New Factory In Talma

A corset manufacturing Company, that may employ 100 local women will be moving to Talma as soon as 20 machine operators can be hired, Mrs. Mildred L. Kramer of Talma announced. Mrs. Kramer, who was manager of the Freeman Manufacturing Company which moved its operations to Puerto Rico last April 26, said that Kabo Corset Company will occupy the Walker building in Talma, that formerly housed the Freeman Company.

When the first 20 machine operators have been hired, the Kabo Company will begin business, at the Talma location, Mrs. Kramer said. Eventually 50 to 75 machine operators will be needed and total employment will reach about 100 persons, she said.

All of the workers in the plant will be from the local area. Mrs. Kramer will be the manager.

Once operations have begun, they will be continued for a trial of three to six months.

If the operations are successful, the business will become permanent in Talma, Mrs. Kramer said.

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



V. F. V. Team On Formosa

The Venture for Victory basketball team arrived in Formosa, Friday morning, June 21, and was received by an enthusiastic group of both Chinese and Americans, according to Don Odle, coach at Taylor University, Upland, Indiana. Saturday morning was given over to practice and to meetings with the various members of the press and radio of the city of Taipei.

A squad was to play its first game Saturday, June 22, against Formosa's number three team. Sunday, June 23, the team was to play three different churches and make a visit to a leprosarium, an orphanage and a boy's home. On Monday, the collegiate basketball stars were scheduled to play two games in the southern tip of Formosa in the port city of Kaohsiung, which is known as the Annapolis of Formosa. On Tuesday, June 25, the team played at Feng Shan, the army base that trains the Free Chinese Army Officers. On Wednesday, June 26, the squad was at Kanchan, the air cadet school. One of the highlights of the second week was to be a visit to Wulai, a mountain village of former head hunters.

"The team's arrival on Formosa is very timely, due to the recent anti-American outbreaks. The young athletes will present Christianity at half time of the games, and will assure the Chinese of their love, friendship, and sympathy in our mutual fight for freedom. Veteran Americans in Free China feel that the team can do much to cement American Chinese relationships," said Coach Odle.

This is the fifth trip for the Venture for Victory team and this year they are being coached by Norm Cook and Bud Schaeffer, former Venture for Victory and collegiate players, now in the Orient as missionaries. Because of health reasons, Coach Odle, who has coached the team on four previous tours, has remained at Taylor and will keep weekly contact with the progress of the team from the campus.

The following boys are members of this year's squad: Fred Whims, Spring Arbor College;

Dick Kamm, Wheaton College; Gary Ausbun, Anderson College; Joe Grabill, former Taylor University Student; Clyde Cook, Biola Bible College; George Glass, Taylor University; Norm Cook and Bud Schaeffer, former Taylor and Wheaton athletics. After ten days on Formosa, the squad will leave for Hong Kong, then Singapore, Indonesia, and the Philippines.

Tractor Safety

Nine persons, including two children, lost their lives in Indiana farm tractor accidents, the first week of May, pointing up the necessity for constant vigilance if accidents are to be avoided.

That is the warning of F. R. Willsey, Purdue University farm safety specialist, who says the rush of work caused by the late spring may bring another rash of tractor accidents.

Analysis of the fatal accidents which occurred during the first week of the month shows that mishaps generally resulted from "extra riders" on the vehicles and overturning of tractors. Victims ranged in age from four to 72 years. Geographically they occurred from the Michigan-Indiana line to the Ohio river.


Most farmers realize that tractors can upset, says Willsey, but it is dangerous to believe that such accidents will "always happen to the other fellow."

Tipping sideways is the most common source of mishaps. But farmers also can overturn tractors by excessive speed on uneven ground. Willsey says row crop tractors are more easily overturned than those on which the front wheels have been spread.

Speed and improper hitching are also sources of trouble. When a tractor's speed is doubled, danger of overturning is increased four times, according to the safety specialist.

Don't permit extra riders—especially children, Willsey advises. Be sure your son is old enough and has sufficient judgment and

strength to manipulate the controls before letting him operate a tractor. Taking the time to teach him safe operating procedures may save his life.

Grain-Harvesting Equipment

Kind and size of grain harvesting equipment is best determined by the volume of small grain to be harvested, according to Purdue University agricultural economists, J. O. Dunbar and N. S. Hadley, and agricultural engineer, Bruce McKenzie.

They issued that advice to farmers who have not yet determined in what way they will harvest small grain this summer.

Machines, now available to harvest both small grain and shelled corn, should be considered on farms where both small grain and corn are produced.

The specialists point out that custom work is probably the

cheapest way to harvest up to 60 acres of small grain, except where the farmer and a tractor are idle when the grain is harvested. There is, however, a greater risk of field damage while waiting for a custom operator to harvest the crop.

A 6-foot pull-type power-take-off combine is the lowest cost method of harvesting up to about 400 acres of small grain. This is true, say the specialists, even though two machines may be required if more than 250 acres are harvested.

On farms where tractors are not equipped with a power-take-off, a 6-foot, pull-type combine with motor will be the cheapest.


A combination corn picker and combine is the lowest cost method for harvesting over 200 acres of small grain if the crop is grown by a farmer operator who also has at least 200 acres of corn.

A self-propelled combine will be the cheapest way to harvest over 400 acres of small grain if no corn is grown in the same unit.



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

Help Keep Chickens Cool

Chickens, which have no sweat glands, need help to keep cool whenever the temperature rises above 80 degrees, a Purdue University poultry specialist has reported.

Joe Sicer said "one of the cheapest and yet most effective helps is plenty of cool drinking water." But "plenty" doesn't mean "enough to take care of normal needs," he emphasizes. In hot weather, the drinking space should be at least doubled.

Temperatures above 80 degrees mean decreasing egg production, egg size and rate of growth. At 100 degrees, heat prostration is not unusual if the chickens are not given help in keeping cool.

Extra water pans or troughs should be on the floor so that the birds do not have to jump on a stand to get water. The pans and troughs should be protected with wire grills or other devices so that a few birds cannot perch on the waterer and keep other birds from drinking.

When mechanical feeders are

used, waterers should be on both sides of the feeder so that the birds do not have to climb over the feed trough to reach water.

The water must be "reasonably cool" to do an effective job of keeping the chickens cool. Waterers on range should be at least shaded. Pipes should be underground.

One plan used successfully, Sicer said, is to have one extra five-foot long trough for every 100 chickens. These extra troughs

are kept in readiness in the chicken house and put to use as soon as the temperature goes above 80 degrees. A long hose with a squeeze valve on the end makes filling the troughs easy. When the hot spell passes the troughs are hung out of the way in a handy location.

Other ways to help keep chickens cool include: painting the roof white, sprinkling water on the roof, extra ventilation, use of fans, insulation and shade.





Grain Drying Equipment

An investment in small grain drying equipment can insure against high moisture dockage and lengthen the combining day.

That's the word from Bruce McKenzie, Purdue University agricultural engineer, who says high moisture grain can be stored safely with no danger of spoilage if dried. In addition, grain drying reduces the chances for insect damage since pest activity is reduced with dry grain.

And, dockage imposed by elevators on high moisture grain will be reduced when the grain is sold.

A day's combining operation can be lengthened by one-fourth

to one-third through the use of drying equipment. The Purdue specialist suggests a method where only one-half of the grain storage capacity on the farm is equipped for drying. The grain combined early in the morning and late in the day can be dried and the grain harvested in the middle of the day stored without drying.


An unheated air system, McKenzie says, will dry grain slower than a heated system but the cost is lower. An unheated system, fan and air duct, equipped with a one-horse power motor to dry 1000 bushels of grain will cost \$200. The power cost to lower moisture content of small grain from 16 to 13 percent in two to

six weeks will range from one-half to one cent per bushel.

Additional information on grain drying is contained in Purdue extension leaflet 348, "Drying Small Grain With Unheated Air," available from county agricultural agents or the office of

agricultural publications at Purdue.

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

Timber Bids Increase Profits

Use of a publication prepared by Purdue University foresters has enabled two southern Indiana farmers to obtain increased financial benefits from the sale of their timber.

The publication, mimeograph F-28, lists primary wood-using industries of southern Indiana. Wood-using concerns in 43 counties are included with the type of timber they purchase.

A Harrison County woodland owner, following the recommendation of Purdue district forester A. N. Liming, used the mimeograph to advertise 19 marked trees for sale from his classified forest.

Six sealed bids, ranging from \$2500 to \$6185 - a variation of \$3685 - were received. The farmer feels that he would have sold the trees for less money had he not asked for bids.

A Bartholomew County farmer had been offered \$250 for all his trees—mainly red and white oak, tulip and beech—on an eight acre tract. None of the trees were of veneer quality.

The farmer did not choose to sell the trees for \$250 but instead marked the ripe trees and asked

for bids from buyers listed in the mimeograph. Five bids were received, the highest being \$650 or \$400 more than the original offer for all the trees.

The mimeograph is available from county extension agents or the agricultural publications office at Purdue.



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Modern Farm Operations on Management Tour

An economist's look at the future will be given Indiana farmers at an annual outlook banquet at 7 p. m. Tuesday, July 23, at the 4-H Club Grounds near Marion.

N. S. Hadley, Purdue University agricultural economist, will speak on "The Short and Long-Run Business of Farming" at the banquet which "kicks-off" the State Farm Management Tour the next day.

Hadley will discuss the various elements which will be a part of the farm scene 15 years from now. He will take up such items as requirements for capital and land, prospects for income and general economic trends.

Hadley and other Purdue farm economists will answer questions from farmers attending the banquet concerning commodity prices within the next few months.

Tickets for the event can be obtained from county agricultural agents or from the agricultural economics department at Purdue.

At 9 a. m. the next day, July 24, the Earl F. Miller farm, four miles west of Marion and one-half mile north of State Road 18, will be visited.

Hog production is the major enterprise on the 420-acre farm which features an efficient farrowing and finishing program. Economical grain handling equipment is another feature. Other farm enterprises are cattle feeding and dairying.

At noon, Dr. Earl L. Butz, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture who will return to Purdue as director of agricultural activities August 1, will speak at the 4-H Grounds.

In the afternoon, the organization and operation of the 700-acre Guy H. Wilson and Son farm, seven miles west and three miles north of Kokomo, will be observed.

The Wilson operation, highly mechanized with many labor saving devices, centers around large scale cattle feeding and hog enterprises.

The tour is sponsored by the Indiana Farm Management Association in cooperation with the Purdue agricultural economics department and farmers from throughout the state are invited to take part.

Crop Roots Need Oxygen

Yields of corn may be reduced by lack of oxygen movement in the soil.

Two Purdue University research agronomists, A. R. Bertrand and Helmut Kohnke, have stated that some cropping systems may not permit sufficient organic matter to accumulate for adequate oxygen movement in the soil.

When land is under continuous row crops, organic matter tends to decay more rapidly than when land is under rotation. The lack of the organic matter results in less air space and in a denser soil.

The Purdue agronomists pointed out that roots need a sufficient amount of oxygen to grow normally. In dense or compacted soils there may not be enough air spaces for oxygen to move readily. Organic matter, for this reason, is the key to desirable

soil structure.

Bertrand and Kohnke found that the rate of oxygen movement in the soil may limit corn root growth. For normal corn root growth, the rate of oxygen movement in the soil should be at least 16 percent of that through free air.

Bertrand and Kohnke say the important question for farmers is: "Will continuous corn maintain enough organic matter for adequate oxygen movement?"

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

All of these boys except Hatfield will be eligible for next year's race and we hope that Mentone can bring home a winner.



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



Early maturing breeds like the Jersey and the Guernsey can be vaccinated at the earlier age. Slower maturing breeds like the Holstein can be vaccinated near the 240-day period. Vaccination is good protection against brucellosis, according to the veterinarians.



How Much To Operate Auto?

Do you know how much it actually costs you to run your car?

Motorists can find out from new statistics released by the Chicago Motor Club. The firm of R. E. Runzheimer and Company, Chicago, compiled them to provide a national average. Two categories were set up; variable costs, related to the number of miles driven, how hard the car is used, and amount spent on service and repair; and fixed costs, including insurance, taxes and depreciation.

The national averages are \$1.74 per day (\$635 a year) for fixed costs and 3.69 cents per mile for gas, oil, tires and maintenance.

These figures apply to cars driven less than 18,000 miles a year, and are based on the lighter models.

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


Solar Electric Fence Charger

Energy from the sun is being harnessed to operate an electric fence charger at Purdue University. G. W. Issacs, Purdue agricultural engineer, says silicon solar cells, located in a frame on top of the conventional fence charger in the above picture, collect radiant energy from the sun and convert it directly to electrical energy.

Farmers can take advantage of high summer prices if they top out hogs ready for market, according to Purdue University swine specialists. "Go to market with the hogs to see them sold and be sure to keep them cool and comfortable enroute. A light layer of wet sand in the truck will help to keep the hogs cool in transit," say the specialists.

If you paint the roof of your chicken house white to reflect the sun's rays you'll find the temperature in the building as much as 10 degrees cooler. That's the advice of Purdue University poultrymen who say a metal roof painted white is even more reflective than aluminum. Composition roofs can be whitewashed.

Satisfactory fly control in barns and other buildings can be obtained by combining a good sanitation program with regular sprays of malathion or diazinon.

Entomologists at Purdue University say malathion is effective for a period of 7 to 14 days whereas diazinon will kill flies for periods up to six weeks.

Irrigates For More Profit

Lee Maxwell, who farms in the Tippecanoe River valley in Carroll County, has pushed corn yields well above average in the past three years with irrigation.

And D. R. Sisson, Purdue University extension agricultural engineer, says Maxwell is readying his irrigation equipment for use again this summer despite the wet spring.

Maxwell isn't waiting for the usual dry weather to come. He has inspected the pump, power unit and other parts of the irrigation system in order to apply water to his corn crop when the need arrives.

In the past three years, Maxwell has harvested an average of 120 bushels per acre from 100-150 acres of irrigated corn—well above yields prior to irrigation. This extra yield has meant more net profit.

Maxwell's irrigation unit is powered by a 185 horsepower gasoline engine and pumps 1000 gallons per minute. He figures the cost of irrigation at about \$25 per acre per year. Maxwell has tested his soil to determine plant food requirements and has added additional fertilizer to obtain the high yields irrigation can give.

"Past experience indicates that I need to apply more water each application. Best results come with three inches of water per

application rather than one or two," he says.

According to Sisson, irrigation is worthwhile on soils such as those on Maxwell's farm which range from sand to loam. The water is furnished by the nearby Tippecanoe River.

Maxwell plans to start irrigating his corn crops before drouths cause damage. He won't wait for the rains.

Maxwell says labor requirements to irrigate are high. "When we start to irrigate that's all we do. It's a full time job."

Purdue University dairymen say one way to offset declining milk prices is to feed more hay and silage per cow. Trench or bunker silos can be covered with plastic to exclude the air and thus prevent undue losses to the silage. According to the dairymen, this could be an important step in increasing the roughage supply available on many dairy farms next winter.



Limited Distance Dialing
To Be Inaugurated Sunday

N. E. Watson, District Manager of the General Telephone Company of Indiana, has announced that effective August 4, telephone numbers at Atwood, Burket, Etna Green, Mentone and Millwood will be changed.

At that time, the telephone numbers in these communities will be identified by a prefix, followed by the five numerals of the telephone number.

The prefixes which will identify each exchange are: Atwood (ULyssees); Burket (GYpsy); Etna Green (DUPont); Mentone (ELmwood), and Millwood (NIagara). Each prefix will be followed by five digits.

To dial a customer in any of the above exchanges, dial the first two letters of the exchange prefix, and then the five digits included in the telephone number. For example, to call a Mentone customer at Elmwood 3-7543, dial "EL 3-7543".

This number change is being made to enable the customers in these five communities to participate in Limited Area Direct Distance Dialing.

This new, faster and more convenient method of calling out-of-town telephones will allow the customer to dial direct to telephones in certain other cities.

After August 4, these telephone subscribers will be able to dial direct to any telephone in At-

wood, Burket, Cromwell, Etna Green, Leesburg, Mentone, Millwood, Milford or Warsaw without going through an operator. Instead, the customer will simply dial "112" followed by the complete telephone number listed in the directory. For example, to reach Mentone ELmwood 3-7543 from out-of-town telephone, the customer would first dial "112", and then "EL 3-7543".

This new service will be limited to station-to-station calls, but anyone wishing to place a person-to-person call may do so through the long distance operator. Toll charges for Limited Area Direct Distance Dialing will be the same as they would be if an operator handled the call.

At the customer's option, calls to free service points may be placed as Limited Area Direct Distance Dialing or regular toll calls subject to the message toll rates and regulations.

A temporary directory listing the changes in these areas will be mailed to all subscribers prior to August 4. Instructions on dialing the new numbers will be included in the front of the book.

Each area has free service to certain other areas, as in the past, and the customer should check his directory to determine this. Any time you dial the "112", as above, you can expect to be charged for the call.

Control Flies and Mosquitoes

Sanitation is the key to the successful control of two pests around the home, flies and mosquitoes, two Purdue University entomology publications point out.

"Sanitary practices to eliminate fly breeding places must be followed," says mimeo E-7, "Fly Control Around the Home."

The publication outlines sanitation practices and use of insecticides for fly control.

Steps that may be taken by communities to control mosquitoes are defined in mimeo E-26, "Community Mosquito Control." A program of control by individuals also is outlined in this publication.

Both mimeographs can be obtained without charge by Indiana residents from county extension agents or the agricultural publications office at Purdue.



29th Annual Coop. Institute

Fort Collins—"Cooperatives in Our Big Business Economy" will be the theme August 18-21 when the three-day summer session of the American Institute of Cooperation gets underway at Colorado State University.

Some 2,500 delegates from all parts of the country, including about 1,000 farm youth and young farmers, will be on hand for the session, according to J. K. Stern, president of the institute. They will consider farm business issues, problems of lower income and higher costs, the latest methods and techniques utilized by farmer cooperative business to meet today's situation, Stern said.

This will be the 29th summer meeting of the institute, which

convenes each year at one of the land-grant colleges. It brings together cooperative leaders, representatives of government, education, the Extension Service, the general farm organizations, the farm press and farm youth.

General chairman will be G. Burton Wood, head of the department of Agricultural Economics, Oregon State College, Corvallis, Ore.

"The challenge facing farmers in purchasing supplies and services and selling their products more efficiently will permeate all general sessions and many sectional meetings for commodity groups and special types of cooperatives," Stern said.

The first general session is slated for Monday afternoon, August 19. Keynote speaker will be Marvin J. Briggs, veteran cooperative leader of Indiana, who will speak on "Cooperatives in Our Big Business Economy."

Other speakers will be Governor Steve McNichols of Colorado and Dr. William E. Morgan, CSU president.

Plant Garden Second Time

The home garden can do double duty this summer if the second crop of vegetables is planted soon.

W. B. Ward, Purdue University extension horticulturist, says late cabbage, Cauliflower and celery can be transplanted and corn, bush beans, broccoli, carrots, Chinese cabbage, cucumbers, endive, kohlrabi, fall lettuce, radishes, spinach, and turnips can be seeded in areas where 70-75 days remain in the growing season.

With the exception of corn, beans and cucumbers, which will mature during October, the other crops are frost hardy. Radishes mature in 28-30 days and can be seeded until mid-September.

The garden should be re-worked and re-fertilized with 10-10-10 or a similar analysis.

Ward pointed out that any garden crop which now seems to be stunted can be given new vigor with a side-dressing of fertilizer, especially nitrogen.

Feeder Pigs Sales

Farmers in southern Indiana sold 5345 feeder pigs for \$88,090.99 at five auctions last spring. Russell Brower and Vernon Bell, Purdue University animal husbandmen, have reported.

The specialists said sales this fall have been scheduled at Springville, Sept. 19 and Oct. 17; at Linton, Oct. 3, and at Osgood, October 22. The spring sales were at the same sites.

Pigs sold this spring averaged 57 pounds and brought almost 29 cents per pound.

Brower and Bell pointed out that the auctions are organized and operated by feeder pig producers as a means to move pigs from the area of production to the buyers' feed lots.

In 1956 more than 200,000 feeder pigs were imported into Indiana. "Cooperative auctions are a service for both the producer and feeder in the production and marketing of native feeder pigs.

"A farmer in southern Indiana has an excellent opportunity to increase his volume and net income by the production of feeder pigs. He markets a minimum of feed and a maximum of time and management," the specialists said.

Brower and Bell added that buyers of feeder pigs have been

well satisfied with pigs from the auctions since the animals are "fresh from the farm" and have not traveled through several dealers.

Delay Seeding Rye In Corn

Seeding of rye as a cover crop in corn fields should be delayed until mid-August to prevent rust infection, say Purdue University agronomists.

Hessian fly resistant Dual wheat, which also can be used as fall pasture and cover crop, should not be seeded until later in the month. Neither rye nor Dual wheat should be sowed if

there is inadequate moisture in the soil.

The agronomists say little evidence is available to show increase in the yield of a crop that follows rye sown in standing corn and turned under the next spring. Rye, however, does have pasture and winter cover crop value.

Seedings in tall corn are usually made by plane or special tractor row seeders at the rate of 1.5 to 2 bushels of grain per acre. With these methods, seed is covered only by rains and stands may be spotty.

Stands and growth will be better where corn stands erect enough to permit row seedings with tools that cultivate and cover in the same operation. Direct fertilization also is possible.







Mr. Hewlett reported on the activities of the past year. Out of the 374 Ag. Departments in the State, Mentone is now one of the 17 First Class Ag. Departments, and the only first class in the county. 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
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
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
