Parcels for Japan, Korea, and the islands of the Pacific should pe mailed as early as possible, preferbly not later than Nov. 1, in view of the distances involved. Air Parcel Post intended for personnel of the armed forces serving overseas or on naval vessels should be mailed not later than Nov. 25. Air parcel post mailed after this date cannot, be assured of delivery before Christmas. The movement of air parcel post by air from the ports

SHAKE HANDS BEFORE AND AFTER CORN HARVEST

Farmers who are going to operate a corn picker this fall might first try tying their shoes with their fists, suggests R. M. Lien, agricultural engineer of Purdue University.

Unless time is allowed to observe safety precautions, the corn harvesting period, just starting, will take its annual toll of lives and hands. A few years ago the corn picking period required months instead of weeks. Development of the picker subtracted instead of economical, when operating harvest time but multiplied the number of dead, maimed and crippled far-

Don't set out each morning to break the record of the previous day, Lien for the day before fatigue brings on

Gauge the speed of operation accord ing to conditions, as would be the cas in safe operation of a car on the highway. Always stop machine and shut off motor to make adjustments in the field. Prevent need for many adjustment stops by having the picker in proper working condition before going into the corn, thus heading off many accident situations.

Loose clothing can be dangerous around machinery. The extra thumb sewed on work gloves to permit wearing both sides could prove to be costly,

a corn picker.

An added precaution, highly recommended, is carrying a fire extinguisher. Stop the machine occasionally and remove accumulated trash so a chance advises farmers. He suggests they quit spark won't start a fire. Replace glass sediment bulb with metal and be careful about smoking in dry corn.

Owing to the long sea transit frequently involved in the transmission of parcels by surface means, and to customs inspections and other formalities to which parcels may be subjected in the countries of destination, it is recommended that mailings be made as early as practicable to assure delivery by Christmas day. Senders can be reasonably sure that parcels mailed not later than the dates shown below will reach their destinations before Christmas.

4-H CLUB CHATTER By Ruth Snellenberger

Dear 4-H Parents and Friends.

WHAT IS 4-H WORK? Four-H is an organization for rural girls and boys to help them to do better the jobs they help to do at home. Hence, the motto "To Make the Best Better." For example a girl may already help can and prepare foods for he freezer. There are new and better ways for doing these things which a girl may learn through the 4-H food preservation project. Another example is in clothing where through 4-H a girl may learn new developments in clothing construction.

WHO MAY JOIN? Anyone who is from 10 to 20 years of age, inclusive, sometime within the current calendar year. One advantage of this lower age limit is that girls are then interested and excited about helping mother in the kitchen .Through 4-H work this interest can be guided.

HOW DO YOU JOIN? By signing an enrollment card available through the county extension office, one becomes a member. In signing, the member agrees to complete the requirements of the project or projects she or he checks to participate in. The signature of both the parents and the adult leader are required to approve and encourage the member.

WHAT MUST BE DONE TO COM-PLETE A PROJECT? To complete a project enrolled in, one must do the required work listed in the project record book, keep the record requested

in a demonstration, exhibit the requir- such a practical way, too. ed items at the county fair, and turn in the completed record book. A member must do her or his own work. The bulletins and record books are available through the county extension of-

WHAT DOES IT COST TO JOIN? There is no membership fee for joining 4-H. What clubs do to provide refreshments at meetings vary. Some ask each member to give five cents, others have members take their turns providing refreshments, and some others have bake sales to make a little money.

WHAT IS GAINED BY BEING A 4-H MEMBER? In addition to the project instruction (more is planned for 1955 than previous years in girls' work) the girl or boy (1) learns behavior in a group—consideration of wants of others, to take turns, to be quiet when others are talking, to understand one does not always win, to practice parliamentary procedure; (2) learns how to organize equipment and information to 'show how" (demonstrate) to do something; (3) has an opportunity to develop leadership by being an officer in the club, serving on committees, and by helping younger members; (4) has an opportunity to develop ability to make wise choices through judging activities where several items are studied before selecting the best one, and (5) has an opportunity to achieve many awards of ribbons, medals, trophies, trips, and so forth.



They keep about 1200 laying hens, milk about 20 head of cattle and feed out about one hundred hogs a year.

SEED A WINTER COVER CROP ON THE GARDEN

A winter cover crop on the garden has several advantages, according to W. B. Ward, Purdue University department of horticulture. It keeps the soil from blowing or washing, holds the available plant foods which will add much needed organic matter when plowed under next spring. The winter cover crop will also add color to the garden during the bleak winter months ahead.

Rve. wheat, and in some localities. winter oats or barley may be seeded during October. Ward advises that the seed may be broadcast by hand and worked into the soil with a small garden tractor. The small amount of seed used on the garden is a very small investment, when compared to the dividends and benefits received from next year's garden.

(With the heavy rains the past few days, you may have to use a rowboat to do the planting.)

Sheep growers will want to inspect the udders of ewes this fall. Henry Mayo, Purdue University animal husbandry extension specialist, says every ewe with a spoiled udder should be disposed of; because her lamb will not have a fair chance next spring. Lamb chickens and beef cattle, is conducted profits depend on how much milk the ewe can provide.

FALL DRIVING PROBLEMS

The Chicago Motor Club gives this advice to motorists who find their autos stalled because of wet ignitions:

1. Raising the auto hood may provide enough circulation to dry off the plugs and ignition wires.

2. Should this not work, spark plugs may be wiped dry with either a dry cloth or one wet with kerosene. The ignition MUST be turned off before attempting to dry plugs.

3. If neither of these procedures help, then the motorist should seek expert help.

Motor Club road service experts pointed out that after driving through water puddles, brakes often will slip. They advised trying the brakes several times before entering heavily trafficed areas, after leaving a wet area.

Motorists should be cautious about parking their cars off roads or on shoulders until the ground dries thoroughly. The heavy rains have undermined many dirt areas.

There is a danger of ground giving way under the weight of an auto in such areas, and also in new housing developments where ground around the driveways has recently been filled in, warned the club.

Egg producers should guard against letting the first cool days of fall be the cause of a drop in egg quality; and a consequent reduction in the weekly egg check. This often happens when furnaces are started, because the heat dries out the basement where the eggs are held. Poultry department specialists at Purdue University advise sprinkling the floor and walls of the egg room. This will help prevent excessive evaporation and drop in quality of the eggs.



3. "A member should enroll in the division of a project where she will laarn something." (For example, usally 14-year-olds should not enroll in a first division of baking, clothing, food

Generally speaking, no more than two divisions in the same project should be taken in one year and one should be completed before the second is started. No credit will be given for projects completed below those of greater difficulty already completed.







Which is witch?? None! They're all good eggs in witches' hats. They're part of the fun at Hallowe'en parties. Each is a favor to take home or consume on the spot. Each bears the guest's name on its collar and can be used as a place card.

The hard-boiled look on the shell is achieved with a black crayon or a few strokes of a paint brush dipped in pure vegetable color.

Assemble a few hard-cooked eggs in array, such as thei, surround with popcorn, use sheaves of grain (or autumn leaves) for background and-presto!you have a centerpiece to radiate magic for Hallowe'en.

Here's how it's done:

Cut witches' hats and collars from black paper, using above pattern.

Twist collars into circles of size to hold eggs and fasten with paste. Then paste names of guests on collars.

Make witches hats by joining the two straight edges of the crown on the inside with cellulose tape. Attach crown to hat brim with more tape. Use pieces of wool varn for witches' hair by pasting to under side of brim.

When hard-cooking eggs, cover them in pan with water to come at least one inch above eggs. After bringing rapidly to boiling, turn off heat. Cover and let stand fifteen minutes. Then cool

promptly and thoroughly in cold water. This helps to prevent dark surface on yolks.

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



OPTIMISTIC DAIRY

OUTLOOK SEEN

Over one-thousand dairymen, mostly producers from 11 states, heard Dr. W. E. Petersen, professor of dairy husbandry from Minnesota University, predict an optomistic future for efficient dairymen at the seventh annual meeting of the American Breeders Service held recently at Carmel, Indiana.

Based on his recent observations of methods in New Zealand and Australia, Dr. Petersen said that greater production per man hour of labor and per acre of land is necessary for efficient production. He predicted a milk shortage in the forseeable future if the present population trend continues. A goal of 400 pounds of butterfat and of hauling the feed to her. ten thousand pounds of milk per cow per year to qualify for service from stud bulls is considered practical, ac- Minnesota showed twice a day milkcording to Petersen.



FOR FARM FAMILIES

Over five and a half million farm operators and farm employees will begin earning old-age and survivors insurance protection for themselves and their families beginning January 1,

Farm operators—people farming for themselves-have not been covered by the social security law up to now. Beginning January 1, 1955 farm operators who make a profit of \$400 or more in law which affects them may be oba year will begin earning social security protection.

People doing farm work for others as farm employees are already covered diana. by the law if they work regularly for one farm operator. The new law brings old-age and survivors insurancee protection to all farm employees who earn \$100 or more cash wages in a year from any one farm.

Gerald O. Kelver, manager of the district office of the social seccurity administration in Elkhart, has stated that this change in the law means more farm workers will now count for

the first time toward soccial security benefits for farmers and their families. Kelver adds that this means farmers will now be able to receive insurance payments in their old age based on earnings from farm work covered by the law and other members of the farmers family may be entitled to payments based on his social security account both during his retirement and after his death.


