TOWNSHIPS ORDER NEW  
RURAL FIRE TRUCK

Meeting at the town hall Monday night, the trustees of Tippecanoe, Newcastle, Harrison and Franklin townships, Louis Weissert, Charles Green, Royse Tucker and Robert O. Jones, contracted for the purchase of a new rural fire truck. The new equipment was purchased jointly, in proportion to the taxable valuation of the four townships, and will be housed, manned, maintained and operated by the town of Mentone and the Mentone Fire Department.

The bid of the Hines Equipment Co., of Bourbon, for a KB7 International chassis for \$2570.52 was accepted.

The fire fighting equipment to be installed on the truck is to be furnished by the American Fire Apparatus Co. of Battle Creek, Mich. This firm's bid was \$4917.85 for the equipment on the truck plus \$595 for 500 feet of 1½ inch fire hose and \$780 for 500 feet of 2½ inch fire hose. The total contracted expenditure will be \$8863.37.

Under present production schedules, it will likely be June before the equipment can be delivered and placed into operation.

### CONFERENCE IN WASHINGTON ON BANGS CONTROL

Of great importance to the livestock industry is the recent conference held in Washington, D. C., on brucellosis control and eradication. Members of the National Society of Purebred Record Ass'n's., Mr. C. K. Tomsen of the American Shorthorn Breeders Ass'n., representing the beef cattle industry, Mr. H. W. Norton, Sr., of the Holstein-Friesian Ass'n., representing dairy interests, and the secretary of the National Society, Mr. Ellis McFarland, met with representatives of the Livestock Sanitary board to discuss and to block out a program for future action in furthering brucellosis control.

An important feature of the program suggested at this meeting was the establishment of a committee to screen press releases and articles on brucellosis so that information reaching the general public, and especially that destined for 4-H and FFA groups, County agents, extension workers and all those directly able to enter into control work, will be uniform and reliable.

On the whole, it was pointed out, the public is unaware of the growing menace of human life and of the staggering loss in milk, beef, veal and pork that the presence of brucellosis

in our livestock herds represents. There are an estimated 100,000 cases of human infection annually, contracted from unpasteurized dairy products and from direct contact with sick cattle and hogs.

Control measures were also discussed at this meeting. The current measures of control, the testing and slaughtering of infected animals, could be made much less costly to the industry if the method of calfhood vaccination prevailed. This latter measure, plus identification of vaccinated animals by tattoo, was recommended to supplement the removal of diseased adult cattle. Opposition to calfhood vaccination runs high in some communities where the public lacks clear information as to the seriousness of the situation, and where the additional work required for control is a genuine problem. It is believed, however, that when the real necessity for effective action is better understood and accepted, progress will be made.

### FILE TWO COURT ACTIONS UNDER NEW LAKE LAWS

The filling in or changing of Indiana lake shore-lines was taboo today as the Indiana Department of Conservation moved to enforce two new lake level laws passed by the 1947 Legislature.

John H. Nigh, Conservation director, said department attorneys and county prosecutors are preparing court suits in Warsaw and Kendallville against individuals charged with violation of the laws.

Purpose of the acts, Nigh said, is:

1. To prevent abutting property owners from filling in portions of a lake to secure additional property rights for building or other purposes, thereby reducing the size of the lake.

2. To prevent disturbance of fish bedding and feeding grounds by removal of underwater growths which provide food and protection for the shore-line fish varieties.

"We must realize," Nigh said, "That the lakes of Indiana are public property, owned jointly by all the citizens of the state. The two new lake laws seek to insure the maintenance of our lakes for everyone and to prevent their despoliation by a few."

The acts provide that any person who illegally fills-in or changes a lake shore may be fined from \$100 to \$500.

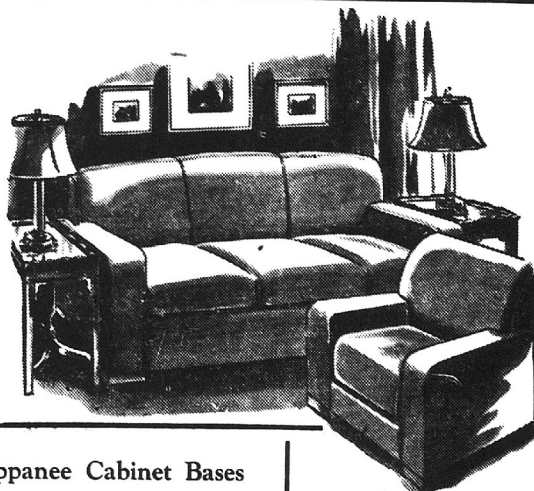

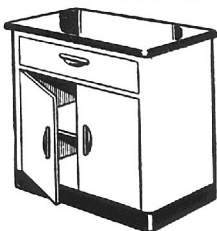

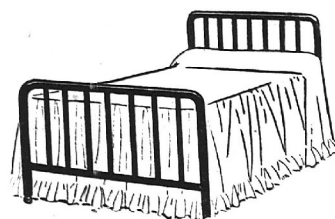

The entire afternoon was fun and truly appreciated by all.

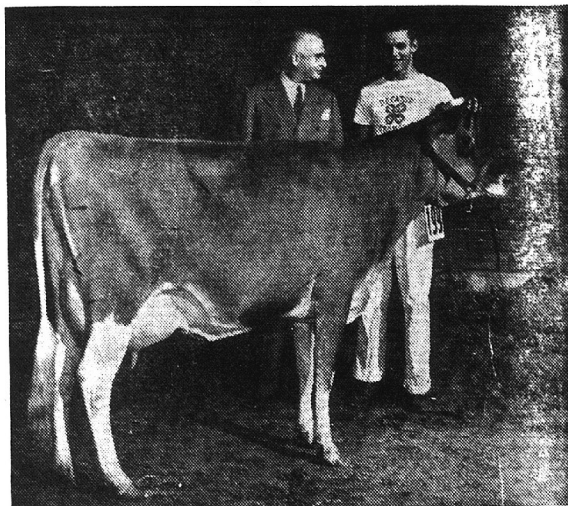

**COUNTY CONSERVATION  
COUNCIL MEETS**

The Kosciusko Council of Conservation Clubs, at their regular monthly meeting October 29, 1947, unanimously passed the motion which supports the Indiana Department of Conservation Division of Fish and Game, in Law Chapter 310, which protects the lake levels and shore lines. Also recommends that whosoever violates this law must be compelled to restore the shoreline as it was previous to the violation.

The fox situation was discussed and

committee reported that they were working on bounty for same.

Each club was recommended to take up and pay each coon hunter a small fee to liberate live coon at end of season.

President reported that we still need three stools and three lavatories yet, to finish our new toilet building at the Conservation camp at McClure lake.

The council decided to take in 80 to 100 boys at Conservation Camp next year. This will leave approximately 10 boys for each adjoining county.

Our annual Auction and Fish Fry will be held at McClure Lake Conservation Camp, May 25, 1948.

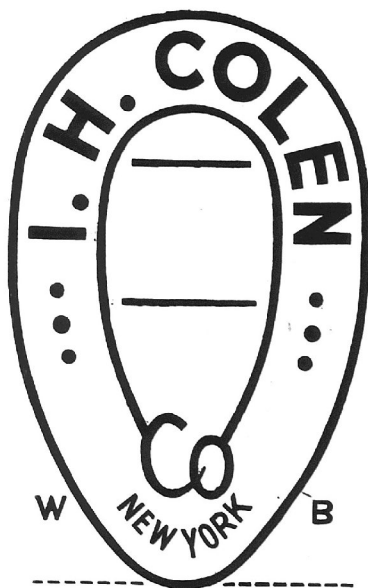

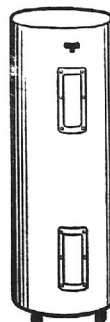

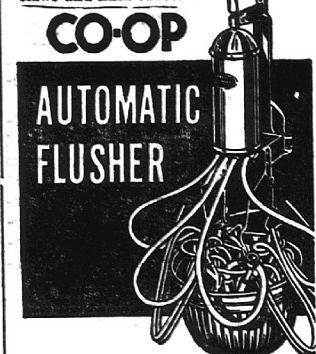
**PAST NOBLE GRAND CLUB MEETS**

#### SOMETHING SHOULD BE DONE —

Mentone has many things of which to boast, and it is a shame that there is yet a few things for which we must constantly apologize, and it gets rather embarrassing at times.

One can safely say that over three-fourths of our best customers and visitors have mail addresses in some other town—Bourbon, Akron, Warsaw, Rochester, Claypool, Etna Green, etc. Rural routes from some of these towns come almost to our very city limits, yet when newspapers or first class mail is addressed to them it takes two or three days for it to get to them.

The situation, we know, was created many years ago by logic which proved to be very short-sighted, but that is no reason why we should go on year after year without making an effort to alleviate the deplorable condition. We are not condemning the service of the neighboring postmasters or their helpers, as they cannot improve the condition.

Mail matter, to reach our patrons a mile and a half from Mentone must travel to South Whitley by star route, be placed on a train for Fort Wayne, returned to Warsaw, Etna Green or Bourbon by star route or train and then delivered by a rural carrier. With the addition of one or two more rural routes out of Mentone the mail could be delivered the same morning it was mailed.

Rural routes may be difficult to change, but it could be done. We might even secure a direct connection with Warsaw and more frequent east and west mail service.

Isn't it about time some of us quit growling and really started kicking? Our rural friends should be entitled to this effort on our part.

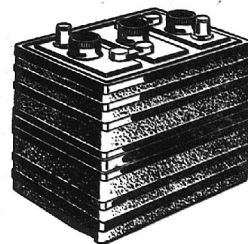

### PHEASANT STOCK HIGH ON STATE'S TWO GAME FARMS

Hoosier hunters, barred from pheasant shooting this year, received encouraging news from the Indiana Department of Conservation today.

John H. Nigh, Department Director, announced plans for a spring liberation of approximately 10,000 hen pheasants, now being carried over at the two game farms—Wells county and Jasper-Pulaski.

Total adult hen population on the two farms is approximately 20,000, Nigh said. Less than 10,000 will be needed for breeding purposes by the farms, thereby allowing the greatest mass liberation of hens in the history of the department.

Five thousand surplus cockbirds are being released now and additional liberations totalling about 10,000 will be made in the Spring.

Nigh pointed out that department surveys indicated advisability of Spring releases of adult birds, thus permitting them to breed under normal conditions.

Broods reared in the open have far greater chance of survival, Nigh said, than the farm-reared variety.

The Conservation Director said he has "complete confidence" that the pheasant season can be opened next year. Protection of the current population, plus the heavy spring release, should result in one of the best years in Hoosier pheasant history.

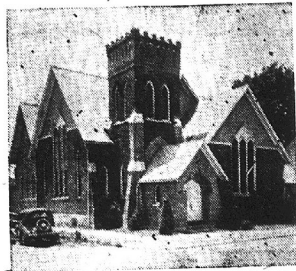

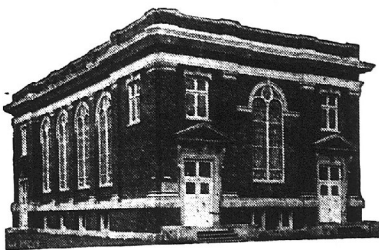

#### STATE BANKERS ASSOCIATION RECEIVES COVETED AWARD

For its part in work of soil conservation, for its management to farm youth, and for outstanding service to farmers by the banks of the state, the Indiana Bankers Association has received the coveted 1000 Point Award

of the Agricultural Commission of the American Bankers Association for the fourth consecutive year.

K. A. Riner, Vice President of the Farmers State Bank, Mentone, Ind., reports that the award was made September 30 at the 73rd annual convention of the American Bankers Association at Atlantic City, New Jersey, by C. T. O'Neill, Chairman of the A. B. A. Agricultural Commission.

"Each year the A. B. A. Commission rates banks in all states on activities which benefit agriculture," Mr. Riner explained. "In the numerical evaluation of these activities, points are given for 'regular' and 'extra' services rendered by the banks. It considers work done by individual banks as well as programs carried out by the agricultural committees of the state bankers associations.

"The banks of our state received special recognition," Mr. Riner said, "for the Agricultural clinic held at Purdue University in March. Our soil conservation efforts were considered especially praiseworthy.

The 'regular' services in which our banks compare well with banks in

other states include the extension of adequate credit to meet the needs of our farm customers," Mr. Riner said. Credit was given, too, for individual bank projects encouraging farmers to keep debts at a safe level and, at the same time, to build financial reserves."

Indiana banks have been active in sponsoring 4-H club activities, crop growing contests, soil conservation programs, profit from pasture drives in their respective communities.

State leaders who shared in the responsibility for an organized agricultural program for the Indiana Bankers Association include Charles H. Buesching, president of the association last year and president of the Lincoln National Bank and Trust Company, Fort Wayne; Marvin H. Cook, Chairman of last year's Agricultural Committee and secretary of the Fountain Trust Company, Covington; H. J. Reed, Agricultural extension director at Purdue University, and Don E. Warrick, executive manager of the Indiana Bankers Association.

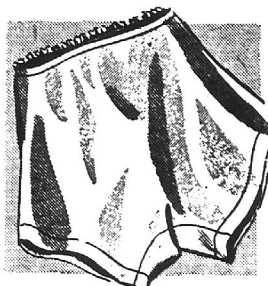

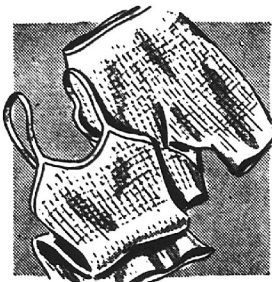

DeKalb hybrid corn certainly was a "life-saver" for S. E. Wiltsee, La Fontaine, Ind., farmer. "If it had not been for DeKalb seed, I wouldn't have had a crop of corn this year," says Mr. Wiltsee. "My field of 404A was planted June 22 and was ready to pick Oct. 10. It is the best corn I have ever had. I'm planting DeKalb again next year."

The early maturity of many DeKalb varieties and their ability to come through in spite of adverse weather conditions saved the day for many Indiana corn growers this year.

### Here's a Big Field of DeKalb—and it's Ripe



Ripe corn and plenty of it, thanks to DeKalb's ability to take it on the chin from the weather and still make a good crop for Earl W. Mahan, manager of the Raff Ranch, Lake Village, Ind.

Mahan planted DeKalb variety 245 on July 1, a month and a half later than usual, and his crop matured before the frost. One 550 acre field of DeKalb 404A he planted is making some of the best corn he has ever raised.

Vivid full-color scenes from astronomy and natural science are featured in "The God of Creation" sound motion picture to be shown at 8:00 p. m. Sunday (Nov. 9) at the Methodist church in Mentone, according to the Rev. Paul I. Irwin, pastor.

Produced in Moody institute of science, West Coast department of Moody Bible Institute, by Irwin A. Moon, Sc. D., "The God of Creation" is the second in a series of evangelistic films.



The first film by Dr. Moon, "They Live Forever," had a large showing in all parts of the country.

In the opening section of "The God of Creation" the audience takes a trip to the stars by means of solar photographs taken through the giant 100-inch telescope of Mount Wilson Observatory in Southern California, and views complex gyrations of our own solar system.

Lapse-time photography is used to demonstrate the beauties of natural science. The illusion of flower buds developing into full-blown blossoms in a few seconds is created through this time-compressing photo technique. The metamorphosis of a caterpillar through the various stages from worm to butterfly, and polination of flowers are seen on the screen in full color.

Believed to be the first of their kind are the natural-color pictures of photosynthesis, the mysterious food-manufacturing process resulting from the action of sunlight on leaves.

Opportunity will be afforded at the show to see, test and study all Major improvements in farm, dairy and poultry equipment and household conveniences. In addition, a full program of entertainment, educational movies and exhibits and 4-H Club events is in store.

Chicago's Mayor Martin H. Kennelly has proclaimed November 29 through December 7 as "National Farm Week in Chicago" in recognition of the importance of the farm show, the many national farm association annual meetings, the 4-H Club Congress and International Live Stock Exposition, which will be held concurrently.

## 12,000,000 GUYS WITH GUNS!

It's fall again. The gridirons are back in their glory, resounding to college yells. The woods of America will soon be filled with hunters, and the game wardens, landowners and farmers are going to have their hands full because, unless Americans have changed, animals, barns, chicken coops, automobiles, and even human beings are going to get shot at.

Roughly 12,000,000 guys throughout this broad land are oiling up their guns and the state authorities know what is coming. While the vast majority of hunters will come out of the woods and fields with their legitimate bag, it will be the small minority that catches the newspaper headlines from coast to coast. Past experience has proved that roughly 1,000 people will meet death by gunfire during the months of October, November and December—the hunting months. True, only about one-third of the number will take place in the field where someone mistakes his buddy for a deer or pulls some similar slap-happy stunt. The others will be accounted for by faulty gun handling in homes and cars.

In 1945, the last year that statistics on accidental deaths by firearms are available, there were 2,454 deaths caused by guns. The average per

month was 205. However, take away the hunting months and the average drops to 165. In October, November, and December, 980 people or 40 per cent of the year's total met death by firearms. From these figures it's easy to see some of the mayhem that carelessness, ignorance and selfishness cause in the woods.

The National Rifle Association has tried for years to get the grim reaper out of the forest, and through its years of experience has formulated five simple gun rules which, if followed, would wipe out the "Trigger Happy Harry" incidents in the great America nsport.

Here they are. Follow them and "Hunt with Safety".

1. Always point the gun muzzle in a SAFE direction.
2. Ask yourself: Is that gun loaded?
3. Be SURE of your target.
4. Be SURE of your backstop.
5. KNOW your gun and ammunition.

## LATE SUMMER PASTURES PAY INCREASED GAINS

Sudan grass and alfalfa pastures paid off in increased gains of pastured hogs over hogs in dry lot, according to recent reports on a comparative pasture carried on this summer by the department of animal husbandry of Purdue University.

Sudan grass has those growth qualities which meet the need in most hog pasture programs for a spring or early-summer sown crop which will furnish good pasture during the hot, dry months of late summer and early fall. O. M. Vestal, in charge of the hog pasture study, says. This kind of crop serves either as a supplementary or substitute pasture on farms where seeding failures, winter killing, dry weather and other causes of shortages in the regular rotation pastures occur.

The Purdue study showed that alfalfa pasture increased the gain of the hogs 8.7 per cent, and Sudan grass 2.1 per cent over those fed in dry lot. Compared with dry lot feeding, alfalfa pasture saved 6.4 percent of the corn and 22.3 percent of the protein supplement while Sudan grass saved 2.7 percent of the corn and 18.1 percent of the protein supplement. A minor saving of salt and other minerals was the same for the two pastures.

On the basis of relative feed cost of gain in the dry lot and pasture feeding, alfalfa saved 2.5 cents per hog daily, and the Sudan grass, 1.4 cents.

Vestal points out that with a pasture value of 2.5 cents a hog per day, an acre of good alfalfa, which will graze 20 full fed hogs with protein supplement, would be worth \$15 a month. Sudan grass would have to

graze 36 similar hogs to an acre to be worth \$15 a month on a basis of its saving in the feed cost in this experiment.

Because of the excess growth in the Sudan pasture, the carrying capacity was not determined. The crop was clipped twice during the period and the observations of the experimental hogs on the Sudan grass indicated that it has a very heavy carrying capacity.

All pigs had a free choice of shelled corn, protein supplement, mineral mixture and loose salt.

Louie plans on moving to the home in about three weeks.

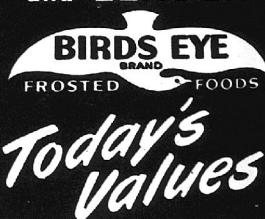

## ONE SLIP IS TOO MANY

Traffic accidents go up when the mercury goes down, Col. Robert Rossow, State police superintendent, warned today.

"Just ahead are the most hazardous motoring months of the year," he asserted. "It is the responsibility of every driver to adjust his driving to changing road conditions."

Indiana has held its traffic death increase to less than seven percent this year, he said, but he predicted a combination of bad weather and bad driving would cause the toll to mount sharply. A total of 875 statewide fatalities have been recorded to date.

Reduced visibility due to snow, sleet or rain is the greatest wintertime traffic hazard, Colonel Rossow pointed out. Murky daylight hours, longer periods of darkness and failure of motorists to adjust their driving from dry to wet or slick pavements were also listed as dangers.

Last year's state experience indicates how the accident total moves up, as road conditions become worse.

During July, August and September 16,342 crashes were reported as compared with 19,995 the final 3 months of the year, an increase of 22 percent.

The state police official urged that car owners prepare for winter driving by having lights, brakes, windshield wipers, tires and horns placed in peak operating condition.

### HEALTH FACTS FROM YOUR STATE BOARD OF HEALTH

Impaired hearing affects one out of every ten persons and of the estimated 3,000,000 children in the United States with a potential hearing loss, a majority need not be permanently handicapped if medical treatment is given in time. These facts were pointed out today by the Indiana State Board of Health in connection with the observance of National Hearing Week.

Indiana tries to help the hard of hearing child by requiring a periodic test of school children so the condition of the child with impaired hearing may be discovered early and steps taken to correct this handicap.

Many persons, with hearing defects, especially school children, are not aware of their handicap. Restlessness, inattention and inability to follow directions are often found to be due to impaired hearing.

Since deafness is often caused by complications following such diseases as mumps, scarlet fever, diphtheria and whooping cough, all possible precautions should be taken to avoid these diseases not only because of the disease itself but also because of the possible after effects. Enlarged and diseased tonsils and adenoids, bad teeth and neglected running ears are also contributing factors which should be carefully checked. Even the common cold may affect hearing.

## WATCH FOR FLU IN HOGS

During the fall and winter months swine influenza or hog "flu" is especially likely to be troublesome and sometimes costly, although it may occur at any time of the year, says Dr. L. P. Doyle of the department of veterinary science at Purdue University.

Like other influenzal diseases, flu in hogs often varies in severity. It may be mild and effect only a few animals, or it may spread rapidly through a herd and be quite severe. It usually does not cause much death loss, unless the hogs are poorly cared for and pneumonia develops; but if it occurs in a herd at the same time some other disease is present or at the time the animals are vaccinated for cholera, the results may be serious.

Coughing and "thumping" are common types of flu, and death sometimes occurs suddenly because of a rapid filling of the lungs with fluid. When signs of sickness occur, it is advisable to have a veterinarian examine the herd, because other disease at times may act very much like "flu".

Unfortunately there is no certain way of entirely preventing hog "flu", but there are several worthwhile things which can be done to make "flu" less costly than it would be otherwise. Experience has established the value of the following recommendations, says Dr. Doyle: do not put newly received hogs with others until they have been observed for about two weeks and found free from signs of disease: provide dry, clean, comfortable, well-ventilated, draft-free quarters for hogs, particularly during this season when "flu" is to be serious. carefully avoid overcrowding; avoid doing anything out of the ordinary, such as worming, delousing, treating for mange, etc., to hogs during the "flu" season.

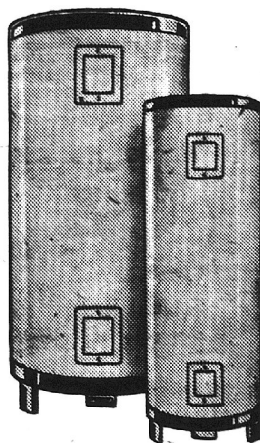
When "flu" gets started in a herd of hogs, put the sick animals in a quiet comfortable place free from dust. Put water where the hogs can get it easily; feed lightly and otherwise leave the animals alone. Over-treatment increases death losses, warns the veterinarian. This is particularly true of any treatment which causes exertion on the part of the sick animals.

The rat population of the United States destroys approximately three and one-half million tons of food per year, a large part of which is wholesome raw or processed food that would otherwise be available for human beings or livestock. Better protection of stored food products from rats and other rodents or vermin during the winter months will help provide food for export to foreign countries.

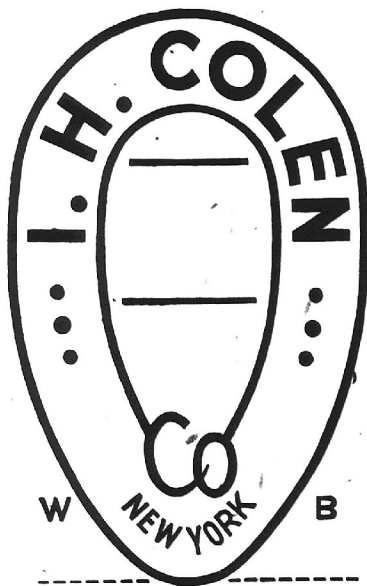

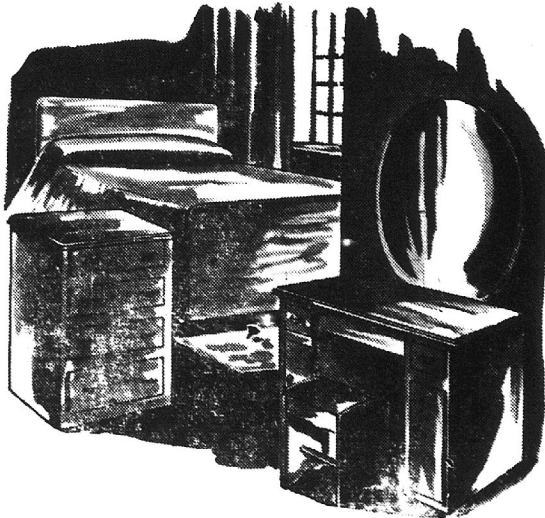

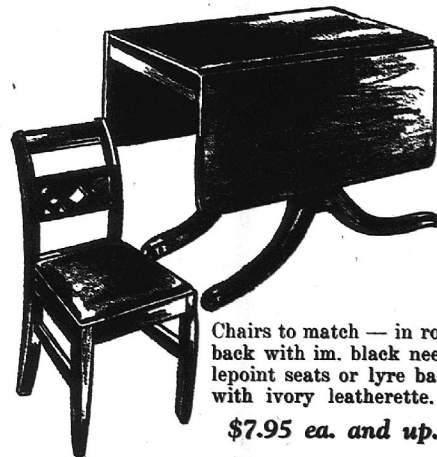

Refreshments were served to 19 members and nine guests. The assisting hostesses were Mrs. Leroy Cox and Mrs. Geo. McIntyre.

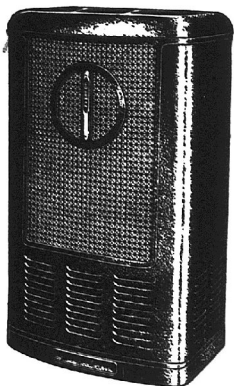

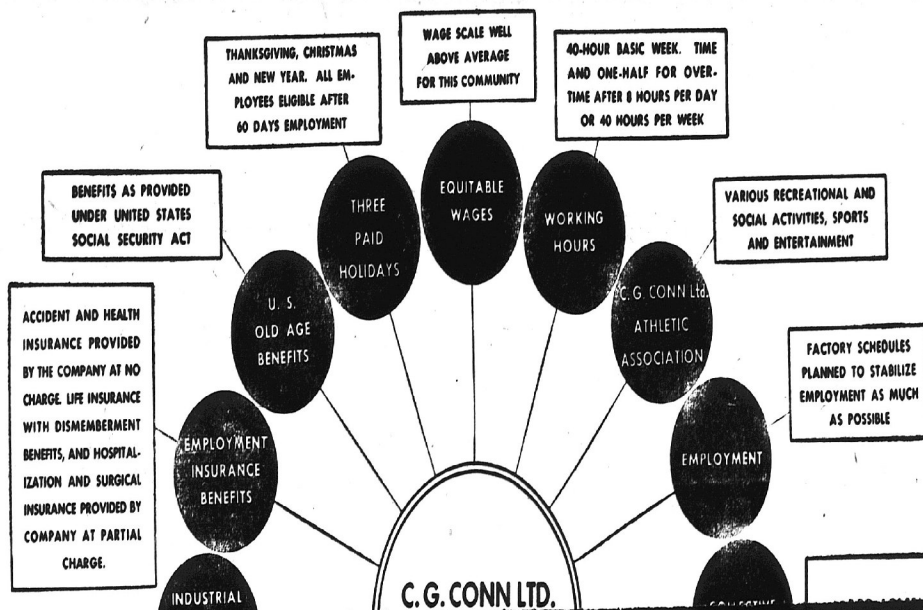

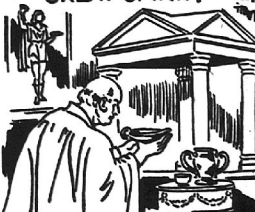

chets can be avoided by using common sense—Do not shoot onto any flat, hard surface (water, rock, baked or frozen ground, etc.) unless you are sure that the background is clear for as far as your bullet can travel. As for ranges and background—the box that the ammunition comes in will tell you the range and a map survey or a personal reconnaissance of the ground you are going to hunt over will take care of your background. Use these precautions and you won't become a case in the Washington files

of the NRA.

#### REMEMBER:

A .22 caliber long rifle cartridge is dangerous up to one mile.

A .30-30 cartridge is dangerous up to one mile and a half.

A .30-'06 cartridge is dangerous up to two miles.

A .22 caliber bullet will penetrate at least seven one-inch boards, so be careful where you tack up your target.

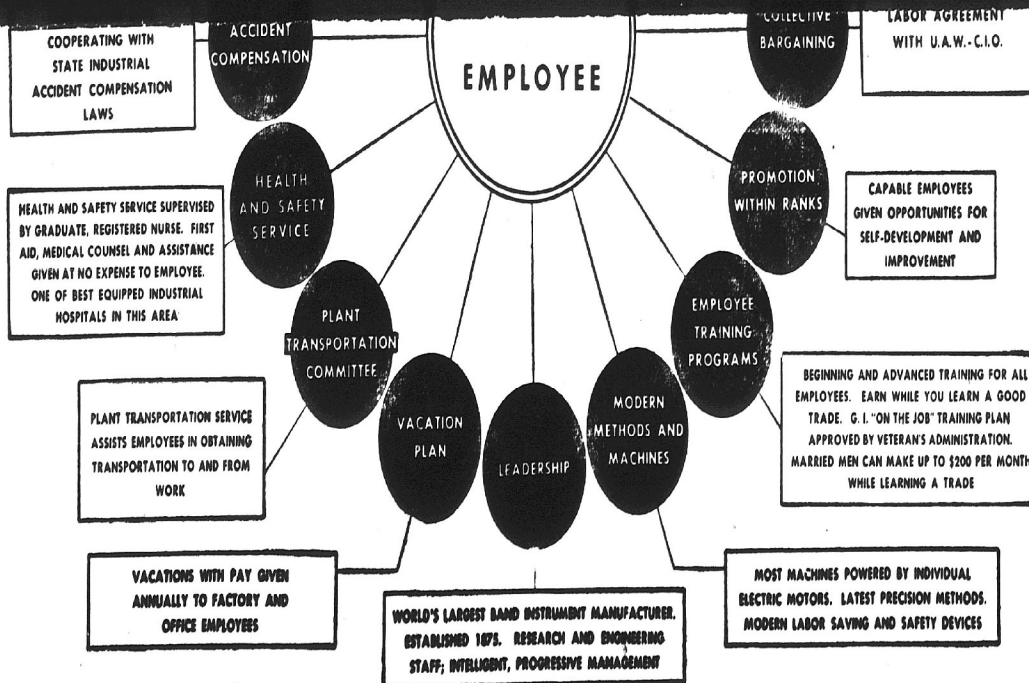

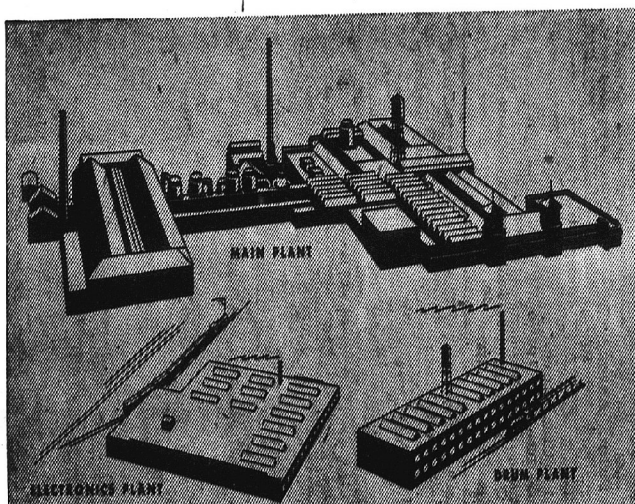

### Moisture in Grasses

The normal moisture content of grasses and legumes at the maturity stages, and not when wet with dew, average between 72 and 75 per cent. An interval of two hours between mowing and loading on a sunshiny day will reduce the moisture content of the crop to between 65 and 70 per cent. With this moisture content there will be very little seepage loss in a 14 by 30 foot silo. Excessive wilting destroys a large percentage of the carotene which is so essential for milk color and flavor protection, and the silage does not pack well to exclude the air, thus encouraging excessive mold growth.

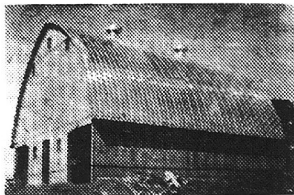

## Yes—There is A Difference in Corn



### Early DeKalb Variety Outyields by 2 to 1

The importance of selecting the seed corn that fits your soil and weather was clearly demonstrated on the farm of Aloysius Beckman of Ft. Wayne, Indiana, this year.

Mr. Beckman experimented with two early hybrid varieties, one was DeKalb 458, and the other, a competitive early variety. Both were planted on the same day, but when harvested, the results were remarkably different. The DeKalb variety nearly doubled the yield of the other hybrid, and produced much larger ears.

Mr. Kelley stated that the Juniors were not selling subscriptions—and also that no class of the Mentone school will sponsor any magazine selling ventures.

One cannot always expect to escape the tricks of these people who work so hard to keep from earning a living, but one safe way is to make sure you know with whom you are dealing—then check up on the story before you obligate yourself in any way. Usually the "schemer" gets in a hurry to leave when one uses direct questions, delays or telephone verifications. Use them whenever there is any question. This is much less expensive.

### POULTRY REQUIRE INSOLUBLE, UNSHATTERABLE GRIT

Although some investigators believe that grit is unnecessary, others have concluded that it aids the digestion of coarse feed. It is believed that its primary function is not that of an abrasive, but rather to separate food particles during the churning action of the gizzard, preventing "balling" of fibrous and packing of pasty materials, according to a review on the subject made by Dr. P. J. Schalbe, formerly of the Michigan State College, as reported in Poultry Science.

Insoluble, unshatterable grit may be retained over long periods of time whereas limestone or oyster shell grit may be dissolved in a few days. However, hens have little difficulty excreting excess of calcium grits in the droppings. There are temporary, probably less efficient, grits which serve the dual role of supplying calcium as well. Very fine granite waste is injurious and interferes with feed utilization and egg production.

The gizzard is not essential, but birds with gizzards removed digest coarsely-ground rations poorly. Finely ground rations produce an abnormal thickening or swelling of the gizzard lining, which is prevented by feeding grit or a coarsely-ground ration.

A truly insoluble, unshatterable grit is Arrow-Head insoluble flint grit. As it is made from pure flint, Arrow-Head is extremely hard. It does not break down in the gizzard as is the case with granite and other shatterable grits. For this reason it helps the hen make more efficient use of feed. Because it is retained in the gizzard longer, hens consume only about half as much flint grit as they do of granite, which makes it the most economical grit to use, as well. ### Gun Lovers' Take Note

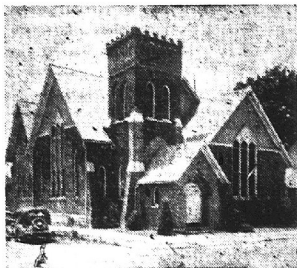

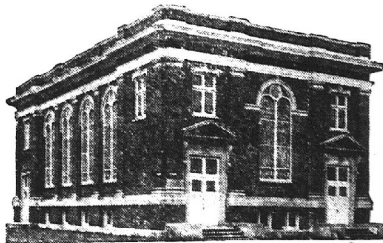

# CORN PICKING TIPS GIVEN

With the corn picking season well  
underway, it is highly probable that  
many newspapers will be carrying stories  
of corn picker accidents over In-  
diana and throughout the corn belt.

In an effort to help prevent as many  
of these costly accidents as possible,  
F. R. Willsey, Purdue University, farm  
safety specialist with the Agricultural  
Extension Service, offers some safety  
precautions for the wise and careful  
farmer to follow:

1. Adjust snapping rolls to suit weather and crop conditions. This takes very little time and will prevent most of the clogging.
2. Stop corn picker rolls immediately if clogging does start and the picker will clear itself.
3. In any case, stop rolls before working around them.

## CHICAGO LIVE- STOCK SHOW

Largest of the country's livestock shows, the International Live Stock Exposition and Horse Show, will be held in Chicago November 29 through December 6 in the International Amphitheatre at the Union Stock Yards.

It will be the 48th anniversary of this world's celebrated event, which each year attracts exhibits of the finest Livestock and crops from the United States and Canada.

Officials of the Exposition anticipate one of the largest expositions in its history when a final tally of the entry is made. They predict a total showing of more than 12,000 head of beef cattle, draft and pleasure horses, sheep and swine.

Prizes totaling \$100,000 are offered in the competitions that will feature 11 breeds of sheep, nine of swine and four different breeds of beef cattle, five of draft horses.

Several hundred of the best saddle and harness horses and ponies, representing leading stables of the country, will compete daily in the famous International Horse Shows, chief entertainment feature of the exposition.

Thirteen horse shows are on the eight day schedule of this event—every evening and on five afternoons.

An opening day feature will be the International Junior Livestock Feeding contest in which boys and girls from midwest farms will exhibit upwards of 1000 baby beeves of their own raising as well as lambs and hogs. The exhibitors are 4-H and Vocational Agriculture club members and are all between the ages of 10 and 21.

The country's largest annual crops show, the International Grain and Hay Show will mark its 25th anniversary this year as a department of the Exposition. A 50 percent increase in cash premiums is announced for this department of the show. Entries were closed on November 10.

Two national sheep shearing contests are to be featured at the exposition. One is for 4-H club boys in which the contestants, all state champions, will compete for the national title. The other is for adult contestants. Here also the winner will be named national champion.

He pointed out that the American Legion is just now getting its section of the campaign underway and said Legion officials are planning an aggressive campaign throughout the state.

### SAVE GRAIN BY HOUSING PIGS RIGHT

When pigs are housed in cold, draughty sheds, a big part of the feed they get will go toward generating body heat instead of toward weight gains. With poor housing, they may eat as much as 25 percent more without making a corresponding gain. This week, the American Veterinary Medical association pointed up that

fact, with the suggestion that a little extra attention to swine housing will mean a big saving on feed bills. "This is one sure way to stretch grain supplies during the present foreign relief emergency," the association declared.

## SAVING GRAIN THIS WINTER

Make maximum use of good fall pasture for the dairy herd as long as possible, especially rye, wheat or legume mixtures, says E. A. Gannon, Purdue University extension dairyman, in giving some suggestions on how to save grain this winter.

Carry heifers on roughage this year, the dairyman recommends, and feed dry cows on hay and silage. If the cows are in good condition, they will not need any grain during the dry period. A saving of 10 to 20 percent of grain can be made by feeding hay and silage several times a day, or feeding good quality hay mixed with poorer quality hay, but do not feed moldy or musty hay. Whenever the quality of roughage is poor, mix about one pint of black strap molasses with one gallon of warm water and sprinkle over the roughage before feeding.

About one and three-fourths pounds of average hay will equal a pound of grain in feeding value, and 100 pounds of good quality legume hay is worth as much as 80 pounds of grain for milk production, but, of course, it must be kept in mind that cows have limited capacities.

Feed each milking cow in the herd according to production, Gannon says. High test breeds should receive one pound of grain for each four pounds of milk produced per day, and breeds producing a low amount of butterfat should receive one pound of grain for each six pounds of milk per day. Do not feed any grain to low test cows producing less than 20 pounds of milk per day or to high test cows producing less than 16 pounds of milk per day.

Feed a balanced ration. When straight legume hay, such as alfalfa, or clover, is fed, use a 10 to 12 percent digestible protein grain ration, for legume hay and silage, a 12 to 14 percent digestible protein grain ration; for mixed hay with or without silage, a 16 percent digestible protein ration; and for non-legume roughage, such as timothy, straw or fodder, a ration containing 18 to 20 percent digestible protein. Compare prices and get the cheapest grain ration possible this winter.

Good management will aid further in saving grain, reminds the dairyman. Cull low producers and unprofitable cows, and balance the herd to the amount of feed on hand. Provide plenty of bedding at all times, and repair the barn doors and windows wherever necessary to control drafts and keep the cows in the best condition possible. Turn cows out every pleasant day, but keep them stabled in bad weather, and

feed and milk regularly. Gannon further suggests planning now for a supplementary pasture program next summer.

### Chemical Industry

Total assets of 40 major American chemical companies were over two billion dollars prior to World War II, says a Twentieth Century fund report, with three companies accounting for about 64 per cent. Finished or semi-finished products that are the direct outcome of chemical operations made up about 40 per cent of manufactures by value.

From a sound land-use point of view, about one-eighth of Indiana's present forest land (from 300,000 to 500,000 of the 3.3 million acres in forest) should eventually be put to crop and pasture use, according to the Purdue University department of forestry and conservation and the Indiana Economic Council.

## HELP PREVENT CALF LOSSES

The average dairyman is likely to lose more calves during the late fall and winter months than at any other time of the year, according to Dr. L. P. Doyle of the veterinary department at Purdue University.

Changes in climatic conditions affect young animals. However, conditions which the dairyman can control are sometimes more important in causing calf losses than the weather. Clean maternity stalls, clean comfortable calf pens, proper and regular feeding may be far more important than the weather in determining whether or not calves live.

So, rather than blame all of the calf trouble on the weather, why not carefully regulate the feeding and conditions under which the calves are kept and help prevent some losses?

Purdue veterinarians suggest the following things which can be done to reduce calf losses: Feed a good ration

to the pregnant cow; provide clean, disinfected maternity stalls at calving time; make sure that the newborn calf gets colostrum or first milk; keep the calves in pens that are well-bedded and well-ventilated but free from drafts; feed the calves regularly but do not overfeed, particularly if there is a tendency to scour.

The degree of success in raising herd replacements may determine whether a herd is profitable or not and there is often considerable risk in buying ordinary herd replacements, because of disease. Proper care and feeding of calves during the difficult fall and winter months gives increased assurance of herd health and profit later, says the veterinarian.

## FOUR MILLION FLAT TIRES

The urgency for motorists to condition their cars for winter driving is pointed up by recent survey findings which disclose that at least one road

breakdown requiring the services of a garage mechanic or tow-crane truck is the prospect for the average automobile this winter and spring, Charles M. Hayes, president of the Chicago Motor Club, said today.

Projecting the representative experience of emergency road service departments of the Chicago Motor club and other clubs affiliated through the American Automobile Association, the nation's 30.5 million passenger cars will suffer a total of 39,000,000 breakdowns within the next 12 months, or an average of 1.3 breakdowns per car, Mr. Hayes stated.

Almost one-third of the distress calls from 11,672,700 motorists will be to fix "flats" or other tire troubles, the sur-

vey showed, while 18 per cent of the calls will be concentrated during the winter months from 7,000,000 motorists plagued with battery troubles in the form of burned out or corroded batteries, shorted cables, or cracked and warped plates.

Concentrated during the winter months, 12 percent of total calls for help will be caused by faulty ignitions, the third most common cause of road breakdowns.

Fourteen percent of all cars will require towing at some time or other during the year, while carburetor troubles on cars not conditioned for winter driving will accumulate so excessively as to cause 6.5 percent of the annual average of breakdowns.

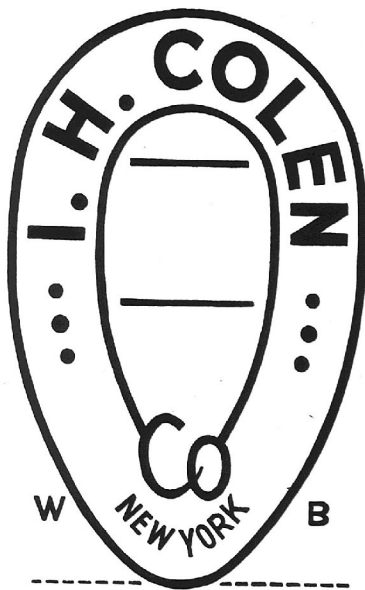

Watch that Muzzle

Most people will buy a car and never think of using it for a battering ram. The same people will buy a camera and never think of using it for anything but taking pictures. But put a gun in the hands of some folks during the hunting season and they will think of a hundred and one different uses for the weapon. They will use it for a vault to go over fences, a stick to clear away brush, or even a club to batter things. Whether the gun is loaded or not, or where the muzzle points never seems to bother them.

These peculiar creatures are a small minority of the 11,000,000 hunters who will take to the fields and woods this fall, but they are the ones who will cause foolish accidents and give a black-eye to a great American sport just because they gave weapons many unwarranted utilities and then forgot to "WATCH THAT MUZZLE."

The National Rifle Association, through surveys conducted in past years, knows that they will point the

gun muzzle at themselves or at others and then an accidental discharge will bring tragedy.

Take the case of father and son in California last year. Junior tried clubbing a raccoon to death with the butt of his shotgun and the resultant discharge shot out his insides. Father then grabbed up the dying son's gun continued swatting the coon. The second barrel went off and mother had two funerals on her hands.

Both men were killed because of a careless, unwarranted use of a weapon. Uncalled for tragedies of this type can be eliminated by—Keeping a gun unloaded when not in use . . . Carrying it in "open action" until game is sighted . . . Keeping the muzzle pointed into the air or ground when carrying . . . never using it to help you over an obstacle . . . and, naturally, Never using it as a club.

Remember to respect a sporting gun's potentialities at all times and see that the muzzle never points at anything but the game you are after.

#### Right and Left Seeing

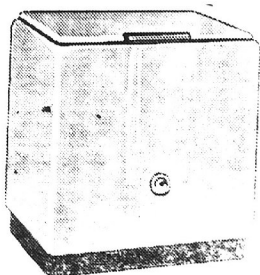

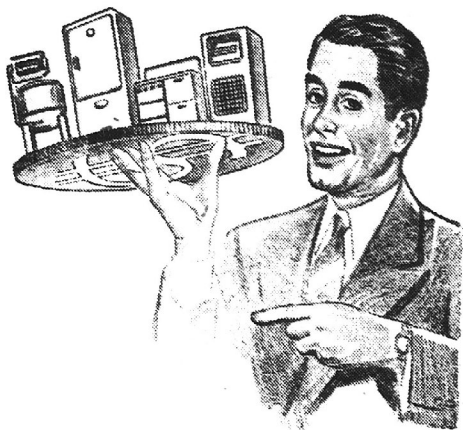

### HUNTERS APPEARED NOV. 10; RECORD SEASON EXPECTED

The greatest hunting pressure in Indiana history was indicated today as Indiana Department of Conservation officials began to tally early reports on the new season, which opened Nov. 10.

Smart rabbits and quail began look for cover Monday, but with a record number of licensed sportsmen in the field, the birds and beasts didn't have much chance. Hoping to spread out the kill fairly well and seeking to cut down "market hunting," Conservation Department Director John H. Nigh, changed the cottontail bag limit from 10 to 5. The rabbit is Hoosier hunters' favorite quarry.

The bob-white Quail, Indiana's number one upland game bird, may be killed at the rate of 10 per day, but the season closes Dec. 20. Rabbits may be hunted until Jan. 10.

The trapping season will extend from Nov. 15 until Jan. 15.

There is no open season on pheasants this year.

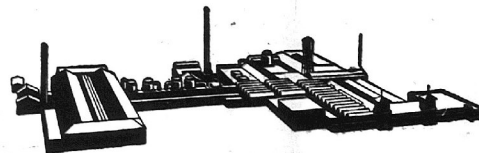

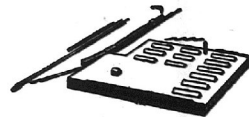

### HEALTH FACTS FROM YOUR STATE BOARD OF HEALTH TULAREMIA

Deaths from tularemia in Indiana have dropped from 19 and 12 in 1941 and 1940, respectively, to one, three or two deaths a year since that time, according to figures released today by the farm-ana State Board of Health.

The decrease in deaths and in cases reported by Indiana Health Officers may be due to the natural fluctuation of tularemia among fur-bearing animals. Tularemia is transmitted among fur-bearing animals by lice and ticks and has epidemic years among animals similar to epidemics of measles, scarlet fever and other communicable diseases in children. The decrease may have been influenced too by the limited number of hunters during the war years, or it may also mean that Indiana hunters are taking proper precautions in the handling of rabbits and other fur-bearing animals and thus avoiding tularemia.

Precautions include the wearing of rubber gloves when handling wild animals, washing the hands with soap, water and an alcoholic rinse after cleaning and skinning game, cooking the meat sufficiently, and avoiding drinking of raw water in areas where tularemia is prevalent among wild animals.

Although the deaths show a decrease there are still cases of tularemia occur-

ring in Indiana. Anyone having direct contact with a rabbit or fur-bearing animal should see a physician immediately if sudden pains and fever develop. The laboratory of the State Board of Health helps local physicians in diagnosing tularemia by examining the blood of a person suspected of having the disease.

Don't waste feed on non-layers, say Purdue University extension poultrymen. Leghorn pullets over seven months old or other pullets over eight months not yet laying are slow developers and feed wasters. Sell them or eat them now.

Some time ago we mentioned that we were going to find out how much it was costing to place the new automatic flasher signals at three railroad crossings in Mentone.

There is no question but that the railroad had erected the latest in railway safety signals and now, if one fails to see the red danger signals and gets in front of a train, he will have no one but himself to blame.

One thing we've noted—and we think it well worth remembering—is that the trains move through the town at a pretty fast clip these days and there isn't much time left to cross after the flashers start giving out the danger signal. If they start to flash, better let the train have the right of way. St. Peter won't give you any right-of-way just because you have a steering wheel in your hands.

### TRIED AND TESTED

Here is another recipe. This time it is for Caramels and submitted by Mrs. Delford Nelson.

- 1 1/4 c. sugar
- 1/2 c. corn syrup
- 1 pt. cream
- 1 egg yolk
- 2 tbs. butter
- 2 tbs. flour
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Mix sugar, syrup and 1/2 cream. Put on to cook. Beat egg yolk and add to rest of cream. Stir gradually into candy, without allowing it to stop boiling. Cook to soft ball stage, stirring occasionally.

Beat butter to a cream, add flour, gradually stir into candy which has been taken from fire at soft ball stage. Return to fire, cook just a trifle harder, according to hardness desired. Add vanilla, pour into buttered pan. I found it can stand considerable cooking to make a fairly firm caramel.

## 41ST ANNUAL CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE

The 41st Annual Christmas Seal Sale was off to a good start on Monday, November 24th. Several million letters will flood the U. S. Post Office service over the nation and several thousand will be mailed in Kosciusko county from 18 different post offices. Ninety-five percent of the funds received will be spent in the State of Indiana and 83% of this in Kosciusko County.

There are over 3000 Associations in the United States that will use the 1947 design of Christmas Seal. Using the same seal with the U. S. left off will be Canada, England, Bermuda and Newfoundland.

Christmas Seal funds are used for case finding, health education rehabilitation, medical research and other services of a national and international basis. Local government agencies assume the responsibility for the care of the tuberculosis. By finding cases early to prevent any further spreading and then care for those afflicted, the death rate since 1904 has been reduced 80%.

The fight, of course is not won, as 53,000 were victims last year. 12,147 veterans of World War II are victims of the disease and the government has already spent one billion dollars for hospitalization, etc. for World War I veterans. It is estimated that there are 500,000 cases of tuberculosis in the United States, one half of which are known cases, the other unknown. The unknown cases must be found.

### 1948 MILK PRODUCTION MAY BE LESS THAN '47

More than the usual amount of roughages and pasture should be used in the 1948 dairy cow ration because of the relatively high costs of feed grains, recommends F. H. Demaree, Purdue University extension agricultural economist, in discussing the 1948 dairy outlook.

With high feed prices in prospect for this fall and winter and since whole milk prices are likely to average about the same in the first half of 1948 as in the first half of 1947, returns from dairy enterprises during this period probably will be about the same or perhaps below returns received in 1947.

Dairy cow numbers have declined steadily since mid-1944, says the economist. The number of milk cows on farms in the United States declined two percent during the year ending in mid-1947, reaching the lowest level since early 1947. Milk production per cow during these years has been going upward, however, because of culling and liberal grain feeding. The high price of grain and less favorable whole-milk-butterfat feed ratios likely will reduce grain feeding in 1948, though, so that production per cow is expected to decrease during the coming year. Wholesale milk prices will increase

seasonally until about the end of 1947, but are not expected to reach the peak of last year, according to Demaree. Prices will decline seasonally after the turn of the year and through the spring months, but a serious price break in the first half of 1948 is unlikely.

Indications are that manufactured milk prices will hold up as well in the spring of 1948 as in the spring of 1947, with the possible exception of milk sold for cheese, the economist says.

### GETTING THE BEST BUYS IN MEAT

Meat buying presents one of the biggest problems to home makers. Miss Anna Paul Rainier, extension specialist of Purdue University, has some timely advice for homemakers headed toward meat counters.

It always pays to buy meat with thrift and cook it with care, each day it is becoming more important to conserve meat. Miss Rainier reminds homemakers that all meat can be made tender by proper cooking. With this in mind, don't overlook the less tender cuts, she advises.

It is highly important to know meat cuts so one can pick out the best buys. Learn cuts of meat well enough to identify them on sight. Study charts that show how meat-animal carcasses

are divided and what the different cuts look like. Learn the various grades. Then study the local markets and patronize those handling the kind of meat that fits the budget.

Plan meat purchases so that every bit can be utilized. Save trimmings and bones for soups and flavoring.

Don't ignore the variety meats. They are nutritious and as a result good buys. There are many recipes available for tongue, heart, liver and kidneys.

Smoked tongue, pork shoulder, spareribs, dried beefs and chuck roasts are economical meat buys.

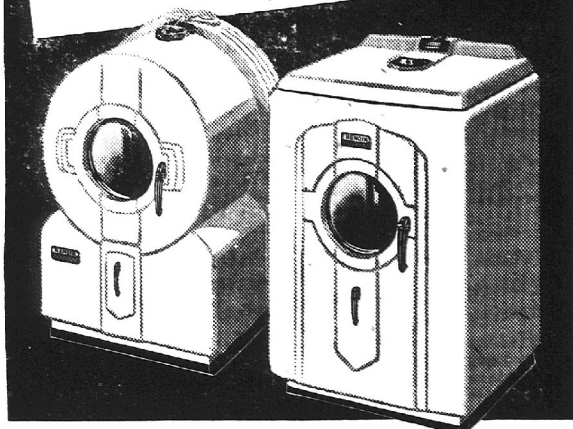

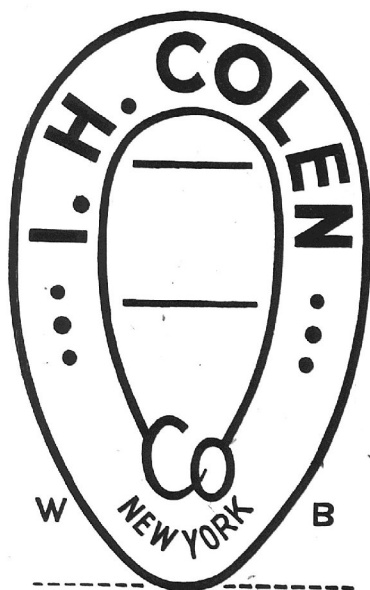

### SOME INTERESTING FIGURES ON THE SCHOOL LUNCHES

We dropped in at the school cafeteria on Wednesday afternoon just as the cooks, Mrs. Witham and Mrs. Friesner, were tackling the stack of

dirty dishes.

We picked up some very interesting food figures and know that they will be of interest to parents, especially.

On the days that chili or soup is served (and it takes gallons and gallons) 16 pounds of crackers are consumed.

sumed.

When orange juice is served, it takes 9 gallons.

Ten bunches of celery or carrots are needed, each day they are served.

When the cooks bake cake, they need 10 boxes of cake mix.

It takes 35 pounds of hamburger and 504 buns when they serve hamburger sandwiches (and some folks use bread instead of buns).

100 pounds of potatoes are used each day they serve potatoes. (Dave Bowsler is official potato-masher, which keeps his appetite in shape).

24 to 28 loaves of bread are used each day, along with 4 pounds of butter and one gallon of jam.

220 half pints of milk are used (and not all the students drink milk.)

When canned vegetables are used it takes two cases of No. 10 cans.

One bushel of apples is used at one time.

As there are around 250 students and teachers eating, it requires vast amounts of food.

The money which was formerly used to hire more help is now being spent on food, and volunteer student help is being used.

## MORE GAME BIRDS AND RABBITS BUT HUNTERS DIFFER

It's the old story. Ask an expert how the game is this year and he will say "spotty." Ask a hunter selected at random and he will say, "lots of rabbits." Ask another hunter in the next field and he will say, "no rabbits." The bird hunters are equally divided; some say one thing, some say another.

Indiana Department of Conservation officials, who should know if anyone does, say both rabbits and quail are available in greater numbers than in 1946, but they point out the actual statistics will not be presented until Pittman-Robertson field men have finished their annual count of the "game harvest."

As usual, the number one upland game bird in Indiana this year is the bobwhite quail. The open season ends on December 20. The rabbit season continues until January 10. There is no open season on pheasants this year.

### HEALTH FACTS FROM YOUR STATE BOARD OF HEALTH

#### Septic Sore Throat

Cases of septic sore throat reported so far this year by Indiana Health Officers to the Indiana State Board of Health show an increase not only over the number reported for the same period a year ago but also an increase over the number of cases reported for any one of the past five years except 1946.

One hundred and sixty-six cases have been reported this year as compared to 76 for the same period in 1946. Only 4 cases were reported in 1942, eleven in 1943, 63 in 1944, 70 in 1945, and 194 in 1946.

The increase may indicate a greater prevalence of septic sore throat or it may mean better reporting of the disease by doctors to health officers.

Septic sore throat is an acute infection of the throat and may appear in epidemic form. Sometimes it is followed by rheumatic fever, otitis media, heart disease and nephritis. Although septic sore throat may be transmitted by direct contact, it is not highly communicable from man to man. Individual cases and a majority of epidemics have been traced to contaminated milk or milk products and are more common in areas where milk is not pasteurized.

Local health departments investigate outbreaks of septic sore throat to determine if the source is a personal contact or contaminated milk or food. Infected milk or food handlers are excluded from handling milk or food until the danger is over. The milk of cows showing evidence of mastitis is excluded from public use and infected cows are removed from the herd.

#### SOCIAL SECURITY HEADACHE

"Came June, came brides, and now a headache for the biggest bookkeeping organization in the country, the Social Security Administration," Gerald Kelter, Manager of the Elkhart office of the Social Security Administration said today.

Being proud of their new names working brides almost invariably ask their boss to show their new names on the pay roll—and being human, most of them put off bringing their cards around to the Social Security Administration office for an official Social Security name change.

So, the bride now appears on her employer's social security report as Mary Brown along with the number that the Social Security Administration records show for Mary Smith. The Social Security Administration suspects that a marriage might be the answer to the discrepancy, but there is also the chance that Mary Brown is a new employee who was accidentally reported with Mary Smith's number.

Mr. Kelter explains that the Government can't afford to take chances, and correspondence with the employer is necessary before Mary Brown, nee Smith, can get credit for the wages she earned. In most instances, the records are cleared and Mrs. Mary Brown gets credit for her wages, but this happens only after the Government and the employer have spent considerable time and effort in untangling the mix-up.

"Now that June is over I'm extending all June brides an invitation to come in and get their name officially added to their social security account number card," Mr. Kelter concluded. "Those that aren't able to come in should send a letter to the Social Security Administration, Room 222, Equity Building, Elkhart, and ask for form OAA-7003, Change of Record Application."

of all the Middlesex County Lions Clubs, who were on hand to present Mrs. Thomsen with a new iron lung. The homecoming was a dramatic one. As soon as the train stopped, a squad of hand picked members of the New Brunswick Fire Company went to the special baggage car in which Mrs. Thomsen made the 500-mile trip and lifted her with care onto a platform cart. Other firemen, working under the direction of Mr. Thomsen, stretched a long cable line to an electric outlet in order that the lung's motor might continue to operate without interruption.

While the firemen were making the connection, Mrs. Thomsen's husband stood by at the manual controls in case of a power failure.

As soon as the iron lung was set on the platform cart, young Ronnie was lifted to his mother's side by a nurse, and he embraced her. Tears welled in the eyes of the crowd each time other members of the family stepped up to greet Mr. Thomsen.

After the iron lung was lowered to the station's main floor, a large truck, with an electric power unit of its own, stood by to carry Mrs. Thomsen to the Middlesex County Polio hospital in New Brunswick, where she will remain for further treatment.

The iron lung is the gift of the combined county Lions clubs, and the money was raised for it by the collection and sale of waste paper.

Mrs. Thomsen, who contracted the dreaded disease on August 37, 1946, while visiting with her mother in Claypool, Ind., is a former Indiana beauty queen.

George Rans is now at his home west of town after spending some time at the Memorial hospital. His condition remains unchanged.
