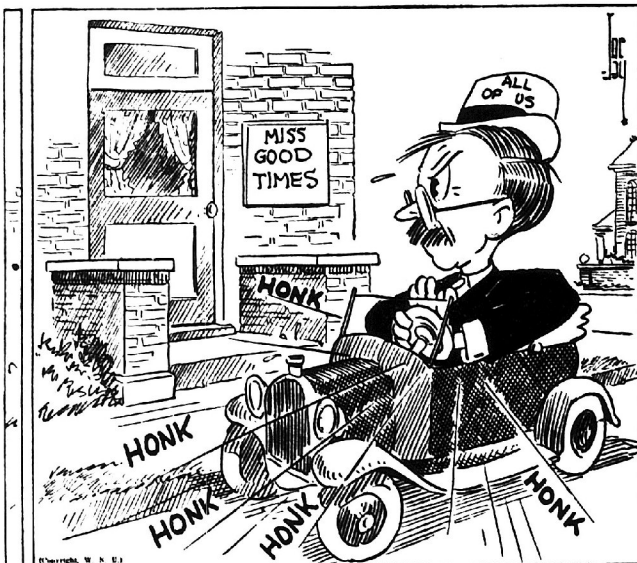
SHIPPING ASSOCIATION

DE KALB HYBRID CORN

PRODUCES HIGH YIELDS

The following report of the DeKalb five acre corn growing contest was submitted by Leroy Norris, authorized local dealer for the DeKalb Agricultural Association.

Mr. Evan Sanderson of Flora achieved the distinction of winning first place in the state of Indiana in the DeKalb Hybrid Corn Growing Contest during this past season. Mr. Sanderson's yield, figured on a No. 2

corn basis, was 146.83 bushels per acre.

In arriving at this yield, representative sections of the field were husked, the corn shelled, a moisture test taken and the yield figured on the basis of 15.5% moisture, which is equivalent to No. 2 corn. Two people who were not directly connected with the contestant checked the yield on this five acre field and the results were signed by a notary public.

The winner of the contest in the entire corn belt was Mr. John P. Byson of Algona, Iowa, with a yield of 178.26 bushels per acre. The state winners were: Illinois—S. A. Penda-mis of Swan Creek with 160.65 bushels per acre; Iowa—Beryl Fleenor of Yarmouth with 153.37 bushels per acre; Indiana—Evan Sanderson of Flora with 146.83 bushels per acre; Nebraska—Louis Stevens of Hartington with 132.46 bushels per acre; and Minnesota—W. C. Schultz of Garden City with 121.5 bushels per acre.

Dr. Allen B. Surguy Expires At Residence

Dr. Allen B. Surguy, retired physician, passed away at his home near Talma Friday morning, March 10, at the age of 91 years. He had been in ill health for several months, but the immediate cause of his death was a heart disease.

The deceased was born in Fulton county in 1847, the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Surguy. He enlisted in the Civil war where he served on the Flagship "Silver Cloud" which operated on the Mississippi river between Cairo, Ill., and the Gulf of Mexico. After the war he took up the study of medicine. He first practiced in Etna Green, Ind., but later went to Chicago where he was a staff physician at the Cook county hospital for eight years. Dr. Surguy then went to Rochester, Ind., where he practiced until his retirement several years ago.

In 1896 he was united in marriage to Stella Irvin, and moved to a farm near Talma where he resided until the time of his death. To this union were born three sons, George and John, deceased, and Fred of near Palestine. Dr. Surguy was a member of the Talma Christian church and of the G. A. R. of Kokomo. He was the last Civil war veteran of New Castle township.

Survivors include the widow, Stella Surguy; one son Fred Surguy; four grandchildren, Rollie at home, and LaMarie, Jacqueline and Rowena of near Warsaw; one sister, Mrs. Anna Turner of LaPorte, and a few other relatives and many friends.

Funeral services were held at the Surguy home Sunday afternoon at two o'clock with Rev. Kennedy officiating. Burial was in Reister cemetery, with the American Legion conducting services at the grave.

CHARACTER TRAINING

A seventh grade boy who had been persistently stealing from the school garden went to this same garden one morning to pick his own favorite watermelon, which he had carefully tended throughout the summer, and discovered that it had disappeared during the night. After this he took a different attitude toward theft. He had been stealing with out the slight est compunction, but as soon as he found himself a victim of some else's disregard for property rights, a new light dawned on his mind. The boy immediately went to the principal of the school and voluntarily confessed his wrong doing and promised that this situation would never happen again. "I never knew before how it felt to lose something that I had worked for," was the explanation that came from his changed heart.

This seventh grade boy promised to obey the Golden Rule, "Put yourself in the other fellow's place."

Why can't more of us follow this rule? If we did there would be no need for laws, police to enforce them, and positively no need for wars or controversy between nations. What a wonderful world we would have to live in if each one of us would try his best to live up to this rule.

Unselfishness is the fundamental

part of this rule. If we were unselfish we would want to give more than was expected of us. Let us think of a part of Christ's Sermon on the Mount. "If any man will sue thee at the law, and take away thy coat, let him have thy cloak also."

Thoughtfulness is important too. More often than not, the wrong we do others and the good we fail to do are the results of sheer ignorance and thoughtlessness on our part. Let us take for example the effects of giving away to bad temper. Our biting words hurt our companions, the objects of our wrath. That is exactly what we want them to do, but on the other hand if they are those who love us there is perhaps a permanent cooling of that love. There are two great foes of friendship and love, in fact, of everything that binds men together in our too often lonely lives; one of these is selfishness, the other is bad temper. Let us try to keep control of our temper and be more willing to give.

The child as well as adults must think of others as much as himself. Team work is the best way to teach children this way of thinking. Give the child someone to play with and to share his playthings with, because learning to share when he is small is much easier than learning it when he is grown.

The Use of Shekels

SAINT PATRICK

The Patron Saint of Ireland, whose feast day, the 17th of March, is celebrated as "Saint Patrick's Day" in every part of the world to which the Irish have penetrated, is best-known of all the saints. He was born in Scotland, near the modern Dunbarton and at his baptism was given the name of Succath. His life seems to reader of modern times most romantic and adventurous. At the age of sixteen he was captured by pirates from Ireland and carried to that island where for six years he tended the flocks of an Ulster Chieftain. During these years of his slavery he became a devoted Christian and after his escape to France entered monastic life. Directed by a vision to return as a missionary to Ireland, he obeyed the call in 432, and for the rest of his life worked zealously in various parts of the island. His labors were miraculously successful. The statement may be accounted almost literally true that he "found Ireland all heathen and left it all Christian," for he found over 300 churches and personally baptized over 12,000 people.

Naturally many legends grew up about the name of this popular saint, the best known of all being the one which represents him as charming the snakes of Ireland by his music so that they followed him to the seashores, where they were driven into the water and drowned.

Indeed, most that is told about Saint Patrick is little more than legendary, for though he left an autobiography, or Confession, written in crude Latin, this places the emphasis on his work and not on his life. Many relics of this venerable man were held sacred for a thousand years, when in the Reformation some were destroyed. At least one, his bell, is said yet to be preserved in the Museum of Arts and Sciences in Dublin. Much study has been bestowed upon him, but even the facts outlined above are by no means without controversy.

TRAITS OF A GOOD SECRETARY

One study of secretarial duties and traits was made by Charters and Whitley. A part of the study deals with personality as a factor in the success of a secretary. The following quotation will help you to understand how the data for this study were gathered.

"A number of employers were interviewed in order to find the secretarial qualities in which employers are especially interested, the things which secretaries do which please employers or particularly irritate them, the reasons for discharge, the qualities in which employers would like to improve their present secretaries etc."

In order to define the meaning of the traits, some of the suggestive trait-actions listed by the employers interviewed are used here. These trait-actions serve to focus attention in the classroom upon the actions which best express the desired traits. Eighty-six percent of the employers interviewed ranked Accuracy first. Accuracy, Responsibility, Dependability and Intelligence are the four that were ranked the highest by the employers.

Here are some rules that the good secretary will follow:

1. Does not make mistakes in typing.
2. Does not make mistakes in computing.
3. Spells and pronounces persons' names correctly.
4. Pays attention to details.
5. Files material under the proper headings.
6. Does not make mistakes in keeping records.
7. Gets the exact information requested.
8. Does not lose papers.
9. Does not make mistakes in transcribing dictation.
10. Does not guess when information is desired.
11. Sees that every letter is perfect before it goes out.
12. Checks all work.
13. Does not send out a letter unsigned.
14. Does not make mistakes in proof reading.
15. Takes details off the employer's shoulders.
16. Does not have to be told everything that must be done.

17. Sees that the employer has at hand everything in the way of detail that he needs in the course of a big job.

18. Is punctual.

19. Gets work out on time.

20. Is regular in attendance at work.

21. Works as well when the employer is not there as when he is.

22. Learns a new terminology quickly.

23. Can grasp an idea from just a suggestion.

24. Does not have to be told the same things over and over.

25. Does not make the same mistakes again and again.

26. Learns new work quickly.

27. Does not give the dictator a letter which fails to make sense.

28. Does not have to be told to correct obvious mistakes in work.

29. Is right there when needed.

30. Works consistently, not well one day and inaccurately or erratically the next.

THE MIRACLE OF FREEDOM: In Acts is told the story of Peter's miraculous deliverance from prison. Even though behind prison bars and chained between two guards, his bonds were loosed and he walked from prison a free man.

As we study this lesson today two thousand years after, we do not understand how Peter's release was effected. We attempt to explain it by merely saying it was a miracle, an answer to prayer.

Men do not escape prisons and prison bars in that way today, but they escape in ways that are just as miraculous from the bonds of sin that bind them as securely as the chains that held Peter. It may be a miracle if we choose to explain it that way, it may be in answer to a prayer, it may be that God has a need for such a man some place in his scheme of things, as he did Peter. Whatever the reason may be, we have seen men throw off the bonds of a sin that bound them fast, that stifled all the inner and better things of their lives, and step out before the world a new man—a free man to live a useful and a helpful life, and to achieve happiness and contentment that he never before knew existed. The freeing of Peter from prison was a miracle, as truly as it was the freeing of Peter from the chains of Agrippa's prison.

Composed 'Rock of Ages'

"Rock of Ages," one of the most popular hymns, was composed under unusual circumstances. In 1775 in England, says Collier's Weekly, Augustus Toplady during a storm took shelter in the cleft of a large rock at Barrington Coombe in Somerset and while waiting for the rain to stop, wrote this famous song on the only piece of paper he could find, a playing card, the six of diamonds.
