Kosciusko County Recieves \$19,600

Indianapolis, May 31 - Federal Housing Administration insured mortgage loans in Kosciusko county totalling \$17,900 for 1937 according to announcement today by R. Earl Peters, State FHA Director.

This brought the total of FHA insured mortgage loans in the county, as of March 31, 1938, to \$19,600.

Lending institutions of Indiana now have approximately \$31,000,000 of their funds invested in FHA insured loans, guaranteed by the U. S. treasury against loss as to principal and accrued interest. To date, after four years of operation, there has not been a single loss in Indiana, either to a lending institution, or to the government.

1938 is expected to be a record year in new construction of homes, and indications point to new heights in mortgage volume, as extension of the credit facilities of FHA have recently been extended to cover farm property, Mr. Peters said.

Two Minute Sermon

WHAT LACK I YET: In the book of Mark is found the story of the rich young ruler who came running one day to the Christ and asked of him: Good Master, what shall I do that I may inherit eternal life? And Christ said unto him, thou knowest the commandments. The rich young ruler said: Master all of these have I observed from my youth up, what lack I yet? Then Jesus beholding him loved him and said unto him: One thing thou lackest; go thy way, sell whatsoever thou hast and give to the poor and thou shalt have treasure in heaven: and come, take up the cross and follow me. And he was sad at that saying, and went away grieved; for he had great possessions.

This passage is most often used to show the handicap that riches may be to the man seeking eternal life. I think it has another lesson that is often overlooked. The fact that the young man had wealth and had lived an exemplary life did not close his mind and heart to the fact that there might be something better than he had ever known, and prompted him to ask the question: What lack I yet? I do not believe it was asked in conceit. I believe he came to the Master with a sincere desire to learn, with the feeling that there was something higher, and finer, and better, than he had yet known. I think the young man question is one that every one can ask of himself. I think it is a good thing for one's soul to now and then come to the Master as did the rich young ruler that day in the way and ask of Him as he asked: What lack I yet?

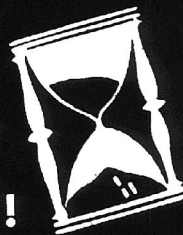

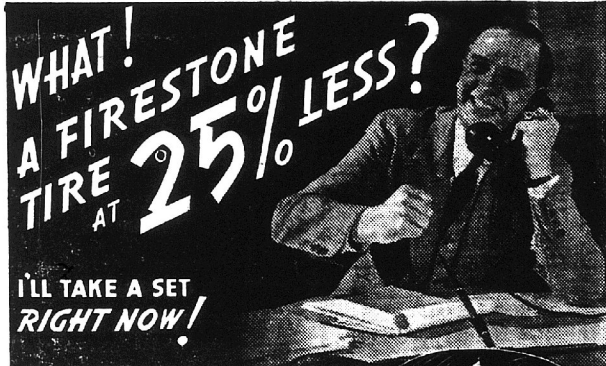

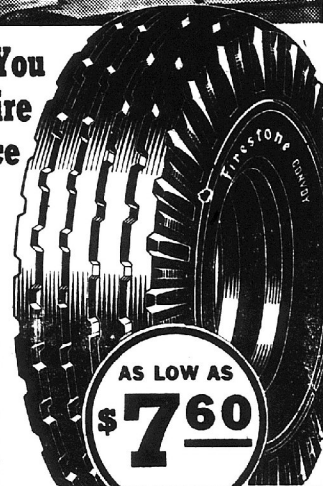

Planes Believed Fireproof

Fire is to be banished from aviation, according to British scientists who have been working for a long time on a new blaze-prevention system for airplanes. Reports received in London say an automatic fire-extinguishing arrangement has been perfected which makes it almost impossible for a machine to catch fire, either in the air or after impact with the ground. Extinguishers are fixed in vital parts, on the gasoline tanks, with jets leading to the gasoline pipes, over the engines, in the passenger cabin and on the fuselage. They have spring-operated automatic nozzles, which act if a bump exceeds the pressure at which the spring is set. Extinguishing liquid is sprayed even before fire can start, and no flame can survive the action of this liquid.

Test Papers Mark Themselves

Examination papers which grade themselves automatically, disclosing to students immediately whether their answers are right or wrong, have been produced by a Mississippi college professor. Under each question are listed several answers, one of which is correct. With a fountain pen filled with water the student traces the number preceding the answer he believes is right. If the number changes from black to blue, he is correct, but if it changes to red, he is wrong.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

Rain of Fish

An occurrence which had not been noted for many years was the finding of small fish in pools and gutters all over the town of Winton, Central Queensland. None were noted swimming up from the distant creek channels; in fact, all were swimming down the gutters wherever they could, in an effort to reach the creeks, and the only solution likely is that they came down with the rain, but how they first got up into the clouds is a mystery.

NEW STAR SHOWS UP SUN AS DIM CANDLE

Supernova Found to Be 250 Million Times Brighter.

Lick Observatory, Mount Hamilton, Calif.—Astronomers have discovered a supernova, or "exploding star," which may mean the creation of a new planetary system.

Dr. F. Zwicky of the California Institute of Technology first photographed the celestial phenomenon August 28. Since then the awe-inspiring manifestation has been the subject of repeated observations at the Lick observatory.

The supernova has received the designation "N. G. C. 4182," which places it outside the stellar system in which the earth has its place.

The supernova at its maximum apparent brightness was only about one-sixth of that of the faintest star visible to the eye. It had an estimated brilliance of 250,000,000 times that of the sun, but its radiance was decreased because of its great distance from the earth, estimated at 3,000,000 light years.

It is difficult to conceive of the brightness of this new star. A supernova was found in the center of the Andromeda Nebula in 1885.

That particular supernova was estimated to be 20,000 times brighter than the sun. Placed in our own stellar system, the 1885 star from a distance of nine light years would appear 100 times brighter than a full moon.

If it could be put in the place of the sun it would give 100,000,000 times the light of that sphere, and in a space of one month at maximum brightness it would radiate as much light as our sun does in 10,000,000 years.

The supernova now under observation has an estimated intrinsic brightness of 250,000,000 times that of the sun.

The spectrum of the new supernova can be photographed with a spectrograph. This is the first time that such a phenomenon has been photographed.

The cause of the outburst of a nova is not known definitely, but one noted astronomer, Stromberg, suggests the possibility that it is the making of a new planetary system. No known supernova has appeared in the earth's stellar system.

Radio Carries Voice of Birds From Lair to Disc

Ithaca, N. Y.—The first attempt to record the voice of any bird on film by means of radio has been pronounced successful by ornithologists at Cornell university, where the first records ever made of the voices of Atlantic petrels were tested.

Albert R. Brand, of the laboratory of ornithology at Cornell, pioneer in bird-song recording, sought the petrels on their own doorstep. With the aid of an assistant, Brand traveled in his sound truck to north-

Maine, ferried across to the island of Grand Manan and arrived within six miles of Kent island, where Bowdoin college maintains a biological laboratory.

A mile from the laboratory, among the rocks on the outer slope of the island, Brand found a colony of Leach's petrels in burrows which they dig in the loose soil.

A mile of telephone wire was laid from a short-wave radio station at the laboratory to the petrel colony. A sensitive microphone, with a parabolic reflector, was attached.

When the petrels gave their croaking notes, the microphone picked up the songs, which were transmitted to the radio station, thence across the six miles of the bay of Fundy to the sound truck waiting on the island of Grand Manan.

Radio Beam May Render Lighthouses Obsolete

Berlin, Germany.—Blind navigation by means of radio houses may in future guide ships all over the seas, instead of light houses.

Radio houses sending directional beams, are said to be safer, more reliable, and can be operated under any weather conditions at day or night. Also, they out-reach ordinary lighthouses and lightships.

These facts were pointed out here during the international sea marks congress.

Waitress Tipped by Mail

Chardon, Ohio.—Elizabeth Shaw, a waitress, received a letter from Arlington, N. J., containing a twenty-five cent piece. "For the girl who waited on me and whom I forgot to tip," the sender explained.

Parrot Fakes Cough to Get Attention

Philadelphia.—Add-A-Line, former parrot mascot of the Philadelphia Club of Advertising Women, liked attention and took great pains to get it.

The bird recently developed a serious wheezing and coughing spell and examiners diagnosed the trouble as a sore throat and cold. They sent her to the Philadelphia zoo for treatment and rest.

While at the zoo Add-A-Line uttered nary a cough or wheeze until the day her mistress called to inquire about its health. It was decided then and there that the parrot had faked the cough just to attract attention.

Produces Rare Wine

There is a small vineyard on the slopes of Mt. Vesuvius that produces a wine so rare and delicate that it is called "Lachrimae Christi"—the "Tears of Christ."

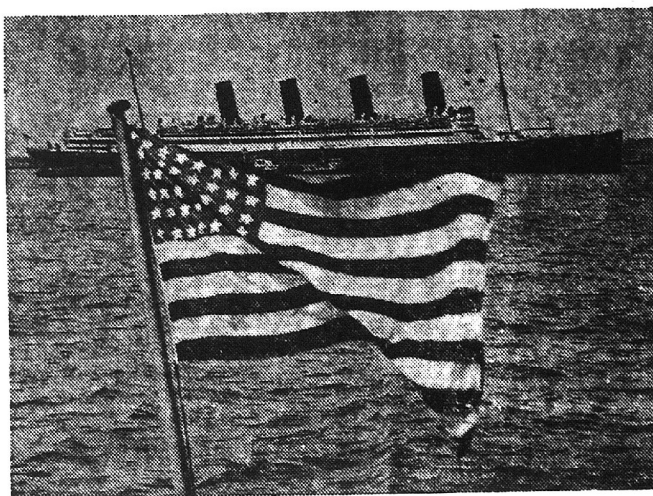

Just recently, a close friend of Mentone Egg Producers attended a conference of North-Eastern Egg Producers. He states that the North-Eastern producers have no fear of competition on egg quality from Indiana producers, in as much as Indiana producers lower the quality of their eggs by shipping only once a week to market. This friend further remarked that the North-Eastern Egg Producers actually laughed at the dumbness of Indiana egg producers in shipping only once a week.

Will we (Mentone Egg Producers) continue to throw away a profit and incidentally let other marketing groups call us dumb? You who are interested speak to Royse Tucker and find out when the change in shipping will begin. Let's not be DUMB, let's be SMART, let's ship twice a week.

RED MARROW BONES ARE BLOOD MAKERS

The University of Chicago surgeons who recently reported to the American Medical association their discovery that blood cells are made only in the marrow of bones maintained at all times at body heat, have given valuable new information to medical science. It was already known, notes a writer in Pathfinder Magazine, that only bones with red marrow are blood makers and that all the bones in the body have red marrow at birth. But why the bones in the extremities should drop this function and why their marrow should turn yellow a few years after birth was not known. In their experiments, however, these Chicago scientists placed rats in incubators and found that when all the bones in the body were kept at body temperature they once more began to produce blood cells.

The most evident result of this discovery is the basic support it gives the new method of treating diseases by producing an artificial fever. Experiments with this fever treatment indicate that by raising the temperature of the body more blood cells are produced which aid in fighting off disease. This seems to hook up very definitely with what is now known of the blood-making function of warm bones. However, years of experimentation are necessary to prove the actual practical value of the discovery.

Shark Fishing Profitable

Norwegian fishermen report that shark fishing off the Shetland Islands is now more profitable than trawling. They say that this season they have been able to make catches worth \$3,500 to \$4,000 in a few days. Large galvanized-iron swivel hooks 50 fathoms apart on stout lines are baited with haddocks. The sharks, from ten to fourteen feet long, are hauled aboard by means of derricks. Every part of the fish is used, flesh being salted for food and skin preserved as fine leather. While the shark lines are in the sea the fishermen shoot dolphins, which are used as food on silver-fox farms.

Fish Saves Catcher's Life

That a fish which he had caught saved his life, is attested by a man in Vaalwater, South Africa. The fisherman had caught several small fish and placed them under a bush. When he went to get them, a large poisonous mamba snake was there, ready to strike. But it had attempted to swallow one of the fish head first, with the result that the fins had caught in the roof of its mouth. This prevented it from striking, and the man killed the deadly reptile with blows from his steel fishing rod.

Plant Breeding Methods Hard to Use on Animals

Inbreeding and outbreeding are the basis of modern plant breeding, say scientists in the United States Department of Agriculture who study inheritance. Theoretically they should give comparable results with animals to which they have been applied much less. Both are discussed in the 1938 Department yearbook.

Inbreeding is mating closely related individuals, such as brothers with sisters, or fathers with daughters, the resulting offspring being superior or inferior in many ways. Outbreeding, the mating of unrelated individuals, is a means of suddenly leveling family differences and starting a new family.

Some experiments with inbreeding and outbreeding of animals on a scale comparable to that with plants have been begun. Inbreeding of guinea pigs at the National Research Center of the Department of Agriculture at Beltsville, Md., is a classic example. Some work has been done with larger animals, but it has been tentative, halting, and partial because of the practical drawbacks of cost, time, and lack of adequate numbers of animals.

Animal breeding to advance, say forward looking breeders, should be along the path of modern plant breeding.

Sound Weighed by New Device

Delicately adjusted balance scales are used in a new device which weighs sound and which makes possible the improvement of musical instruments and motion-picture sound apparatus. The scales weigh pressure exerted by a given sound to within a few thousandths of a gram of accuracy. The inventor, W. F. Adler, believes the sound-weighing machine will make possible the establishment of the first true unit of sound pressure and that it will result in standardization of tone without the hazard of human error.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

Liberty Statue of Copper

The Statue of Liberty is built of copper sheets, 2½ m. m. in thickness. Its total weight is 225 tons, of which 100 tons represent copper and the remainder iron and steel. The pedestal is of stone and the base is a solid block of concrete.

The egg shippers of this section should be glad to know that eggs are now being shipped twice a week from Mentone. It is an established fact that more frequent shipping of eggs especially during the warm months puts a better egg on the New York market. In time this should develop a better price.

In addition to Saturday, Tuesday has been set aside as a shipping day. To those shippers who feel they can ship only once a week, Tuesday should afford two distinct advantages. First, so many shippers buy their feeds at the time they ship eggs it causes a congestion at the local mills on Saturday causing many to wait long periods. Tuesday shipping should make it possible to offer better service at the mills. Second, to the housewife who has her Friday and Saturday household duties to perform in addition to helping in the preparation of the eggs for market or in actually doing all the work of preparation, it should be a welcome change to carry the eggs over until Tuesday.

And to those who would like their checks earlier in the week, after the first week of the change over to Tuesday, checks would be arriving earlier in the week.

This is really a worthwhile attempt on the part of the Egg Shippers Association to be of better service to the producers and shippers and should have the necessary support.

Two Minute Sermon

THOUGHTFULNESS: In the book of Mark appears the beautiful story of the woman, who, one day during the last week of Christ's ministry on earth, broke upon his head an alabaster box of precious ointment. Because of the act she was criticised by several of the group who deemed it a heedless waste. Christ rebuked her critics and shamed them into silence.

The picture is one of striking contrasts. On the one hand we see a group of followers who had been with the Christ for three years, yet here within the last week of his earthly ministry, when the shadow of the cross had already darkened his pathway, they found fault with this gift of devotion and revealed that they did not yet understand him, nor his teachings, nor his mission upon the earth. On the other hand was a woman. Little is known about her. She was not included among the chosen disciples. She had had little opportunity to sit at her Master's feet and learn from his deeds and teachings, yet she was willing to give a costly gift because of her devotion. No wonder the Christ silenced her critics. Here in his last days on earth, with Gethsemane but a few hours away, when fellowship and understanding and loyal devotion were most needed, his own followers did not understand. Only the woman understood. Hers was the last earthly touch of ministering love and devotion that the Master received before he faced the cross.

How often it happens today, that we, buried in the things that fill our days, forget, until it is too late, to render the thoughtful little services that mean so much. The smallest service may be more precious than the rarest alabaster box of costly ointment. It is precious, not because of its great cost, but because of the thoughtfulness, and the sympathy, and the understanding that prompts its giving.

J. F. SHOUP ANNOUNCES NEW AID TO THOUSANDS

Important changes in veterans com-
pensation legislation which will open
the door of government benefits to
thousands of widows and orphans of
World War Veterans were announced
today by Mr. J. F. Shoup, Chairman
of the Kocisusko County Chapter,
American Red Cross.

The amended law makes compen-
sation for death not due to service
available to widows and children of
World War veterans whose service-
connected disability was only 10 per-
cent. Previously death benefits were
paid in such cases only where the
veterans disability was 30 percent or
if there were children in the family,
20 percent.

While this applies only to World
War veterans' dependents, Mr. Shoup
revealed at the same time that a new
law increasing the pensions of cer-
tain soldiers, sailors and nurses who
served in the Spanish-American War,
the Philippine Insurrection and the
China Relief Expedition has just
been passed by Congress and signed
by President Roosevelt.

The latter provides a \$80 monthly
pension for veterans 65 years old
who served at least 90 days and to
those who served less than 90 days
and were discharged for disability
incurred in service. Under the old
law veterans were not eligible for
this increased pension until they
reached the age of 75.

The act also increases from \$72 to
\$100 a month the pension for per-
sons whose physical or mental condi-
tion requires regular attendance of a
nurse of other individual.

This increased pension will take

American Red Cross Solicits Your Aid

Americans throughout the country have been called upon by Norman H. Davis, National Chairman of the American Red Cross, to assist in raising a fund of \$1,000,000 urgently needed in China for refugee relief work.

In a letter addressed to Mr. J. F. Shoup, Chairman of the Kosciusko County Red Cross Chapter, Mr. Davis pointed out that the need for our help that exists in China is appalling. Men, women, and children are dying for lack of adequate food and medical assistance and every donation, no matter how small, will be of great help in handling this relief problem that is growing daily in scope. Hundreds of villages have been completely demolished, and thousands of civilians are without medical assistance of any sort to care for their ill or wounds, resulting from existing conditions.

Hundreds of refugee stations have been established in the larger cities, but for lack of funds, little has been done for rural population or those whose villages have been entirely destroyed, with a loss of all personal property and complete destruction of growing crops.

This money will be used for general civilian and maternity hospitals, purchase of medical supplies, milk and food for orphans and young children, rice and other food for hundreds of existing refugee camps, bedding and shelter for the millions of destitute victims who are wondering homeless over the country. All money is being sent direct to China, with no deductions of any kind being made.

Because of the lower cost of living in China, Mr. Davis stated that \$1.00 will feed, cloth, and house one refugee for a month. Added contributions being sent in from other countries, such Red Cross funds will assist thousands to live until normal conditions are restored in the East.

Kosciusko County Chapter's quota is \$135. Let us out of our comparative abundance give these pitiful victims of tragedy this measure of hope and encouragement.

Assistance shall be given under the provisions of The Welfare Act to any aged person who is 70 years of age or over, or, after July 1, 1938, is 65 years of age or over; is a citizen of the United States; has not sufficient income or other resources to support himself; has resided in the state of Indiana for at least five out of the last nine years, the last year of which must have been continuous; is not an inmate of a municipal, state, or na-

tional institution, although any inmate may receive assistance if he leaves such institutions and is otherwise eligible; has not transferred any property within five years prior to application in order to qualify for assistance or in order to evade any provision of The Welfare Act.

Two Minute Sermon

IF WE BUT UNDERSTOOD: In
the book of Mark is told the story of
Christ's retreat to the Garden of
Gethsemane, where, accompanied by
his three chosen disciples he endeav-

deal of the cross. Few passages in
scripture reveal more of the human
side of the Christ than does this.
Though there was the natural shrink-
ing from the cross, as much, if not
more, of the human side of the Christ
was revealed in his desire for human
companionship.

What poignant yearning is re-
vealed, as three times he comes back
to the three sleeping disciples. They,
lacking understanding, slept on.
What could have contributed more to
the darkness of that hour? The
Christ did not desire his disciples to
save him from those, who, led by Ju-
das came under the cover of night to
arrest him. He had no need for this.
The angels of heaven would rush to

contact—if we but understood—if we
but stopped to think.

The Art of Poisoning
