#### FEW INDIANA FARMERS ADEQUATELY INSURED

Many Indiana farmers are underinsured, according to a recent survey of farms in the central and southern parts of the state. Purdue University agricultural research by Doctors H. G. Diesslin, J. E. Losey, and L. S. Robertson has revealed that only about onefourth of Hoosier farmers carry adequate insurance.

About one-half of them have insurance programs which are unbalanced, and the remaining one-fourth have insurance which is inadequate in both type and amount.

What kind of insurance do farmers carry? Of those interviewed, 94 percent carried fire or fire and wind insurance on their property. A high percentage of auto and truck owners carried insurance on their vehicles.

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#### TAKE CARE WITH

SUMMER EGGS

Hot summer days are the signal for poultry flock owners to do a better job of caring for eggs. Purdue University extension poultrymen say that when egg prices are low, as they are now, it's especially important to follow practices that will win premiums paid for high quality eggs.

First and foremost, gather eggs frequently — four times a day. Use a wire basket to collect and hold eggs before casing. Eggs cool twice as fast in a wire basket as in a busket or other closed container.

The time eggs are held until the buyer makes his pickup is critical. Hot weather tends to dry out eggs. That means the egg holding room must be cool and moist.

The Purdue specialists report that some successful producers of high qual-

ity eggs have provided proper egg holding facilities at low cost. Usually, a basement room is best. Burlap sacks can be moistened and hung on the walls, and an electric fan circulates the

Or, low pressure spray nozzles, such as are used with weed sprayer outfits, can be attached to the water system in the egg holding room. A fine spray or mist from the nozzles will furnish proper humidity in a hurry.

Either of these two low-cost practices will create nearly ideal conditions for keeping high grade eggs.

#### ADJUST COMBINE

Farmers who can spare the time from making hay and cultivating, should start up their combine and check on its condition before using.



The County Dress Revue is the next big event for 4-H home economics members. Even though it concerns clothing project members specifically, I hope others will be interested from the standpoint they might be in it next

Generally speaking the procedure for the judging and public showing are very much the same as last year.

Friday, July 16, at the Woman's Building on the Fairgrounds at Warsaw. The following schedule has been set up:

9:00 a.m. — Clothing II; 9:30 a.m. All other clothing members eligible for Junior Dress Revue (girls 13 years of age and younger); 11:00 a.m. Apron Revue (Clothing I girls); 1:15 p.m. — All clothing members eligible for Senior Dress Revue (girls 14 years of age and older with three or more years club experience; 3:00 p.m. Checking by the State 4-H Club Office.) A chamjudges of second garment member may pion and a reserve champion will be

wish to wear in public showing.

Pre-registration for Dress Revue judging is not required. Members are asked to bring a sample of their material (s) to have to attach to a description sheet which they will be asked to fill out for the commentator to use in describing their costume during the public showing.

Participation in county dress revue is optional. It is not a requirement for completing the clothing project. Even so it is hoped every member will participate in order to receive the help she will get from the judges' comment and to receive an award ribbon.

The clothing project record books are Judging of costumes will be held not required to be submitted on the day of the dress revue judging. It is anticipated that any girl who participates and receives a ribbon would complete her project requirements and exhibit at the County Fair.

Dùring the judging on July 16, group placings will be made and blue, red, and white ribbons awarded. An honor group will be named (10-15 percent of those participating will later receive dress revue pins supplied through

Before being eligible to appear in the public showing on July 30 a member is required to have her costume judged on July 16.

Judging of the complete costume means considering not only the garment made — it's becomingness to the wearer in style and color, the way it fits (workmanship is not considered except as it affects the fit and outward appearance), it's suitability for the oceasion for which selected — but also the accessories selected to go with that garment.

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



NO COMMENT by Walter Chamblin, Jr.

The General Tax Revision Bill, a major piece of the Eisenhower legislative program, is of importance to the general public as well as to business.

The bill should not be looked upon as a tax reduction bill. It is more than that. It is actually a tax reform bill, as its real purpose is to remove many of the barriers that have grown up in recent years that constitute brakes upon investment . . . the incentive to in-

vest . . . and therefore discourages general economic growth.

The Senate Finance Commitee, headed by Senator Millikin (R-Colo.), has given it careful study. Some observations in the Senate Committee Report are worthy of consideration:

1. The present tax burden upon the American people is too heavy . . . and any attempt to raise \$65 billion in tax revenue is bound to throw the economic system out of balance.

2. The nation's economic health cannot be sound, or even reasonably sound, as long as the average taxpayer is required to turn over to the government appoximately one-quarter of what he earns. Those with larger salaries suffer much more heavily.

The Committee has even indicated that it feels that too much emphasis is being placed upon the income tax as a source of revenue. It further indicates a belief that more thought should be given to increasing the revenue obtained from excise taxes.

If enacted, the bill will represent a major accomplishment for the Eisenhower Administration. The revisions in the tax code will return to the taxpayers close to \$1.5 billion. Of this, more than \$600 million will go directly to individuals and more than \$600 million will go to corporations. (This really means that all of the \$1.5 billion is for individuals as, after all, individuals are the ones who pay all taxes, including those classified as corporation taxes.)

The measure covers a wide range. For instance, mothers who hire baby sitters while they work will now be permitted to charge off the cost of the baby sitter as a business expense. Along

with this comes more liberalized depreciation rules for business . . . partial relief from double taxation of dividends . . . permission to write off expenditures for research and development . . and the elimination of many technical provisions blocking a free flow of the economy.

With the passage of the pending measure the total tax reduction by this Congress will approximate about \$7,350,000,000 . . . by far the greatest tax relief ever given by any administration. But any further tax reduction would throw the budget too far out of balance.



According to the letter, bird banding in North America is under the general direction of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, with the cooperation of the Canadian Wildlife Service and participation by state and provincial game departments and many licensed and Purple Martin and Blue Jay and 13 son Gail spent Sunday in Michigan.

HEARS FROM WILDLIFE SERVICE qualified volunteers. Reports of banding and recovery are the means by which information is obtained on migration routes, distribution to wintering and breeding grounds mortality, and other subjects important in regulation and management.

Also of interest are such extreme age records as that of the Caspian Tern, recovered 26 years after banding, a Ring-billed Gull and Osprey taken after 21 years, and a Mallard and a Pintail with known ages of more than 20 years. Among the longest intervals between banding and recovery for the smaller land birds are 14 years for

years for Chimney Swift.

Wild birds banded in North America have been recovered as far away as Siberia, Africa, France, and the mid-Pacific.

### 4-H CLUB CHATTER By Ruth Snellenberger

Dear 4-H Members and Friends,

Since some of you clothing project members may still be making up your minds to participate in the Dress Revue, I would like to give some more information about it. At the same time, I hope this information will be both interesting and helpful to friends and to prospective participants.

Last Week, Friday, July 16, was mentioned as the day for County Dress Revue Judging. This is not open to the public but mothers are invited and encouraged to come hear the helpful comments of the judges. You know, that's the big question of the day; "What will the judges say?"

Whatever they may say (both are trained home economists), it should be realized that no two judges will judge exactly alike but will probably agree on accepted practices. The comments made to the girls and their mothers are to be concerning principles of good taste in selection of becoming dress, and so forth. Mothers are particularly asked to come hear the judges-frequently mother learns right along with her daughter.

With more than 200 enrolled in the clothing project, it would be wonderful to have that many costumes judged and then to have them appear in the public showing. That there are ninetysix members enrolled in division one of interesting if there were seventy-five positively — avoid saying "I can't do

or more in the Apron Revue!

By the way, Clothing I girls, every girl who participated in the Apron Revue judging on July 16 will receive a ribbon this year. There will be Honor Group ribbons (more than ten will be named in this group if enough participate) and participation ribbons for the others.

The public showing of the County Dress Revue will be held Friday night, July 30, at the Warsaw high school auditorium. Again this year Carter's Department Store is sponsoring the showing and have arranged with Miss Patricia Hunt, director of the Northern Indiana Conservatory of South Bend. tto stage the producction. For several years she has been assisting with the St. Joseph County 4-H Dress Revue which is held in conjunction with their 4-H fair. The attendance reported there each year is certainly a fine recommendation. So it is hoped this year that the Warsaw High School Auditorium will be filled to overflowing the night of July 30.

Now to give some pointers to participants in the Dress Revue-both for the judging and the public showing. I have asked Miss Reba Pyle, our home demonstration agent, for some notes from her little black book that she took from comments made by Miss Hunt during instruction given to 4-H members on two Saturdays in June. And I quote:

"Everyone is a champion if he has the right attitude. Begin by weeding one's thinking so that one has pleasant clothing is interesting (an increase of thoughts, thus a pleasant expression 25 over last year). And wouldn't it be even if one is frightened . . . Do think

"Good grooming is important - that means grooming from the skin out." Emphasis should be placed on good posture . . . Stretch upward at the waistline so the waist doesn't sink into the hips. This pulls abdomen in and brings hips in. Avoid throwing shoulders back (as is oftimes mistakenly thought to be a good practice) as this actually throws body out of normal

"For accessories, hats and gloves should be worn with better dresses and suits. Anklets are okay for little girls

before the teens; for girls in teens wear hose or leg make-up."

Thanks to Miss Pyle for these notes. I'd like to add my comment that the practices suggested and taught for Dress Revue are not just for this event but for everyday living — appearances on the street, public gatherings, at home, and at all times.

#### "MERIT SYSTEM" OF HOG MARKETING TO START HERE

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As a part of Producers Marketing Association's program of marketing hogs on a live graded basis, the Mentone Producers' market will soon be buying hogs on this merit system, according to W. R. "Dick" Cummins, general manager of the organization. "We have set Tuesday, July 27, as our first live hog grading day," Mr. Cummins said. "Hogs will be graded on only one day per week (on Tuesdays until 1:00 P.M.) at the start of this program," he continued.

Richard Maple, manager of the Mentone Producers' market, also announced today that there is to be a demonstration meeting held at the old gymnasium in Mentone. Thursday night July 22, at 8:00 P.M. (Daylight Savings Time), for the purpose of presenting a live grading demonstration along with an explanation of the Producers' new hog marketing system.

All farmers in the county are urged to attend to get first-hand information on this new development in hog mar-

keting.

E. C. Miller, Extension Swine Specialist and M. Paul Mitchell, Extension Marketing Specialist of Purdue University, will present the live grading demonstration and discuss the economic significance of this development. This meeting is being sponsored by the Mentone Producers Hog Improvement Committee in cooperation with the County Agricultural Agents of Kosciusko, Fulton and Marshall counties.

Six other Producers' markets in the state, Centerville, Logansport, Lafayette, Amboy, Montpelier and Columbus have been grading hogs on a one or two days per week basis. Over 50,000 hogs have been presented for grading at these six markets during the short time the program has been in operation.

### 4-H CLUB CHATTER By Ruth Snellenberger

\_\_\_\_

Dear 4-H Members and Friends,
Most of the chatter among 4-H members now I imagine is about finishing
their projects and getting ready for
the County Fair, August 9 to 14. So
it's about exhibits that I'll comment

today.

First, I'd like to call attention to
4-H home economics members, parents,
and leaders, to the sources of informa-

tion about the exhibits. The project record book is the first source. To clarify and standardize projects and exhibits a "Kosciusko County 4-H Home Economics Project Standards and Clarifications" was prepared by leaders and mimeographed for distribution, one copy per family. (If you failed to recreive one there are a few more available in the county extension office.) Then the third source is the County Fair catalog (or mimeographed sheets with the same information which were distributed four weeks ago) which explains specific pointers about displaying the exhibit.

Too bad all the material isn't in one place, you say? I agree. What can be done about it for another year?

Now to go on about exhibits. In spite of all these sources of material, there are still questions arising when Miss Pyle, our home agent, and I make our visits to clubs to give exhibit helps. For the preparation of the individual meat loaf requied (see Fair catalog) for division IV in Food Preparation, as a result of a discussion among leaders and mothers it was decided a girl might be wise to mix ingredients for a family size meat loaf. However, instead of making one large loaf, make individual meat loaves, the number depending on the number the full recipe should serve. For example, if a recipe is designated

for serving eight, make eight individual loaves. Place them far enough apart so they do not touch one another. When done, select the one that looks the best, place on a small plate for exhibiting.

Regarding the size of this meat loaf, it is difficult to say, but perhaps three-fourth to one cup of mixture might be used. Perhaps some of each amount could be made. What is the reason for this variance? The amount of fat in meats varies. The amount of shrinkage varies, too. The amount of filling added varies.

For clothing project members, do be sure all garments which are made of smooth materials should be well-pressed. Actually, a good seamstress presses the garment as she progresses with the construction. Even so there always needs to be the finishing touch. In all probability, head-scarves, tray cloths, drawstring bags, aprons, and skirts can be washed and ironed while damp to get a neat finish before exhibiting. Skirts and aprons might need a little starch, too.

Baking, division I members, are reminded that their plain butter cakes are to be baked in square loaf pans (not layer pans). Reasons for this are being pointed out at the Exhibit Helps meeting for the clubs. This idea is one to help you have a better product.

Food preparation members are cautioned to be sure to have their name in ink on adhesive tape secured to the

bottom of the dish in which their product is exhibited. And do discuss with your mothers regarding what dish to use — not her good china or glassware, please! Avoid thin glassware that might break easily, and long stemmed sherbert dishes, too.

Home improvement, division I members, please notice that a large "before" and "after" drawing is required along with the story, "Report of What I Did" and your exhibit.

All girls enrolled in the Electric project will have their exhibits judged by one of the judges procured for judging the home economics projects.

Any other questions?

Next week I'd like to discuss "What will the judge say?"

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



#### TESTS INDICATE BAND SEEDING BEST FOR GRASSES

Band seeding is the common-sense way to get legumes and grass seedings off to a stronger start.

It's a simple matter to convert your grain drill to a band seeder that will put legume and grass seeds where they belong: in a band on the soil surface 1 to 2 inches directly above a band of starter fertilizer.

You can reduce the amount of seed by one fifth, Capper's Farmer points out. The strong start helps eliminate failures from summer drouth or winter-

Tiny seedlings get a fast start because they are so close to the fertilizer. Legumes especially need the help of starter fertilizer for quick root and top growth.

Dr. M. B. Tesar, Michigan State College, used radioactive phosphorus to prove band-seeded alfalfa seedlings got benefits 2 weeks after seeding.

In the Michigan tests, the band-seeded alfalfa got all its phosphorus from the fertilizer during the first month. Plants 3 inches away from the fertilizer band got practically no benefit in the first month.

Legumes and grasses over the fertilizer band soon furnish tough competition for between-the-row weeds. Stands have less weeds, and hay is of higher

Band seeding is no cure-all. Lime, fertilizer, inoculation, seed treatment, adapted seed, weed control, proper seedbed preparation are important:

But band seeding is worth a trial. You can buy a conversion kit for your drill or use materials you have.

plant, looks like any other vine, but can be identified by leaves that branch off in threes. Its color is green in summer and red in fall. The leaves on poison ivy are sometimes a foot long but normally are from two to six inches long. In May and June it has clusters small greenish flowers; in late summer and fall it bears little clusters of white or pale green berries.

This troublesome plant grows most anywhere, as vines on trees, in thickets or as ground cover. It may even be found in gardens. Also, poison ivy can be found in just about every state in the country. The plant is dangerou; all year around.

Poison ivy affects most people in some manner. A few people are im-mune. Children especially are susceptible to ivy poisoning. Motorists traveling with children should remember that prevention is the best medicine for poison ivy. They should watch for signs of ivy and caution their children to stay away. A good rhyme for summer travelers to learn is: "Leaflets three let it be!"

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

### 4-H CLUB CHATTER By Ruth Snellenberger

Dear 4-H Members and Friends,

"What will the judge say?" was the topic I said I'd chat about this week. Actually, 4-H members won't have an opportunity to hear a judge "say" anything; but at County Fair time, each member exhibiting will see what the judge "does" in placing her exhibit. It is about the placings made by judges that I wish to discuss in hopes that there might be a better understanding about those placings made by judges.

First, however, I'd like every 4-H home economics member and her parents to know that she is required to exhibit at the County Fair AND to bring her completed record book in order to complete her project. The

Fair catalogue gives the necessary information. Read it carefully. Time for various project exhibits have been arranged considering the 4-H girls' time, the time workers are available to take care of exhibits, and other activities on the fairgrounds.

Now about judging. Blue, red, and white group placings in all project exhibits—that is 4-H home economicss projects about which I will be referring—will be made this year. The judges are not instructed to make any certain number in each group.

From the blue ribbon groups in specific projects where there is an opportunity for a State Fair entry, the judges will be asked to single out one as a "representative of the best" in Koscitsko County. Believe me, that is a difficult job! For example, there are 96 girls enrolled in first division clothing. Suppose 60 of them made head scarfs of which 15 or 20 were placed in the blue ribbon group. It's not easy to select one!

To go on about judging, I'd like to say that both judges secured this year are trained home economists. No other two judges would judge exactly the same as they will do, yet the basic principles on which they judge will be the same. They probably won't judge exactly as Miss Plye or I do. Yet, they have been hired in good faith and we should abide by their decisions. Just like a referee in a ballgame. Didn't I say one time that 4-H work was kind of a game?

In regard to differences in judging, one mother told me her daughter received a blue ribbon on her skirt, made in division II, at the dress revue

(judging was on outward appearence, color and style becoming to her, accessories selected, etc.). At their local club exhibit she had received a red ribbon when construction was considered. At the County Fair judging when her skirt was displayed with all the other division II skirts, this girl received a white ribbon construction. Can you visualize how this could happen?

Every girl certainly would like to have a blue ribbon all will agree I'm sure. It's a known fact that everyone cannot place in that group. So the girl that does not, needs to realize that she has a chance to improve, that in all probability she has learned as much or more than the one who placed higher. The girl who places in the white ribbon group will either be discouraged and quit or be challenged to work much harder and, or more carefully next year.

One comment I'd like to make about placings as information to all—the baked products, counts less than one-third when judging. Thus the judge not only looks at the exterior, but cuts the product to look at the interior





#### INSTALL MORE EASY REACH CABINET SHELVES

It is possible for homeowners to get additional space for kitchen items by utilizing efficiently all the space that is in their cabinets, says Miss Ruth be placed on the full depth shelves Hutcheson, Purdue University extension home management specialist.

The bottom shelf of the wall cabinet and the top shelf of the base cabinet are the two places in the kitchen which are the easiest to reach. For convenience, the dishes and utensils used most often should be placed on these "easy reach" shelves. Actually only about half of this space is would eliminate stacking unlike items, such as small plates on top of large plates or reaching behind one row of glasses for another size of glasses. Such a situation can be corrected by placing half shelves above those now

Half shelves may be made of threeone inch thick board screwed to the ficiently as possible.

plywood under each end of the shelf. These shelves should be only four or six inches deep. They provide for saucers, cups, small bowls or other pieces often used.

Plates and other large items may underneath. This saves time and energy in unstacking those smaller pieces to get the larger ones and reduces the scratching of china and danger of breaking stacked pieces.

Space may be made available for other small pieces by attaching inexpensive racks to the inside of the doors. A vertical file, set or built into a high shelf allows easy storage of items generally used. Full use of this space which can be stored on edge-such as small platters, pie plates and shallow baking dishes. A larger vertical file may be located on a lower shelf of the cabinet and provide "easy reach" storage for trays, cookie sheets, muffin pans and the like.



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### WHEAT STRAW DAMAGES CLOVER, ALFALFA SEEDLINGS

Hoosier farmers can protect their clover and alfalfa seedings, advise Purdue University extension agronomists, by removing heavy straw left in combining high yields of wheat.

Purdue Experiment Station field fests and farm trials show that heavy masses of straw left on top of the stubble badly damage legume stands. Shading is harmful to the young legume plants and allows molds and diseases to spread.

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Clipping the stubble and removing all straw growth has resulted in the best survival of legume seedings in field trials with heavy straw residues. Clipping the stubble and cultipacking the straw to get it down on the ground helps some, say agrononomists. By using this method in field trials the researchers have gotten about eighty per cent of the hay yield they got when all the growth was removed. Cultipacking only or clipping only produced somewhat less hay than this combinhation gave, but was a much better practice than leaving the straw undisturbed.

Alfalfa that looks bad because of the hot weather may recover later on if there is sufficient rainfall after combining. If there is vigorous growth of the alfalfa at harvest time pasturing will help to break up the straw masses and to push them down under the legumes.

Sweet clover can take competition from straw and shading much better than alfalfa or the other clovers. If the sweet clover has made a lot of growth by combining time, leave it undisturbed, advise the agronomists, for clipping heavy top growth will do more to prevent further growth than the straw cover. If the top growth is small, the crop is not damaged as much by the clipping and heavy machinery.

It is important to remove heavy straw growth as soon as possible after combining. If annual weeds develop, a second clipping may be desirable in August. Seldom should it be done as late as September.
