National Used Car Week, March 5 to 12

New York, Feb. 27-A national drive to sweep the American automo bile industry out of the current recession and stimulate American busin ess generally was announced here to-

- day by Alvan Macauley, speaking for every American automobile maunfacturer and the nation's 46,000 automobile dealers.
- The campaign, to be known as ntional Used Car Exchange Week sch duled for March 5 to 12, is an
- outgrowth of recent conferences at the White House between President Roosevelt and leaders of the automobile industry, Mr. Macauley said.

The campaign is timed at the outset of the spring selling season when both new and used cars usually begin to move in greatest volumn. It is vaimed primarily at stimulating the disposal of used car stocks now in

- dealer hands. Once this is accomplished, a substantial increase in car manufacturing schedules and employment of wage earners in the automobile factories is anticipated. "The motor car industry, said Ma-
- Cauly, "is generally credited with showing the way out of the last depression. Today, the automobile manufacturers, their suppliers, the nation's 46,000 dealers and allied indust ies are launching a similar drive.
- "Until the large stock now on dealers hands can be removed and dealeis can begin to handle a normal volume of new cars, factories will be forced to continue on part-time, and thousands of men in the motor car plants must remain either out-ofwork or on part-time schedules.

A lustrum was the solemn offering made for expiation and purification by one of the censors in the name of the Roman people at the conclusion of the census. The animals offered in sacrifice were a boar, a sheep and a bull. They were led around the assemblage on the Campus Martius before being sacrificed. As the census was quinquennial, the word lustrum came to signify a period of five years.

Latin Mottoes on Great Seal On the obverse of the Great Seal of the United States is the familiar motto, "E Pluribus Unum," translated, "One from Many." On the reverse are two Latin mottoes. The one above the design is "Annuit Coeptis," translated as "He (God) Prospered Our Endeavors." The lower one is "Novus Ordo Seclorum" and is translated as "A New Order of the Ages."

Six-Cylinder Cars Given Preference

They gave our farm the highest rank of any Leghorn breeder east of the Mississippi River according to the Poultry Item award for 1936-1937. This award was based on the production of fifty birds in official egg laying contests with an average of 264.4 eggs and 274.2 points. Our birds won the Hunterdon County egg laying contest in New Jersey, establishing an all-time high record for official egg laying contests conducted in that state. Our birds also ranked first among White Leghorns at the 1936-1937 Rhode Island Contest. We had the second high pen at Central New York con test. Hanson from Oregon won this contest setting an alltime high record for United States Contests. His birds averaged 313 eggs. We tied with another poultry farm for the livability trophy awarded by Hatchery Tribune with a livability for one year of 93.8%. This livability was based on an entry of five pens (65 birds) in official contests, 61 of which were returned to us at the end of the year.
