University who urges producers to make an "all out effort" to maintain high quality eggs.

Many poultrymen no longer selling eggs for hatching still have roosters in their laying flock. According to Matzen, fertile eggs do not hold up as well as infertile eggs and thus recommends removing roosters from the laying flocks that are no longer producing eggs for hatching.

After an egg is produced its market quality depends considerably upon the care given it. The extension specialist recommended the following practices:

1. Gather eggs twice daily or oftener.
 2. Cool eggs quickly after gathering. Cooling in a wire basket or by laying them out on a tray results in faster cooling than when using a market basket or a solid pail.
 3. Hold eggs in a cool, moist place, a temperature of 65 degrees is desirable. Wetting the cellar floor or hanging wet burlap near the eggs helps increase humidity and keep egg quality.
 4. Never put cooled eggs into a warm case and do not case eggs until they have cooled overnight.
- More effort to market higher quality eggs should increase returns. It will also result in fewer inedible eggs and a larger proportion of eggs marketed will meet government requirements. Thus, with the cooperation of egg handlers, the egg industry will be doing something toward national defense.

MUSSEL SEASON TO OPEN IN STATE TUESDAY, JULY 1

The open season for taking mussels from Indiana rivers and streams will start Tuesday, July 1st, it has been reported by the acting director of the Division of Fish and Game. The season had been closed since April 1 except in the Wabash river below Lafayette.

The taking of mussels for the shell which is used for making buttons and similar products is one of the state's minor industries but affords seasonal employment for scores of people.

COMPLETE DELIVERY OF 92,000 PHEASANT CHICKS

Delivery of 92,000 pheasant chicks to conservation club brooders in all parts of the state has been completed by the Jasper-Pulaski and Wells County State Game Preserves, it has been announced by C. R. Gutermuth, acting director of the Division of Fish and Game.

This is the largest number of pheasant chicks to be furnished conservation clubs for rearing since the brooder program was inaugurated 4 years ago. More than 450 pheasant brooders are being operated this year by conservation clubs, another record. Under the contracts between the individual clubs and the division of Fish and Game, the club will be recompensed for each bird reared and liberated.

EXTRA PINT A DAY FROM HOOSIER COWS (Purdue News Service)

"An extra pint a day will go all the way!"

Indiana's share of the increase requested for the National Food for Defense Program can easily be produced by the present cow population if every cow increases production as little as one pint of milk per day.

Last year, 794,000 Hoosier cows produced 263,903,575 gallons of milk. If 750,000 cows maintain this slightly enlarged production throughout the year, the increase would amount to 26,162,790 gallons or approximately 10 per cent of our annual production.

This increase of one glass of milk at each milking may easily be accomplished in any one of the following ways:

1. More careful and complete milking.
2. Provision of sufficient supplementary pasture.
3. Grain should be ground ration, balanced, and fed according to individual needs of each cow.
4. Provide 20 to 30 pounds of high quality legume hay per cow.
5. Provide an abundant supply of fresh, clean water.
6. Have salt available at all times.
7. Keep cows comfortable, winter and summer.
8. Regularity in milking and gentle treatment.
9. Use silage to supplement dry roughage.
10. Condition and rest each dry cow six to eight weeks.
11. Feed calves limited amounts of milk, substituting with suitable grains and then market the maximum production.

**ALLOTMENT CLEANOUT
OF DITCHES NOW DUE**

(Purdue News Service)

Recent rains are expected to stimulate Indiana farmers to cooperate in the cleanout of their open ditches. states Dave Harker, extension drainage specialist of Purdue University, who reports that June 1 to Septem-

ber 1 is the time designated by law for the allotment cleanout.

Harker emphasized the fact that when the allotment was made some years ago, notice was given each farmer of his share of the cleanout, but that it is the farmer's responsibility thereafter to mow weeds and willows annually and clean out the silt biennially.

Some farmers may have lost their notices and, therefore, do not know exactly where and when they are expected to clean. It is suggested that county surveyors be called upon to ascertain this information, because failure to clean out an allotment of ditch, makes concerned farmers liable to paying cash for the cleanout plus a ten per cent penalty. The

law requires the county surveyor to make this charge against the farmer who fails to comply.

It was pointed out by the drainage specialist that farmers badly need their drainage-ways in good operating order, and that cooperation with the county surveyor may result in maintenance of drains which can easily be the difference between

success and failure of crops.



**"MISS-MEAL-ITIS" NEWEST
HAZARD FOR POULTRYMEN**

(Purdue News Service)

A new "disease" is taking the lives of hundreds of Indiana's growing chicks and poults, this week announced Dr. J. Holmes Martin, head of the Purdue University poultry department, who diagnosed the ailment as "miss-meal-itis," or the mere missing of too many meals.

Only a few days ago a Morgan county turkey farmer called at Dr. Martin's office, reporting that he had lost more than 200 poults. After a careful examination of some poults the farmer had brought along with him, the Purdue poultry chief, who is an authority on turkey produc-

tion, declared the birds were suffering from a lack of feed, although they were being provided with a standard commercial mash.

The fault was not with the feed, said Dr. Martin, but rather with a habit that the poults had formed when they were first brooded. The farmer reported his poults had been eating a lot of sand that was being used for litter. The poultry chief explained that the poults, not knowing the difference between sand and feed, had started eating the sand and had not formed the habit of eating the feed. Turkeys were said to be worse than chicks about forming such habits.

Dr. Martin suggested that when starting poults or baby chicks, it is a good idea to check carefully to make sure the birds are eating the feed rather than the litter. If the birds continue to fail to eat the feed, they may be encouraged to start forming the right habit by sprinkling rolled oats over the feed each time the hoppers are filled for a period of several days.

Not long ago, Dr. Martin said, a Pulaski county farmer reported that he had lost more than 600 poults because they had eaten the corn cob litter rather than the feed.

**CONSUMER COOPERATIVES
CONTINUE TO GAIN**

Consumer cooperatives have shown that they are not a depression phenomenon. The latest figures reveal that there were 2,200 retail societies with 1,150,000 patron-members in cooperatives associated with the Co-operative League of the United States at the beginning of 1941. This represents a gain of more than 20 percent in the last two years.

The past few years have seen a slowing down in the growth of cooperatives in rural areas, but sharp gains in the cities, the 1941 edition of "Cooperatives in the U. S.—A Balance Sheet," points out. 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

No work has yet been done in the city of Warsaw. Several substantial donations have been received from fraternal organizations of the county.

Recently the council purchased 15.1 acres on McClure lake located in the southwest part of the county near Silver Lake. The site is to be used for a camp for Boys' Conservation clubs, 4-H members, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts or any other youth group provided such group is sponsored by a recognized organization.

The buildings will include one large hall, 24x50 feet with full basement and five sleeping cabins accommodating 10 persons each. The sleeping cabins will be 16x18 feet in size. It is said that this will be the only camp of its kind in the state of Indiana.





NAMED NAVY EDITOR

At the suggestion of Secretary of Navy Knox, Mr. Cullum, editor of the News has been made Navy editor, to help the Navy in giving ambitious local young men information about the opportunities the "Two-Ocean Navy" offers them for technical training and advancement as they serve their country in its emergency.

According to an announcement made public in Washington, a limited number of additional men between the ages of 17 and 50 will be given a chance, by enlistment in the Navy, to get to the top, with big

pay, in jobs which by their aptitude and as a result of examination they show themselves fitted, from among nearly 50 different trades and vocations. These include such callings as aviation machinist, dental technician, photographer, diesel engineer, radio technician, welder, storekeeper, and baker. Enlisted men may also qualify for commissions as officers.

Beginning this week, the Navy plans for a limited time to accept new qualified men for training. These men will be sent to one of four Naval Training Stations and may have a chance to go to a Navy Trade School even before assignment to the fleet. During this period they will be given regular Navy pay and the Navy's free schooling is valued up to \$1500.

"Never in the history of the United States has there been greater opportunity for loyal young Americans to serve their country and build their futures than right now," said Secretary Knox.

In outlining the many advantages offered by Naval enlistment, it is possible for a bright young man to increase his pay seven times during his first enlistment and he can earn as much as \$126 a month. This monthly figure is actually worth much more when it is remembered that the man has few living expenses and is provided with the finest of medical and dental care.

You have all your food and lodging, and also your original outfit of clothing provided by Uncle Sam free. In addition there are free sports and entertainment—even to the latest Hollywood pictures. On top of this you get free travel and adventure in colorful places—a thing few civilians can afford, the report states.

As Navy editor, Mr. Cullum has received from Washington a supply of free illustrated booklets for all men interested and, in addition, will welcome inquiries from young men who wish to look into the new and

greater opportunities the Navy now offers for training for future civilian careers as they serve their country now in its emergency.

DEFENSE BOND QUIZ

- A. No. People want to help arm America against all attacks. In many cases, people are putting every cent they can spare into Defense Bonds and Stamps. Some are doing this by asking employers or banks to withhold part of their salaries in order to buy these Bonds or Stamps for them.

RURAL CARRIERS SELLING DEFENSE SAVINGS STAMPS

—FAIR—

Thirty-two thousand rural mail carriers are now acting as agents in the sale of Defense Savings Stamps, postal officials have informed the Treasury Department. Demand for the stamps in sparsely settled districts caused the Post Office Department to authorize the carriers to act as salesmen.

The stamps range in value from ten cents to five dollars. Purchasers are given albums in which they can be mounted. When filled, the albums may be exchanged for Defense Savings Bonds.

Post Office officials recalled that rural mail carriers acted in similar capacities in 1917 and 1918 selling War Savings Stamps.

Mildew on oiled silk shower curtains can be removed by washing them in a mild lukewarm suds and spreading them on a flat surface to dry. They should not mildew if the room is ventilated properly and they are dried each day.
