FUNERAL SERVICES HELD FOR JESSE CREAKBAUM, SATURDAY

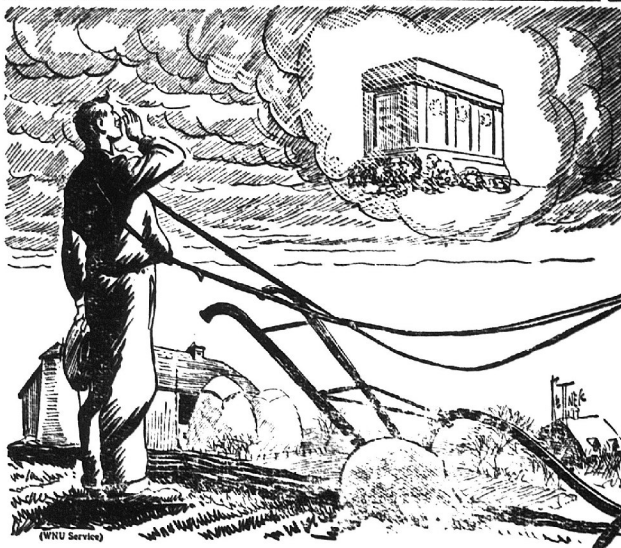

Family Supper Held At Ora Tucker Home

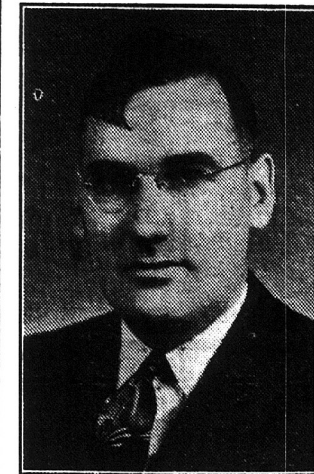

Pheasant Season In November 10 - 20

Nine days of pheasant hunting for Hoosier sportsmen with a bag limit permitting the taking of one hen bird, was announced today by Virgil M. Simmons, commissioner of the Department of Conservation. This is the longest open season on pheasants that Indiana has had and the first time that the taking of hen pheasants has been permitted.

While the established open season is from November 10 to 20—both dates inclusive—Indiana statutes prohibit hunting with firearms on Sunday, eliminating Sunday Nov. 10 and Nov. 17 from the open season for all but bow-and-arrow hunting. The open season includes one holiday, Armistice Day on Nov. 11, and one weekend this year, giving more sportsmen an opportunity to participate in pheasant hunting. The open season on quail, rabbits and Hungarian partridge also begins Nov. 10.

Gypsum Plaster Old

Republicans Winners In Kosciusko County

Kosciusko County, traditionally Republican, ran true to form again when the outcome of last Tuesday's election became known. The entire Republican county ticket was elected with large pluralities. A new record was set in the number of votes cast, when 15,494 voters went to the polls disregarding the generally rainy and disagreeable weather. The previous high mark was 15,072 in the 1936 election.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democratic third term candidate, was decisively re-elected to the presidency of the United States over Wendell L. Willkie, Republican, a native Hoosier, by an unofficial count of 25,956,562 votes to 21,591,032. Roosevelt, carrying 39 states, received 468 electoral votes as compared to 9 states and 63 votes for Willkie. Willkie, however, carried Indiana by a comfortable margin.

Henry F. Schricker was the only Democratic candidate to be elected on the state ticket when he defeated Glen Hillis, Republican, for the governorship of Indiana. Of interest to voters was the defeat of Sherman Minton, popular Democratic senatorial whip by Raymond Willis, Angola country editor.

Lead Pencil Invention

The earliest mention of what are known today as lead pencils appears in records dating back to 1565—not long after the discovery of the noted graphite mine at Borrowdale, England, in 1554. This mine furnished the material for the first lead pencils. The graphite was sawed into strips and fastened into wooden casings. In 1795 the Frenchman Conte improved the process by grinding the graphite and mixing it with clay, in order to produce grades of hardness and blackness.

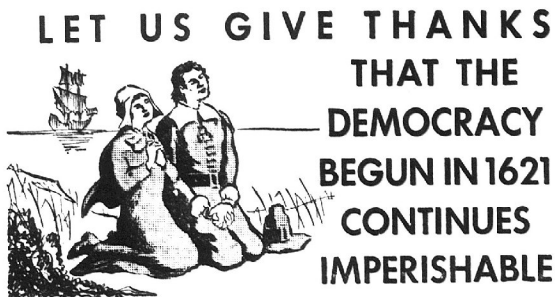

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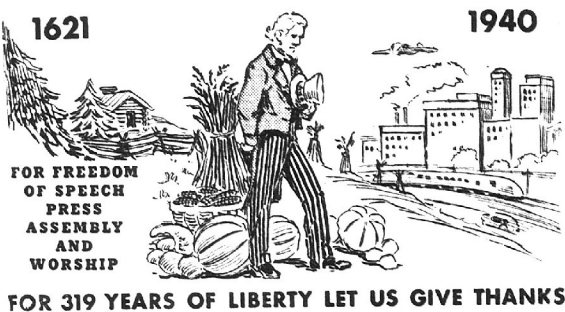

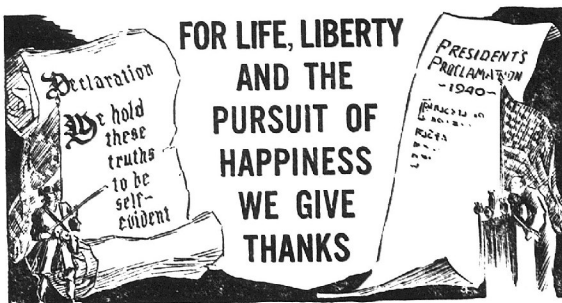

LAW LIMITS USE OF NIGHT-RUNNING DOGS

Night-running dogs must be kept up from sunset to sunrise for fifteen days before the opening of the trapping season which begins November 15 north of U.S.-40 and on November 25, south of U.S.-40, it was pointed out recently by Virgil M. Simmons, commissioner of the Department of Conservation.

The law enacted in 1939 provides that, "It shall be unlawful for any person for a period of fifteen days prior to the open season on raccoon to run or chase any fur-bearing animal with or by use of dogs or to permit their dogs to run or chase any fur-bearing animal between the hours of sunset and sunrise."

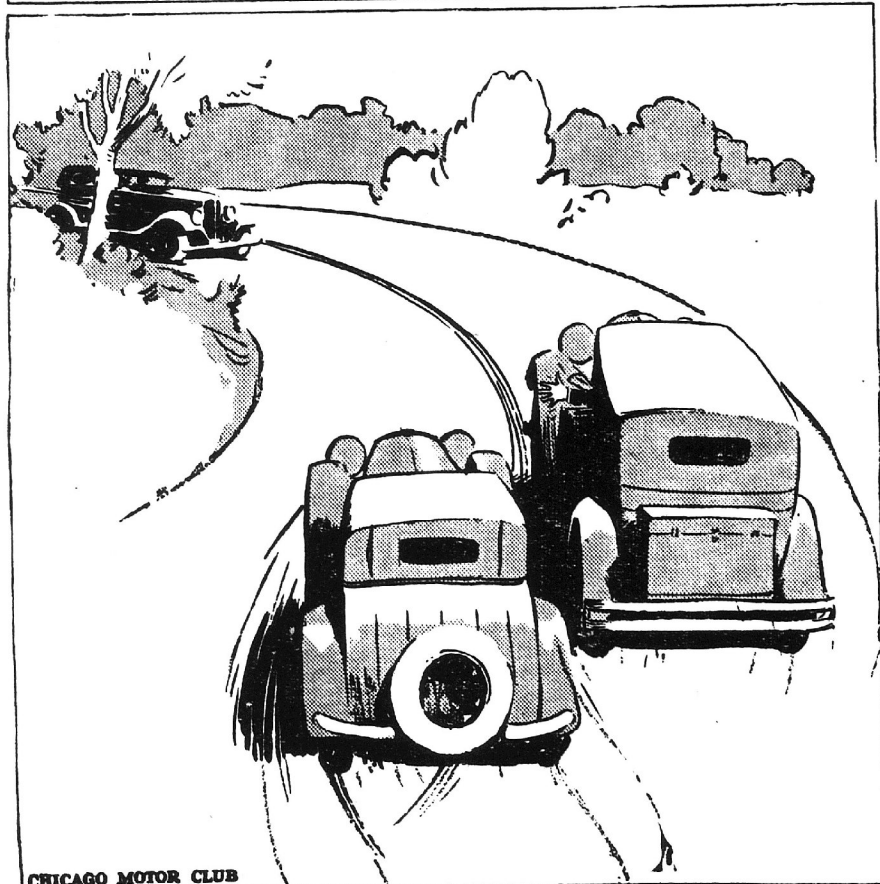
