AN ORDINANCE FOR THE CHILDREN OF MENTONE;

This is the time of the year when parents become concerned over the threat of dogs biting their children. Rabies has long been one of man's most dreaded diseases.

The threat of rabid dogs was thought serious enough by the citizens of Mentone in 1911 to prompt an ordinance requiring dogs to be "securely muzzled" between the first day of June and the first day of September of each year. This ordinance provided that the town marshal should slay any dog off the premises of the owner that was not securely muzzled. This ordinance is still in effect.

The same threat of rabid dogs was responsible for a statute passed by the General Assembly of Indiana in the year 1937 which made it unlawful for any dog owner to permit his dog to stray beyond his premises unless under reasonable control of some person. This same statute requires dogs to wear dog collars with the metal tag evidencing payment of the dog tax. Violations of this statute are punishable by a fine of \$25.00.

The present Board of Trustees of the Town of Mentone, being aware of the constant threat of rabies, passed an ordinance at its meeting on June 6, 1950, requiring dog owners to have their dogs immunized against rabies every twelve months by a duly licensed veterinarian. This ordinance is published in this issue of this paper. It will go into effect ten days after publication. The ordinance provides for the destruction by the town marshal of any dog which has not been immunized against rabies. It also requires dog owners to attach a metal tag to the collars of their dogs evidencing the immunization. Violators are subject to a \$10.00 penalty. The Town Board has instructed the town marshals to rigidly enforce the law.

While a mad dog is a danger to any person in the vicinity, it is particularly dangerous around children since a small child can at best put up a feeble defense against the swiftness and ferocity of a mad dog. The children of Mentone are now in their summer vacation from school and are constantly outdoors playing. It is primarily for their benefit that the ordinance requiring immunization was passed.

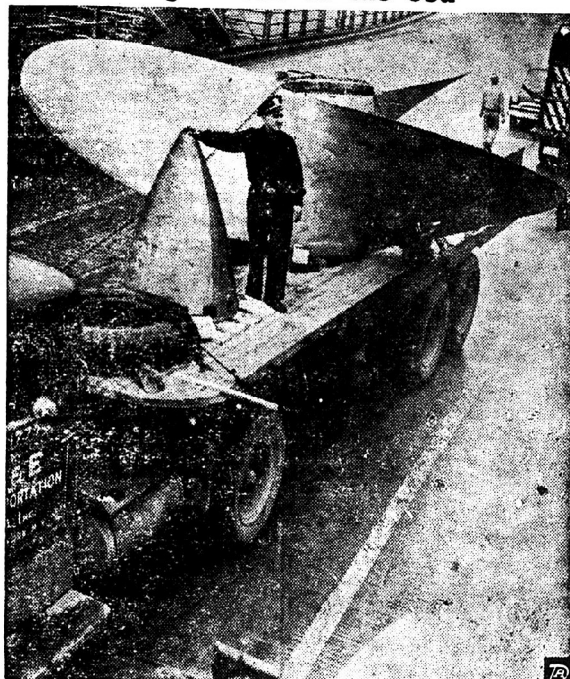

NEW YORK—The largest propellers ever made for a twin screw passenger ship in the United States are shown here enroute from Staten Island to Quincy, Mass., where they will be installed on the new 1,000 passenger liner S.S. Constitution. Each of these giant propellers, one of which is shown in transit aboard a Fruehauf Platform Trailer, weighs 54,500 pounds and has a diameter of 19 feet 6 inches. The cone shaped object is a fairwater cap which is mounted on the end of the propeller shaft for streamlining. The S.S. Constitution and a sister ship S.S. Independence are now under construction at Quincy.

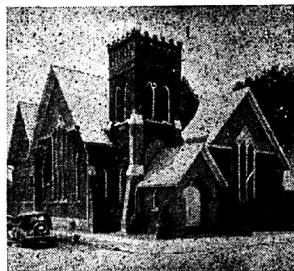

WEATHER CLOUDS UP IN CORN BELT AFTER MOSTLY SUNNY SKIES

CHICAGO—(SPECIAL) —Weather conditions throughout most of the Corn Belt changed suddenly after more than a week of good planting weather, according to latest reports from DeKalb Hybrid Corn Company crop reporting stations over the Middle West. After a week of clear skies and warm weather, which jumped soil temperatures seven degrees to a record high average for the season of 64 degrees, the rains came. Field operations have now virtually stopped in most sections reporting.

DeKalb crop observers report, however that a lot of corn went into the ground before the recent wave of showers. (In some areas more than an

inch of rain fell.) Farmers around Jackson, Minnesota, have nearly 75 per cent of their corn planted. About 45 per cent of this went into the ground during the last few days of plantable weather.

There are some exceptions to this general picture. Farmers around Deshler, Ohio, are complaining that seedbeds are hard and dry. Most corn planted in this area is lying in dry soils. Rain is needed in the Deshler region.

Up until heavy showers planting in most sections, corn planters were to be seen in most fields. The farmers around Storm Lake, Iowa, lead all sections reporting with 97 per cent of planting completed. Tuscola, Illinois, and Marshall, Mo., are next with 90 per cent. Humboldt, Iowa, is close with 85 per cent in. On the other hand, Esmond, Illinois, still has plenty to do with only 30 per cent of total corn acres in that section planted.

HEALTH FACTS FROM YOUR STATE BOARD OF HEALTH

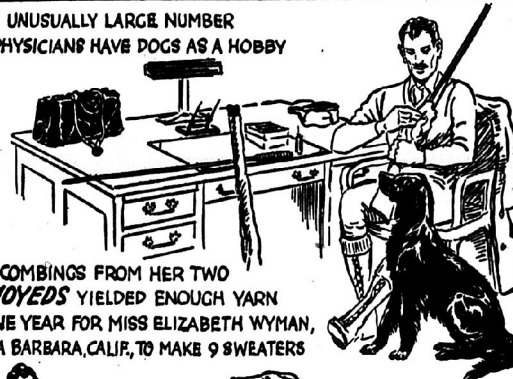

MENTONE MURMURS

June may be the month for roses and brides, but it also is the month for Iris blossoms and strawberries. Have you made a tour of the Tucker-Riewoldt gardens where there are more varieties of the Iris blooming than you can count on your fingers and toes. It is difficult to realize without seeing them that there could be so many variations of color in the blue and yellow blossoms. Then, there are the dusty hues which have velvety purple petals that ars so showy against the pure white bloom of neighboring plants.

The south side of the Cullum residence is a-bloom with these spectacular flowers also, and the gardens of Mae Borton, Gary Rose, and Mrs. Carbeiner combine these blooms with peonies which give an enchanting aroma to the bright rare days of June. In contrast to the blaze of color in these gardens is the cool refreshing greenery that borders Mrs. Williamson's porch. Here is the reminder of deep dank woodlands cool and moist on hot summer days. When the thermometer registers in the upper eighties, it is pleasant to think of cooler retreats than corn fields and truck patch-

es.

Another showy blossom that should not be over-looked, one which is blooming at this time, is the orange-red Oriental Poppy. The fragile blossom drops its petals too soon for the busy work-a-day world to get to fully appreciate, yet, because it is with us for such a short time, it has a greater value than a more hardy and enduring plant. The blossoms may successfully be used as floral bouquets along with other large blooms, but do not expect them to last too long.

AN ORDINANCE requiring the annual immunization of dogs from rabies by a licensed veterinarian and the wearing of metal tags on dog collars showing such annual immunization.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Mentone, Indiana:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person to own, harbor or keep any dog more than six (6) months old that has not been immunized from rabies by a duly licensed veterinarian. It shall be the duty of the owner of any dog to see that the dog is immunized every twelve (12) months. A metal tag shall be attached to the collar of the dog by the owner indicating that the dog has been immunized from rabies.

Section 2. Every dog which has not been immunized from rabies is hereby declared to be a public nuisance. Section 2 It shall be the duty of the town marshal to capture any dog which does not have a metal tag attached to its collar, as required by this ordinance; to make reasonable inquiry to ascertain its owner; to return the dog to its owner; and to warn the owner to comply with the requirements of this ordinance.

Section 4. If upon reasonable inquiry the town marshal is unable to find the owner of any dog which does not have a metal tag attached to its collar, as provided by this ordinance, or, if upon three warnings by the town marshal any owner refuses, omits, or neglects to have his dog immunized from rabies

or to attach a metal tag to the collar of his dog, as required by this ordinance, it shall be the duty of the town marshal to destroy the dog.

Section 5. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall pay a penalty of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) to the Town of Mentone for each violation.

Section 6. This ordinance shall be in effect on and after the tenth day after publication.

THIS ORDINANCE PASSED by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Mentone, Indiana, this 6 day of June, 1950.

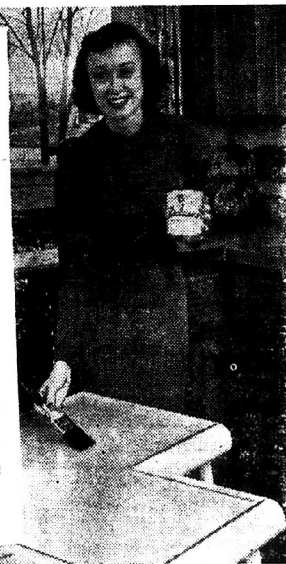

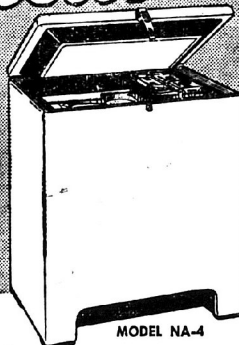

Murmurs wants to take his hat off to the men who gave of their time and energy this past week-end to make the attendance of the Boy Scout Troop 58, of Mentone, at the Scout Camporee,

which was held at Rice Field, Elkhart, Indiana. Mr. James Rodibaugh and Wayne Tombaugh spent the night with the boys. Ora McKinley and Murmurs provided transportation and moral support. It is not an easy task to direct the activities of eleven boys for over thirty hours; and without the assistance of our committee and interested parents any such activity would be impossible. It is hoped that in the near future the entire troop of thirty boys may be able to attend a camp.

This Camporee was of particular advantage to this troop, as it provided camping experience in competition with other Scouts of our Council. It afforded the boys an opportunity to test their Scout knowledge and compare themselves with other boys of similar interests.

In the uniform inspection Dick Tombaugh made 93 points out of a possible 100 points. David Gosser, Charles Urschel, and Larry McKinley made 92 points, and the other Scouts in uniform made ninety points. Two boys were not in uniform, and it was not necessary for attendance, but the camp was impressive with the khaiki, green, and blue uniforms of scouts and cubs.

The boys who attended were, according to their tent locations, John Smith and Pierre Ferverda, Gale Johnson and Frank Manwaring, Merrill Peterson and Larry McKinley, Bill Clark, Dick Tombaugh and Robert Holloway, Charles Urschel and David Gosser.

The contests were based on patrol activity, and at least three scouts had to be in attendance in each patrol for the patrol to receive credit. 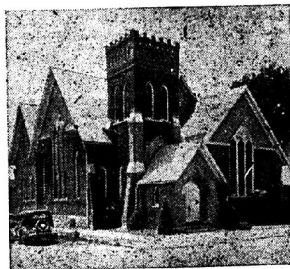

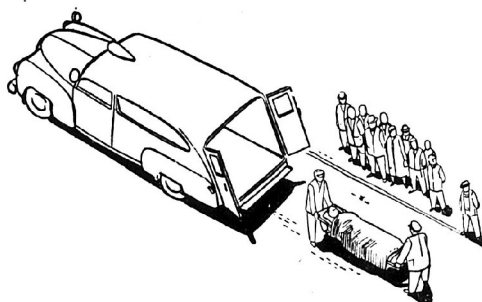

STATE FAIR ANNOUNCES INCREASE IN PREMIUMS

ADVERTISING is as much a part of American newspapers as the paper upon which they are printed. Without advertising this newspaper would be a very different publication. Not only would it be less interesting, but it also would cost subscribers considerably more.

Advertising is commercial news. It is as valuable to readers as every other feature of a newspaper. It is so interesting, in fact, that there are papers in many cities devoted exclusively to advertising.

The commercial and professional announcements of this community's business' civic and professional people are important to all who live here. They are also timely cross-sections of the needs, interests, hopes and desires of the people of this locality.

In some communities there are those who apparently do not fully grasp the importance of the role advertising in the home town paper plays in their daily lives. There are merchants, for example, who seemingly do not realize that failure to acquaint people with their goods and services handicaps both the store and its customers.

Those who advertise in this or any other newspaper actually rent space in which to publish their own, generally commercial, news. The space is the property of the newspaper. That has been confirmed by court decisions upholding newspapers in their refusals to provide space for certain advertising uses.

Revenue

Space rented for advertising is the principal source of revenue to virtually all newspapers. Such revenue makes possible delivery of the paper to subscribers for less than the actual cost of the blank paper in each copy.

The use to which advertisers put the space they rent is of equal importance to the community as a whole. Advertising is the lubricant that keeps the commercial machine of the community functioning at maximum efficiency.

Advertising in the home town newspaper is a sound investment, like buying a bond so a school can be built. The advertiser gets direct return in more business and goodwill, and the community benefits from the information.

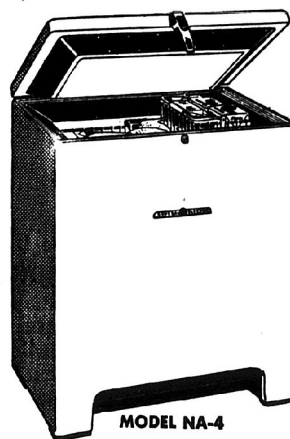

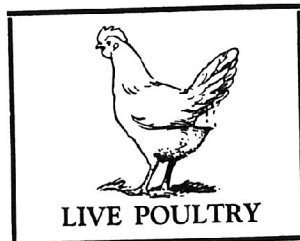

It appears to Murmurs (and to most of you) that we are in for another peak growing year. The precipitation (rain, in this case) and the humidity make for bad weeds, but Murmurs contends that where weeds grow something

good may be raised also. In most cases, however, the two will not complement each other, and it takes a little effort to keep the weeds from being where the other things ought to be.

It's pretty much that way with life. We are in constant need of keeping weeds out of our lives. The disgrace is not so much in their appearance, but in the way we let them take root and flourish until they crowd out all the good that should be there. The most difficult to uproot is thought,

wrong and evil thoughts, for while we let them stay long enough until we can mull over them, they become so well ingrained in us that it takes much effort to dislodge them.

Like the gardens again, when they are dislodged, they disturb the roots of our better thoughts, and if we are in an intellectual drought, the good that we would think becomes impossible to think because there is not enough incentive about us to nourish the good thoughts.

Developing the simile a little more it may be suggested that the cultivation of good thoughts is just as essential as the cultivation of crops. Quite frequently good people acquire the belief that good thoughts should be let alone and not be disturbed, but they must be worked if they are to grow and do mankind any good. It is quite likely that good thoughts for the sake of good thoughts only, are like good people, they are good for nothing.

Crops are raised to market and use. Thoughts are even more essential for life, yet we are afraid to expose them. When an individual comes forth with a good idea or thought, there are always a dozen folks who want to plow him under, and his crops unused. As necessary as it may be to keep our frows clear of weeds, one fact can not be ignored, we must be sure that what we are uprooting are weeds. Frequently good things are uprooted because we are inexperienced in our thinking or our visions have been limited by prejudices and lack of experience. Too long we may have been planting the same crop of thoughts, and the fertility of our mind runs out just like the soil in which we plant corn and beans. We need to do a little of the rotating of intellectual pursuits to get better results for our effort.

There may be no value in chasing after the isms, and certainly no stability in running from one field (of thought) to another to see which is greener, but it is necessary for spiritual and intellectual growth to improve the strain with new blood and new life, to hoe a new row, to rotate our thought, to whistle a new tune. For every prodigal thinker there are a

hundred stalmated, "dead from the neck up," nonproductive thinkers.

Murmurs would analyze the reason. Fear. This is the paramount reason, because fear was once considered a virtue, at least the fear of God. We have learned that the Scriptural concept has in it, however, the idea of respect, of reverence and awe. We have only associated the meaning of cringing, bullying, terrifying experiences with the word here-to-fore, and any new thing or experiences was feared. Ancient peoples feared God because he was unknown; an experience to be avoided. Our concept of God has changed and the word fear in relation to Him is obsolete, so is the attitude we have towards new experiences, for now we meet them with a spirit of adventure, the opening of new worlds before us, the viewing of great visions. In like manner we should consider new thoughts, for we may be shutting ourselves out of a richer and more abundant life. Richard Lovelace, a seventeenth century poet said:

"Stone walls do not a prison make,
Nor iron bars a cage;
Minds innocent and quiet take
That for an heritage;
If I have freedom in my love,
And in my soul am free,
Angels alone that soar above
Enjoy such liberty."

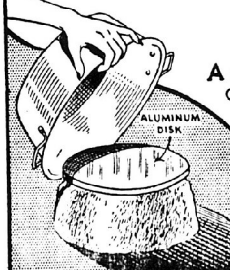
HOW-TO-FIX-IT

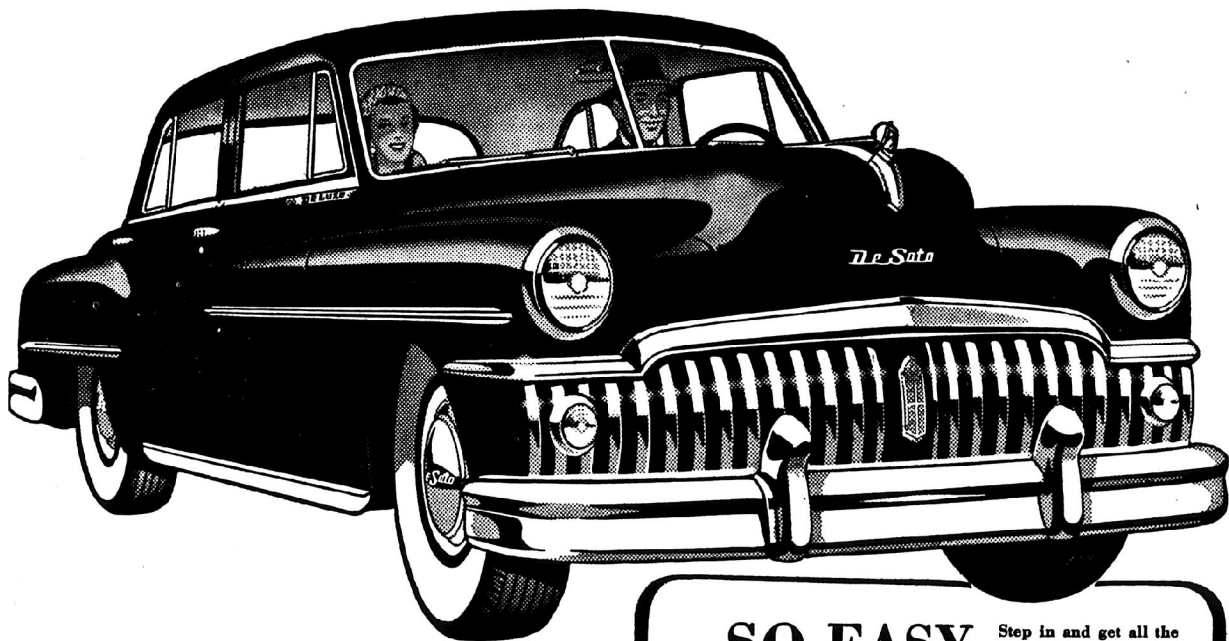

FUTURE GAME FOR HUNTERS DISTRIBUTED

Thousands of pheasant and quail chicks and eggs of both are currently being distributed to conservation clubs by the Indiana Department of Conservation Division of Fish and Game.

Through the two state game farms, Wells County and Jasper-Pulaski, these eggs and chicks are being allocated to clubs throughout the state which operate and maintain brooders.

Pheasant eggs are being distributed by conservation officers in every county which has requested them. Club hatcheries incubate these eggs until they hatch, whereupon, the young pheasants are turned into the brooders and pens until they reach maturity. They are eventually liberated to increase the natural game supply, thereby providing sportsmen with an abundant fall harvest.

Within 12 to 24 hours after quail and pheasant chicks have hatched at the state game farms, the chicks are boxed and shipped in a special temperature controlled truck to clubs co-operating with the Division of Fish and Game in propagating game birds. This truck is equipped to maintain a constant temperature of 97° Fahrenheit in order that the chicks may have every chance to live.

All quail and pheasant received under this club operated plan must be liberated when they reach maturity. Clubs requesting eggs or chicks operate equipment inspected and approved by Division of Fish and Game.

Game farm superintendents hand-pick all parent stock on the basis of their capabilities, thus insuring excellent game hatches and full propagation returns.

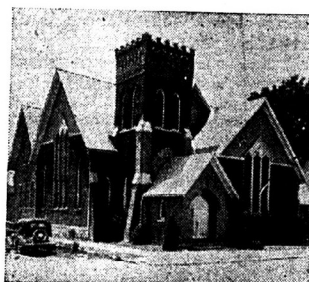

HEALTH FACTS FROM YOUR STATE BOARD OF HEALTH

Less heavy foods are required for summer coolness, according to Miss Lelia Ogle, chief nutritionist, Indiana State Board of Health.

"You need just as much meat, eggs, milk and vegetables in the summer time but should cut down on starches, sweets and fats," Miss Ogle pointed out. "These heavy foods on which you can cut down include rich desserts, pastries, gravy, whipped cream, mayonnaise and hot breads."

"To be comfortable see that you have plenty of vegetables and fruits along with your daily quota of milk, some whole wheat bread, an egg and a good helping of meat, fish, poultry or cheese. If you are overweight, drink skimmed milk. Eat three regular meals a day and be sure that the hot food is steaming hot and the cold food is refrigerated and served cold."

Miss Ogle's advice is to drink plenty of water to make up for the loss in perspiration but to avoid coming in tired and hungry after traveling, golfing, fishing, or gardening and drink quickly too much iced beverages. Lemonade and other fruit drinks are refreshing and are thirst-quenching if not too sweet.

**HEALTH FACTS FROM YOUR
STATE BOARD OF HEALTH**

June is the beginning of the tick season.

The reporting of three cases of Rocky Mountain Spotted fever during the past few weeks draws attention to the fact that now is the time to watch for ticks which carry the germ causing the disease. Dr. J. W. Jackson, director, Division of Communicable Disease Control, Indiana State Board of Health, warned Indiana citizens today.

The cases this year were reported from Vigo and Vanderburgh counties. Nine cases were reported last year with no fatalities. The mortality of the

disease throughout the nation averaged 23 per cent in 4,033 cases reported during the period 1939-46.

"Persons on vacations and others going into wooded areas should wear heavy clothing for protection from the tick," Dr. Jackson pointed out. "An inspection of the body after a trip in the woods is recommended as the ticks seldom transfer the infection until after feeding on the victim for several hours. Remove the tick with care, using paper or some article protecting the hands. The abrasion should be touched with a disinfectant such as iodine or gently washed with soap and water."

The disease is characterized by high fever, muscle pains and a red, spotted rash.

FISH OF INDIANA**LARGE MOUTH BASS**
Huro Salmoides (Lacepede)

DESCRIPTION: A very large mouth, the maxillary of which extends beyond the posterior border of the eye; high arched spinous dorsal almost semi-circular in shape. Scales on cheek almost as large as those on body. These are best characters to use in distinguishing this bass from the Small Mouth and the Spotted Kentucky Bass. Large Mouth Bass weighing 9 lbs. have been taken in Indiana waters.

HABITAT: Is a fish of the weedy, muddy lakes and ponds. In rivers, found in quiet, weedy spots such as bayous and overflow ponds. It hides, waits its prey beside logs or among water plants.

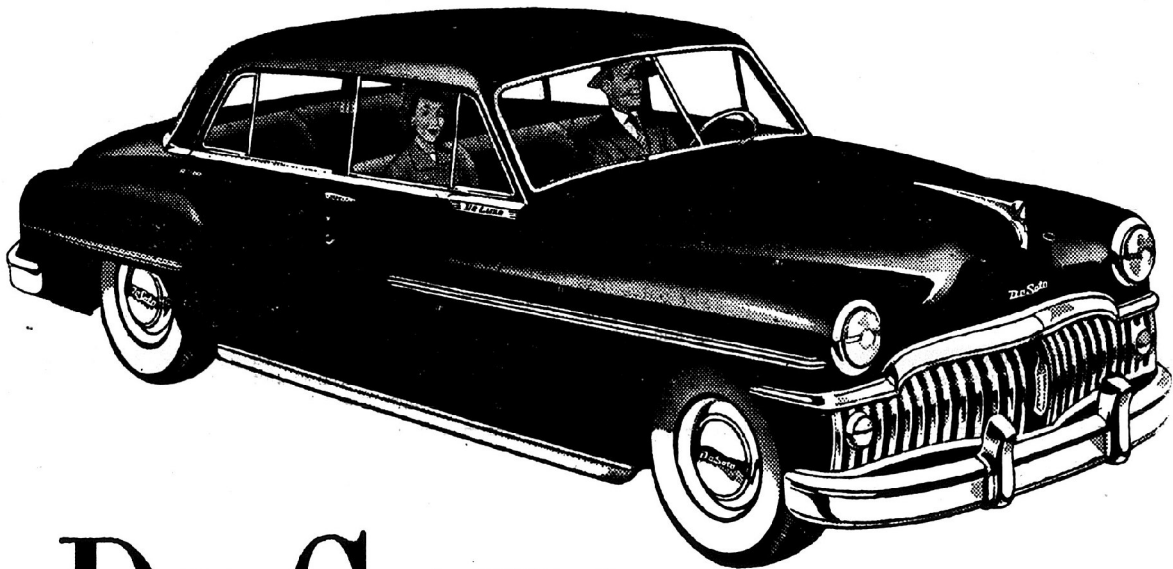
STOCKING: State stocking has been and still is heavy throughout state; is being carried on in lakes, gravel pits, farm ponds and quarries.

SPAWNING — PROPAGATION: Nests in quiet situations in from one to six feet of water. Hard to locate and less prominent than nests of other two types. Often built in vegetation with bottom free of debris. Principal spawning May and early June, depending on weather might be later or earlier.

FOOD: Small fish, insects and crayfish.

SEASON: June 16 to April 30. Both dates inclusive. Keepers — Ten inches. LEGAL BAG LIMIT — SIX.

Your Paper Not All Pictures Are Good Ones

By William R. Nelson

A PICTURE may or may not be worth "10,000 words," as the Chinese proverb claims, but it certainly represents a pretty penny in costs, time, space and judgment, if published in a newspaper. In addition, it is seldom desirable to republish a picture, so all of the effort, time and money expended is for a single use.

Editors appreciate the interest shown when readers suggest publication of pictures, and they comply as often as possible. But publishing a picture in a newspaper is not as easy as it may seem.

Pictures

Are
News, Too

Pictures are only "worth 10,000 words" when they convey desired information.

That immediately classifies them as news and means they should be selected for their news value. Unless a photograph is of someone or some event currently in the news, publication has little or no meaning.

Assuming that a picture has news value, it then must be of such quality it will reproduce well in the paper. Many photographs which are entirely satisfactory for an album cannot be reproduced distinctly enough to be recognizable in a newspaper. Publishing such pictures is a disappointing waste of space, effort and money.

There are other factors, too, such as permission of those in the picture for its publication, its news value or the amount of interest in it among the paper's readers, and whether there is time to make a cut.

If not taken specifically for the paper, on its order, a photograph

may not be timely and therefore its use may seem incongruous. Even if timely but received too late to get a cut made, it may not be practical to use it in a later issue because reader interest will have waned by then.

For these and many other reasons, the editor is always the best judge of whether or not a picture can be or should be published.

If the paper publishes other pictures, some not local in origin, in the very issue for which your's was rejected, it is well to remember that in addition to the above factors, there is still another. It is that some pictures, always of news value, are furnished to the paper in forms that make their use easy and inexpensive, because they are also supplied to many other newspapers.

CITIZENS URGED TO TAKE BLOOD TYPE TESTS

Residents of the Mentone Community are urged to come to the Urschel Clinic in Mentone on the evening of Thursday, July 6th, to have their blood types determined and their names recorded in the Mentone Community Blood Donor List. Having knowledge of your blood type is important to save time whether one needs a transfusion or in securing donors for other in need.

The formation of the Mentone Community Blood Donor List is sponsored by the Mentone Firemen, Lions Club, the American Legion, the Legion Auxiliary, the Mentone Reading Club, the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Psi Iota Xi, the Jolly Janes Home Economics Club, the Mentone Home Economics Club, the Merry Mollies Home Economics Club, the Royal Neighbors, the Mothers of World War II, Mentone Merchants' Association, and the Parent Teacher Association.

The Blood Donor List will be available at all times and free to all. Any one forced to locate blood donors for a loved one is now faced with an almost impossible task. As many as forty people might have to be contacted and typed in a single day, just to find two persons suitable for a transfusion. The Blood Donor List, will make the finding of donors quick and easy. Blood donors are not often needed, but when they are required a life hangs in the balance, and no time must be lost in searching for a donor.

The American Legion has for many months maintained a Blood Donor List, composed of its members. This list has seen much use in recent weeks, and it is doubtful that the Legion list

would be adequate for the present needs of the Community because of the great demands now being made on it by ill persons in neighboring areas.

The tests to be made at the Urschel Clinic on the evening of Thursday, July 6th, are very quick and simple, and nobody need hesitate for any reason whatsoever. The name of the citizen volunteering for the list will be recorded, and at the same time one drop of blood will be removed for examination from a fingertip, and there will be no waiting, no pain, and no embarrassment, and the examination will be made without charge.

The Community commends Dr. Urschel and Mr. Denton Abbey for their cooperation in making available laboratory facilities for the tests, and for their donation of time and skills to the work. "All of us can be proud to have a part in this project, and it will take all of us to make Mentone Community Blood Donor List a success."

A NATION OF AUTO OWNERS

A total of 1,339,914 motor vehicles were registered in Indiana during 1949, or about 2.7 percent above the number registered the previous year, according to the Chicago Motor Club.

There were 1,304,824 motor vehicles licensed in Indiana in 1948.

Government figures forwarded to the club show 36,433,674 passenger cars, 208,898 buses and 8,028,016 trucks were licensed in the United States last year.

"Total registrations for 1949, including autos, trucks and buses," Mr. Hayes continued, "reached 44,670,588, an 8.6 per cent increase over the 1948 figure, and 10,198,000 greater than the pre-war high established in 1941.

"It is interesting to note that more trucks were registered last year than passenger cars for the year 1919. The greatest increase in motor vehicle registration was shown by Louisiana which had 17.3 per cent more vehicles in 1949 than in 1948. The smallest increase was recorded by Maine with 0.5 per cent."

DIVORCE GRANTED

Helen M. Goble, a nurse, route 5, Warsaw, was granted a divorce in circuit court Thursday from Paul B. Goble on grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment. Her former name Helen M. Hoffer was restored. They married Jan. 29, 1942, and separated Dec. 9, 1949.

STATE STOCKS GAMBUSIA TO KILL MOSQUITOS

The mosquito population of Indiana is due for a tremendous setback from now on as the result of a program being carried out by the Division of Fish and Game in which Southern mosquitos minnows, known as the Gambusia affinis, are being used to destroy the mosquito larvae.

The Gambusia, which in reality is not a minnow but is commonly called a minnow, makes mosquito larvae (known as wiggletails) about three-quarters of its daily diet.

These fish are most prolific and the female gives live birth to approximately 200 of her offspring at a time. This

occurs at least twice yearly.

The male attains the mature size of about one inch while the female reaches a length of about two and one-half inches at maturity.

Sometime ago the Division of Fish and Game decided to try to raise these tiny destroyers of one of the country's outstanding plagues only to learn that the fish would live in southern water but was not rugged enough to withstand cooler climes. Through exhaustive research and selective breeding Dr. Louis Krumholz, of the Lake and Stream Survey, Indiana University and others connected with the University finally succeeded in acclimating the tiny destroyer to cold water. The Fish and Game Division has placed 14,000 Gambusia in 14 selected Indiana Lakes where they have thrived and multiplied many times. The state plans distribution in all lakes, streams and ponds in the state just as rapidly as the minnow can be raised, seined and transported. Thus, it is hoped that mosquitoless nights soon may be enjoyed to a greater degree through the agency of a tiny minnow whose favorite dish is what it takes to hatch the pest. They are being raised in state hatcheries.

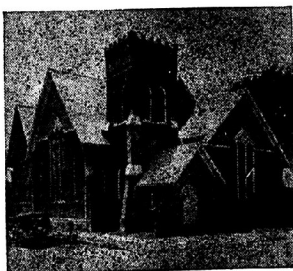

The Period included begins 4 p. m. Friday, June 30 and ends midnight, Tuesday July 4.

Normally, safety experts say, ten of these 17 deaths would occur on the open highway. Indiana accident records, especially in Lake County, show high percentage of auto-rail fatalities. Half of Lake County's annual traffic deaths occur at rail crossings, compared to 13 per cent for the rest of the state and 4. per cent for the nation.

Seven of the victims will be women, according to average past experience. Last year only one woman was killed

in a traffic accident over the four day July 4 period.

The men victims will include salesmen, laborers, students, a farmer, a soldier and a printer, if last year's record repeats.

Greatest danger waits at highway intersections and on the open road. Last year three accidents claimed three lives each during the holiday weekend. One was a half mile east of Marion on Ind. 18. It involved a 24 year old youth and two boys, 12 and 14.

The second also claimed three youths, 19, 26 and 24 years. It occurred at 2:50 a. m. the day before the holiday, 2 miles south of Indianapolis on Ind. 37.

The third was at 2:50a. m. the morning after the Fourth 11 miles north of Lebanon on U. S. 52. Two of the men were 20 and the other 21.

This year's toll can be effectively reduced if motorists follow the program outlined by the Chicago Motor Club.

1. Start trips early to avoid fatigue, night-driving and necessity of speeding. Two-thirds of all fatal accidents occur at night. Excessive fatigue and high driving speeds invite fatalities.

2. Allow extra margins for driving error, especially in passing or following cars. Control speeds at intersections, railroad crossings, bridge approaches and other hazardous points.

3. Condition your car for holiday driving, double checking all safety equipment, particularly brakes, windshield wipers, lights and tires.

Survivors include the parents, and two brothers, Steve and Dave.

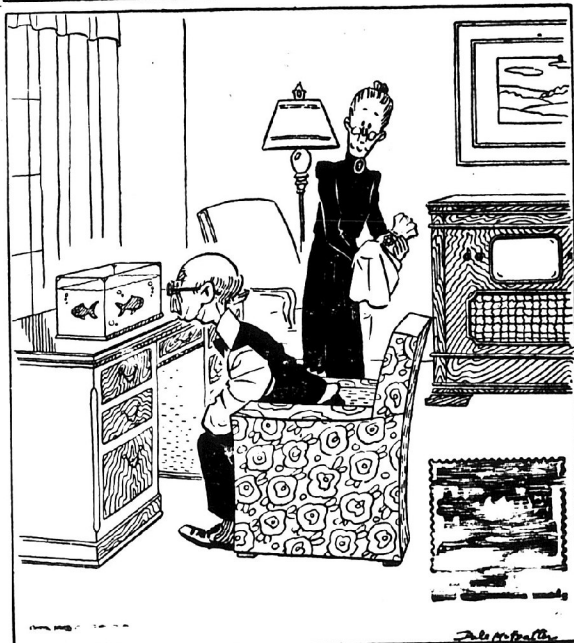
