Continued from page one.) urbances, if over-fed.

tions for hens or chicks that tain 10 per cent or more meat scraps will contain ample phosphorus for normal growth. The addition of extra bone meal to the ration containing 10 per cent meat scraps is almost certain to cause enlarged joints, slipped tendons, and deformed bones. Chick rations in particular that contain 10 per cent meat scraps are certain to cause trouble if more bone meal is added.

Sodium and chlorine are badly needed by poultry, but fortunately these materials can be added in the form of common salt. It is customary to add 1 per cent salt to poultry rations. This is an adequate quantity but it must be thoroughly mixed. Large quantities of salt are extremely toxic to poultry and must be avoided under all conditions.

Mineral mixtures in a ration are not desirable unless the ration contains vegetable protein concentrates Instead of meat scraps. If the ration contained such concentrates as soy ean meal as a protein supplement, then it would be necessary to add about 5 pounds of mineral to each 100 pounds of feed. This mineral mixture could be composed of 60 ber cent bone meal, 20 per cent ground oyster shell or limestone, and 20 per cent salt.

The vitamins take their names from the letters of the alphabet. There is no chemical test for them yet, their biological affect on animals is plainly evident. Perhaps their action on the body is a combination of chemical and physical reactions.

Vitamin A is, associated with the vellow pigment of plants called carotin This pigment contains properties which when taken into the body of the animal is capable of forming this Vitamin A. The pigment zanthophyll oes not carry this propert and is ot capable of producing Vitamin A. Lack of Vitamin A causes a nutrianal disorder in the fowl, popularly referred to as Nutritional Roup or more technically Avitaminosis A. Since Vitamin A is formed by the feeding of yellow corn, green feed, alfalfa, cod liver oil, and similar feeds, rations that are low in these materials are likely to cause trouble. This deficiency causes the formation of white patches on the lining of the throat, in the kidneys, and the eye.

Vitamin C found in orange juice and tomato juice is not required by poultry. They seem to have the ability to manufacture it in their livers,

Vitamin D. known popularly as the sunshine vitamin, is most important in poultry nutrition. This vitamin makes possible the use of mineral in the body, giving eggs of normal shell and bones of proper texture. Lack of it gives the condition comparable to rickets in children.

The theory of Vitamin D is that the ultra-violet rays of the sun falling upon the body causes chemical changes and the formation of the vitamin in the body. We also know that this health giving material may be formed in the body of fishes and stored in their livers. The use of cod liver oil and sardine oil is well known to poultrymen.

Chean oils such as cottonseed oil have been treated by exposure to sunshine and ultra violet lamps with the hopes that Vitamin D properties might be imparted to them. These tests have been practically negligible in results. Feeds are being created in the same way, but nothing very prac-

Some Types of Aircraft Have Three-Blade Propellers

Many modern types of aircraft are equipped with propellers having three blades, rather than only two. The reasons for three propeller blades, relates a writer in the Kansas City Star. depend to a great extent upon the type of aircraft and engine.

In certain modern aircraft it is es sential to use a three-blade propeller because the blades are considerably shorter than those of a two-blade propeller designed to permit a given engine to develop full power, for there would be danger of longer blades striking the ground at the takeoff. In addition, extremely high propeller tip speed, necessary in a two-blade propeller to develop full engine power. 18 not necessary in the propeller of three blades. High tip speed is excessively noisy and places undue stress on the propeller. In addition, full engine power is not developed so rapidly with the longer two blade propeller as with the three-blade propeller.

The slower an airplane propeller can turn to do a given job, the less noise will result, along with the other important item of less engine speed and consequent less wear and tear and lower operating costs.

Why Animals' Names Are Applied to Some Tools

Why are so many things, especially in engineering circles, called by the names of animals? It is not difficult to see why the long, tapering lifter of greater weights should be called a crane, although it might as fittingly be called a stork or an ostrich. As for the donkey-engine, it obviously does the "donkey-work," the smaller tasks ignored by the bigger engine.

Is the monkey-wrench so called because it deals mainly with "nuts." or because when open it bears some resemblance to the simian features? Horse power is the unit of strength in all civilized countries, and naturally arises from the fact that until recently the horse was the world's mainmeans of traction. The carpenter's horse and the clothes-horse have evidently heavy burdens to carry, and the tailor's goose gets its name from the resemblance of its handle to the neck of that bird.

Why Cupolas Are Used

Small, house-like buildings are seen frequently on top of barns in the rural areas. They are sometimes located at one end of the barn, and sometimes in the middle; but always they are on the ridge of the roof, Martins and other birds often build nests in them. The purpose of the small building on farm barns is for ventilation. It is called a cupola. and on the large hay barns, particularly in the northern states, it is a common method of construction. In most cases the cupola is merely a covering for a hole in the ridge through which air from the barn may circulate. In virtually all cases the sides of the cupola are constructed of inclined

boards. In modern construction, this cupola is connected with air shafts properly arranged in such manner as to control the ventilation, particularly in dairy cattle barns.—Kansas City Star.

Why British Crown Was Remade The gold framework was taken to pieces and reset to make it more secure. Among its famous stones are the Black Prince's ruby, which dates back five centuries; the pearl eardrops of Queen Elizabeth; the second largest part of the Star of Africa diamond, weighing more than 300 carats; the great sapphire from the crown of Charles II; the sapphire from the coro nation ring of Edward the Confessor. and other symbols equally as historic. Why Virginia Is Not D. C.

The citizens of Alexandria petitioned the congress for the retrocession of Alexandria county, Virginia, ceded to the national government for the national capital. The vote was 763 to 222 of the citizens and the petition was based on the grounds that no federal buildings had been erected on the Virginia side, nor were likely to be, and that the citizens were deprived of political and other rights, with no henefits. The act retroceding the territory was signed by the President July 10, 1846.

Why Glass Is Whitewashed

Have you ever noticed that the glass roofs of greenhouses are whitewashed? The reason for this is to prevent the sun's rays from burning up the flowers. It not only shades the plants but reflects the sun. Black would be used, florists explain, but this would cut out too much of the heat from the sun and not allow enough light to reach the growing plants.

Would Reach to Moon

Postage stamps printed at the bureau of engraving and printing in a single average year, if laid end to end, would reach from the earth to the moon, according to an authority. The line would exceed 200,000 miles, or eight times the circumference of the globe, and 25 different colors would be represented in the chain. Stacked in sheets of 100 stamps each, the annual stamp production would make 92 piles as high as the Washington monument. Eight hundred tons of paper, 430 tons of link and 240 tons of gum are used in an ordinary 12-month period.

Decommission

The term decommission is of recent origin. In application it has been limited almost exclusively to naval use with reference to ships, aircraft, or the like. In the navy a vessel is "put into commission" when, after completion or after repair, it has been fitted for sea service. Conversely, it is decommissioned when it has been officially taken off the list of vessels inactive service.—Literary Digest.
