





CAROLINA WREN

There is a group of diminutive brown birds whose tails are usually held either erect or depressed but who rarely hold any pose for a considerable length of time. The sounds they produce are usually all out of proportion to the size of the birds. The group is probably best known by its representative, the house wren, which obligingly occupies or at least appears

to occupy the bird houses put up hy hopeful young naturalists. Closely related to the wrens are the wren-tits and the dippers or water ouzels, with which we are not here particularly concerned.

The wrens are usually the size of the smaller sparrows. The Carolina wren

measures 6 inches including the inch tall and the beak which is about 2/3 inch long. The Carolina wren is rather conspicuously redd ish for a wren and lacks conspicuous markings except for a long white or pale brown stripe over each eye. The under parts are buff and the throat whitish. The wings are short as they are in most wrens. The black bars on the flanks of the winter wren and the whiteedged tail of the Bewick's wren are lacking in the Carolina wren.

Carolina wrens breed from northern Florida to central Texas north to Nebraska and the lower valleys of the Hudson and Connecticut rivers. Sometimes they are found farther north into Ontario, Maine, Michigan, and Wisconsin but this is rather unusual. There are three subspecies recognized of which the Florida wren extends the range into Florida and the Lomita wren from Texas across the Mexican border.

Possibly the most startling thing about the Carolina wren is that it more or less is to be found over its range at any time of the year. On occasion it may sing, even with snow on the ground, its ecstatically repeated 'tea kettle" or "whee-udel" song. This of course endears it to naturalists who at the winter season may be more or less starved for a sound such as they hear from this popular bird.

The nest is a mass of vegetable material commonly hidden in stumps, fallen tree-tops or sometimes in buildings. There is an inner lining of finer material. In the nest the 4 to 6 eggs are laid. They are white or cream with Cinnamon, brown and lavender markings. There may be 2 or 3 broods a year and incubation for 12 days is carried on chiefly by the female that is smaller than the male usually.

The food of the Carolina wren is probably 95 per cent insects and includes chinch bugs, cockroaches, grasshoppers, crickets, cotton-boll weevils, cucumber beetles, moths and similar pests. Although this bird is less likely to come to human habitations than the house wren, it can be enticed to a feeding station by hamburger. For that matter, in these days that might not be a trait limited to our feathered friends. Apparently the wren has no habits contrary to those that suit man's interests and it has been awarded the honor of being the state bird of South Carolina.

The National Wildlife Federation encourages the study of birds of this type through banding and other means be-



FINDS OLD FLOUR BAG IN HOUSE WALL

Recently Dwight Reichart was doing some remodeling at his home and after tearing off some old plaster, found a number of old flour bags that had been used for insulation in the wall. One of the bags had the printed portion well preserved, and it was from the Nickel Plate Roller Mills at Mentone, Manwaring & Mentzer, proprietors. The bag is now on display in the Co-Op. News window.

In checking with M. O. Mentzer, he stated the mill was built by his father, Samuel Mentzer, and Chester Manwaring's father, Art Manwaring, in 1884. It was located where the Mentone Lumber Co. coal yard is now, and it operated day and night for five or six years, supplying the flour needs of this area. It was the only roller mill in this country, and the bran and middlings were shipped to the eastern dairy country in carload lots.

There had been a sawmill just south of where the mill was being built in 1884, but this burned, and with the help of all the threshers of the area, using their water tanks, the mill was saved from destruction also.

Ownership changed as time went on, Mr. Mentzer selling a share to Albert Tucker and eventually these three sold to Elmer Eddinger and John Nichols.

eggs-at least until late 1953. So more attention to your poultry flock might help take up any slack in profits you might have in other farm operations.

Here are several ways suggested by Capper's Farmer to take advantage of higher egg prices:

1. Keep pullets away from older birds. An all-pullet flock is a good answer to the segregation problem. And if you do keep over some good layers, don't mix them with pullets or disease can spread easily. Specialists say to house them at least 400 feet apart.

2. Raise pullets on good pastureprobably the largest single factor of good health. S. F. Ridlen, Ilinois extension poultryman, says the best way to get large eggs early is to give pullets all the feed and good clean range they can use. Ladino makes excellent pasture.

3. Cull out boarders—spot loafers ear ly—to save feed costs. Heaviest pullets at 12 weeks are quite likely to be the first to come into production.

4. Provide plenty of floor and feed-er space. Each bird needs 3 or4 square feet in the laying house, according to breed. Crowding causes high mortality home folks.

5. Watch protein level. A hen should have at least 15 percent protein ra-Poultry specialists see more profits in tion. Half-and-half grain and 20 percent protein mash is a recommended formula. Some poultrymen say that all pullet flocks might need a 17 percent ration. An easy way to figure protein level is to multiply the percent in the mash times the amount fed. If 70 lbs. of an 18 percent laying mash are fed with each 30 pounds of grain, there, will be 12.6 pounds of protein. The grain at 10 percent protein will give 3 pounds, bringing the total to 15.6 pounds or percent.

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

POOR MANAGEMENT CAUSES

Lafayette, Ind.— Tail picking and feather picking among chicks in the brooder is often due to poor managestates Joe W. Sicer, Purdue University extension poultryman.

Empty feed troughs, empty waterers overheating and overcrowding are among the chief causes of cannibalism in chicks.

Hungry chicks are going to-eat something. If the troughs are empty the chicks are quite likely to start picking at each other. Probably more cannibalism in chicks is started because of carelessness in allowing feed troughs to stay empty than because of any other single reason, says Sicer.

Should the vice appear in a brood, it is esential to do something to divert the chick's attention. Sometimes paper torn into strips and placed on the floor will keep the chicks busy. Strings of large shiny buttons often interest them. Green hay or radish tops hung for the chicks to pick at, or strips of sod for them to work on, may turn the trick of giving them something else to do so that they can forget about picking each other.

If at all possible, get the chicks outside on good grass. Cannibalism seldom starts or persists among chicks that are pastured.

When other ways fail, the electric debeaker may be used to remove about one third of the upper beak. This will almost always stop cannibalism without hurting or setting back the chicks, but good management can us-



Sleep and wakefulness, says Dr. Nathaniel Kleitman, a University of Chicago physiologist, are governed by two nerve groups in the brain, which he calls the "wakefulness center." Sleep cannot come if this center is disturbed by the activities of the cerebral cortex, the seat of man's intellectual proesses of reason, judgment, and the



Artificial insemination has been found to be one answer for herd improvement on many Hoosier dairy farms, according to N. J. Moeller, extension dairyman at Purdue University. He estimates that one out of every four Indiana dairy cows is being bred artificially today.

An objectionable, slimy, orange-cololored growth is moving in on both apple and red cedar trees in some localities over Indiana. Dr. E. G. Sharvelle, Purdue plant pathologist, says these growths, which appear like ornaments from the trees, are actually galls of the apple cedar rust disease. It probably won't be worthwhile to attempt to control, he saye, since the disease rarely causes serious damage to the affected trees.





ect haymaking weather in June. That's KEY TO SILAGE MAKING why S. M. Hauge, agricultural Chemist at Purdue University, advocates putting up grass and legume silage as the most practical method of saving forage food values.

He says a farmer has two choiceseither to put up freshly cut forage, adding preservatives, or to wilt the crop to about 40 percent moisture content and put it up with or without preservatives. Farmers who have had little experience with ensiling grass mixtures should probably play safe and use a preservative, suggests the chem-

Preservatives are usually added to the green material as it goes into the silage cutter or onto the apron of the blower. About 60 or 80 pounds of blackstrap molasses or 40 to 50 pounds of dried molasses per ton may be added. Adding 150 pounds of finely ground corn meal or 200 pounds of corn and cob meal per ton will also be satisfactory.

If silage is tightly packed, it will keep for a long time. Air must not be allowed to penetrate the silage or mold will grow, causing spoilage. Forage cut in quarter-inch lengths seems to pack

Hauge points out that the principles of preserving and packing apply to all types of silos, whether they be upright, trench or stack.

FARMING TODAY IS A SCIENTIFIC PROCEDURE

Too many farmers are "overdoing" their efforts to get more out of their soils, says a Minnesota soils expert. It's time those farmers reviewed some fundamentals of soil management-or pay the price for soil handled too fast and too much.

C. O. Rost, head of the soils department at the University of Minnesota, Have your soll tested. Many soils-men is quoted in Capper's Farmer as say-

"The average farmer tills land at

yields suffer because soil is too compacted.

Here are the basic common-sense rules of working soil listed by the national farm magazine:

. Build up soil organic matter. Organic matter "fattens" soil—maintains pore space so air and water is distributed to the plant's root systemcounteracts packing action by heavy machinery. Renewed tilth enlarges rootbed capacity for usable moisturequickens growth processes and speeds up intake of rainwater at the surface.

2. Use plenty of nitrogen fertilizers. think we have just scratched the surface on use of nitrogen.

3. Stay off fields when soil is too a fast pace. Often ground is worked wet. Michigan researchers found that course when he returns to camp.

when it is too wet or too dry. Crop a two-plow, rubber-tired tractor compacts wet ground to a depth of seventeen inches. You may need to tile or terrace.

> 4. Limit tillage operations. Work corn land just enough to separate crumbs and fluff up plow layer. Earl Jones, Ohio agronomist, says an ideal seedbed is mellow on the surface and firm below- a few clods on the surface aren't harmful. One should be wary about third cultivation. It may cut off corn roots and reduce yield.

Commercial fishermen catching menhaden along the Atlantic coast can tell the "mostest" if not the biggest fish story. 

FOR YOUR FREEZER FARM PROPERLY WRAP FOOD

Lafayette, Indiana- Many homemakers have hung wet clothes on the line to dry on a cold winter day. They have seen washing freeze until stiff and dry. Miss Ann Liggert, extension nutritionist at Purdue University, explains that the same thing can happen Phone 1312J. to foods which are improperly wrapped in the freezer.

Since the air in the freezer is dry, moisture will be taken from the food unless it is tightly wrapped in moisturevapor-proof packaging materials. It is most essential to remove all the air possible when sealing the package of food for the freezer.

Surveys show that home freezing has introduced new food preparations and new methods of meal planning, food budgeting and home management.

Through surveys, it also was found that many homemakers did not understand what makes adequate packaging materials. Do not use waxed paper, ice cream cartons, store wrapping paper, newspapers or ordinary household aluminum foil to package foods for freezing. These materials are not satisfactory for retaining the good quality of the food.

Homemakers should examine the various types of packaging materials and decide on the kind that meets their needs. The directions should be carefully followed for the proper use of that particular type. If the necessity for the correct use of moisture-vaporproof packaging materials is not under-





MOST INSECTS HAVE VERY GOOD APPETITES

The farmer was hopping mad

He had given a U. S. Department of Agriculture entomologist permission to take samples from his wheat bin to use in studying stored grain insects. He put 500 bushels into the bin at harvest time. When it was welighed out there were only 450 bushels. Where was the other 50 bushels?

They went to feed the insects. The entomologist had records to prove it.

This is an extreme case, says Capper's Farmer, but insects do take a terrific toll from stored grain every year. First, they cause the grain to shrink. Second, you may get docked at the elevator for infested wheat.

Insect damage can cost you anywhere from six cents to 45 cents a bushel, depending on whether infest-

ation is light (2 per cent) or heavy (10 per cent). This grain loss is based on actual study of farm-stored wheat by the U. S. D. A., and figured with the market price at \$2 a bushel.

To this you must add whatever dockage elevator operators set in light of requirements worked out by the Food and Drug Administration and the U. S. D. A.



COMBINE CAN LOSE PROFIT ON GRAINS

You may save a bushel or more of grain an acre if you check your comhas returned to his home after a visit bine at the beginning of harvest season.

It's easy to tell if you're losing grain, but it takes examination to find where it escapes. Here is a Capper's Farmer list of things to check:

- 1. Feeding. Reel, divider, cutterbar and feeding mechanism all contribute to header loss. The reel should hold the crop upwright while it is being cut, then, lay it gently back on the draper. The reel's speed should be about 10 percent greater than the forward speed of the machine. Knives and ledger plates should be sharp and in register.
- 2. Threshing. Unthreshed heads are caused by either too slow a cylinder or too wide a cylinder-concave clearance. Broken seeds result from too high cyl-

inder speed, too narrow chearance, or bent auger housings. Set the cylinder speed just fast enough to knock the grain out of the head.

3. Separating. Losses at the straw rack commonly result from: Grain not in threshable condition, overloading, uneven feeding, improper rack speed, badly worn joints in shaker arms and worn out grain checks.

4. Cleaning. Losses occur above the upper seive when it has more material on it than it can handle. A good rule to follow is to use as wide an opening as possible, without getting too much straw and refuse in the grain tanks, will reduce damaged seed.

5. Detective work. A good way to measure grain loss is to walk behind the combine, catching material from the straw rack in a screening box. Some farmers are surprised to see how much grain is in the box.
