SHORTAGE OF SEEDLINGS

Shortage of several species of trees for spring planting, a result of the hundreds of orders received from private landowners in recent weeks, was reported today by Frank Wallace, acting commissioner of the Department of Conservation. While the number of trees for spring planting this year is the highest that the state nurseries have ever produced, interest in reforestation has increased more rapidly.

All applications for trees to be used in windbreak, woodlot or general reforestation plantings are accepted subject to the supply of the species available and are filed for shipping in the order received.

Funeral Rites Held For Merrill C. Carey

Funeral services were held at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, February 26 at the Warsaw Methodist church, for Merrill Cecil Carey, 57, with Rev. Dougherty, officiating. Death occurred at the home of his father-in-law, Obe Haimbaugh, three and one-half miles southwest of Mentone, after her had been seriously ill for only the past week. He had, however, suffered from angina pectoris for a number of years.

Mr. Carey was born in New Burlington, Ind., Dec. 8, 1883, the son of a Methodist minister, Rev. A. J. Carey. His early home life took him throughout Indiana and portions of the East. He was a graduate of Indiana university law school and had previously studied two years at De Pauw. He had been a member of a Philadelphia law firm until ill health forced his retirement from law practice. He then took a position with the Fisher Bros. Paper Co., where he was employed at the time of his death. He was united in marriage Oct. 8, 1929, to Edna Haimbaugh, who survives him.

Surviving relatives besides the widow are two sons, Jack and Robert, of Kingsport, Tenn.

Active in social life, he was past commander of the Warsaw Knight's Templar. A prominent Mason, he was a member of the Blue Lodge Masonic order, of Utica, New York, member of Chapt. 8, council 88 and commandery 10 of the Warsaw Masonic lodge. He was also president of the Warsaw Travelers Protective Association.

Literary Criminal Now in Cell After Sensational Theft

Directs Aids in Stealing Shakespeare Folio From Library.

BUFFALO.—Impossible feats always have held a hypnotic fascination for a certain few quixotically minded people.

For them, no mountain is too high to assail, no abyss too great to start across on a tightrope, no problem too knotty to tackle.

It was the spirit of such endeavor, perhaps, which a year ago led a 22-year-old Buffalo, N. Y., draftsman to conceive the Homeric project of stealing the Shakespeare first folio, one of the most bizarre modern crimes.

It was a venture comparable in principle to the classic theft of the Mona Lisa, and equally impossible of successful completion.

The Shakespeare folio, the first compilation of the bard's plays printed in 1623, was in the library of Williams college at Williamstown, Mass., and was one of the few copies extant.

They are worth upwards of \$50,000, and the ownership of each is known to thousands of rare-book connoisseurs.

Had Experience.

William Kwiatkowski already had considerable experience in illicit literary transactions, so the assistant district attorney's office says. In 1936 he sent to a magazine as his own work a story that had been published by another magazine 14 years before, and had been discovered. He was put on probation upon his agreement to return the \$300 he had been paid.

This time he laid more careful and elaborate plans.

To do the actual stealing, he enlisted a friend, Donald Lynch, and assigned his own younger brother, Edward Kwiatkowski, 19, to assist.

Last February 7, Edward drove Lynch to Williamstown, and the latter, equipped with the simple disguise of a pair of scholarly shell-rimmed glasses, and carrying a brief case, walked into the Williams library.

To the librarian, Miss Lucy Osborne, he presented a letter forged in the name of the president of Middlebury, Vt., college, identifying the bearer as a Middlebury professor, and asked to see the folio.

Miss Osborne escorted Lynch to a private room and put the valuable volume on a table before him.

Exchanged for Dummy.

The minute she left the room, Lynch slipped the book into his brief case and substituted a dummy he had brought. He waited a few moments and then rushed out, affecting restrained excitement.

The folio was so marvelous, he exclaimed, that he must call his wife to come see it. Then he vanished.

The theft was discovered in a few minutes. Massachusetts state police quietly arranged observation of every bookstore.

Whatever strange plans he may have had for disposing of the folio probably never will be learned, because five months later, while Kwiatkowski was still biding his time, Lynch became overburdened by his guilty knowledge and went to the police in Albany.

They turned him over to the Massachusetts police, who took him to Buffalo, where the whole group presently were rounded up by federal agents.

A short time ago William Kwiatkowski, the "master mind," was sentenced to two years in prison. His brother-in-law, the financier, and Lynch, the actual thief, got a year and a half; and the younger Kwiatkowski a two-year sentence, suspended.

Handless Hunter Kills Giant Bear in Mountains

WALLA WALLA, WASH.—A man who lost his hands seven years ago has the hide of a 400-pound bear to prove his prowess as a hunter.

He is John Tamplin. And he shot the bear in the Blue mountains of Oregon.

After Tamplin lost his hands by amputation he supervised the making of mechanical hands which he now wears. With the artificial members, he learned to shoot a rifle and soon was an adept rifleman.

A Blue mountain rancher, Jake Klucker, told how the huge bear had charged at Tamplin after Tamplin had fired two shots at it and missed. The third shot dropped the bear at Tamplin's feet.

'Romance Knows No Age,' Bridegroom, 90, Insists

SANGER, CALIF. — "Romance knows no age," says the Rev. J. M. Spencer, 90 years old, who revealed that he had married Mrs. Belle Hurst, 55, of Oklahoma City after a whirlwind letter writing campaign.

A matrimonial agency put him in touch with Mrs. Hurst last July, he said, but he had told her that he was only 80, for fear she would not be interested if she knew he was 90.

"I think I've got a prize package and I know we'll be happy," said Spencer, a bridegroom for the fourth time. "Nobody ever took me to be older than 65 anyway."

SUGGEST PREVENTION OF RICKETS IN CHICKS

By SCOTT HINNERS
Purdue Extension Dept.

Each year many broods of chicks suffer from rickets. Often the owners may not suspect trouble because the chicks do not always die. Exposure to direct sunshine is the best way to prevent this trouble.

The symptoms of rickets are nervousness and soft rubbery beaks. When these symptoms appear add some vitamin D supplement to the ration. One per cent of a 85 or 100 unit fish liver oil should supply sufficient quantities of vitamin D.

The direct rays of the sun supply vitamin D, therefore it is highly desirable to give the chicks access to direct sunshine and as soon as possible in the spring. Some folks are always over cautious about turning chicks out of doors. It is not necessary to wait until corn planting time before allowing the chicks out on the ground. The use of an outdoor range, after the birds are two weeks old, may help prevent much loss from rickets, slipped tendons, feather picking, and cannibalism. A small pen may be used at first and enlarged as the chicks grow.

Decide now to avoid any chick brooding mistakes made last year. Brooding results may determine poultry profits for a period of many months. Ask any Indiana county agent for a copy of the Purdue Extension Bulletin No. 177, "How to Raise Chicks," which gives many useful suggestions.

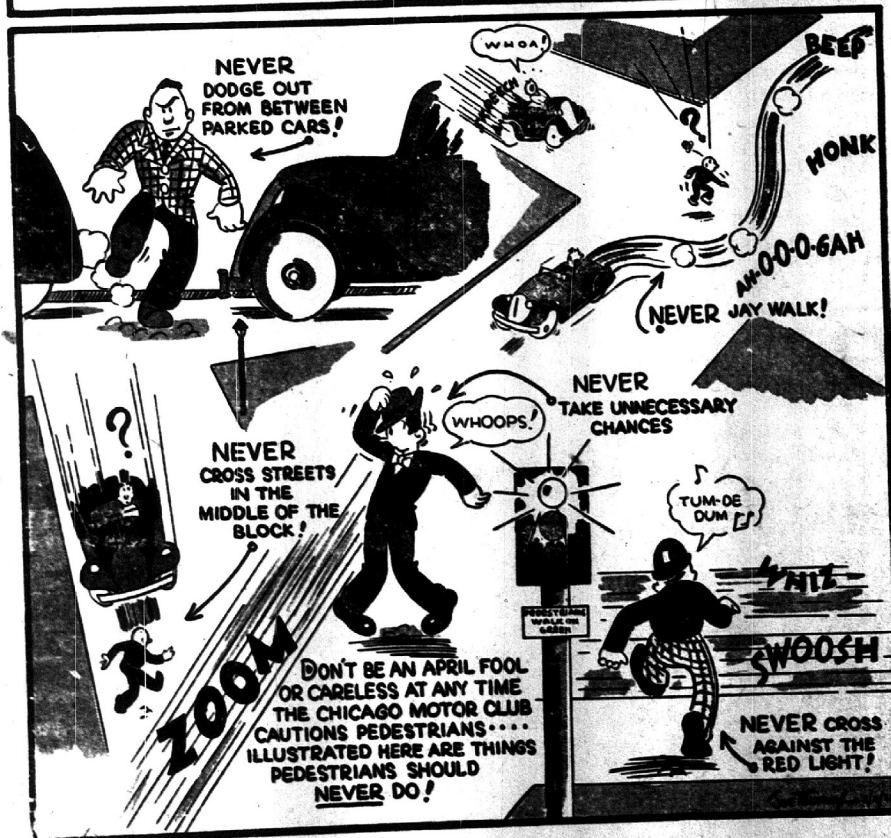
