A fall down a basement stairway Thursday morning proved fatal to Frank Tippy, well known radio repairman of Rochester. Tippy, who maintains a shop and living quarters in the Barrett building, had left the trap door to the basement open as he stepped outside the building for a few moments. Upon his return he evidently forgot about the basement being open and fell a distance of eight feet to the floor. Mr. Tippy was taken to the Woodlawn hospital where he died at 2:30 p.m. Thursday from a fractured skull. He never regained consciousness.

Frank Tippy was born in Ohio June 13, 1871, and came to Talma when but a child. His parents were Edmond and Emma (Pix) Tippy. He was married to Loretta Hardesty, who preceded him in death on April 12, 1941. Mr. Tippy was a member of the Eagles and Moose Lodge of Rochester.

Survivors are a brother, Levi Tippy of Talma; two sisters, Mrs. Ida Scott of Debanon, Mr. and Mrs. Eva Fore of Rochester, and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday in the Foster Funeral Home at Rochester with Rev. James Kimsey officiating. Burial was made in the Reichter cemetery near Talma.

READ DIRECTIONS FOR INSECTICIDES

Approximately 70 percent of the insecticides sold in retail stores are wasted, according to J. J. Davis, head of Purdue University's entomology department. And the reason is not because insecticides are ineffective, but because the purchaser fails to read the directions on the container that tell him how to use the material properly.

Davis says there's no excuse for failure to control insects by use of insecticides, because the federal laws now require that insecticide labels tell what they contain and for what insects they are effective against. In most cases, the labels tell how to use the materials.

Davis urges buyers of insecticides to read carefully all label directions, and understand them so that they can insure good insect control on their crops.

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**WORLD'S FIRST MINIATURE
KIDS RANCH**

The first ranch in the world, designed, built and maintained exclusively for children was announced today by Ben Jack Cage, Texas industrialist.

The ranch, on which construction is to start immediately, is The Lazy C Kid's Ranch and will be built on several acres of Mr. Cage's sprawling horse and cattle ranch in Sugarland, Texas, 23 miles southwest of Houston. It will be immediately adjacent to the famous single acre of land being sold to the public in two-square-inch plots, at 25 cents a plot.

In announcing the plans, Mr. Cage said "The fascination which a ranch holds for children is well known. But too often the adult-sized operations rule out participation by young people. The Lazy C Kids' Ranch will be for children only, and they can participate to their hearts' content."

The ranch will be open year round and children whose parents hold a deed to one of the two-square-inch plots will be admitted free. An exact reproduction of the full-sized Lazy C Ranch, the kids ranch will be used for raising miniature horses, cattle and certain other small varieties of animals. The working techniques will be those of the adult Lazy C Ranch. Hence children will have the opportunity to inspect ranch life on their own level, to learn from it, to work and play on it, and to benefit from the knowledge of ranch life and operation that can be gained only from first hand experience.

The children's ranch house, stables and corral will be approximately two-thirds the size of ordinary ranch buildings. Mr. Cage also announced plans to use the small buildings for annual rodeos and stock shows for children. Only animals raised by children will be ridden or exhibited and in the case of the stock shows, animals bought and sold will be priced on a child's allowance level.

Upon completion of the ranch proper, plans are to invite representatives of Texas industries to prepare and display working models of their equipment. Exhibits already anticipated include an oil derrick, a cotton gin, and a chemical plant.

"Thus," Mr. Cage said, "we hope to provide a genuine kid's eye view of Texas, from which children can gain an interest and an understanding which may result in their future activity in the growth and prosperity of the entire West."

Recently, acting on the theory that people would like to own a small portion of Texas land, primarily to assure themselves Texas braggin' privileges, Cage offered a single acre of his Lazy C Ranch for sale in two-square-inch plots at 25 cents each. Buyers receive a legal warranty deed to their property and may, if they choose, have it registered. The deeds are being sold in over 100,000 outlets throughout the country, and will serve as admission tickets for

children to The Lazy C Kids' Ranch.

President and honorary foreman of the Lazy C and The Lazy C Kids' Ranch is Capt. M. T. (Lone Wolf) Gonzauillas, of Texas Ranger fame. Working foreman is veteran cowhand Jim Luman. One of the last links with the days when the gun was law, Gonzauillas' ability with a pistol earned for him the respect and fear of outlaws, against whom he often fought alone, unwilling as he was to endanger his colleagues. Thus, he came to be known as Lone Wolf.

Gonzauillas was in New York this week with Mr. Cage for the formal announcement of the Lazy C Kids' Ranch.

On exhibit in New York were miniature animals of the type which will be raised at the kids' ranch. They included two miniature horses, full grown, though only 30 inches high, miniature chickens, pigeons, Mexican parrots, and one pair of Oil Man's Gophers, known outside Texas as chinchillas. Completing the stable was a miniature purebred collie dog. The animals were raised by W. B. Parker of the Parker Animal Agency in Studio City, California. Valued at \$15,000 the animals and fowls were flown to New York by the famous Flying Tiger Airlines.

Plans are to open the kids' ranch in the mid-summer, with construction under the supervision of the Houston architectural firm of MacKie and Kamrath.

Meantime, several miniature horses and cows will be housed in the large stables of the Lazy C Ranch where they will be on view to holder of deeds to the two-square-inch plots of Lazy C land.

NO COMMENT

(The column, "No Comment", should not be regarded as necessarily reflective of NAM position or policy, for it is a reporting of incidents and conversations

which its author thinks might be of general interest.)

Immediately after the election of President Eisenhower this Bulletin reported: "The Eisenhower victory should be looked upon more as a reprieve than as an acquittal from the Fair Deal . . .

and it could be a brief one."

Recent developments in Washington definitely tend to confirm that appraisal. The New Deal philosophy of heavy government spending and a continuing mild inflation are barely under the surface. Here are some examples:

Unions and New Deal political groups have opened a campaign to wreck the Eisenhower economy budget. The first move is an effort to persuade Congress to adopt huge spending programs to combat unemployment . . . even though unemployment is decreasing. The basic objective is to create an atmosphere that will help elect New Deal Senators and Representatives this November.

The CIO has held a self-styled "full employment" conference here. Hundreds of union leaders filled the halls of Congress lobbying for the program which includes . . . an increase from \$600 to \$800 in Personal Income Tax exemption . . . increase in the minimum wage from 75 cents to \$1.25 per hour . . . a general increase in all wages . . . more liberal Unemployment Compensation payments . . . an expanded Federal Housing Program . . . and \$3 billion more for public works construction.

Ex-President Truman endorsed most of this program in a recent Atlantic City Speech in which he suggested a political program in opposition to the Eisenhower Administration. This CIO-Truman program would entail expenditures or tax losses totalling at least \$10 billion. Under the present fiscal-tax program, the deficit next year is

contemplated at \$2.9 billion.

Thus the CIO-Truman program would increase the deficit to around \$12 billion. An objective of this is to initiate a lot of federal spending which will make it easier to demand higher wages generally. This CIO-Truman . . . to repeat . . . would wreck completely Mr. Eisenhower's efforts to stabilize the dollar, arrest inflation and curtail government spending so that . . . there can be even more tax reduction than the approximately \$7.33 billion already voted or pending in Congress.

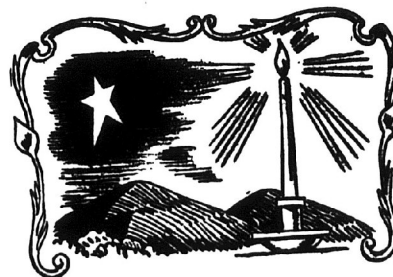

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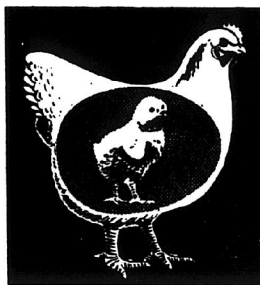

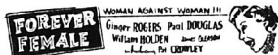

Seven top farm management experts interviewed this month in a national farm magazine generally agreed that protein feed should be bought on a "hand to mouth" basis during the next 6 months.

In the June issue of Capper's Farmer, a Federal Reserve Bank official advised keeping a close check on the price of different kinds of protein. Their relative costs will likely show numerous shifts, he said.

"Watch crop reports on soybeans, cotton and flax," said Leonard Schruben, Kansas State College. "Should a short crop develop, lay in supplies early. However, odds favor much lower prices this fall than in late May or early June."

The economists were then asked: "What has the drouth done to corn prospects?"

They said subsoil moisture is low in several corn belt states and the crop will be dependent on timely rains.

Francis Kutish, Iowa State College farm marketing specialist, said, in general, Iowa has a serious shortage of subsoil moisture.

"The corn crop will depend on current rains to pull it through the summer months," he said. "Odds for an average crop (in Iowa) are only fair — definitely against a bumper crop."

The lack of soil moisture in some areas makes the corn crop more vulnerable than usual, a farm economist pointed out. Normal rainfall, well distributed, will make a good crop in the eastern corn belt, he said.

In answer to whether farmers should resale corn for the government payment of 15 cents a bushel this year, the economists voiced this consensus: "Yes, if you have room for the 1954 crop."

With the 15-cent payment most farmers would receive a net return "of 10 to 20 percent" on their investment in storage facilities, Schruben said.

In reply to what marketing program should hog raisers follow the rest of the year, the farm experts said the June and early July market will bring the top price. They predicted one of the sharpest price breaks on record this fall.

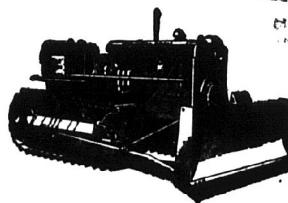

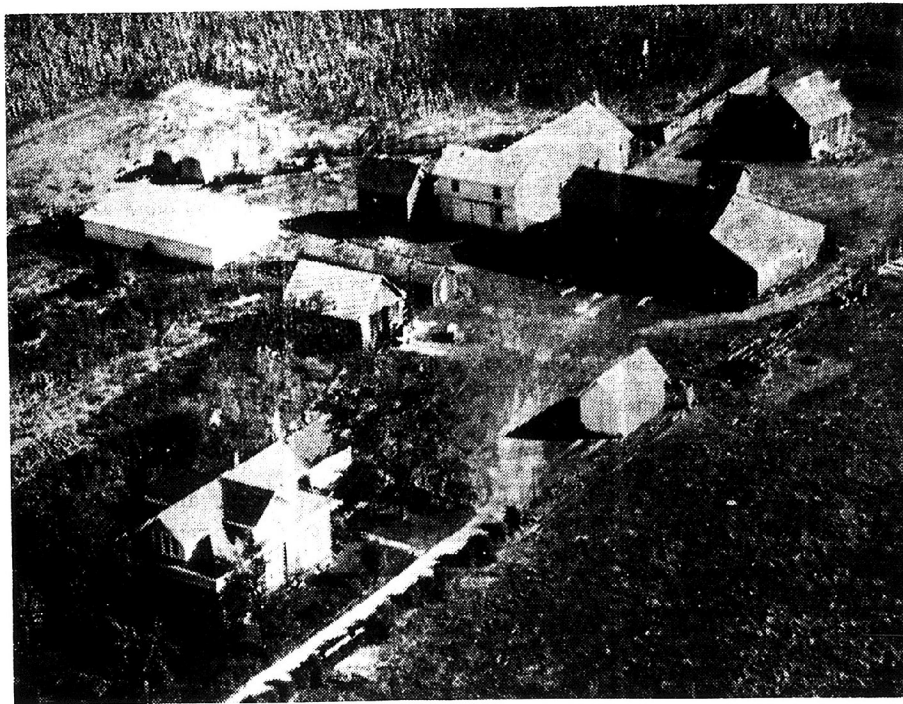

BONUS PIGS

You can get one or two extra pigs a litter by breeding sows twice, states Capper's Farmer. In a Missouri test, sows bred both the first and second days of heat produced 9.8 pigs a litter, while those bred the second day only produced 7.7 pigs a litter. Those bred only on the first day farrowed litters that averaged 8.8 pigs. Only 50 percent of those bred the first day were settled.

SACKS MAKE CHUTE

A handy chute made from two feed sacks, joined with ends open, will spot seed oats from an overhead bin into the fanning mill. An Iowa farmer adjusts the slide opening in the overhead spout so that the grain feeds down at the right rate for the mill, relates Capper's Farmer. The fanned seed empties into an open-end box on the opposite side of the mill, where it is then sacked.

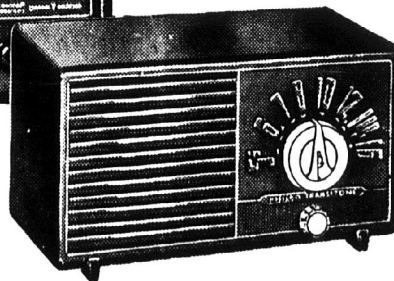

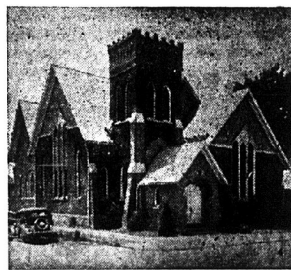

4-H CLUB CHATTER

By Ruth Snellenberger

Dear 4-H Members and Friends,

Since there are many 4-H activities in June, I thought it might be well if I say a little about each of them.

June 9-10-11, 4-H Club Round-up, Purdue University. Only 3% of the enrollment in any county may attend as trip achievement award winners. In this county, the quota was 21. Because the enrollment in 4-H Home Economics projects (mostly girls) is greater than in Agriculture projects (mostly boys), 11 girls were selected and 10 boys. Occasionally a girl is selected for achievement in agriculture projects. The Kosciusko County Farm Bureau sponsors these 4-H Round-up trip awards paying for transportation, housing and registration. The 4-H Awards Committee of the County 4-H Council makes these selections. (More at a later date on how they are made.)

June 12 and 19, Patricia Hunt Days. Any 4-H girl may attend the instructional period scheduled for her club.

Miss Patricia Hunt, director of the Northern Indiana Conservatory in South Bend, will give instruction in correct standing and sitting, good grooming, and poise. A fee of fifteen cents per member will be charged to meet expenses. The Adult leaders have been notified of the schedule of clubs for specific periods. Mothers are invited to attend and watch the instruction given at the Woman's Building on the Fairgrounds, Warsaw.

June 22, County 4-H Home Economics Senior Demonstration Contest, Woman's Building, Fairgrounds. Only two demonstrations per club may be entered. To be eligible demonstrators must be 14 years of age or older with at least three years 4-H club experience. Winners in this contest will represent Kosciusko County in the district contest on July 15. Demonstrations which place in the blue ribbon group have an opportunity to demonstrate in one of the six special demonstration contests at the State Fair if the subject falls in one of the following six classes:

Cherry Pie Baking, Use of Dairy Foods, Use of Raw or Frozen Vegetables, Use of Canned Vegetables, Baking De-

monstration, Home Economics Electric Project. Only one entry in each contest is permitted from each county. The public is invited to watch them.

June 24, County 4-H Home Economics Judging Contest (Morning). Any 4-H member 14 years of age or older with three or more years 4-H club experience is eligible. There is no limit as to the number per club. Contests in the five major projects will be set up. (Next week's Chatter will give more information about judging.) The two high scoring individuals will represent the county in the district contest, July 15.

June 24, Joint Meeting of 4-H Home Economics Adult and Junior Leaders (Afternoon). At this meeting final plans for county dress revue judging and the public showing will be made, instruction in checking record books and taking exhibit entries at the County Fair will be outlined, and the Fair hostess schedule will be set up.

June 29, County 4-H Home Economics Junior Demonstration Contest, Woman's Building, Fairgrounds. Only one demonstration from each of the 26 4-H home economics clubs is permitted. These demonstrations are 5 to 10 minutes long to be given by members 13 years of age and younger. The public is invited to watch them.

June 29 — July 2, State 4-H Junior Leader Training Conference. Five was the quota for Kosciusko County (number permitted relates to county junior leader enrollment) who may attend this

conference. The Warsaw Kiwanis Club pays the expenses of the five Junior leaders named by the 4-H Awards Committee. The conference is sponsored by the State Kiwanis Clubs in cooperation with Purdue University.

Doesn't this sound like a busy month? More next week about judging. Bye.

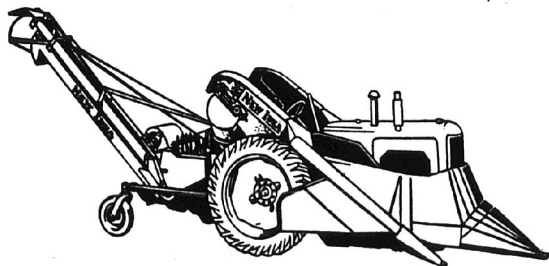

Mrs. Charles Manwaring handed us a number of copies of the old Mentone Gazette, edited by C. M. Smith. The issues start with No. 3, of volume 3, dated January 22, 1887. This was the beginning of the third year of publication of the Mentone paper.

The editor was starting a few news articles about local prominent people,

and the first man written about was Solomon Arnsberger, who moved into Mentone from his farm west of Sevas-topol. He was a member of the town board and was taking an active part in civic affairs. C. H. Adams was the second man to be listed, and he dealt in timber and lumber. David Ault was listed as an itinerant photographer who was currently making Mentone his headquarters.

N. A. Clay was the railway station agent and sold Perkins windmills on the side. R. C. Railsback advertised furniture and undertaking, even to "A good hearse furnished on funeral occasions when desired."

J. W. Sellers, Hardware Store was the place for "Bargains in Building Materials, Blacksmith Supplies," etc.

Hayden Rea manufactured and sold harness goods, and J. B. Middleton handled rugs, patent medicines, silverware, watches, jewelry, magazines, sewing machine needles, and "Eocene" illuminating oil.

W. C. Wilkinson handled trees and shrubs, and Wesley Carpenter was advertising "office days" as Harrison township trustee.

J. Newman was doing blacksmith work and the Gazette Editor advertised he'd give a year's subscription (\$1.50 value) for anyone delivering a load of wood to any of the churches in town. Patent medicine advertising was

LIONS ENJOY DEMONSTRATION ON CORNSTALK PANELS

Richard Lewis, a student at Purdue University and a brother to Raymond Lewis of Mentone, gave a demonstration to the members of the Mentone Lions Club last Wednesday evening. He has been experimenting with the use of cornstalks to make wall panels for construction work. A strip of plywood is laid into a form and several layers of cornstalks are then placed on the plywood. A phenol resin is placed on the stalks and then a top layer of plywood is put in place. The entire segment is then baked for about two hours to seal the entire section with the resin. Panels can be made any desired thickness, are light in weight and exceeding strong. Buildings made of this material, theoretically, would require no uprights for support.

Mr. Lewis stated the harvesting of the stalks is yet very expensive and resins are being developed with this particular use in mind.

PLAN DAIRY PROGRAM AROUND ROUGHAGES

Lafayette, Ind. — Cost accountants might break down dairy production into such cost units as labor, overhead, disease control and feed. Labor and overhead are usually fixed items, not varying much from year to year. Although disease control is important, it

usually does not represent a very large percentage of total costs; therefore, feed cost is the item the dairyman can do the most about to lower production costs and increase the earnings from his dairy enterprise.

Because roughage, such as pasture, silage and hay, is a cheaper source of nutrients than grain, successful dairy-men are using more and more of it.

The dairy cow is, by nature, a great roughage consumer. A cow in full milk production can and will often consume up to 75 per cent or more of her required nutrients in the form of roughage. Frequently, the ration may be entirely roughage. This depends upon a number of factors, including the cow, previous feeding habits, and quality of roughage on hand. For best results, the roughage used should be palatable, of high quality and nutritious.

For more complete information on lowering dairy feed costs, see your local county agent. Ask for a free copy of Purdue University Station Circular 347, entitled, "Plan the Dairy Program Around Quality Roughage." This short, illustrated booklet contains such information as the daily feed requirements of various breeds of dairy cows and the amount and quality of roughage needed to meet them. Also, the normal carrying capacities of various Indiana pastures are listed.

4-H CLUB CHATTER

By Ruth Snellenberger

Dear 4-H Members and Friends,

Because everyday people do some kind of judging, I feel the judging activities in 4-H club work is a real learning process. It gives the member an experience of looking at and studying several articles before deciding which is the best choice.

Isn't this a procedure we all should do before buying a new appliance, or before deciding which wall paper to select for the living room, or before deciding which feed to use for the chickens? Many other examples might be suggested. It is about this decision-making that I wish to chat with you today.

Some judging activity should be included in every local 4-H home economics club program. How might this be done? For the baking project division II members might each bring to a designated club meeting a plate of six cookies she had baked. The junior or adult leader might discuss with these members (or even all the club members) the characteristics of a good cookie. The baking II bulletin describes

a good cookie and gives a score card for judging. After this discussion each member could look at the plates of cookies, taste a sample, and then decide which one or ones seemed the best. If there are ten plates of cookies it might be difficult to single out one plate as the best by inexperienced judges (Yes, I'll even say difficult sometimes for trained judges!).

After each member had decided which ones are the best, which are not so good, and which seem the poorest, the leader should then have the group discuss why they thought some were best, some not so good, and some the poorest.

In addition to this training in thinking things through before reaching a decision, the 4-H member should be able to learn what might be done to improve the baked product.

Judging activities for other projects could be worked out similarly. Several boxes of sewing equipment could be judged by the first division Clothing project members, cotton anklets by second division Clothing project members, salads by Food Preparation project members, lamp shades by Home Improvement members, canned tomatoes by Food Preservation members, and so forth.

For the County 4-H Home Economics Judging Contest, June 24, the judging procedure is somewhat similar. For each project contest (Baking, Clothing, Food Preparation, Food Preservation, and Home Improvement) there are two classes to be judged (four items in each class) and a written test. The scores from these make the total score for the individual. These

FARM LAND PRICES DIP FIVE PER CENT

Lafayette, Ind.—Hoosiers who are in the market for that "farm you've always wanted" probably won't come across any great windfalls in 1954, but they may find some real estate a little lower priced than the last time they looked a year ago.

The reason is that Indiana farm real estate prices have declined about five per cent during the past year. Howard G. Diesslin, Purdue University agricultural economist, says this decline has been substantially greater for the lower than for the higher quality farm land (8 per cent for "poor" land, not over 3 per cent for "good"). With this 5 per cent drop, Indiana prices are now about 25 per cent above their pre-Korean level.

Barring substantial involvement in the Indo-China War, continues the

farm economist, a continued gradual decline in farm land prices can be expected in the year ahead. However, he feels little change will take place in values as long as hog prices remain in their relatively favorable position.

The four price-depressing factors currently influencing the land market are (1) the cost-price squeeze in agriculture which lowered net farm profit substantially during the past two years; (2) the current general business softness; (3) the prospect for lower hog prices due to larger marketings beginning in late summer; (4) the predominance of lower quality farm real estate listed for sale.

Dr. Diesslin believes most of this moderate decline will continue to take place in the average and below-average quality real estate. However, the buyer shouldn't be too impressed by this, for the better quality farm real estate will still be the best buy on the market.

If legume pastures are getting short, Purdue animal husbandry specialists advise you to turn ewes and lambs in the oats field. Both do well on oats pasture.

Hoosier homeowners should spray for bagworms on evergreens and deciduous trees and shrubs during June. Purdue University entomologists say these pests are easier to kill when small, and if they are killed now, most of their injury can be prevented. Use 4 lbs. of lead arsenate per 100 gallons of water. Other satisfactory insecticides are toxaphene and malathion.

Purdue University horticulturists recommend planting sweet corn each week during June for a continuous crop of nice fall roasting ears. Hoosier Gold, Golden Cross Bantam, Huron and Io-chief are the best yellow hybrids.

1954 FARM INCOME
TO MATCH 1953'S

Hoosier farmers can expect their 1954 net returns to be about the same as in 1953, with conditions permitting favorable returns for efficient sized, well managed farms.

R. H. Bauman, Purdue University agricultural economist, believes that the net cash income for all U. S. farmers may be 5-10 per cent below the 1953 figure, but Indiana incomes will hold up because of more favorable price prospects for some of their principal products, notably hogs and soybeans.

Since the demand for farm products is largely determined by the level of employment and general business conditions, this economist says it is very important to study the prospects for

general business.

General business activity has slipped some in the past year, but the decline has been fairly moderate and gradual. The major part of the business adjustment appears to be over. The nation's gross production went down five per cent between the second quarter of 1953 and the first quarter of 1954. However, the total national production in 1954 is expected to be second only to 1953.

Bauman says that one main reason for this business decline was that production, prior to mid-1953, increased faster than sales and burdensome inventories accumulated at the factory, and wholesale and retail levels. Businessmen decided it was time to cut down on production so that relatively heavy inventories might be trimmed. Other reasons are that federal expenditures have been reduced and there

was a slight dip in consumer spending and business investment in the last half of 1953.

One of the indications that most of the decline is over is the continued high rate of business spending. Recent surveys show that 1954 investments in new plants and equipment will be close to the 1953 rate.

Individual incomes are staying close to boom peaks despite the business decline. Consumer spending is down only

one per cent from the peak 1953 rate. The reduction in federal personal income taxes, which became effective January 1, and in excise taxes April 1, are inducements for consumers to be a stronger force on the market.

For all of these reasons, Bauman feels Indiana farmers won't have to modify operating policies in 1954.

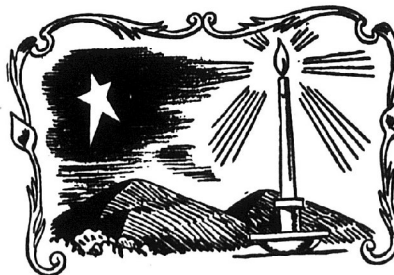

4-H CLUB CHATTER

By Ruth Snellenberger

Dear 4-H Members and Friends,

The organization of a Home Economics Judging contest I'd like to tell about first. Later then I will explain the recommended way to state reasons for the placing order of items within a class.

You may recall that last week I stated for each project contest there were two classes of items to be judged (four items in each class) and a written test. In Baking there will be four butter cakes to make up one class, and four different sets of utensils for preparing a butter cake for baking (the recipe will be given). In Clothing, there will be one class made up of four groups of accessories to be worn with a blouse or sweater and skirt for winter school wear, and a class consisting of four summer skirt

and blouse costumes. In Food Preparation, the classes are (1) a day's menu for high school aged girl, and (2) flower centerpiece for a table decoration at the main meal of the day. For Food Preservation judging canned green beans make up one class, and frozen peaches are the second class. For Home Improvement judging, four different shades for one table reading lamp will be one class, and arrangement of furniture for a living room is the second class.

In this county, the test is given first in each project contest. For the most part the answers to the questions are found in the project bulletins. Thus a girl preparing herself for judging would do well to study those bulletins of the project in which she was judging. For Food Preparation the Purdue mimeograph bulletin H-O 36 "Principles of Flower Arrangements" was suggested as a source for answers to those questions in addition to the project bulletins.

After the test each project contest

participants are divided into groups of four to six who in turn look at each of the classes for about ten minutes. The items in each class are lettered from left to right A-B-C-D. The participant must decide the correct order, selecting one as the best, another as second best and so forth. On a prepared sheet she indicates her idea of the correct order (it might be B-C-D-A or A-D-B-C or something else), and writes reasons why she thinks so.

In scoring the contest, the perfect score is 600—200 for the test, 100 for correct order of placings in each class, and 100 for complete reasons in each class.

Now to help girls stating their reasons, it has been suggested that for your first placing you should tell all the good things about it; if there should be something not so good, mention it last. For the second placing

state that it has all the good points of the first placing except . . . then say the bad things about it. For the third place state that it has the good points of the second place except . . . describe then the bad points. For the last place tell all the bad things first, then mention whatever good there may be. Do you think this will help you organize your thoughts while judging?

I could not talk about judging without expressing heartfelt thanks to the 4-H adult leaders who help collect material for the classes, grade reasons and tests, help register and so forth. Gratefulness is extended to you fathers and other family members too, who get along without mother or older sister when she's helping with 4-H.

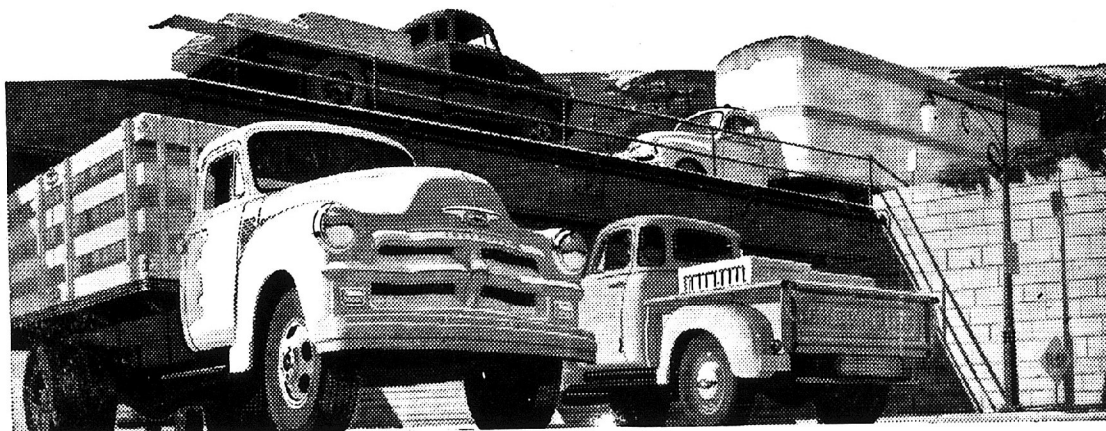

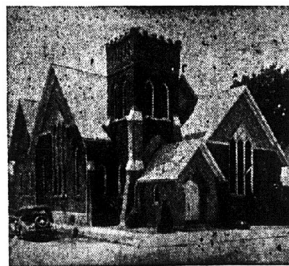

NO COMMENT

by Walter Chamblin, Jr.

A number in Washington look upon the international situation this way: Communism, like early Christianity, is expanding on the basis of ideas and perhaps must be deflected with ideas . . . as force was ineffective against the spread of Christianity . . . and force so far has been equally ineffective against Communism.

This leads some to believe that it will take more than just bullets to win the battle against Communism. After all, Communism and Christianity are the reverse of each other. Christianity dignifies the individual. It opens up a new era to the individual. Its doctrine has grown and spread despite all that ancient kings and emperors could do.

On the other hand, Communism, instead of opening up a new era, returns mankind to an old era . . . the era of the ancient world when the state was supreme and the individual repressed. There are some in Washington who believe that the best answer to Communism is found in teaching the repressed peoples of the world what the individual has accomplished in this nation under the freedom to think for himself.

In this connection, the Capitol has noted with more than passing interest President Eisenhower's statement that "Our military strength and our economic strength are truly one . . . and neither can sensibly be purchased at

the price of destroying the other."

With this statement in mind, it is well to measure just what the Administration has done to abide by this principle with respect to the effect upon our economy of government spending and taxes . . . remembering that the nation is in an age, rather than an instant, of world tension which requires a marshalling of all resources. And it should be kept in mind that there is a danger of over-spending if public attention becomes too distracted by current alarms and frenzies in various parts of the world.

Here is how the appropriations record looks as of the present:

The Administration's requests for \$12.5 billion and actual expenditures new appropriations were reduced about \$7 billion below the total presented in the last Truman budget. The 1954 deficit, as contrasted with the last Truman deficit of \$10 billion, has been cut to approximately \$3 billion. This reduction by Mr. Eisenhower has been effected even though budget receipts this year will be less than the amount estimated when the budget was prepared a year ago.

The budget for the fiscal year 1955 . . . which begins July 1st . . . was submitted to the Congress last January 21. It is the first budget prepared by the Eisenhower Administration. It proposes expenditures of \$65.5 billion . . . receipts of \$62.5 billion . . . with a resultant deficit of \$3 billion. In summary, this means that Mr. Eisenhower reduced the requests for new spending authority by \$15.5 billion or, in other words, from \$71.8 billion to \$56.3 billion. Further, actual expenditures of money previously appropriated during the Truman Administration have been reduced by \$12.3 billion. This is the greatest reduction in proposed government expenditures in history.

Put in specific terms, it means about a 20 percent reduction in the cost of government. Spelled out as applied to the individual, it means that your share of expenditures has been re-

duced on an average from \$486 per year to \$404. This is a reduction of \$82 per person.

On top of this, the Eisenhower Administration has reduced the annual taxes paid by individuals and corporations by slightly more than \$7 billion. Mr. Eisenhower's friends hold that this record in bringing about fiscal stability in the Administration is not only remarkable but exceeds expectations.

4-H CLUB CHATTER

By Ruth Snellenberger

Dear 4-H Members and Friends,

With various 4-H activities and contests taking place in the coming weeks, it seems quite appropriate that I discuss 4-H achievement records.

To a 4-H member I would say, "Your 4-H Achievement Record should portray the real 4-H you." It should reflect personal growth, indicating when "self" is subordinated to service to others.

The 4-H record is a word picture of everything the 4-H member has accomplished, which is a reason to describe record-keeping as "Painting Your 4-H Picture."

The "canvas" upon which the picture is painted is really the 4-H Achievement Record Book. The "colors" which go into the picture are the experience the member has had.

Every "Artist" — the boy or girl

who paints the picture—must have a box of paints from which to work. This paint box is the 4-H Memory Book or My 4-H Box. Into the Memory Book or 4-H Box goes all the material relating to the "artist's" experience in club work, and every experience is a "color" for the 4-H picture.

Actually the 4-H Memory Book or 4-H Box is a place to keep souvenir material such as project records, club stories, pictures, news clippings and mementos, ribbons, certificates and letters.

Considering these items as "colors" let us now think about which colors you, as the artist, would want to use for the 4-H Achievement Record Book. Just those items which summarize your 4-H club activities and tell others about your progress and achievements should be used. These would include pictures showing something you had accomplished for yourself or showing you helping someone else, news-clippings in which your name had been mentioned as doing something, copies

of letters of recognition for awards or for assistance given in some activity, copies of your record project books, and so forth.

In this county this year a 4-H Achievement Record Contest has been set-up with the Lake City Bank of Warsaw sponsoring it by making available to every 4-H member the appropriate cover and informational material to help them prepare such a record. There is a Junior Contest: all 4-H members 13 years of age and under and for all other age members with less than three years club experience. The Senior contest is for members 14 years of age and older with three or more years club experience.

These covers and contents are being distributed from the County Extension Office to the 4-H Adult leaders. The completed 4-H member's Achievement Record Book is due in the County Ex-

tension office after the County Fair but not later than September first. Qualified persons will grade them, naming an honor group for each contest. Members in the Junior contest honor group will receive appropriate pins. The honor group of the Senior contest will be guests at a recognition dinner.

It is anticipated that from the Achievement Record Books in the Senior contest a county winner in each project field will be named. These records will then be submitted for state competition (and perhaps national).

Through this contest it is hoped Kosciusko county will have better 4-H Achievement Record Books to send for state awards. It is hoped too that 4-H members will have a treasured book that in years to come, they'll enjoy looking back through to reminiscence.

PURDUE SUGGESTIONS

Here are two dates Indiana farmers will be hearing more about in the next few weeks—July 27 and 28. The event is the annual two-day State Farm Management Tour. It's slated to be held in Morgan county, according to A. M. Nichter, Purdue agricultural economist.

Purdue University entomologists say that hydrated lime should never be used on cucumbers and melons for beetle control, because it may cause serious stunting and burning of the plants.

If lice or mange is appearing on hogs, spray with lindane or benzene hexachloride (BHC), advise Purdue University animal husbandry specialists. They say one application will usually do a good job of controlling these parasites.

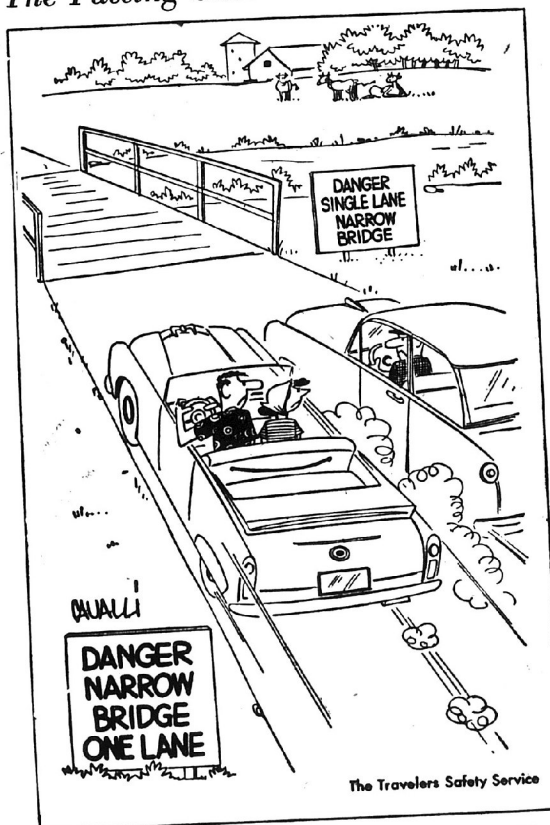

Vacationers this summer are finding they can get good travel buys for their money, the Chicago Motor Club said today.

For example, summer season rates in Florida hotels allow the vacationer a week for the same price he would have to pay for a day or two during the winter.

And in Mexico, the peso has been devaluated, increasing the value of the dollar by 30 per cent. There you can buy gasoline for the equivalent of 16 cents a gallon, a complete tenderloin steak dinner for \$1.30 or fly round trip from Mexico City to Acapulco for \$13.20.

Both bargain spots are accessible by auto, one of the biggest factors in bringing low cost travel to more Americans than ever before.

There are now some 46 million automobiles in this country — almost one to every family — and some 50,000 motor courts, with 2,000 more being built each year.

These facts, plus the fact that a "buyer's market" exists and more persons have paid and staggered vacations, means that a new type of traveler is on the road — the man of moderate income.

Arvid P. Olson, of the Motor Club's travel bureau, says the travel industry is aware of the new traveler and is catering to him.

"The travel industry has been its biggest benefactor by ingeniously working out low rates to meet the demands from the new type of traveler," he said.

"Railroads have family plans allowing the father, only, on certain days to pay full fare while the rest pay half fares. Too, railroad coach travel has been vastly improved with air conditioning and services to the point where it is attracting many who were unwilling to make long train trips before.

"Airlines have had family plans and tourist flights for some time," he said, "but they, too, are increasing their services.

HOOSIER CORN CHAMPION ENROLLS IN '54 CONTEST

Indiana's corn growing champion J. Herbert Roadruck, Brookston, who has produced the two highest yields on record for this state, 199.4 bu. in 1951 and 198.5 bu. per acre in 1953, has enrolled in the 5-Acre Corn Contest for 1954.

Herbert has taken out a life membership in the Indiana Corn Growers' Association and promises to be a contest contender for many years in the future, according to K. E. Beeson, Purdue University agronomist and secretary of the association.

Last year a total of 3,573 corn growers in 80 counties competed, and had their yields officially checked. Of this number, 1947 were adults and 1626 were juniors.

Enrollment in the contest for 1954 is open to adults or juniors, age 12 to 20 years, who become members of the Indiana Corn Growers Association. Membership is accepted at any county extension office. To participate in the 5-acre contest and have yields checked requires that each member have at least 5 or more acres of corn.

The Indiana Corn Growers' Association

awards rose gold medals for yields of 150 bushels or more, green gold medals for yields of 125 to 150 bushels, gold medals for yields of 100 to 125 bushels and silver medals for yields of 85 to 100 bushels per acre. Bronze medals for yields of 75 to 85 bushels are awarded only to junior members.

Each contestant is furnished a report blank on which a record of his agronomic practices is kept and which furnishes very helpful information on the best corn growing practices when summarized by Purdue extension agronomists.

4-H CLUB CHATTER

By Ruth Snellenberger

Dear 4-H Members and Friends,

With County Fair time fast approaching the big question is: Will all 4-H members complete their projects?

Actually four persons are responsible that a 4-H member complete her or his projects, according to a group of 4-H leaders and parents discussing the problem of members' completions. And I heartily agree.

First, the 4-H member herself is responsible to complete the work requirements she agreed to do when she signed the 4-H enrollment card. In one sense of the word, a 4-H member signed an agreement (or a contract) with the adult leader, the parent, and the agricultural extension service to do the work requirements as set for the particular project(s) indicated. This making a decision willfully, abiding by it, and take the consequence is a learning step in growing up, in my opinion. This, it seems to me, is one of the many phases of 4-H Club work which helps build better citizens.

The second person responsible that the 4-H member complete her work requirements is the parent who signed the enrollment card. In reality, it is assumed that both parents share this responsibility. Many of you parents know better than I do, how younger members (sometimes older ones too) need to be checked on — yes, prodded to be sure they are completing all their work requirements. For this reason I earnestly urge all 4-H parents to take time, go over with your daughter(s) and/or son(s) the work requirements of their projects to learn if the mini-

mum amount of work is being done and recorded in the project record book.

If parents are not sure or do not understand some part of the work required, contact the 4-H adult leader in your community. Or if my help is needed, Friday afternoons is my regular time to be in the county extension office, and I'm frequently in parts of other days of the week.

The third person responsible is the local 4-H adult leader. You see, she, too, signed the 4-H member's enrollment card. Since almost all of the 4-H home economics leaders are volunteer leaders, who are busy with their own home and family responsibilities along with other community activities, they really have little time to give to check on some member who isn't doing her work.

The fourth person which this discussion group named as responsible that a 4-H member complete is the junior leader. If an adult leader has a dependable junior leader she can ask her to go to the various member's homes to learn about the progress with their projects. However, many junior leaders work away from home so their time is limited, too.

Some of the reasons a 4-H member should be sure to complete her project (s) requirements are: (1) It gives her a personal satisfaction; (2) her 4-H record is better; (3) she has not let her fellow club members down (85% membership completion is needed for a standard club — higher percentage for an honor club); (4) she may be eligible for some current awards; (5) both her parents and her leader will be happier with her; and (6) she will have helped both the county and state completion record.

How about it, 4-H'ers? Are you a quitter?

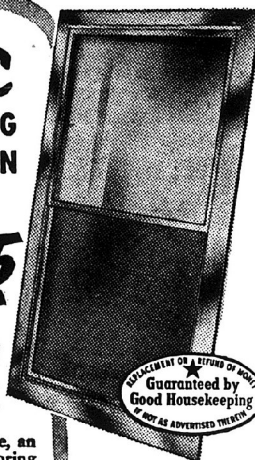
