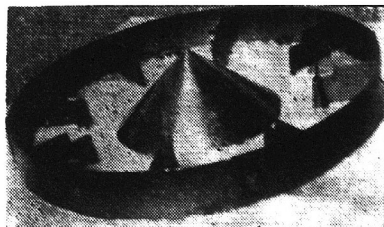

## Diver Describes Wealth Lying on The Ocean Floor

### Fabulous Fortunes Awaiting Daring Adventurer With Capital.

MILWAUKEE.—A fabulous fortune lies at the bottom of the ocean awaiting any adventurer with daring and capital enough to get it.

Max Eugene Nohl, deep sea diver and inventor, described the wealth under the seas in sunken ships and other sources.

"In the South Seas," he said, "I can take you up in an airplane and show you 200 wrecked ships lying on the bottom in the clear water in less than an hour."

The six-foot, 29-year-old diver who made the world's deepest dive, 420 feet, intends to investigate these wrecks this summer in a combined salvage and motion picture expedition.

Many of the ships lying on the ocean floor will prove disappointing, according to Nohl. Their once valuable cargoes will be ruined by sea water, or after hours of dangerous work the diver will find a safe he laboriously hauled to the surface was ransacked by the crew before abandoning ship.

#### Certain of Wealth.

But there is the optimistic side of the picture, too, Nohl contends. Some of the cargoes will be intact and some of the safes will contain large sums.

He estimated there are 3,600 sunken ships in the South Seas alone that are worth salvaging.

Another fortune could be made, the youthful adventurer asserted, in diving for sponges—which live on the floor of the ocean.

However, even before beginning to think of cashing in on this tempting wealth, large capital is needed, Nohl said. He pointed out that the necessary diving equipment, salvage ship and provisions for a trained crew, as well as the months of preparation and the unfruitful searches, run into a lot of money.

Another consideration before tackling the job of salvaging a fortune from the sea is the danger involved.

Last summer Nohl salvaged the steamer Tarpon in the South Seas. It proved to be a lucky strike because the ship's safe carried a large pay roll, but it almost cost the young diver's life.

#### Work 110 Feet Down.

Operations had reached the point where most of the wreckage obstructing the captain's cabin had been cleared away. Nohl was working on the ship in 110 feet of water.

"The crew signaled me that my time was up on the bottom," Nohl said. "But spurred on by the excitement of knowing that our ob-

jective was close I decided to stay down another 10 minutes.

"Well, the time stretched into one—two—three hours. Then I started up in the usual way—stopping for 30 minutes at various stages so that I would become accustomed to the changes in pressure gradually.

"At the surface," he continued, "I felt fine except for a slight gnawing in my stomach."

It was the dreadful bends—a reaction accompanied by unbearable pain experienced by divers and others who work under pressure and then return to normal air pressure too quickly.

He was rushed to a hospital, where, after repeated doses of morphine and several days' rest, he was normal again except that his arms remained partly paralyzed. Despite this, he returned to the salvage work, finding that whenever he was diving his arms functioned properly, becoming limp when he returned to the surface.

"It was worth it," Nohl commented, but he would not reveal the amount rescued from the ship's safe.

### Shunned by Former Wife, Kills Self With Dynamite

## Heirloom Stolen In 1915 Returned

### Recovery of Gem Is Due to Deathbed Confession.

SEATTLE.—An old-fashioned diamond, an heirloom, has been returned to its rightful family ownership 25 years after it was stolen.

It was returned in a tiny box, wrapped in adhesive tape and tissue paper. The box also contained an unsigned letter by the thief's brother, telling sadly of a war veteran's deathbed confession.

When she sent the diamond to a Seattle jeweler for cleaning, she learned of the fraud. Margaret, now Mrs. William F. Miller, put the ring away and has not worn it.

Now, she says, the ring will be presented to her nine-month-old daughter on her twenty-first birthday.

Scattered rains have lessened the danger temporarily in some parts of the state but these have been insufficient to soak the leaves and other vegetation dried out earlier by days of high temperatures. The effect of these light showers is lost with a short time under a hot sun and strong winds.

Due to the fine cooperation received from the public and the efficient work of the fire wardens, losses from forest fire in the past few weeks have been surprisingly low in view of the conditions which have been put out before they covered much territory or reached valuable timber.

## LAND BANK AIDS FAMILIES TO BUY FARMS IN COUNTY

Eighty-two families in Kosciusko county bought farms of their own during the past 5 years with financing through the Federal Land Bank and the Commissioner, according to Mahlon G. Rickel, secretary-treasurer of the Kosciusko County National Farm Loan Association, at Warsaw.

Pointing out that this financing has enabled some families to purchase farms for the first time in their lives, Mr. Rickel said 16 families bought from private owners, such as elderly families, and 66 purchased farms from the real estate holdings of the Federal Land Bank on liberal credit terms.

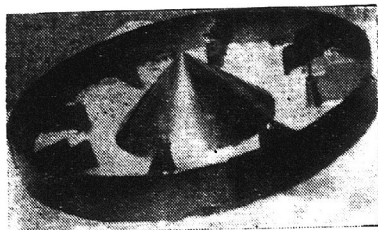

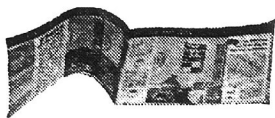

# Household News

By Eleanor Howe



**'MOTHER'S DAY OUT'**  
(See Recipes Below)

It's the custom, in a great many clubs, to draw the season to a graceful close with a charming spring tea. If you're chairman of the refreshment committee for that delightful social function of your organization, why not plan to make "In the Time of Roses" the theme song for your tea?

Use roses here, there and everywhere . . . a rose-pink damask cloth with rose pattern; rose-sprigged china; a great bowl of real roses for the centerpiece, and candied rose petals to decorate the tiny cakes.



When you plan the refreshments, allow at least three sandwiches and two little cakes (or cookies) for each guest, and a pound of mints or salted nuts for each 25 guests. If the tea is a large one, you'll need two platters of sandwiches, two of cakes and one dish each of mints and nuts, on the table at one time, and make sure that for each platter on the table there's at least one full one in the kitchen to take its place.

Choose an interesting variety of dainty sandwiches for your tea. Oblong brown bread sandwiches with cream cheese and marmalade are good, and combine effectively with round white bread sandwiches, with a blend of tuna fish and mayonnaise between them. Very thin, dainty slices of an unusual bread are excellent for plain bread and butter sandwiches.

An assortment of dark and light

cookies, and very small cakes provide the sweet touch for your menu. And tea you must have, of course.

Tea, when properly made, is one of the most invigorating drinks you can serve. It is most important, especially when making tea for a group, to measure the amount of tea used and to brew it just long enough and not too long in order to insure its best fragrance and tang. (Three to five minutes is generally conceded to be just about right brewing time.)

## **Bishop's Bread.** (Makes 1 loaf)

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 1½ cups flour
- 1½ teaspoons baking powder
- ¾ teaspoon salt
- 2 cups nut meats (broken)
- 1 cup dates (sliced)
- 1 cup Maraschino cherries
- ¼ pound sweet or semi-sweet chocolate

Beat eggs until light, and add the sugar, beating just enough to mix. Sift flour, baking powder and salt and add the nuts, dates, cherries and chocolate which has been broken into pieces about the size of a five-cent piece. Add to the first mixture, and mix just enough to blend the ingredients. Grease a bread loaf pan thoroughly and line the bottom with wax paper. Grease paper and pour in the batter. Bake in a moderately slow oven (325 degrees) for about 1½ hours. Cool and slice very thin.



## **Butter Ovals.**

(Makes 30 small cookies)

- ½ cup butter
- 3 tablespoons superfine powdered sugar
- 1 cup flour
- 1 cup nut meats (broken)

Cream butter, add powdered sugar and blend well. Add flour slowly and mix thoroughly. Fold in nut meats. Shape into small crescent shaped rolls about the size of a small finger. Place on greased baking sheet and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for approximately 20 minutes. Roll in powdered sugar while warm.

## **Little Swedish Tea Cakes.**

- 1 cup butter
- ½ cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 2 cups cake flour
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Cream butter and add sugar slowly. Cream well. Add well-beaten egg and blend. Sift flour once before measuring and then sift again with salt. Add and blend in flavoring. Place a rounded teaspoonful of batter in very small greased muffin tins (1½ inches in diameter). Press batter up sides and over bottom so that there is a hollow in the center. Fill this hollow with an almond filling (about 1 teaspoonful).

Almond Filling.

- 2 eggs
- ½ cup sugar
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ½ pound finely ground almonds

Beat eggs until very light and add sugar, salt, and ground almonds which have been put through food chopper twice. Bake 30 minutes in a slow moderate oven (325 degrees).

## **Black Walnut Bread.** (Makes 1 loaf)

- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup black walnuts (rolled fine)
- 3 cups flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder

Combine milk, sugar and walnuts. Sift flour and baking powder together, and blend with the first mixture. Pour batter into small, greased bread pan. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 60 to 70 minutes.

## **Dream Bars.**

(Serves 6-8)

- 1¼ cups flour
- 1½ cups brown sugar
- ½ cup butter
- ½ teaspoon baking powder
- 2 eggs (well beaten)
- ½ teaspoon vanilla extract
- ¾ cup coconut

Mix 1 cup flour with 2 tablespoons brown sugar. Cut in butter. Pat into greased square pan and bake 10 minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees). Add baking powder to remaining ¼ cup flour and sift. Beat eggs and add the remaining 1½ cups brown sugar, beating thoroughly. Then add the flour and the vanilla extract. Spread this mixture over the partially baked butter



and flour mixture. Sprinkle with coconut, return to oven, and continue baking approximately 25 minutes longer.

## **English Currant Bread.**

- 2 cups bread flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- ½ teaspoon nutmeg
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ cup sugar
- 2 tablespoons butter
- ¾ cup currants
- ½ cup pecans or other nut meats (broken)

- 1 egg (well beaten)
- ½ cup milk
- 1 teaspoon orange rind (grated)
- 1 teaspoon orange juice

Sift all dry ingredients together. Cut in shortening. Add currants and nut meats. Combine egg and milk and add to first mixture. Add orange juice and rind. Mix well. Place in well-greased loaf pan. Bake in moderately hot oven (400 degrees) 40 to 45 minutes.

## **Strawberry Jam Gems.**

- 2 cups general purpose flour
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- ¼ cup shortening
- ¾ cup milk

## **Strawberry preserves**

Sift all dry ingredients and blend in shortening. Add liquid and knead lightly for a few seconds. Form small biscuits with finger tips as for yeast dough mixtures. Make small indentation with spoon and put 1 teaspoon strawberry preserves in each indentation. Stretch dough over opening and place in greased muffin tins. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees) until brown. Serve hot like biscuits.

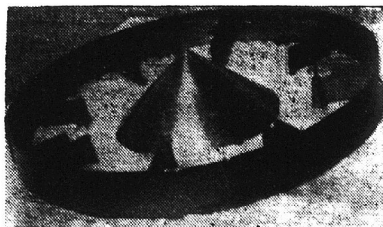

## Diver Foresees Treasure Ships Giving Up Gold

MIAMI BEACH, FLA.—A fortune of \$70,000,000 in silver and gold lies buried along the Silver shoals in the Caribbean sea, where Spanish galleons were wrecked in 1642, believes Capt. John D. Craig, diver and sea photographer.

Addressing the committee of 100 here, Craig said he believed that some day most of the gold and silver would be recovered. He returned recently from an expedition in the region south of Puerto Rico, where the huge fortune is believed to be located.

"We failed to find any trace of the lost treasure, but we did find some of the cannon off the wrecked galleons," he said. "Some day divers may recover that buried fortune."

Craig told of his experiences filming underwater pictures in the Caribbean, where sharks and other dangerous fish abound.

He described how his crew of men fought sharks by letting air out through the sleeves of their diving suits. Bubbles would ripple out, frightening the sharks, he said.

## Old Hospital Bill Paid To Assuage Conscience

WATERLOO, N. Y.—Mrs. Alice M. Yaw, Waterloo Memorial hospital superintendent, exhibits a faded slip of paper and a \$2 bill as proof that most hospital patients believe honesty is the best policy.

The currency, she said, came from a man who walked into her office and stated he wished to pay an eight-year-old bill. The man was injured on Memorial day, 1932, at the local race track and after being treated at the hospital, left without settling the small bill.

"I've come a long way to pay this bill," the man said, "but I feel a lot better now."

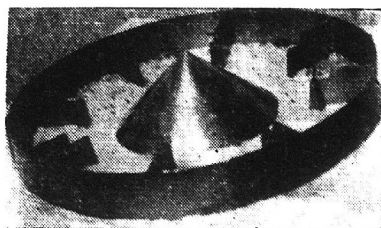

## YELLOW LINE MARKING NO-PASSING ZONES IS BEING REFLECTORIZED

Further safety for motorists traveling state highways in Indiana at night is being provided by reflectorizing the yellow lines which designate no-passing zones on curves and grades. T. A. Dicus, chairman of the

State Highway Commission announced recently. A number of miles of highways already have been marked and the work of marking the remainder of the state highway system is proceeding rapidly.

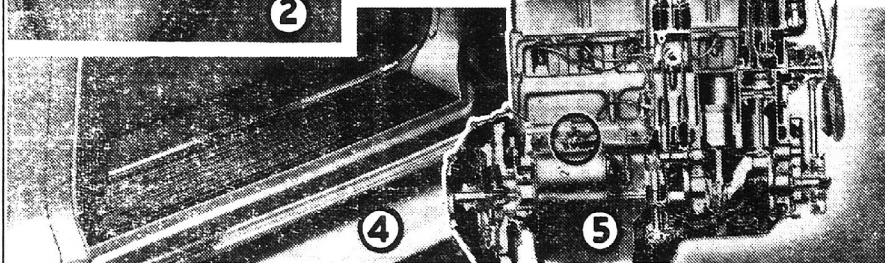
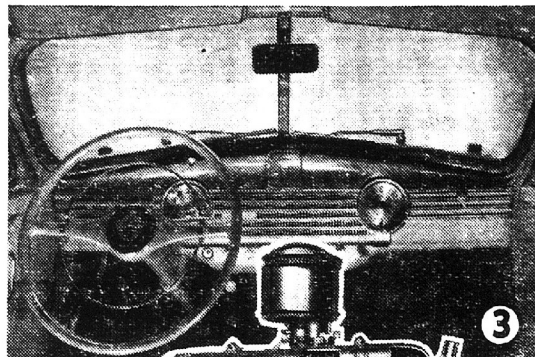
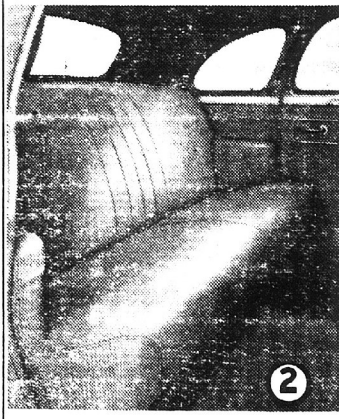
The yellow line, painted on the pavement parallel to the center stripe warns motorists that sight distance ahead is limited and that it is

hazardous to attempt to pass other vehicles moving in the same direction. This marking is standard on all state highways in Indiana which carry an average daily traffic of 750 or more vehicles and has been a factor in reducing accidents on curves and grades.

This line is now being reflectorized, spreading glass beads on the

paint as it is being applied to the pavement. The thousands of small beads serve as reflectors, making the yellow line more visible at night under all weather and traffic conditions. Experiments in the value of using beads in the paint were conducted for some time and met with the approval of motorists.

## Beauty Reaches All-Time High in New '41 Chevrolet

IT WAITS ON MAN ALONE: I am a member of a well known lodge. It so happens that my attendance is irregular. Because of my irregular attendance I receive during the year from members of the lodge, no less than fifty invitations to attend its meetings. I have often wondered why there is such a difference in the practice of inviting absent members to lodge and inviting absent members to church. I know of church members who seem to take some pride in the fact that they are church members who never, to my knowledge, have invited anyone out to church. I think in their failure to do this they rob themselves of a certain amount of satisfaction and spiritual increase. Men and women are, as a rule, interested in an organization in the degree that they give to it their service, and they give to it their service in the degree in which they are interested. Service for one's church consists in doing something that will make it grow. To make a church grow a member has to do more than merely attend, himself. He must get to attend. When he does this the church grows and he grows also. Christ left his work in the hands of men. There is no other plan by which it is to be carried on except as one man through his interest and personality brings the invitation to another, and he to another. Men are led by men and not by creeds or philosophies. The extension of God's Kingdom and his church waits on man alone.
