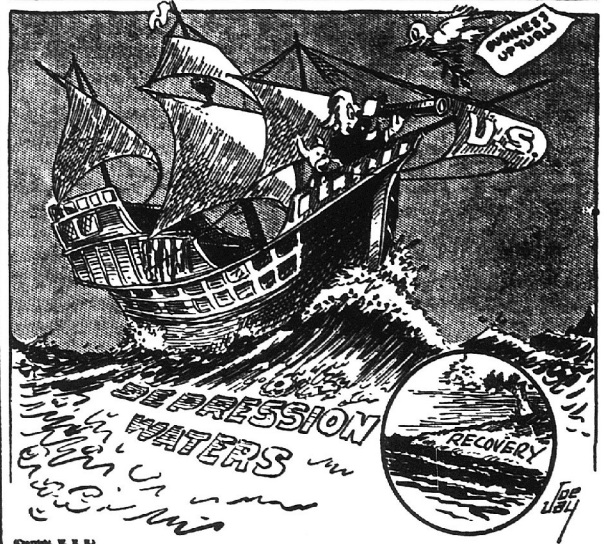

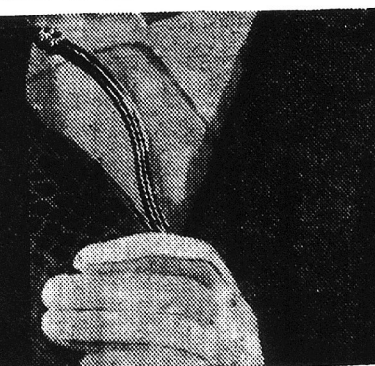

The winner was given a bushel of Hybrid corn and Ralph Osborn of Culver gave $\frac{1}{2}$ bushel of Hybrid corn to the second highest, and $\frac{1}{4}$ bushel each to the third and fourth highest.

Each contestant was allowed 5 oz. of husks. For each oz. over 5, 1 per cent was deducted up to 9 oz. Over 9 oz. 3 per cent was deducted for each oz. Each pound of marketable corn left in the field is multiplied by 3 and deducted from the amount husked.

Rex Huffer will compete in a state contest in the near future.

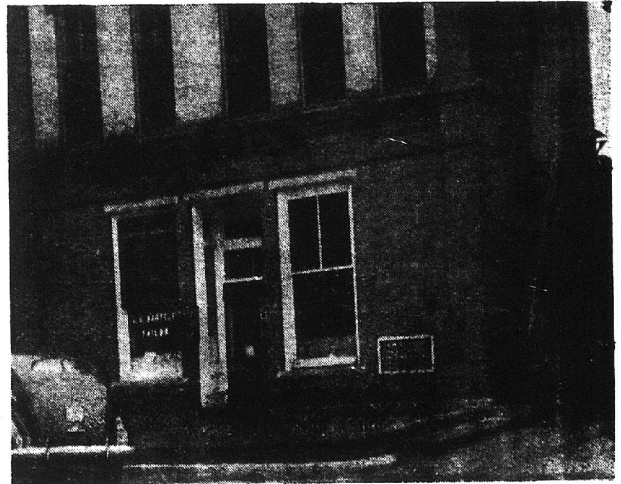

KOSCIUSKO COUNTY RURAL ELECTRIFICATION MEETINGS

In the near future 1200 Kosciusko County farms are to receive service from rural electric lines. During the week of October 24, three rural electrification meetings will be held throughout the county in order that farm operators and homemakers may enjoy the fullest benefits from electrical service, when it becomes available.

The services of S. A. Anderson, Extension Specialist in the Division of Agricultural Engineering, Purdue University, have been secured through the County Agricultural Agent's office for these meetings which are being held as follows:

Monday evening, October 24, Sidney School.

Tuesday evening, October 25, Mentone School.

Wednesday evening, October 26, Silver Lake School.

Slides illustrating the various types of equipment available and in use in farm homes and on farmsteads in Indiana, the cost of operating the electrical equipment, and the planning of adequate, safe and convenient wiring to provide for present and future needs at a minimum cost, will be the timely and interesting topics discussed at the meeting.

Farm owners and homemakers who are soon to receive service from rural lines are urged by their county agricultural agent to attend these meetings. The discussion will not only assist them in securing the most efficient and economical use of the service but will help them to avoid mistakes in the selection of electrical equipment and in the planning of the wiring of the farm home and farmstead.

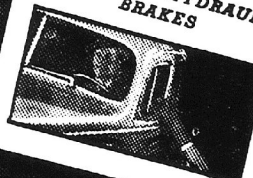

Violin and Cello Built

For Solos in Large Halls

PASADENA, CALIF.—After eight years of experimentation, Dr. Hugo Benioff, associate professor of seismology at the California Institute of Technology, has a violin and a cello that are calculated to solve the problem of volume in solo performances in huge auditoriums.

The instruments have the conventional forms and outlines except that the wooden front and back are omitted. In the place of these resonance chambers, a small aluminum container is placed beneath the strings. In the case of the cello, the container holds a small piece of crystal. Vibrations from the strings cause the crystal to vibrate. A wire carries these vibrations to amplifying devices and thence to a loud speaker.

In the violin, a slightly different principle is used. In place of the crystal, there is an electro-magnetic device. When a string vibrates to the magnetic field of this device, a current is produced which is amplified on the loud speaker.

Titanic's Last Menu Is

Cherished by Survivor

PITTSBURGH.—A menu of the last dinner served on the Titanic just before she struck the iceberg that sent her to the bottom of the Atlantic in April, 1912, is the prized possession of J. I. Flynn, a Pittsburgh department store executive. Flynn, who believes the menu is the only one in existence, said he had been offered \$3,000 for it.

Flynn recalls that at dinner on the night of the disaster he had asked some friends to write their names on the menu. "It would not fit into my tuxedo pocket," Flynn said, "so on deck I put it into my overcoat pocket."

He was sleeping when the alarm was sounded. He jumped from his bed, flung the overcoat over his shoulders and dashed on deck. A sailor commanded him and Edward Calderhead, another passenger, to man a boat loaded with women.

Half-Masting the Flag

The custom of lowering the flag to half-mast in honor of the dead is said to have arisen from the old naval and military practice of lowering the flag in time of war as a sign of submission. Spanish ships in the Seventeenth century displayed the flag at half-mast as a signal of distress. Captain Smith's Seaman's Grammar as early as 1627 makes reference to the flying of a flag at half-mast as a sign of mourning.
