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National Used Car Week, March 5 to 12

New York, Feb. 27—A national drive to sweep the American automobile industry out of the current recession and stimulate American business generally was announced here today by Alvan Macauley, speaking for every American automobile manufacturer and the nation's 46,000 automobile dealers.

The campaign, to be known as National Used Car Exchange Week, scheduled for March 5 to 12, is an outgrowth of recent conferences at the White House between President Roosevelt and leaders of the automobile industry, Mr. Macauley said.

The campaign is timed at the outset of the spring selling season when both new and used cars usually begin to move in greatest volume. It is aimed primarily at stimulating the disposal of used car stocks now in dealer hands. Once this is accomplished, a substantial increase in car manufacturing schedules and employment of wage earners in the automobile factories is anticipated.

"The motor car industry, said Macauley, 'is generally credited with showing the way out of the last depression. Today, the automobile manufacturers, their suppliers, the nation's 46,000 dealers and allied industries are launching a similar drive.

"Until the large stock now on dealers hands can be removed and dealers can begin to handle a normal volume of new cars, factories will be forced to continue on part-time, and thousands of men in the motor car plants must remain either out-of-work or on part-time schedules.

The eighth grade general science students are studying about magnets and electricity. We like this work very much but it is near time for our monthly test and we're wondering if we won't change our minds.

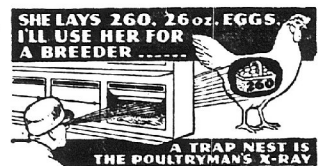
The Eighth Grade civics class has taken up the study of how a bill becomes a law. We find that a bill passes several severe tests before it can become a national or state law.

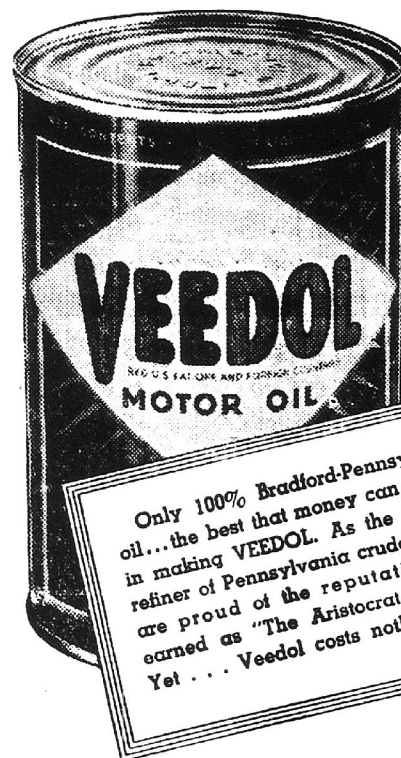
Injured In Fall

Two Minute Sermon

STANDING BY ONE'S GUNS: In the book of Mark is to be found a number of instances in which Christ appeared in places, and in company, and under circumstances that the Pharisees chose to criticize and because of which they attempted to impugn his motives and purpose. In all of these situations, whether he was eating with the publican or the sinner or the social outcast, he never sacrificed anything of his Christly manner or bearing. Though he mingled freely with all classes he did not find it necessary to lower his own standards. In it all, and through it all, he was still the Christ.

I think there is a striking lesson

here for everyone. There is no criticism of the man who mingles with all classes and kinds of people as long as he maintains unsullied and untarnished his own ethical and moral standards. Christ proved that it could be done, and, in doing it, sacrificed nothing essential. It is a common saying today that one must go with the crowd and do as the crowd does if one is to get along. When it comes to the sacrifice of any important principle the statement is merely an excuse, an alibi from one who lacks the courage to be individual and to stand for the things he believes to be right. There come times in the lives of everyone when self respect is worth more than the praise of the crowd, and there is no one less happy than the man who has secured this praise at the conscious cost of his self respect.

Sources of Vitamin G

Sources of vitamin G are: whole milk (fresh, evaporated, dried), buttermilk, cheese, eggs, meat liver (beef and pork), kidney, spleen, heart, lean cuts of beef, pork or lamb, salmon, green leaves, mustard, turnip tops, kale, beet tops, carrot tops, collards, spinach, broccoli, watercress, bananas, wheat germs, and yeast. Vitamin G withstands the heat of cooking but is destroyed when soda or other alkaline substances are present.

China Supplies Tungsten

Sixty per cent of tungsten, that rare whitish-gray metal, comes from China to the United States. It has a higher melting point than any other known metal, 6,000 degrees Fahrenheit, and is used in electric lamp filaments, radio tubes and high-speed tool steel.

Duck Laden With Oil

Duck in the Far North is so laden with oil and toughened from exposure that it is barely edible.

Chinese Widely Spoken

Chinese is the most widely spoken language, and it has been estimated that at least 400,000,000 speak it in its various dialects. English is next, with 200,000,000, followed by Russian, 140,000,000; Hindustani, 100,000,000; German, 80,000,000; French and Spanish, 70,000,000 each; Japanese, 65,000,000; Portuguese, 60,000,000; Italian, 50,000,000; Polish, 16,000,000; Greek, 9,000,000; Serbo-Croatian, 8,000,000, and Bohemian, 7,000,000. Although there are about 5,000 languages spoken in the world, no other language has 7,000,000 speaking it.

Plants Used as Narcotics

Two interesting plants used as narcotics or stimulants are the poppy and tobacco. Chinese originated opium smoking and the Indians tobacco smoking. Tea was supposed to prevent dropsy, to overcome rawness, to vanquish superfluous sleep, to purify a person's humor and a hot liver. A Japanese tea room is generally kept bare and simple. One poet describes drinking tea as follows: the first cup moistens the throat, the second relieves loneliness, the third revives memories of books and stimulates him to write new ones, the fourth causes sweating, the fifth completes purification, six summons him to the gods, and the seventh welcomes him into their presence.

The Original Uncle Sam

There was an original Uncle Sam. His name was Samuel Wilson, and he lived in Troy, N. Y., where he was in charge of inspecting and stamping goods purchased for the government. He was nicknamed "Uncle Sam," because of his own name and the fact that he stamped all government goods "U. S." Instead of being the long and lanky symbolic figure known as "Uncle Sam," he was short and stocky. Uncle Sam died in 1854.

Clouds Not Water Vapor

The weather bureau says that clouds are not made of water vapor. Water vapor is an invisible gas. When air which contains water vapor is cooled sufficiently some of the vapor condenses into tiny water droplets or, at temperatures below freezing, ice crystals. Fog and clouds are composed of such water droplets or ice crystals.

"Who Was David's Mother?"

The question, "Who was David's mother?" is often quoted as unanswered as Sam Lloyd's puzzle "How old was Ann?" King David, who reigned over Israel about 1000 B. C., was the son of Jesse of Bethlehem. He had several brothers and sisters, but the name of his mother is not recorded in the Bible.

Sir George Downing, who built and after whom London's famous street is named, was Harvard college's second graduate in its first graduating class in 1642.

The composition and proportions of these will vary with the composition of the original vegetable or animal matter.

Earliest Codification of Roman Law

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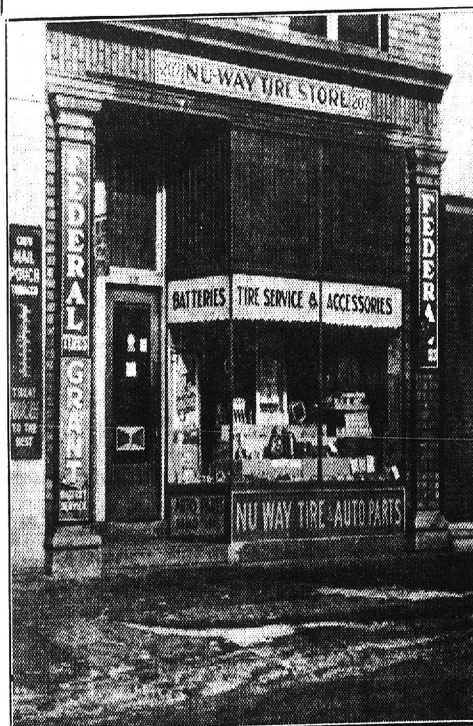

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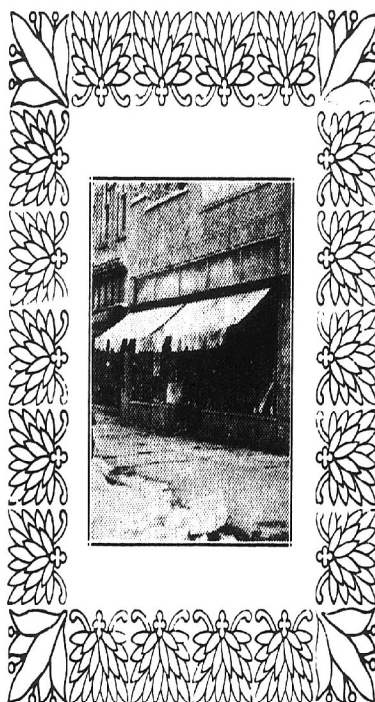

LOAFING CHRISTIANS: Not long ago I attended a session of a men's Sunday school class. There were twenty-five men present out of an enrollment of sixty. Every one on the roll was a member of the church, and their ages ranged from thirty to sixty. An effort was being made to get the membership out, and the teacher called for volunteers to see absent members during the week and extend an invitation to them to be present next Sunday. I was amazed to see but six of the twenty-five offer their services in the campaign. The offer came after a most earnest appeal by the teacher for help.

I was told that this was the average interest manifested by the members of the group toward work of this kind in the class. Something is wrong with the training and the teaching of such a group that no more responsibility was felt for the program of the class than was shown here. Had this been a group of young boys I would not have thought so much of it, but here was a group

of men who were the very back bone of their congregation. They had reached the age when their responsibility to their church was evident to them. They should have been intensely interested not only for the success of their class but for the cause they represented, yet with stolid indifference they refused to spend five minutes during the week in the service of their church.

I left the class session feeling that I had been present in a group who were willing to let it appear by mere attendance they were interested in their church, but who were unwilling to give the slightest service to its cause. I wonder how deep a cause goes that does not inspire some measure of willing service.

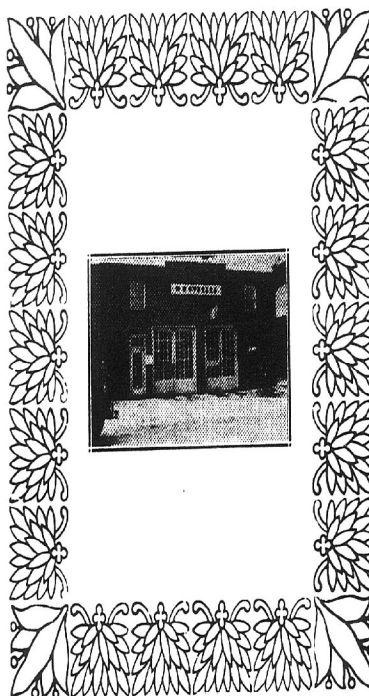

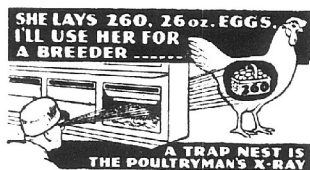

As the census was quinquennial, the word lustrum came to signify a period of five years.

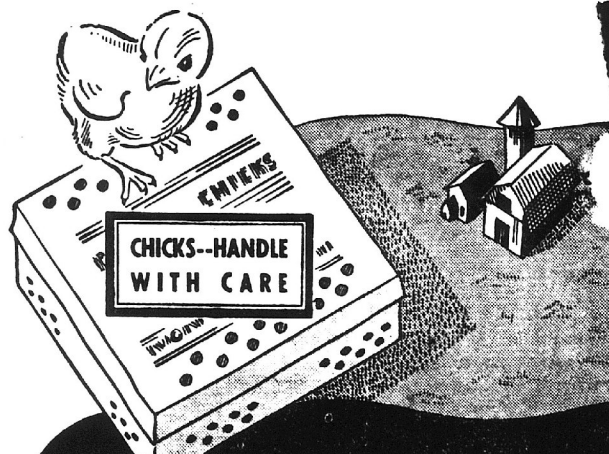

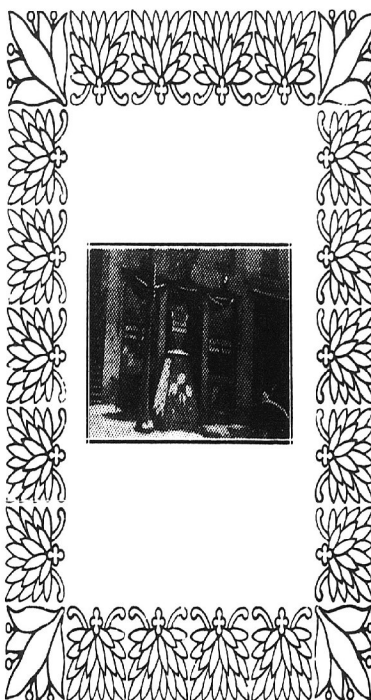
