Creighton Brothers Expand Poultry Farm

Creighton Brothers have under construction at the present time five laying houses each thirty by two hundred and ten feet which will accommodate a total of ten thousand laying birds.

This is no doubt the largest building project the poultry industry has witnessed in the midwest. This plant is located on U. S. Road 30 and the Pennsylvania Railroad between Atwood and Etna Green. The buildings will be used next spring for brooding baby chicks and will be filled with laying pullets in July or August of next year.

All lumber and cement is being furnished by the Northern Indiana Cooperative Association.

Two Minute Sermon

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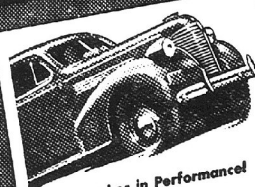

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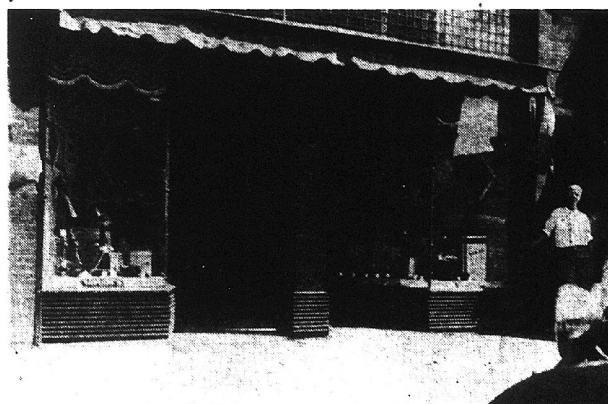

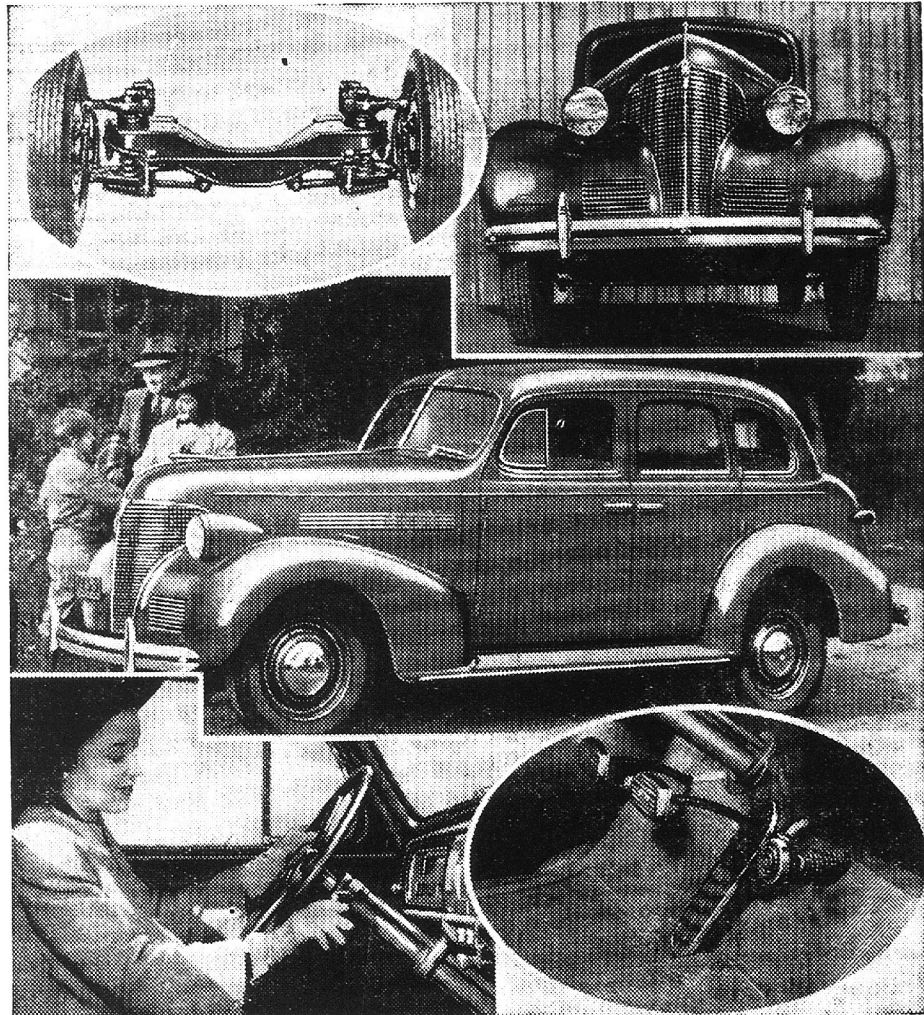
Perennials

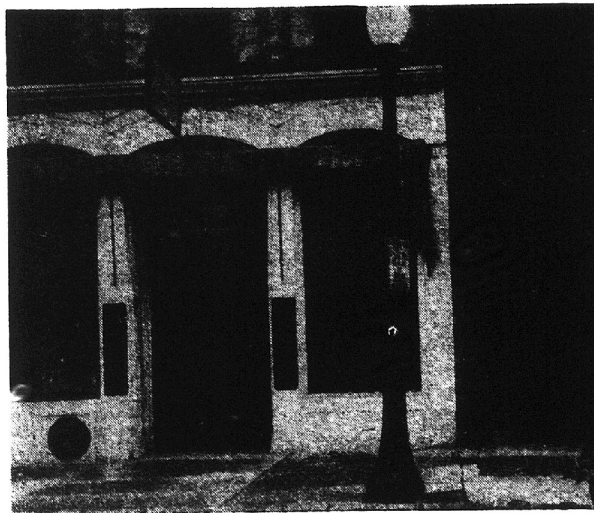

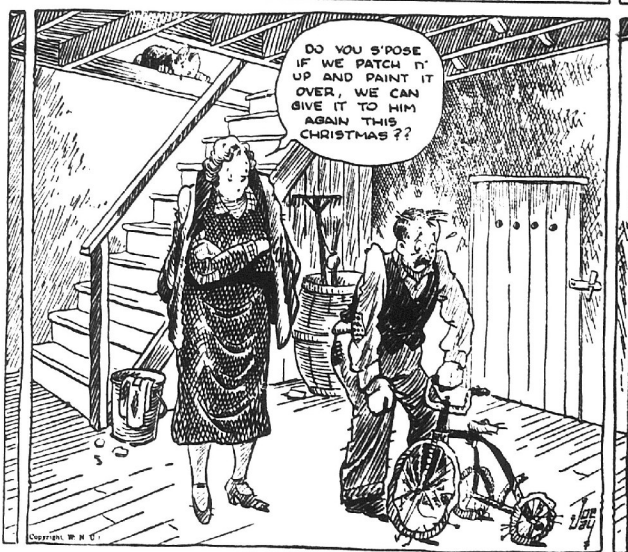

COLORFUL LICENSE

PLATES FOR 1939

The most colorful license plates ever seen on the highway will appear in 1939, Bert Vanderwarf, head of the Chicago Motor Club touring and travel bureau, reported recently in announcing color schemes for next year's automobile tags.

Yellow and black, used by seven states, is the favorite combination, followed by blue and white in second place with six states. Aluminum, which appeared for the first time a few years ago, is gaining in popularity as seven states will use it next year on their plates.

To promote tourist travel within their boundaries, several states are continuing the growing tendency to express their individuality by casting their plates in distinctive designs or using slogans. Outstanding examples for 1939 are Wyoming's bucking bronco pattern, Louisiana's pelican, and Ohio's ox and covered wagon design.

The 1939 color for Indiana will be blue on yellow. Color schemes for neighboring states are: Illinois, canary yellow on black; Michigan, full year-black on buff, half year, white on blue; Ohio, blue on white; and Kentucky, white on green.

Why Louisiana Has Parishes

Soon after the purchase of Louisi-
ana from France, that part of the
territory which comprises the state
was divided into 12 settlements
called counties. These districts were
not clearly defined and proved un-
satisfactory for the purposes of
civil government. In 1807 the legis-
lature of the territory of Orleans
divided the territory into 19 dis-
tricts and called them parishes,
from the old French and Spanish
ecclesiastical districts or parishes.
And when the state was admitted
to the Union the name parish was
applied to additional civil districts
which were afterwards created.

Making Wallpaper in Rolls

Paper in continuous rolls was in-
vented by Nicholas Louis Robert of
Essones, in 1799, and the English
patents "to make paper without
seam or join" were obtained in Lon-
don in 1801 by John Gamble and
Didot St. Leger. The use of paper
in continuous lengths was not, how-
ever, permitted in England before
1830, because of the important re-
venue derived from the tax stamps
on the small sheets. France, mean-
while, made use of the new invention
after 1810.

Longest Pontoon Road

The longest pontoon road in the
world is the much-traveled path of
planks over Hooghli river, between
Calcutta and Howrah in India. The
planks are laid on boats. Each
boat has two anchors upstream and
one downstream, to hold it in place.
This roadway is even elastic. Dur-
ing floods or high tide, additional
boats and planks are inserted in the
middle to increase the length of the
bridge, and let it stretch with the
river.

Two Minute Sermon

THOU SHALT NOT KILL: I had the privilege recently of attending a session of a men's Sunday school class when the lesson, the commandment, "Thou Shalt Not Kill," was being discussed. The lesson followed the usual treatment of this subject by Sunday school teachers, the wrong of taking human life and the sacredness of human life. The class even got into a discussion regarding capital punishment.

The thought occurred to me that the lesson might have a closer application to 1938 living. The wrong of murder and of taking life is generally conceded, but too often we do not think that we are contributing to murder when we knowingly permit pollution in a city's drinking water. We are contributing to the taking of human life when we sell, or permit to be sold, milk known to be tubercular infected, or when we fail to use such means as are available to determine this fact. We are guilty of contributing to the taking of human life when we drive a car with our senses dulled with liquor, or when we drive in excess of our ability to control. We are guilty of contributing to the taking of human life when we permit any condition to exist in our community that endangers life and health.
